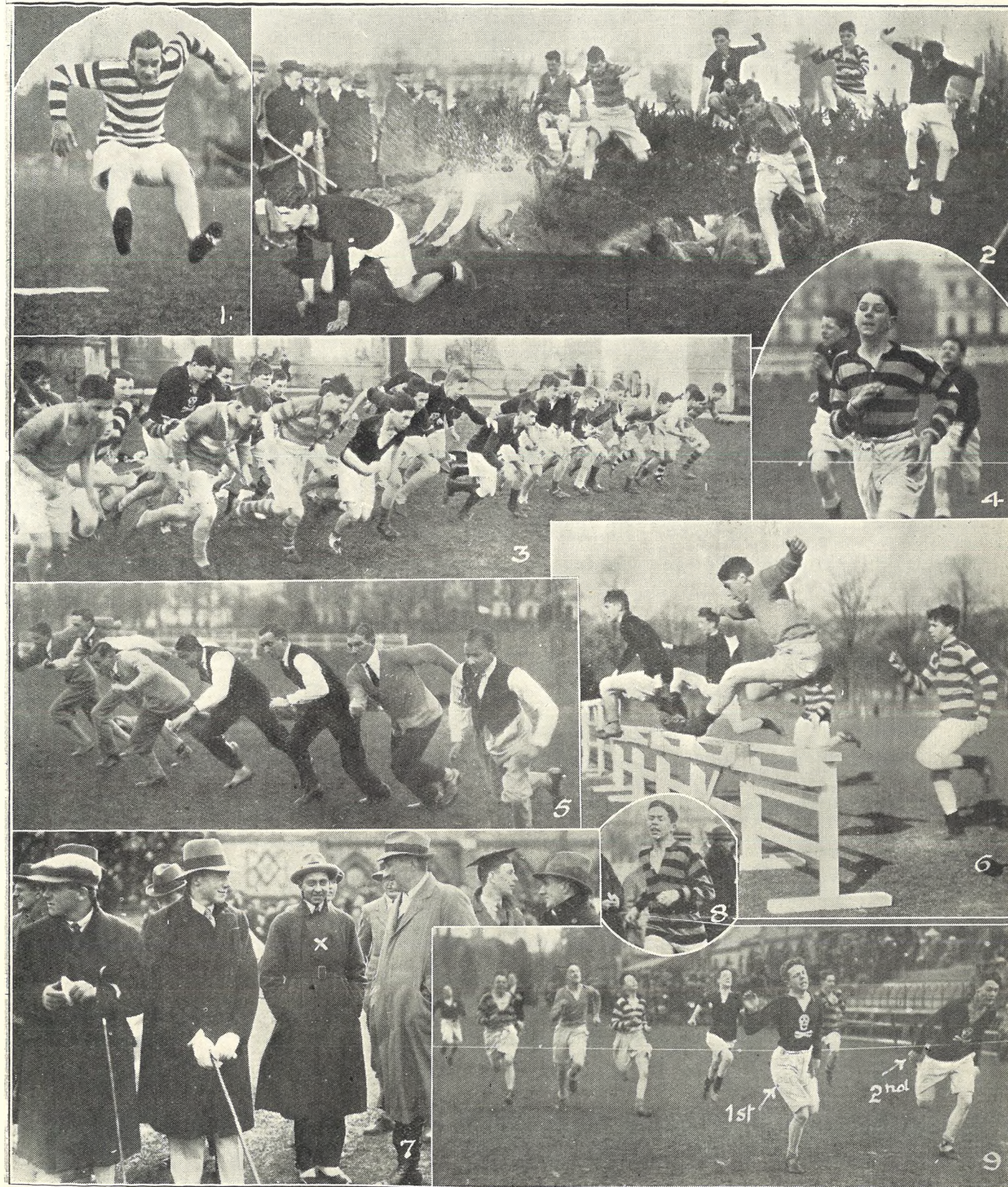

