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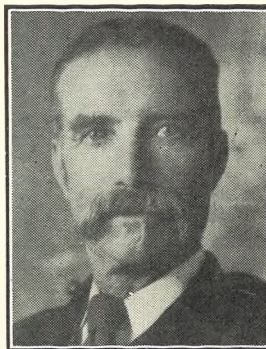

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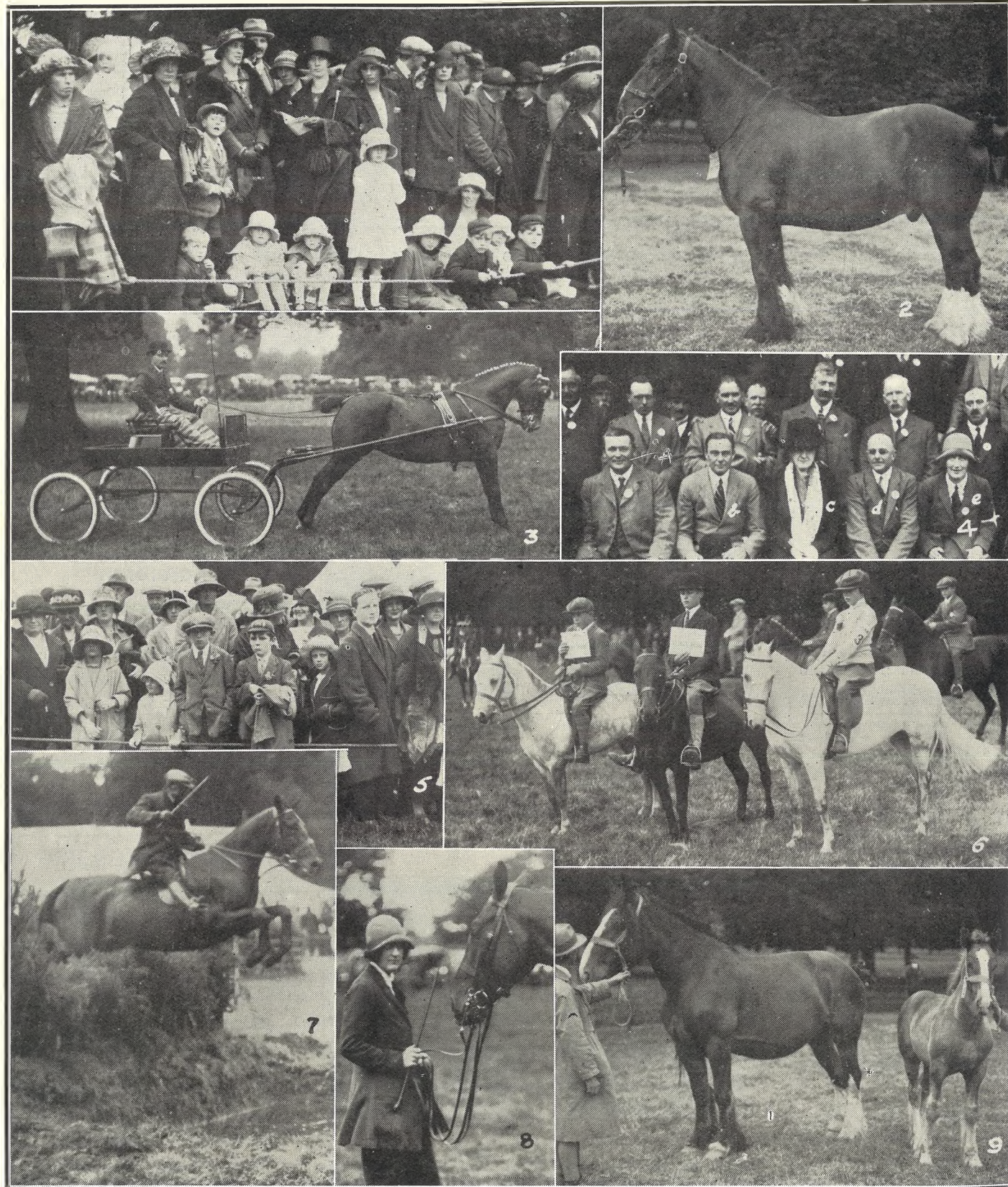
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LEDBURY HUNT AGRICULTURAL AND HORTICULTURAL SHOW.

