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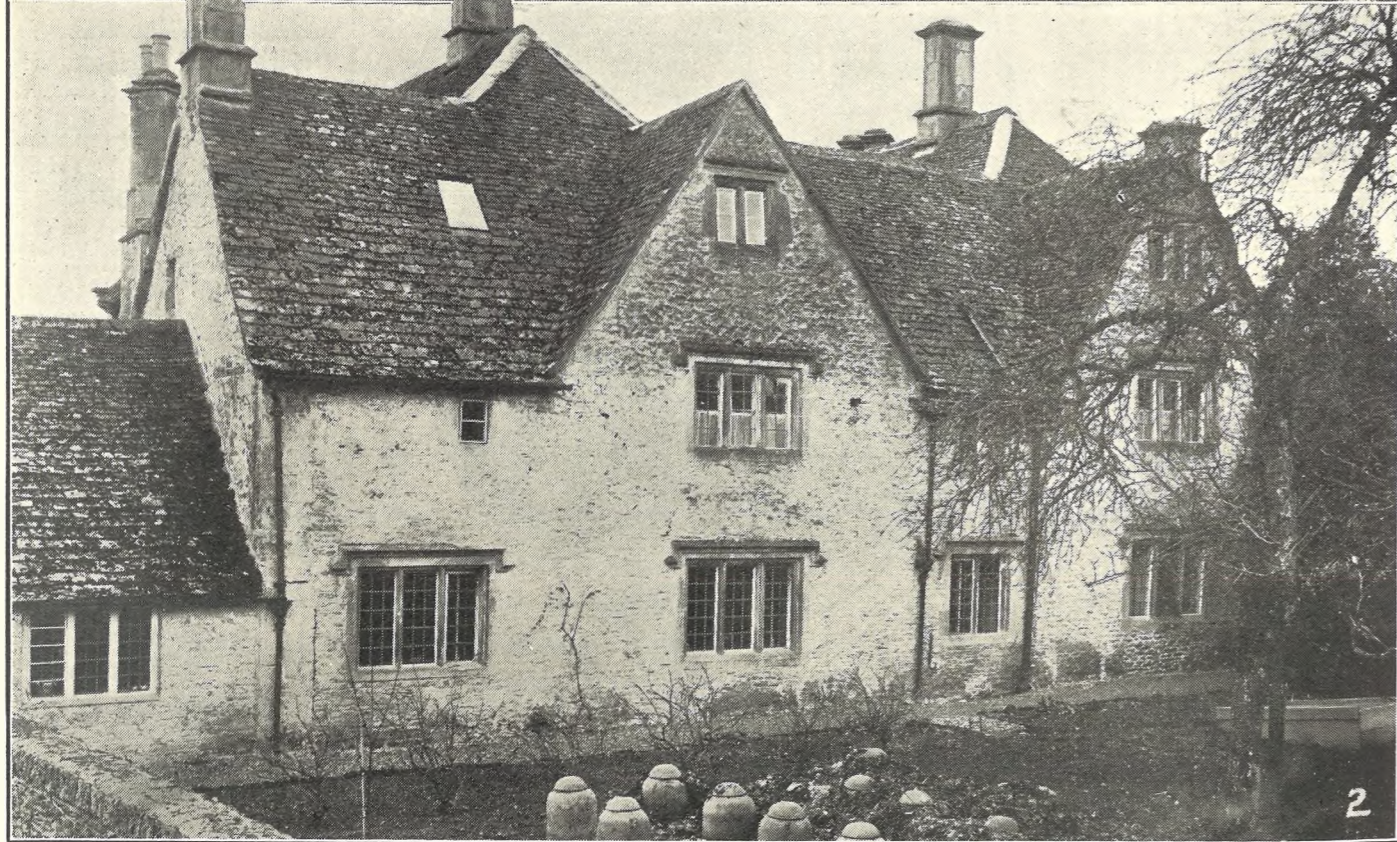
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—COLN ROGERS.