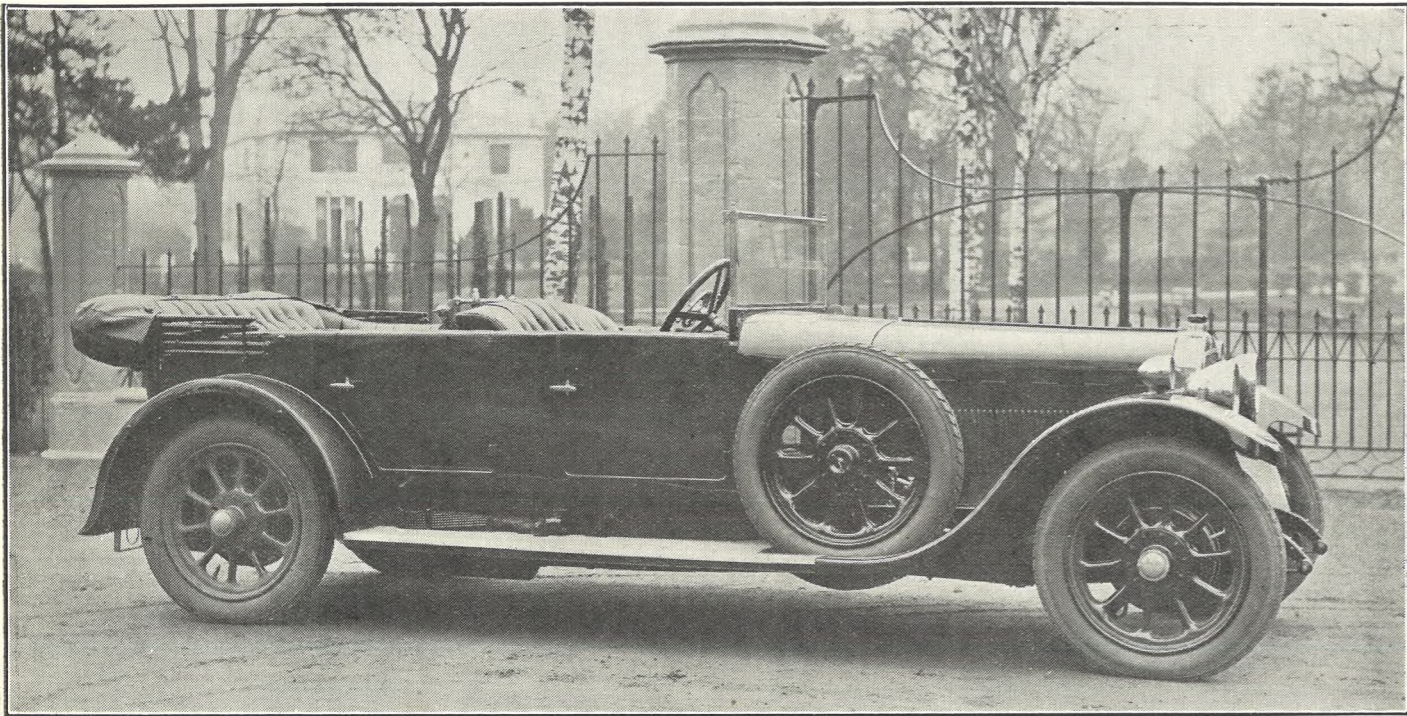


CHELTENHAM COLLEGE SPORTS.