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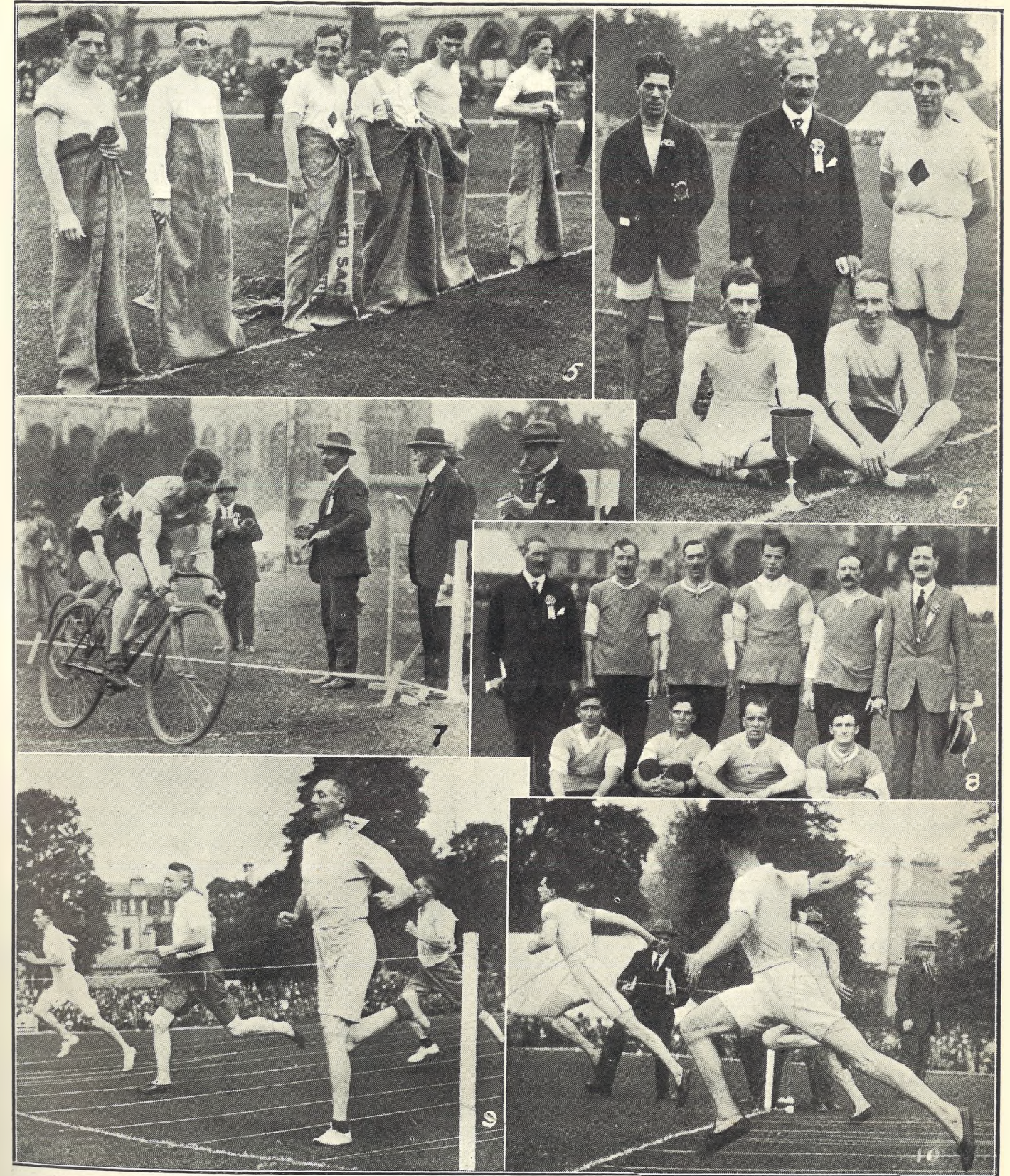


GLOUCESTERSHIRE CONSTABULARY SPORTS MEETING.

