Woof is the old Gloucestershire professional, who first played for the County in 1880, and was honoured by a place in the team against the Australians in 1902, after an absence from first-class cricket of ten years. He is 65 years of age, and is at present the popular coach at Cheltenham College, a position he has occupied for well over 30 years.

W. C. Woof is a son of "old Billy," and, like his father before him, is a first-class cricketer. He has never gained County honours, but for Cheltenham Town he has attained fame with his excellent bowling, whilst he has been known to amass goodly totals with the bat.

The youngest member of the trio, P. W. Woof, is the son of "young Billy," and he has this season been awarded his colours at Cheltenham Grammar School, being an excellent all-round player.

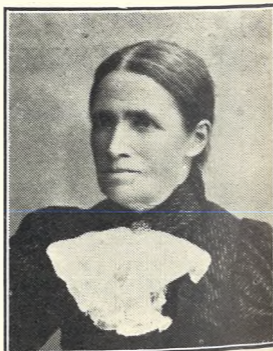

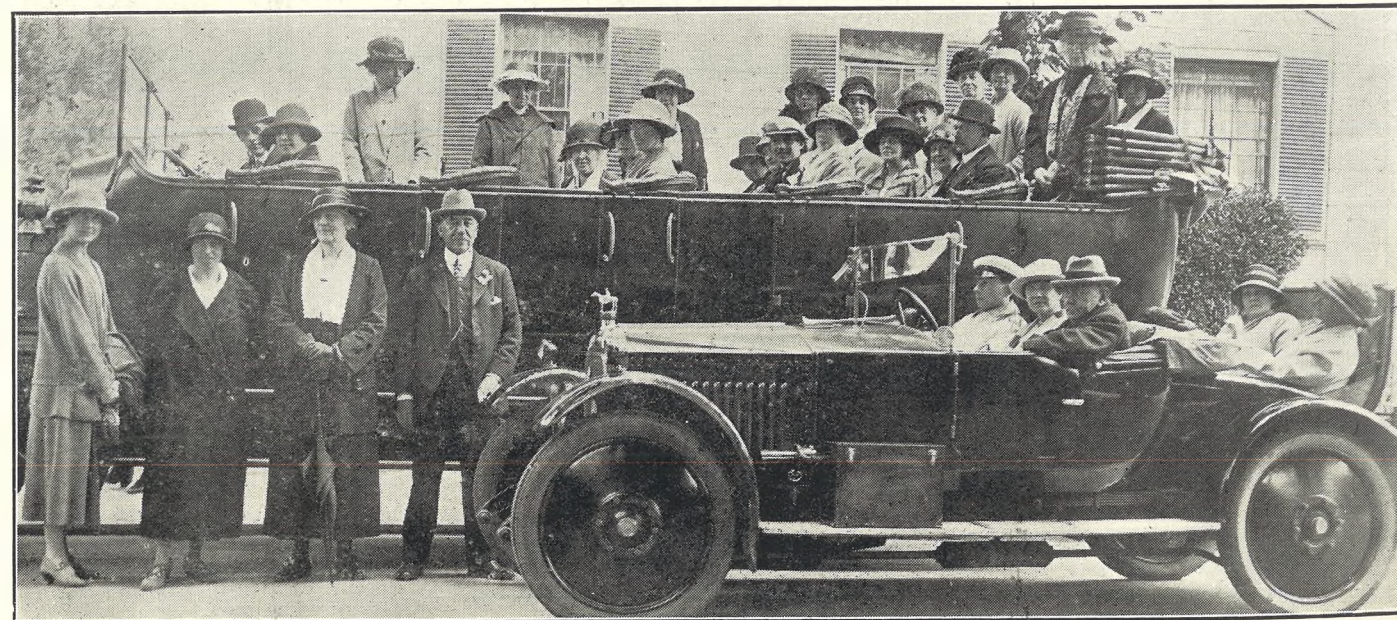

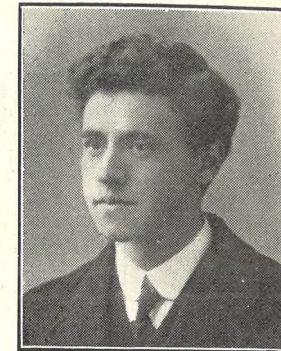

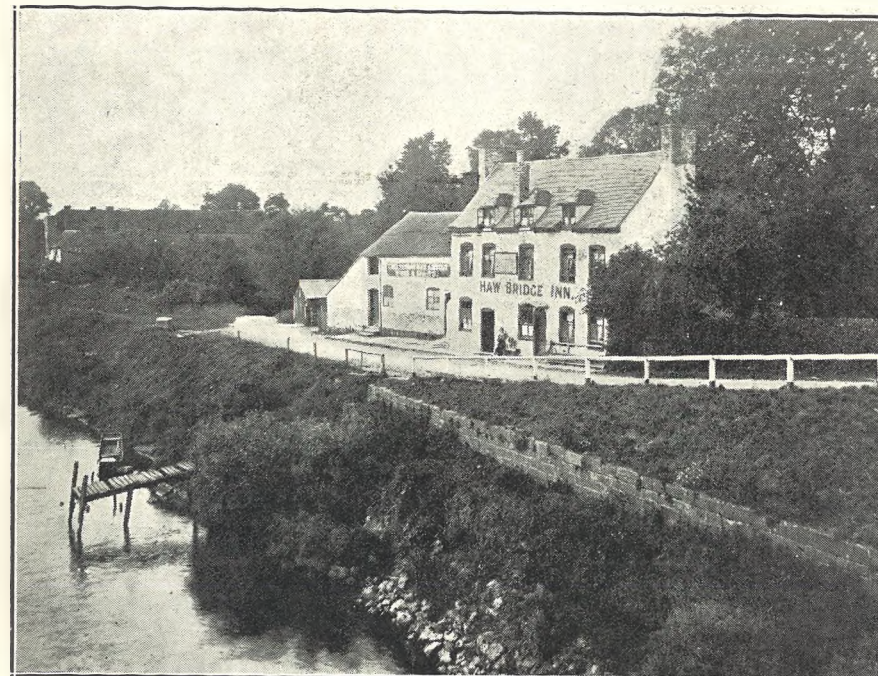


NAILSWORTH HORSE SHOW AND CARNIVAL.

HAW BRIDGE INN.

HAW BRIDGE INN.

Once known as the Passage Inn. Before the weir was erected at Gloucester, the Passage, the Wain Lode, and the Lower Lode were three of the best known crossings of the river Severn in the ancient days. The Haw Bridge Inn was re-named when the bridge was erected 100 years ago, and the Inn has probably been in existence since the earliest days. It is peculiarly liable to floods, but it is very well known as a resort of the bargemen.

NEW INN, LEDBURY.

An old coaching house, with a pleasant old court yard with rooms overhanging. It is a well-known market house in this quaint old town!

TRUMPET INN, Pixley, near Ledbury.

At the junction of two main roads, is probably one of the best known houses in Herefordshire. The present building is of the 17th century, and though leaning very heavily will probably last many years. It would be interesting to know how the name of the house originated.