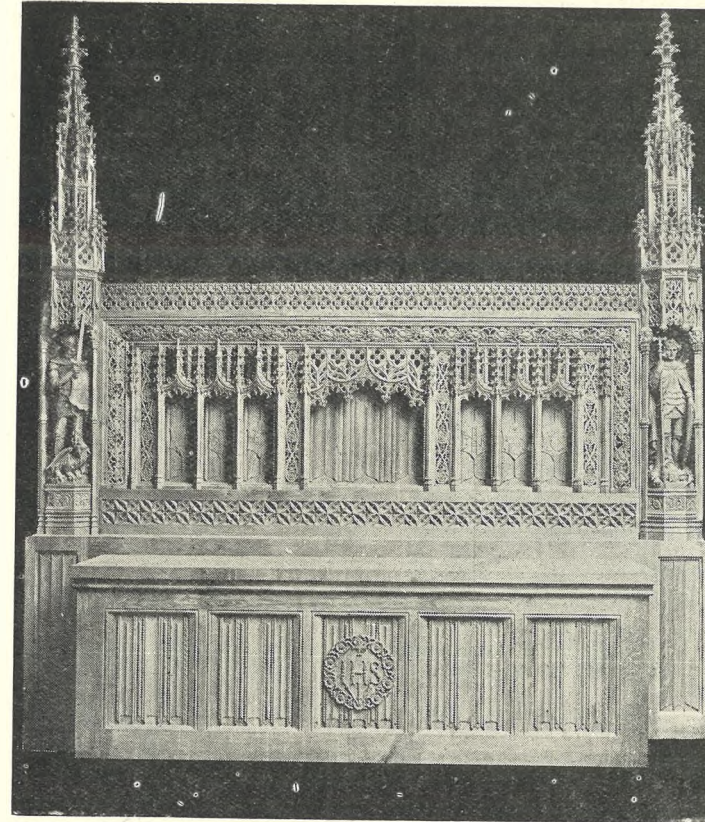

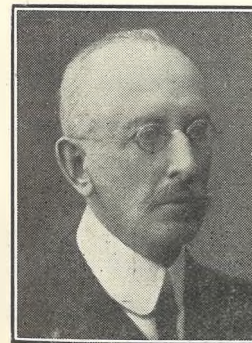

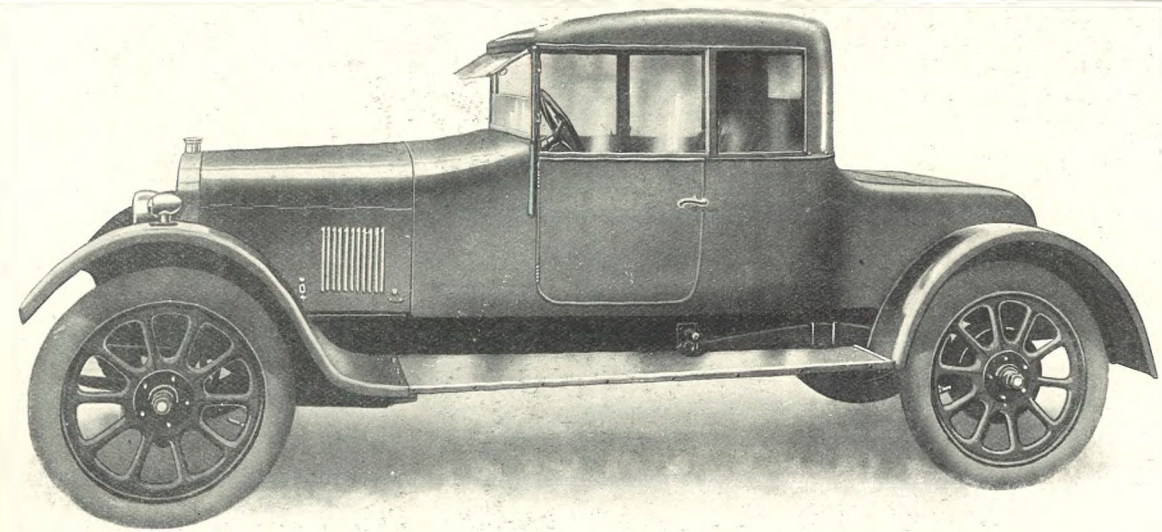