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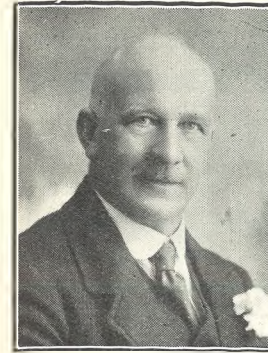

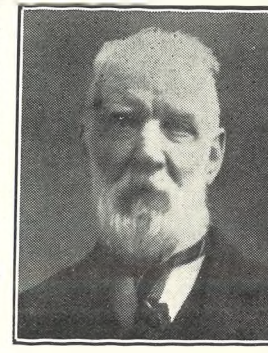

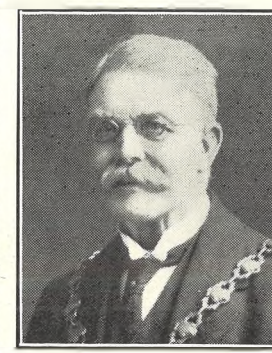

He was one of the most highly respected and well-known residents of Charlton Kings, having been in business as a butcher in London-road for many years. He was a staunch Conservative, and for years a member of Charlton Kings Urban District Council.

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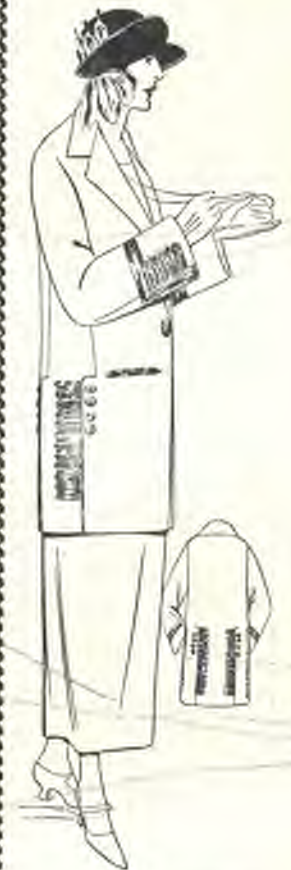

