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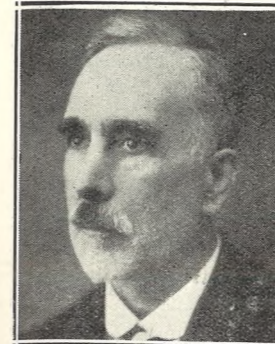
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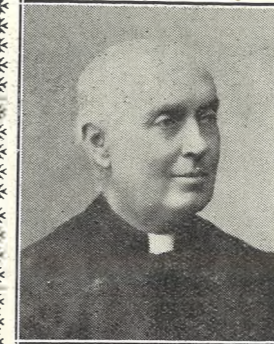
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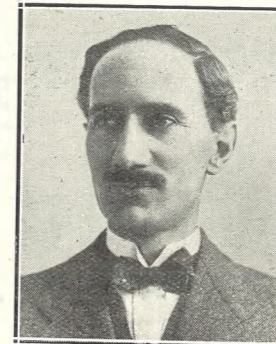
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MR. A. GEORGE,

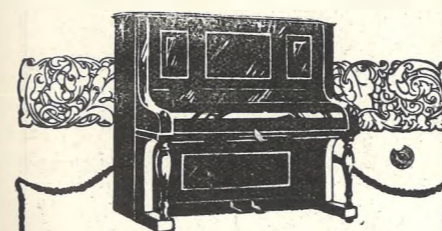

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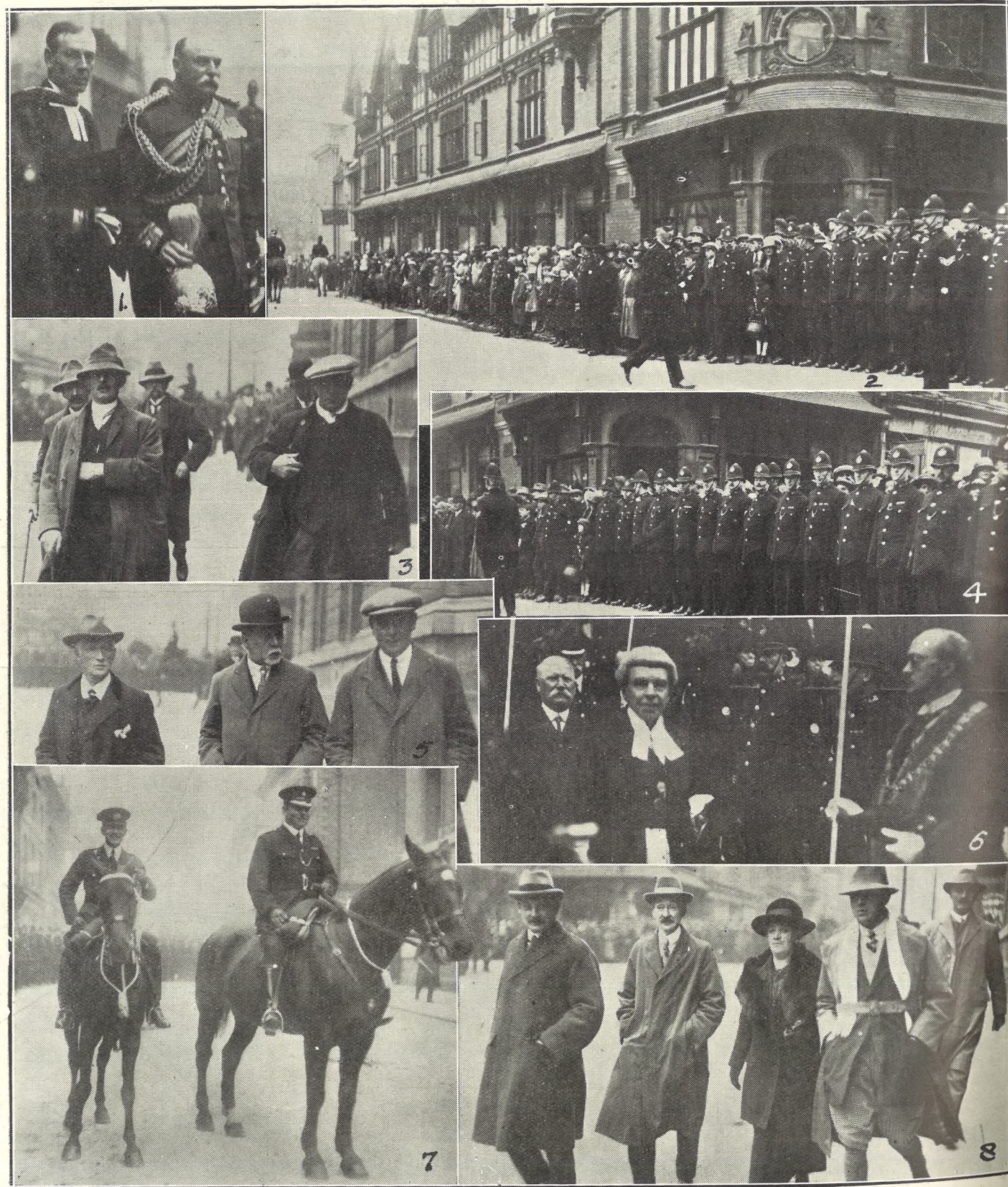