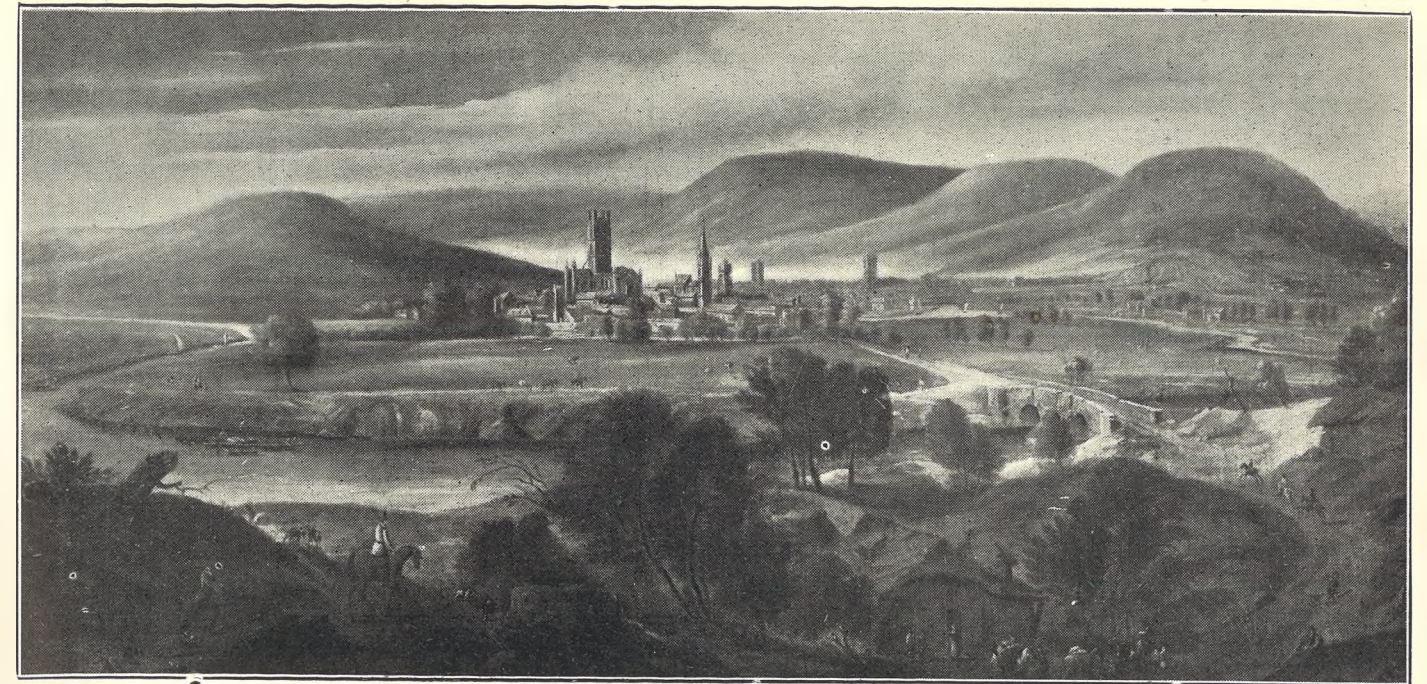

WESTERN CENTRE A.C.U. HILL CLIMB AT CHATCOMBE, NEAR CHELTENHAM.