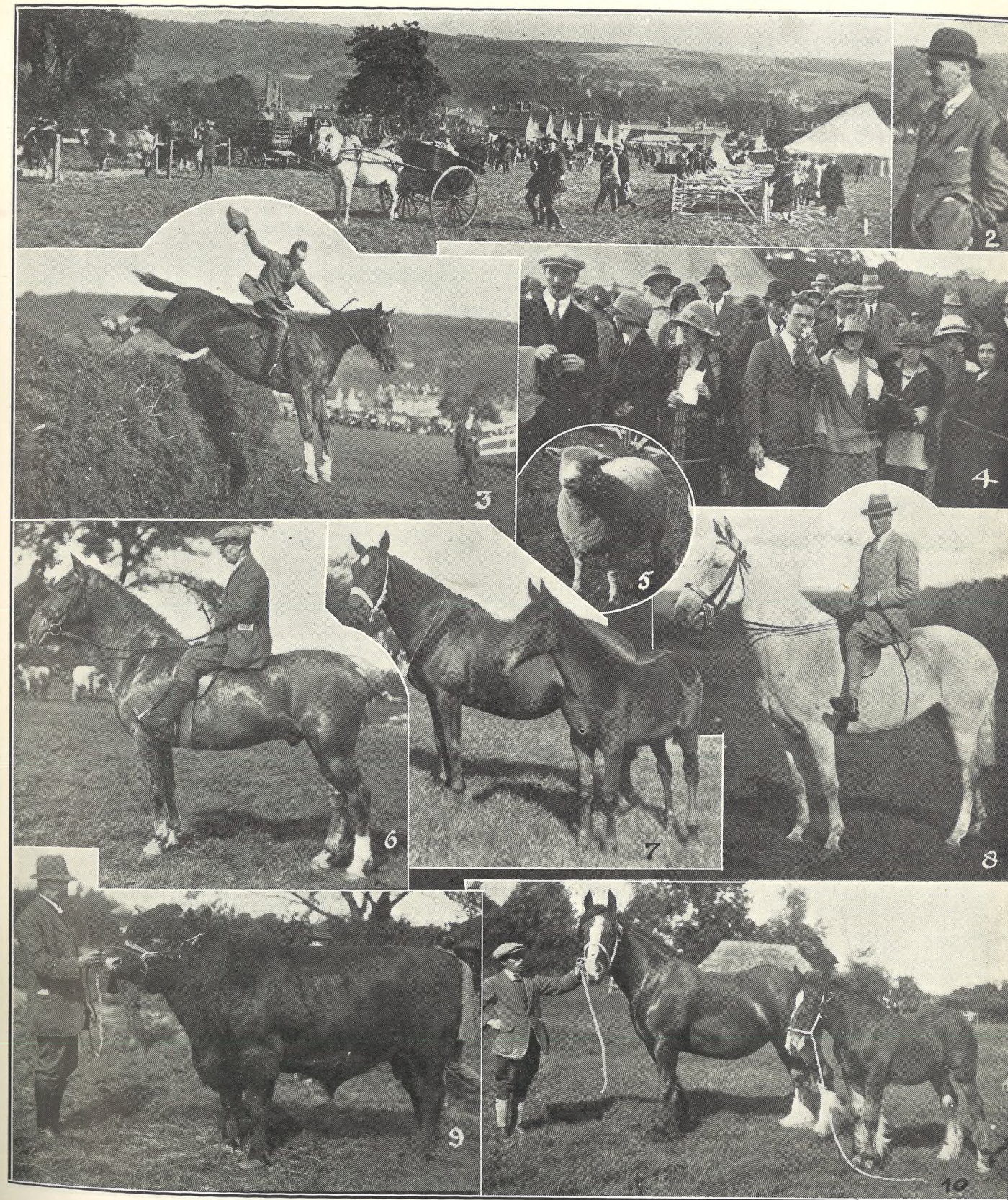

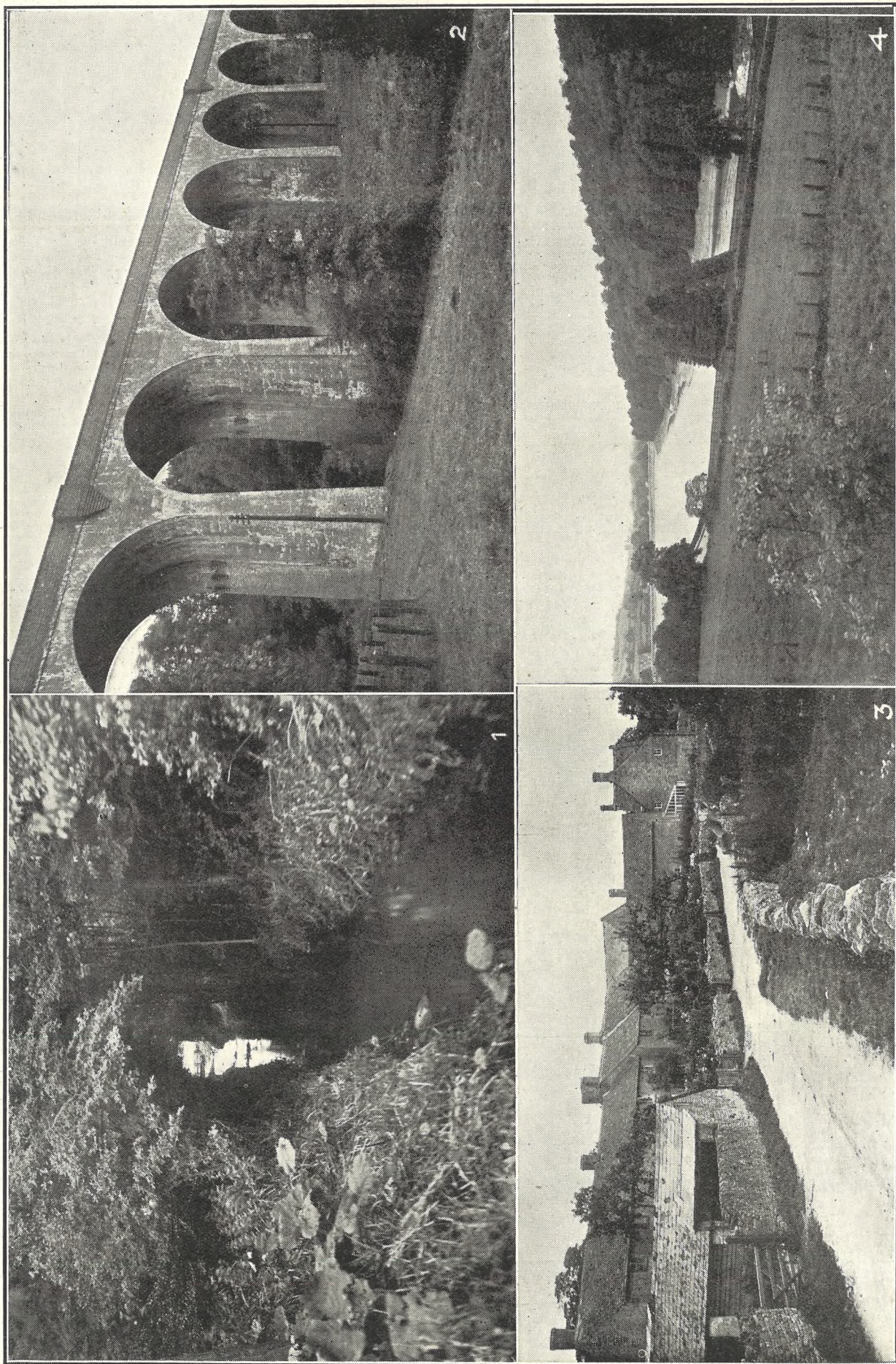
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTER SHIRE.—ANDOVERSFORD AND DISTRICT.
 Andoversford, about five miles from Cheltenham, on the Northleach and Oxford road, is only a hamlet of Dowdeswell, and is the entrance to the Cotswolds from Cheltenham.

