HAW BRIDGE INN.

Once known as the Passage Inn. Before the weir was erected at Glouces-Before the werr was erected at Glouces-ter, the Passage, the Wain Lode, and the Lower Lode were three of the best known crossings of the river Severn in the anoient days. The Haw Bridge Inn was re-named when the bridge was erected 100 years ago, and the Inn has probably been in existence since the earliest days. It is peculiarly liable to floods, but it is very well known as a resort of the bargemen.