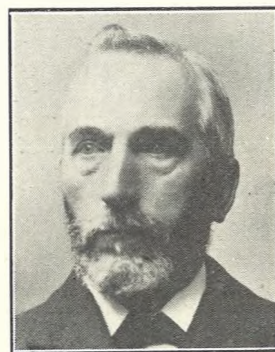

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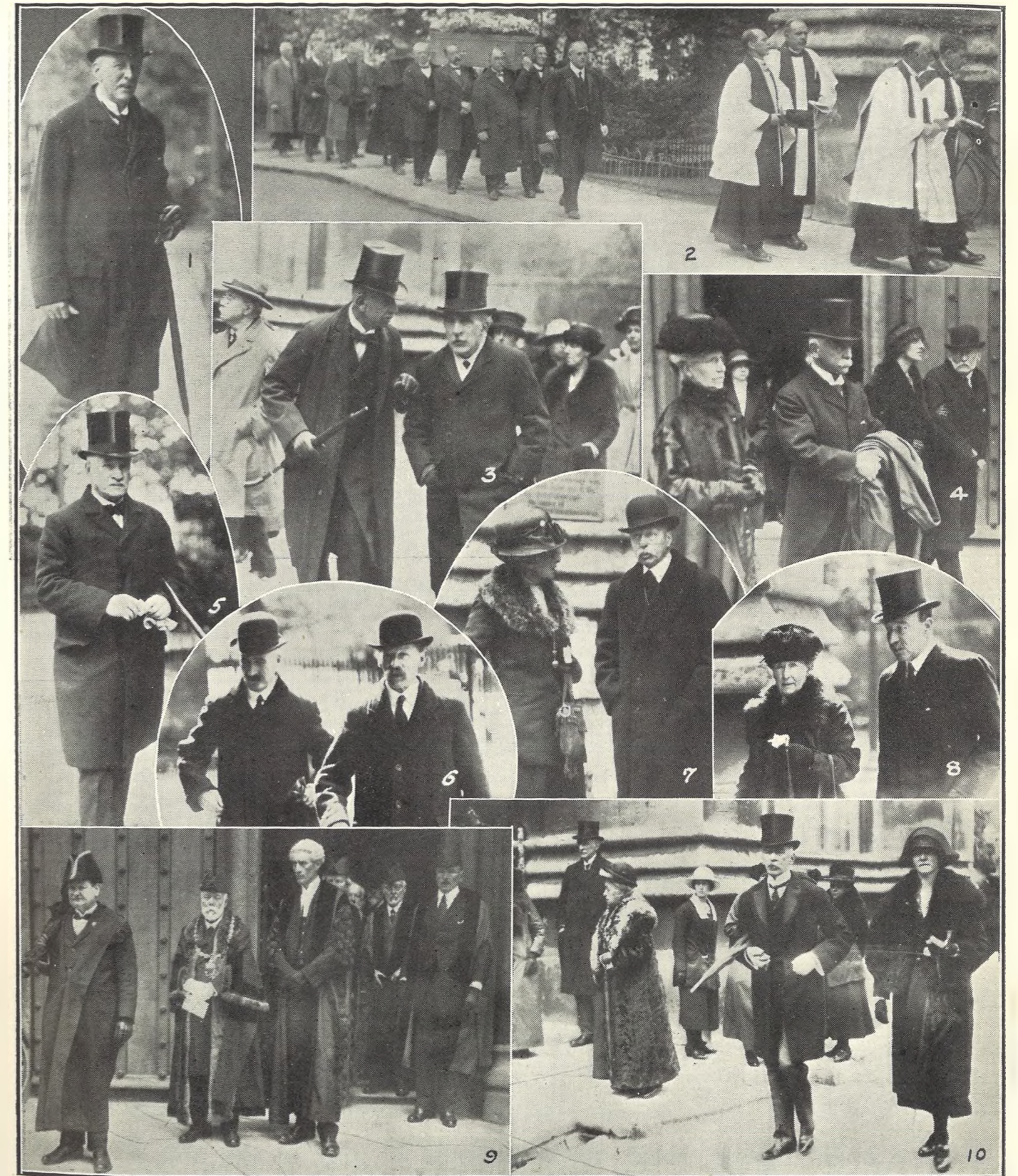