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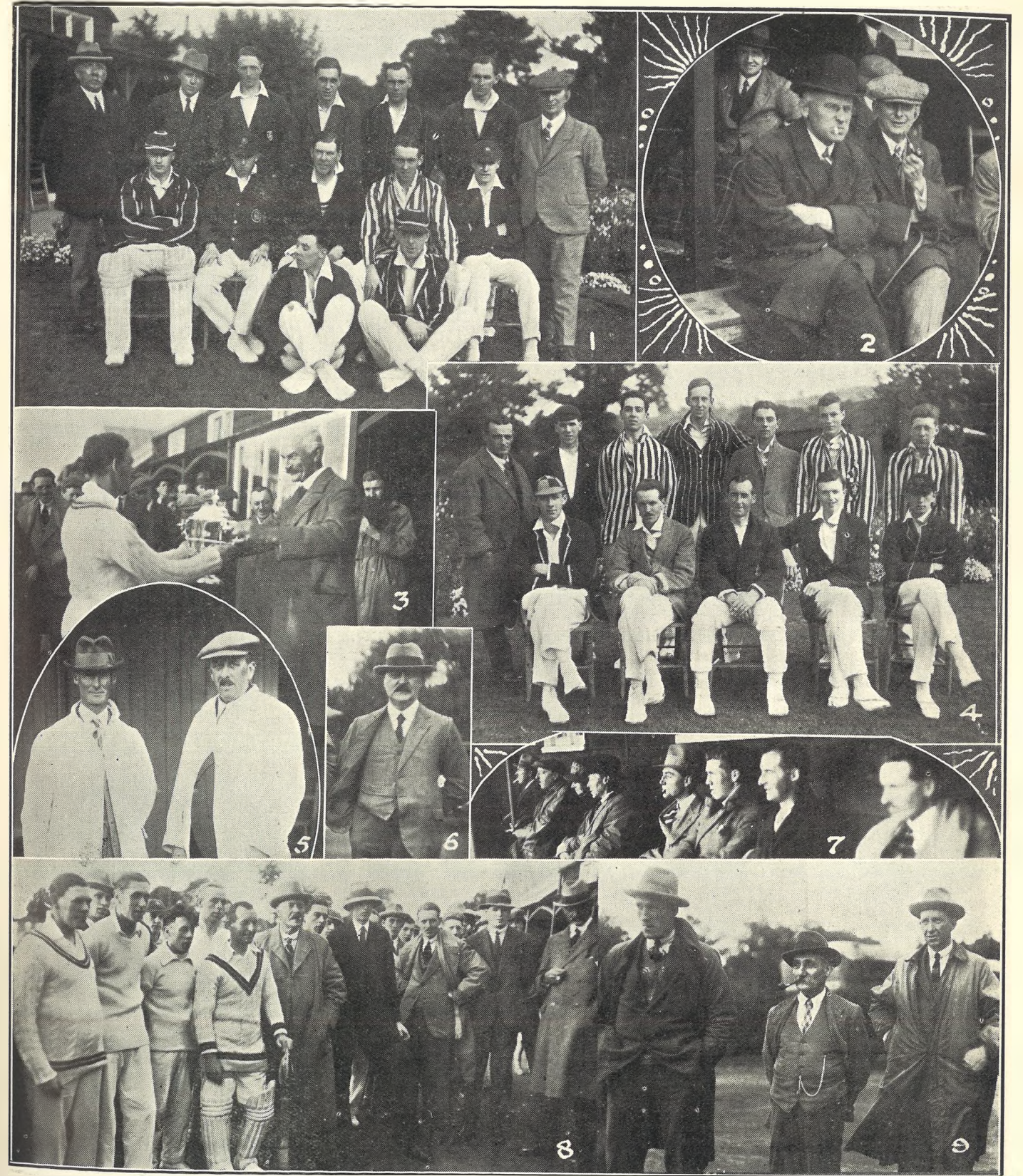