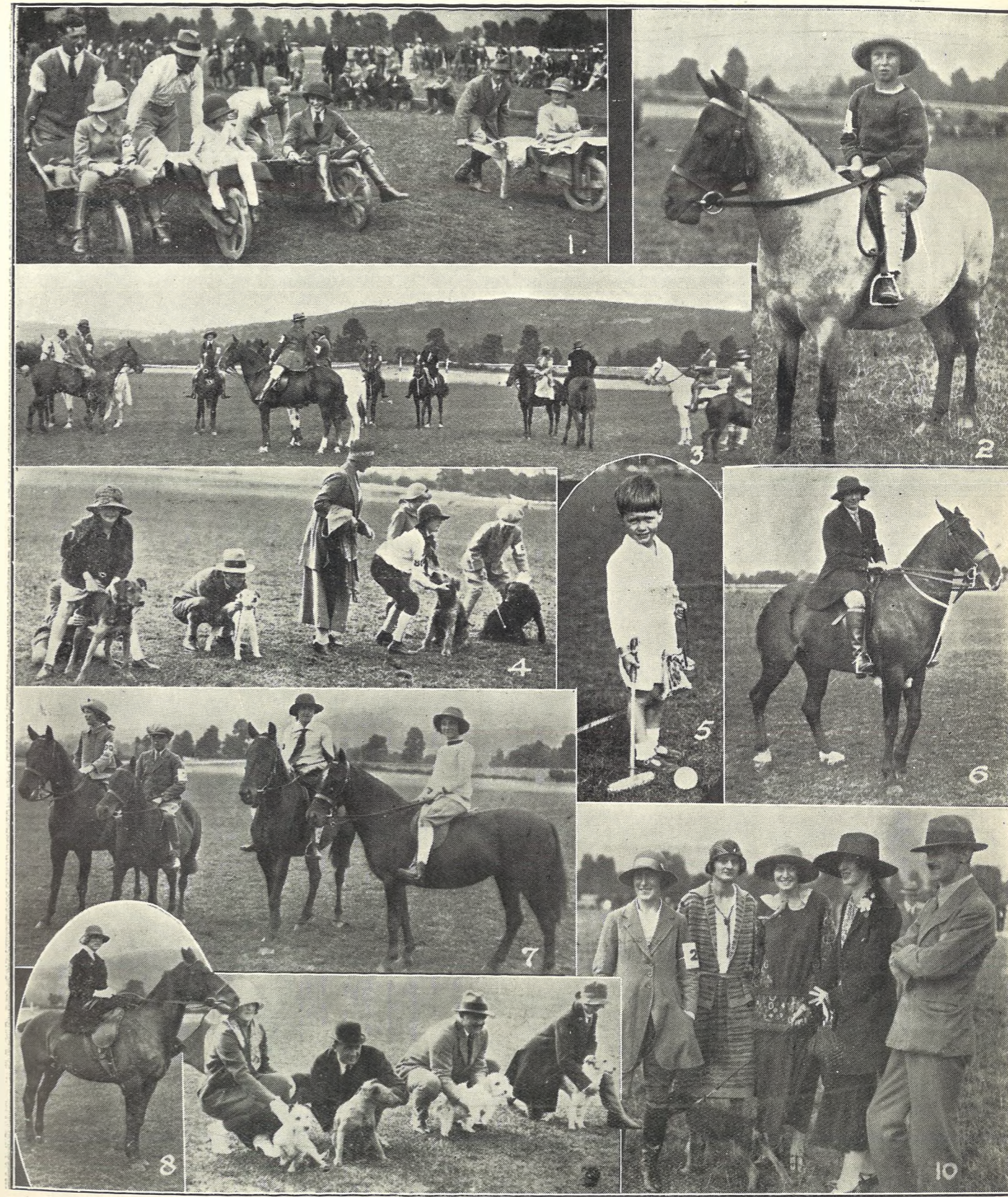

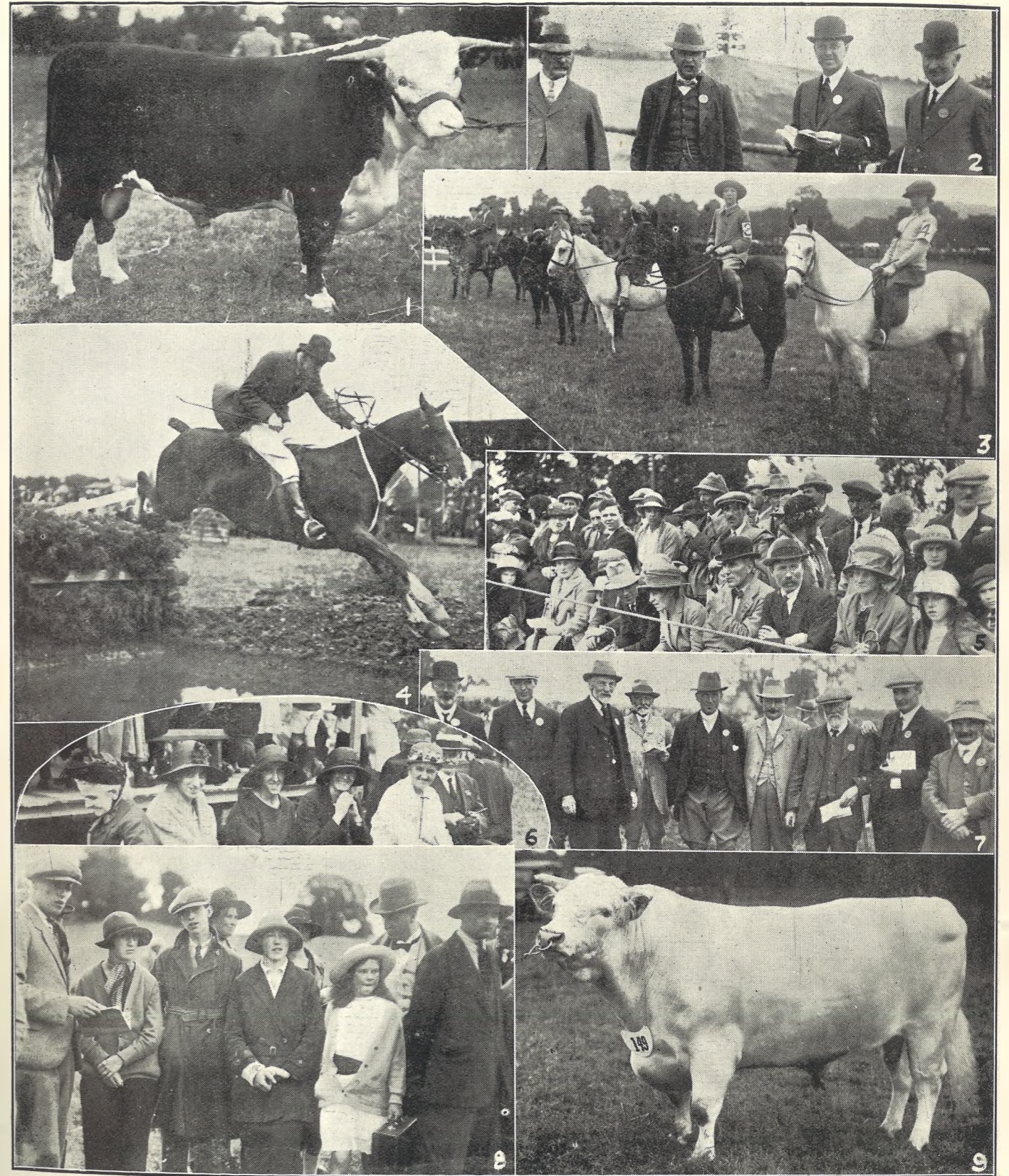