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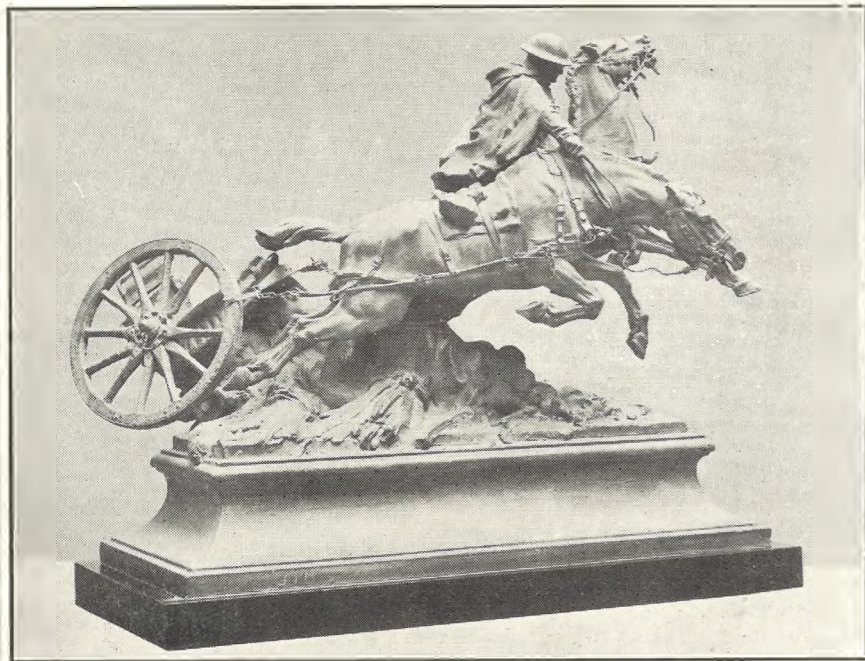

WOODEN CROSSES FROM THE BATTLEFIELDS.

A number of the original wooden crosses removed from the graves of Cheltonians on the Battlefields of Europe, as their bodies were reinterred in the larger cemeteries, have been sent to England, and erected on oak rails in a plot in Cheltenham Cemetery near the entrance gates. There are 90 at present, but many more are expected.

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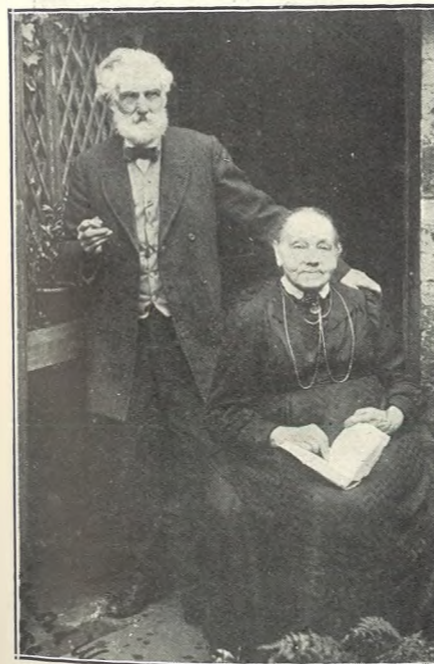
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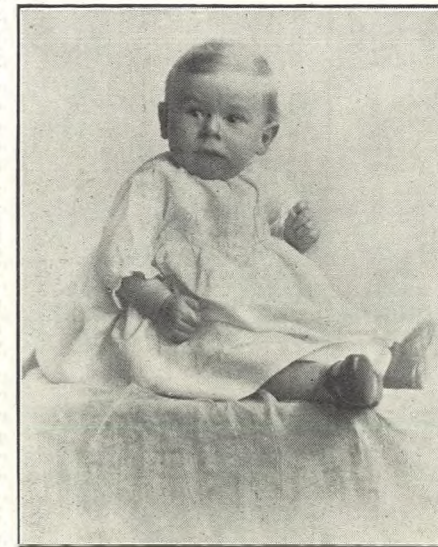
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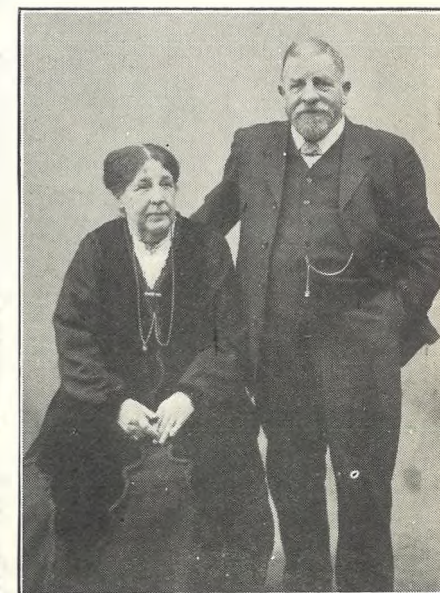
MR. ALFRED MAYALL,