The Autumn Assizes at Gloucester were opened on Saturday last, October 25th, by Justice Lush. The trial of Dr. Hadwen, of Gloucester, for manslaughter caused great interest, and there was an imposing display of police in and around the Shire Hall.

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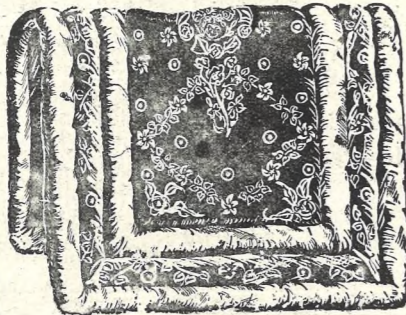
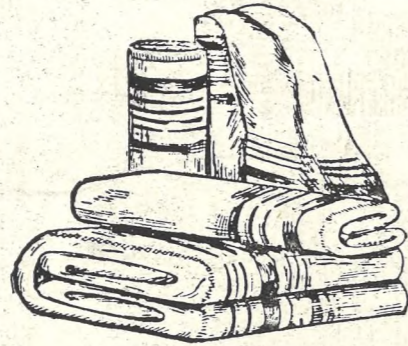


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SCENES IN CHELTENHAM ON ELECTION DAY AND TUESDAY.

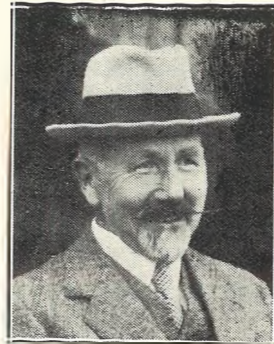

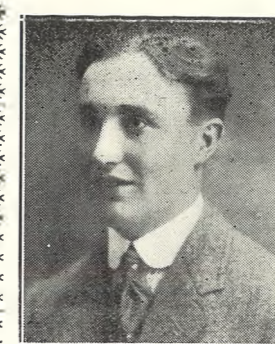

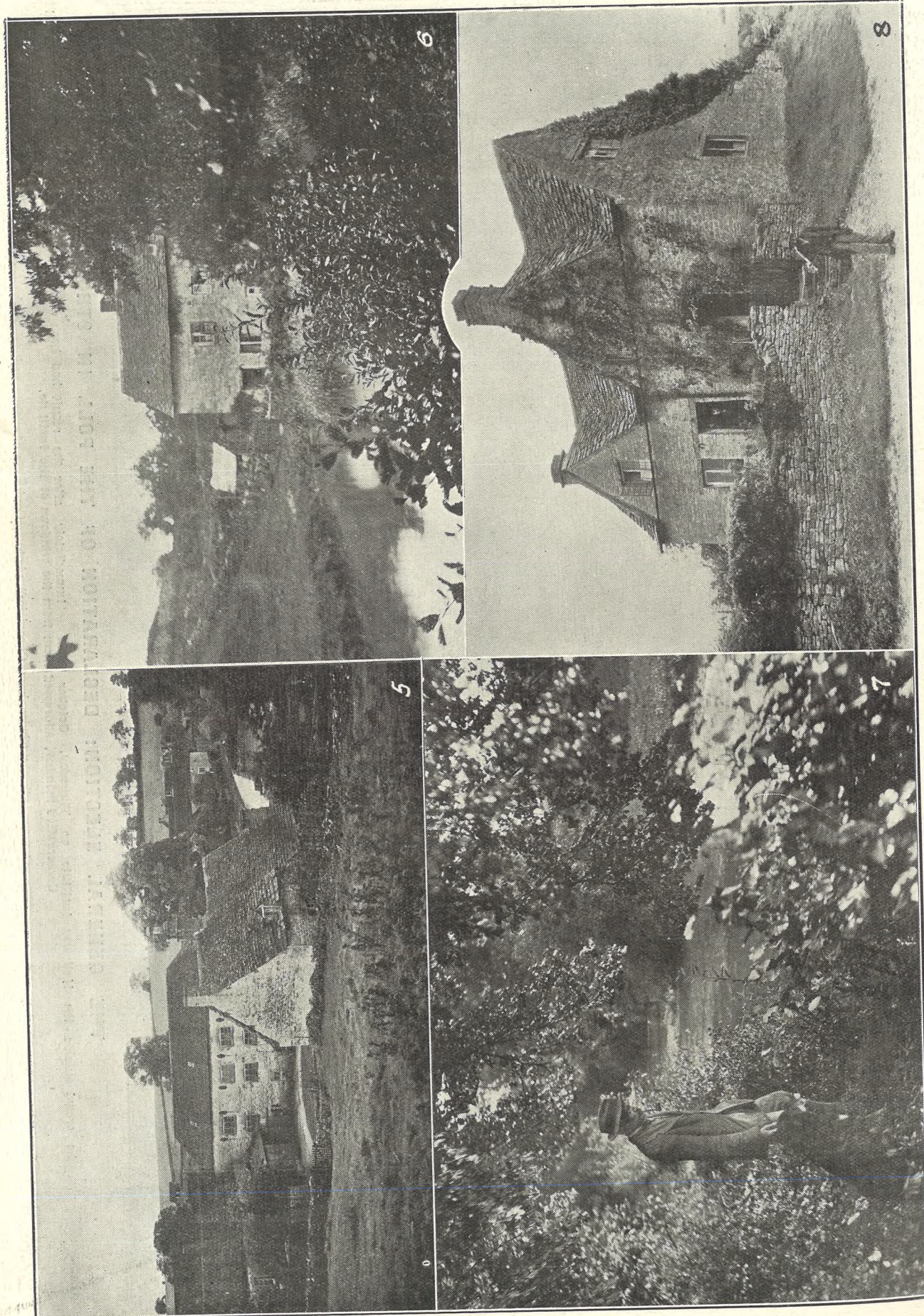

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BAUNTON. Baunton is a picturesque old-world village on the side of the Cheltenham and Cirencester-road, about two miles from the latter. 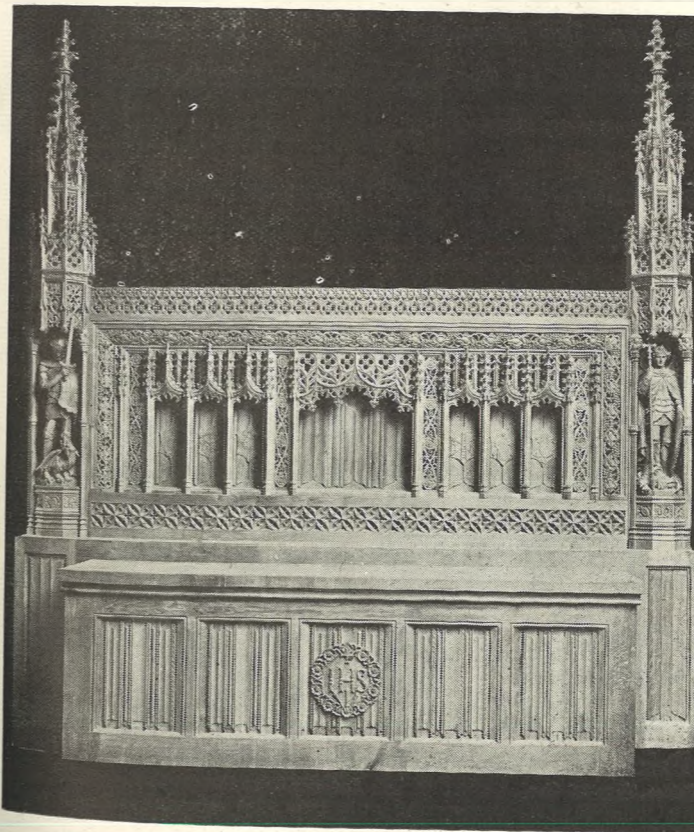

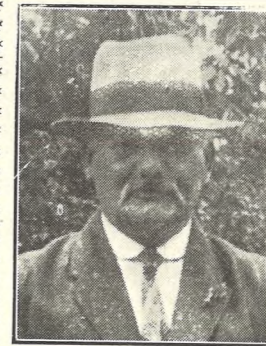

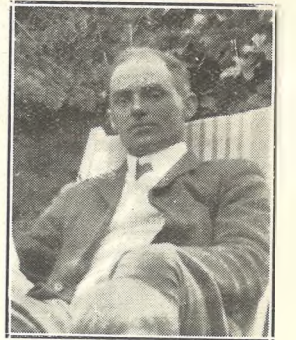


A FINE REREDOS.