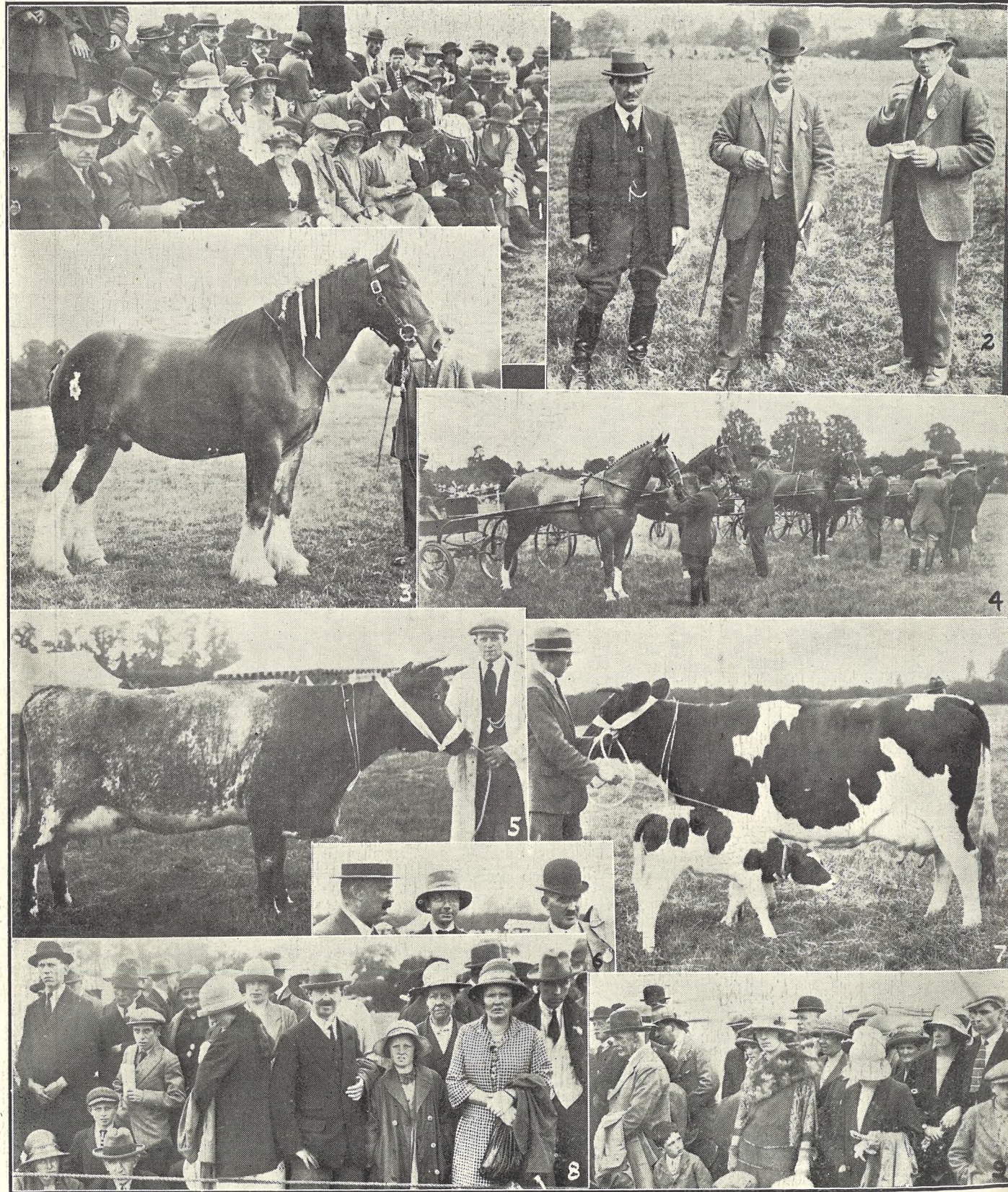

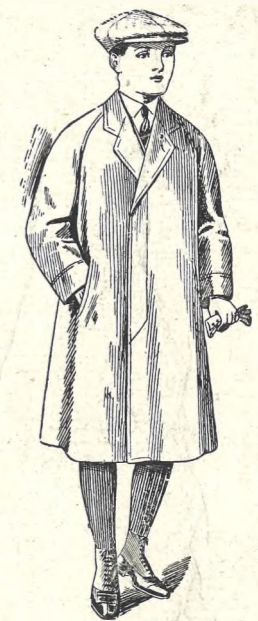
THE BLOCKLEY MOTOR COACH DISASTER.