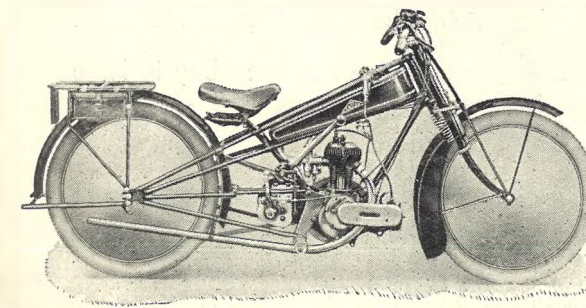

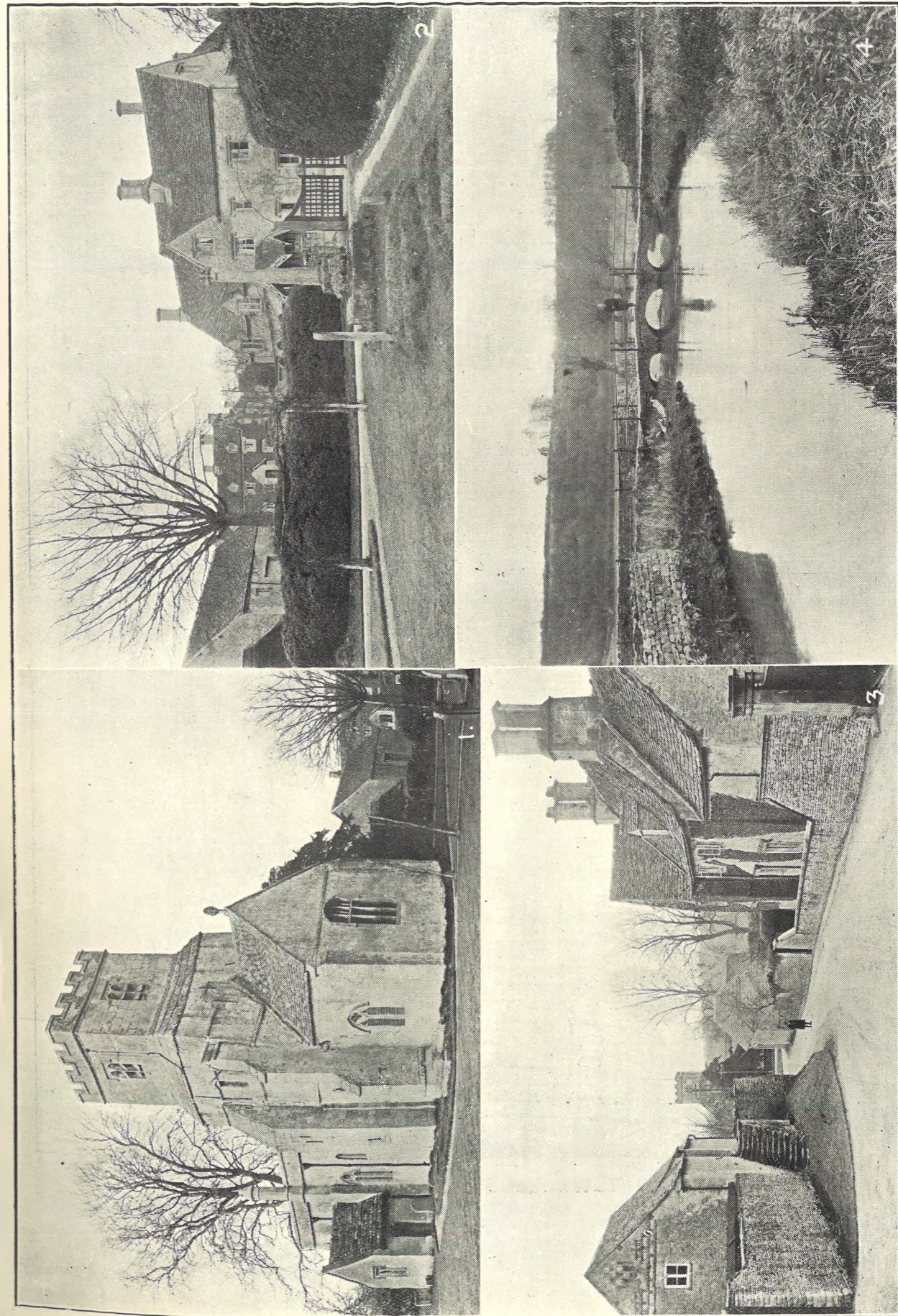

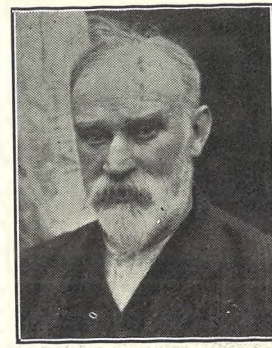

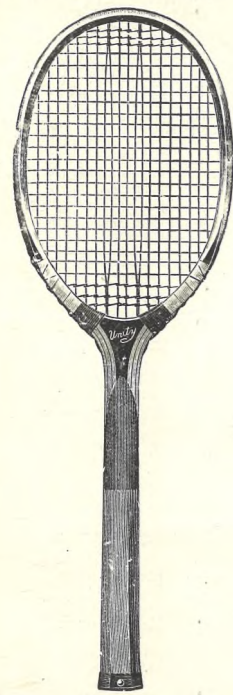