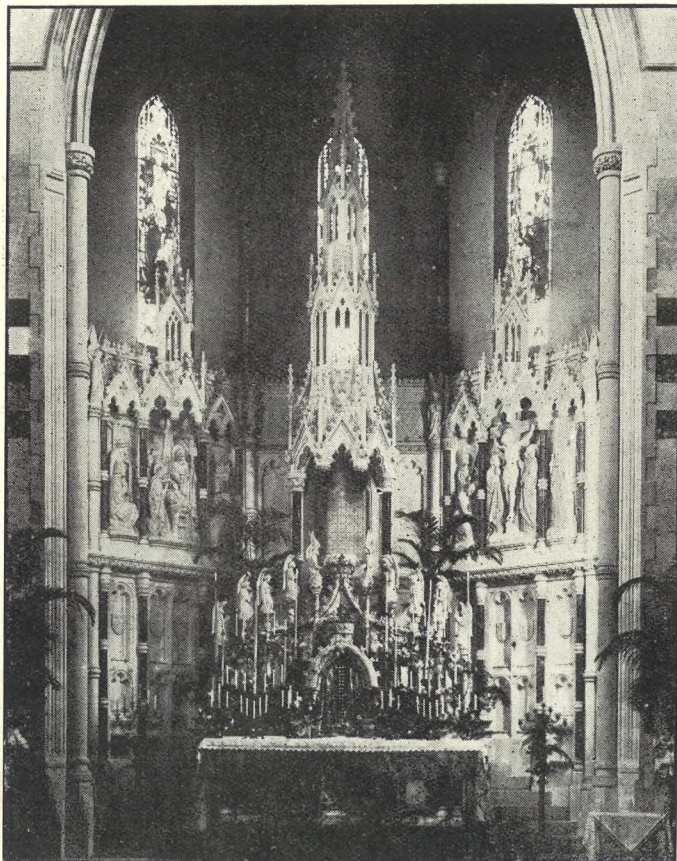

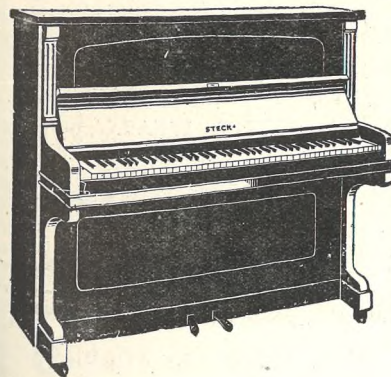

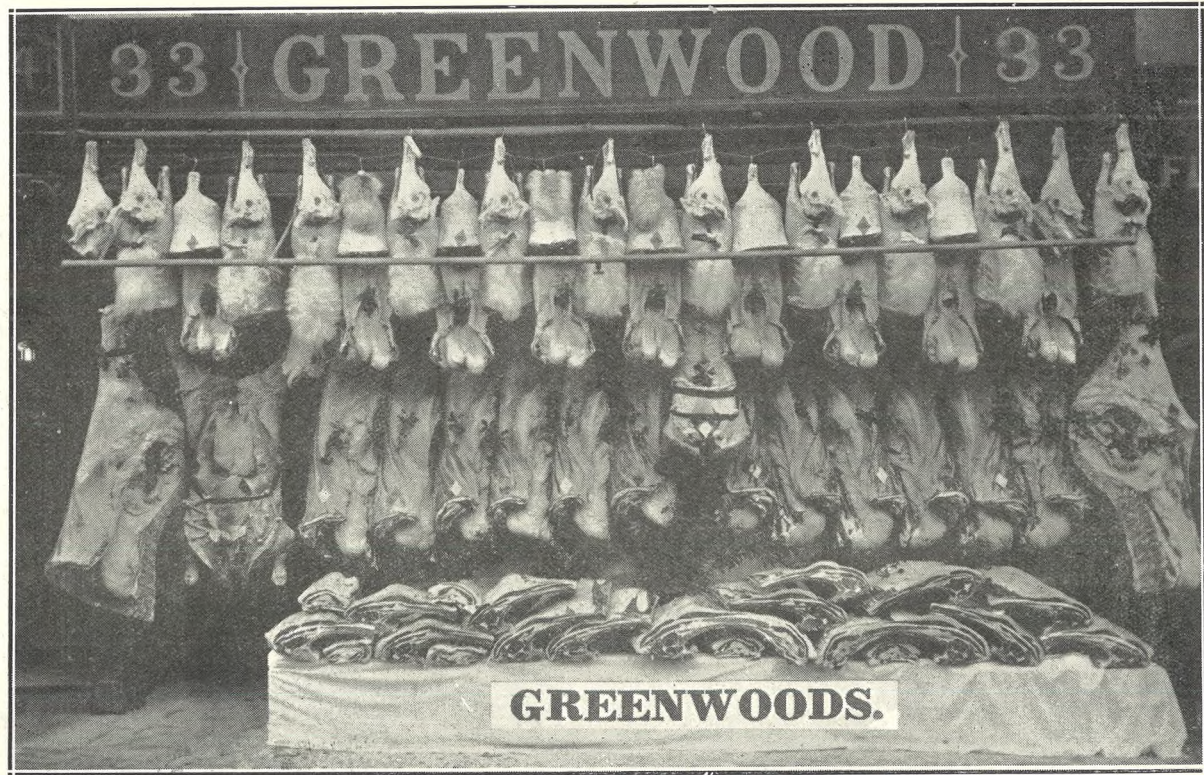

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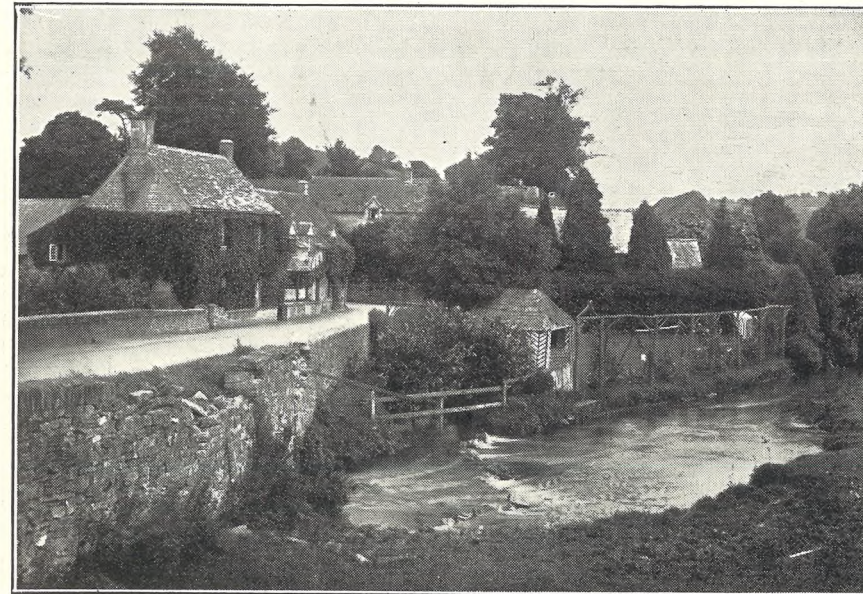