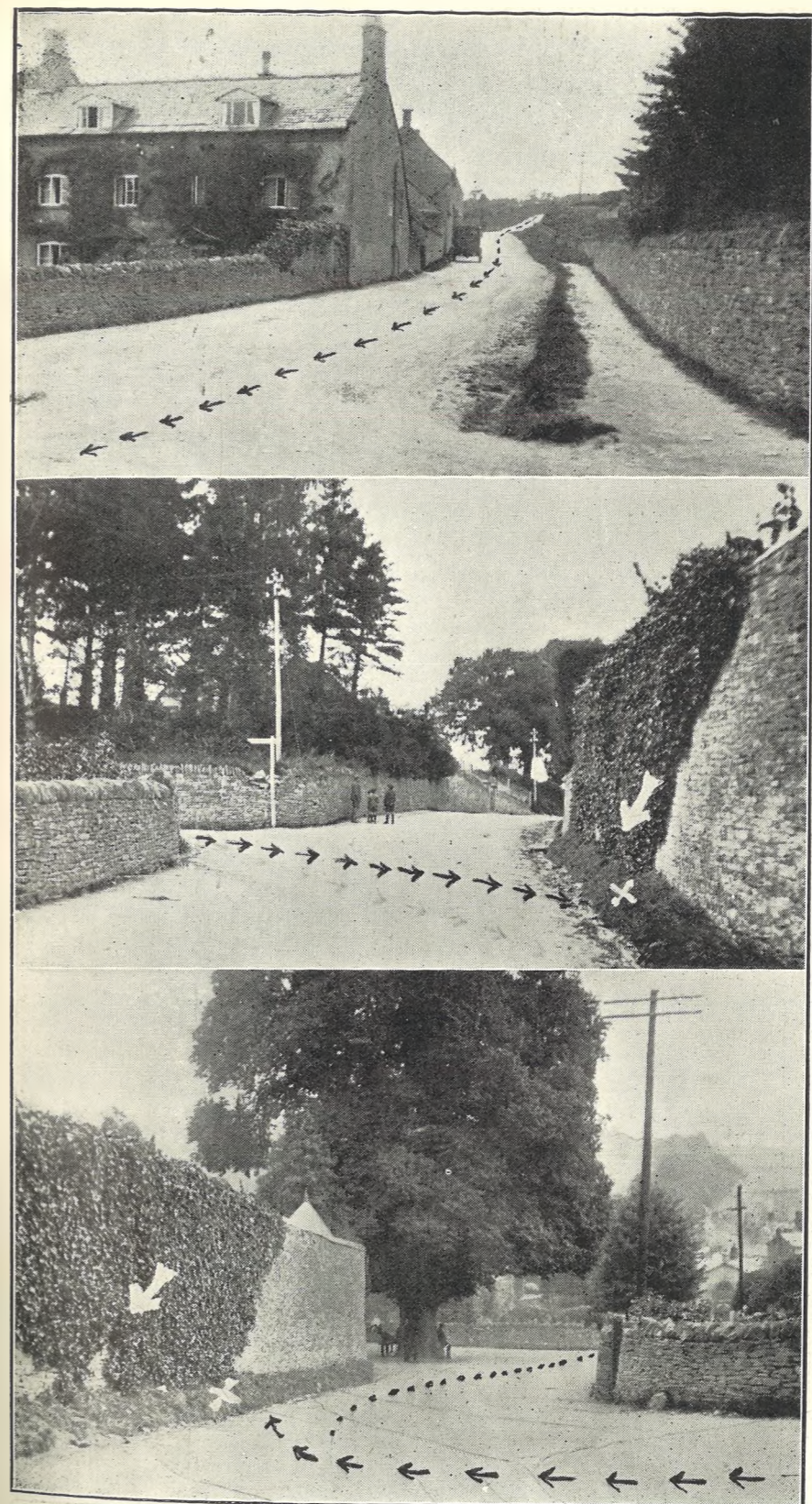

On Tuesday, August 5th, a Ford charabanc, containing 19 women and children, returning from Stanton, near Broadway, to their homes at Blockley, got out of control through the main shaft breaking while descending the mile-long steep hill leading into the village. In turning the sharp corner into the village itself, the car turned over, throwing the helpless passengers with terrible force against the stone wall, killing seven and injuring all the others but two, one of whom had jumped out and the other (a little girl) having a miraculous escape.