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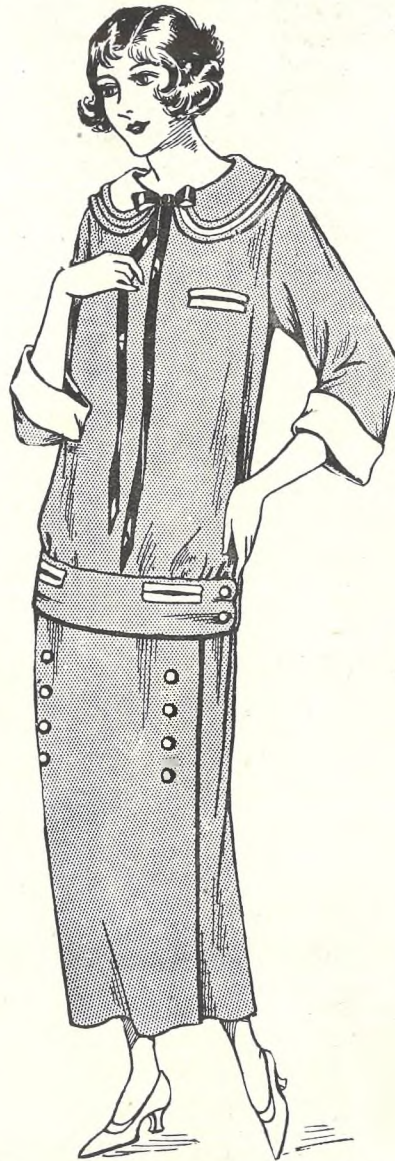
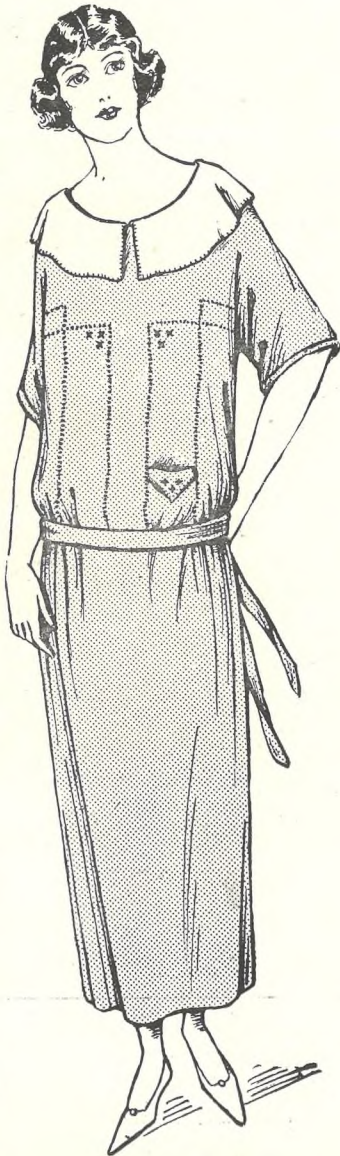