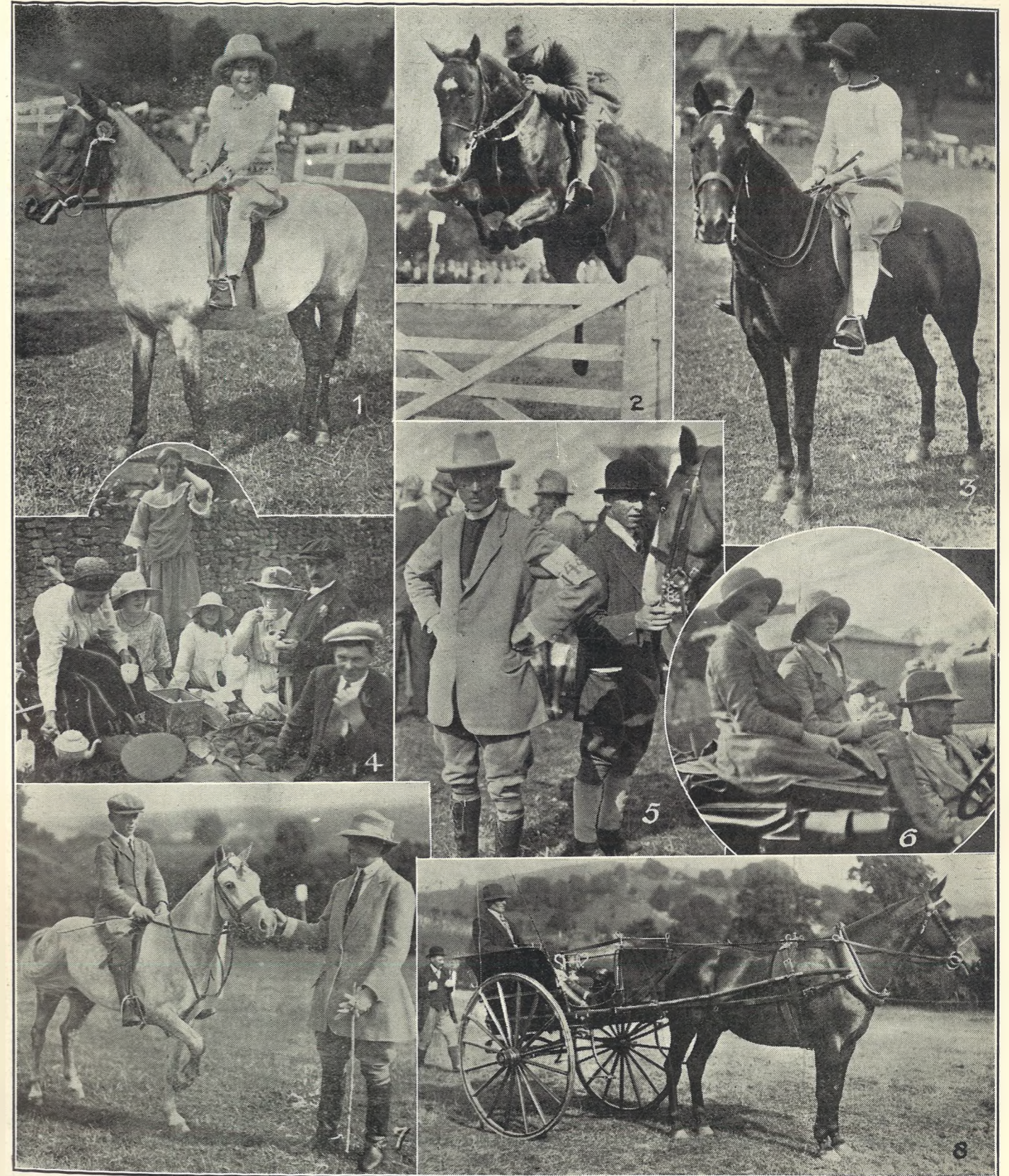

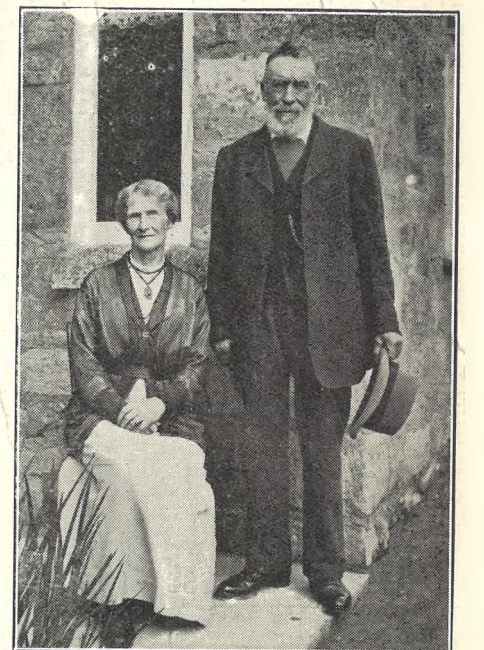

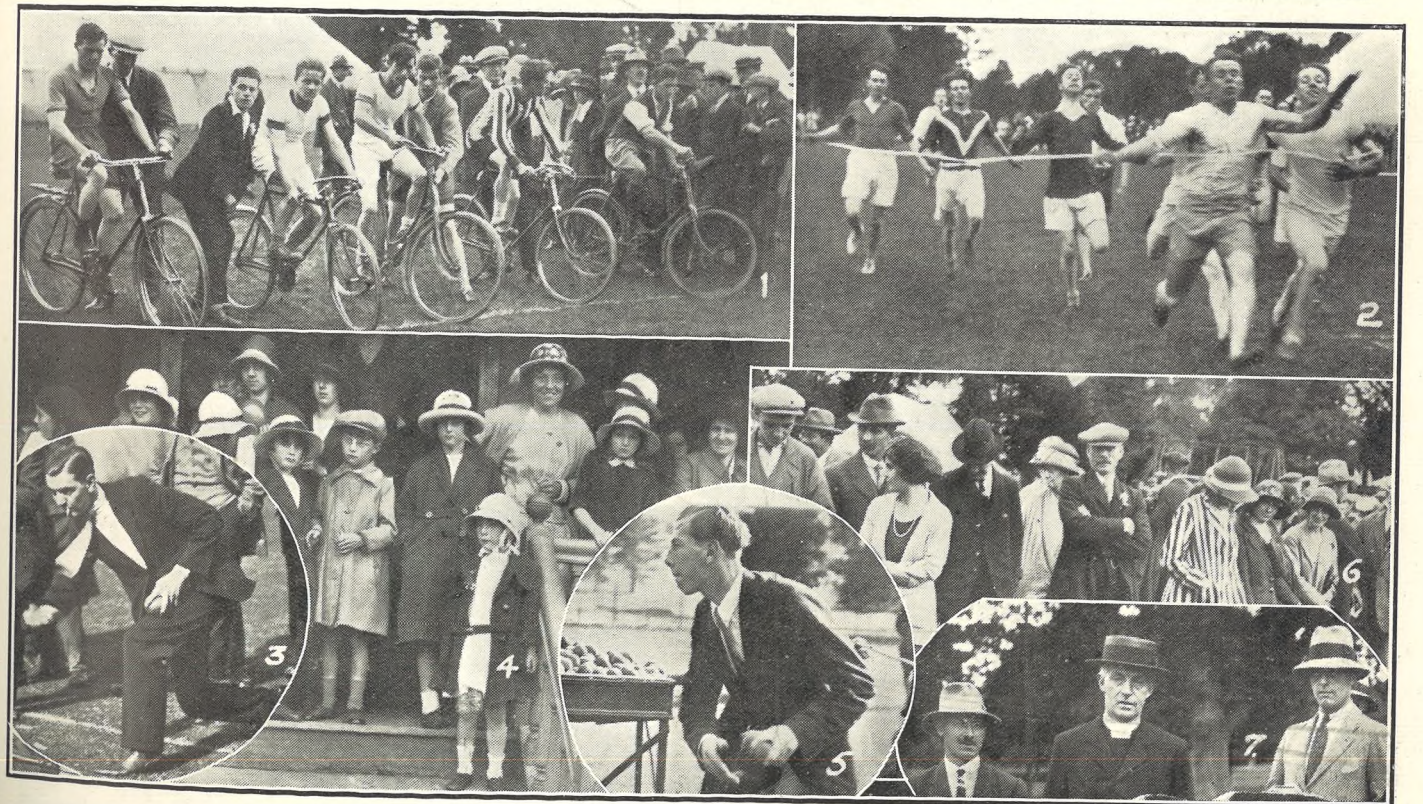