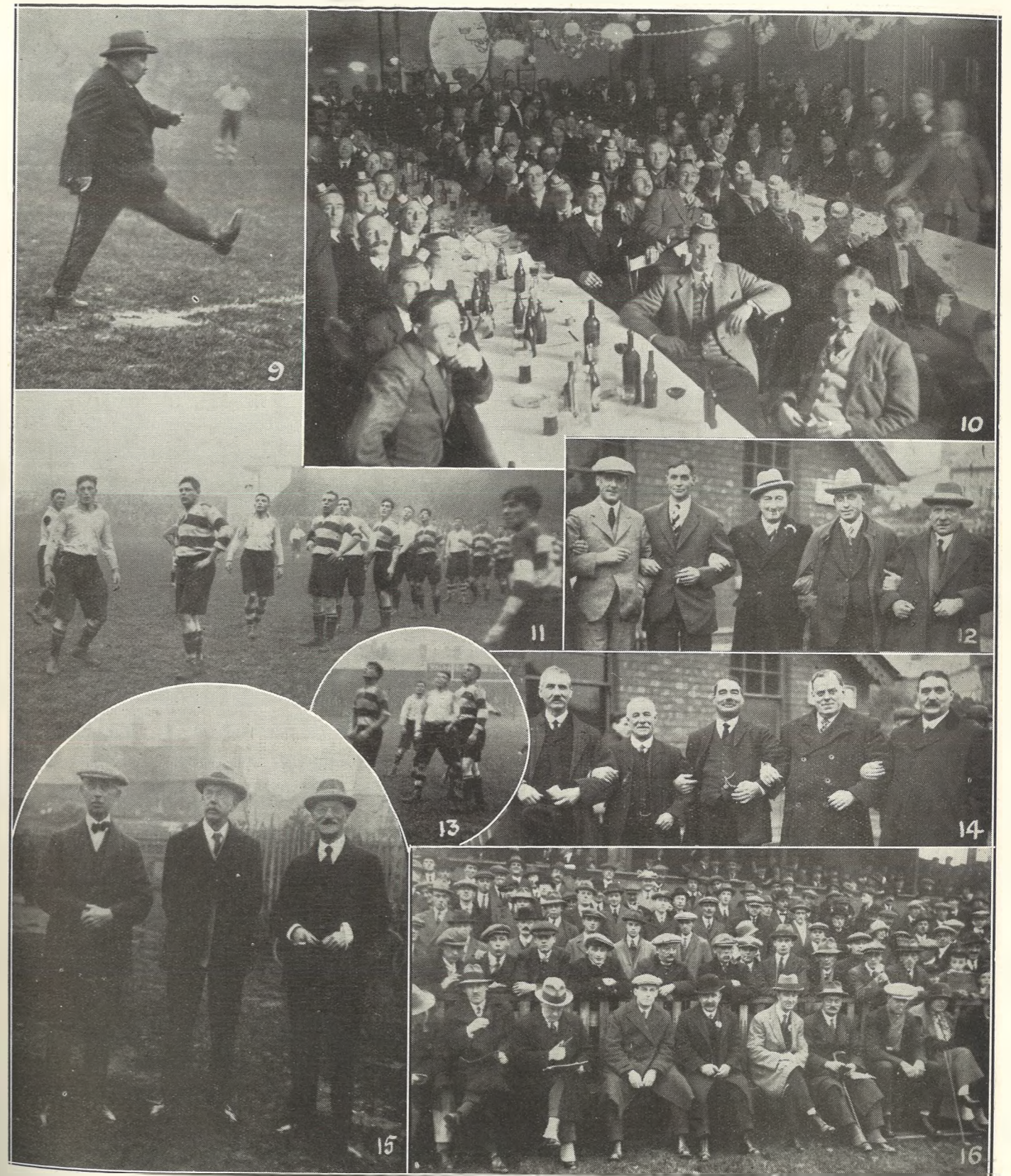


GLOUCESTER RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB'S JUBILEE.

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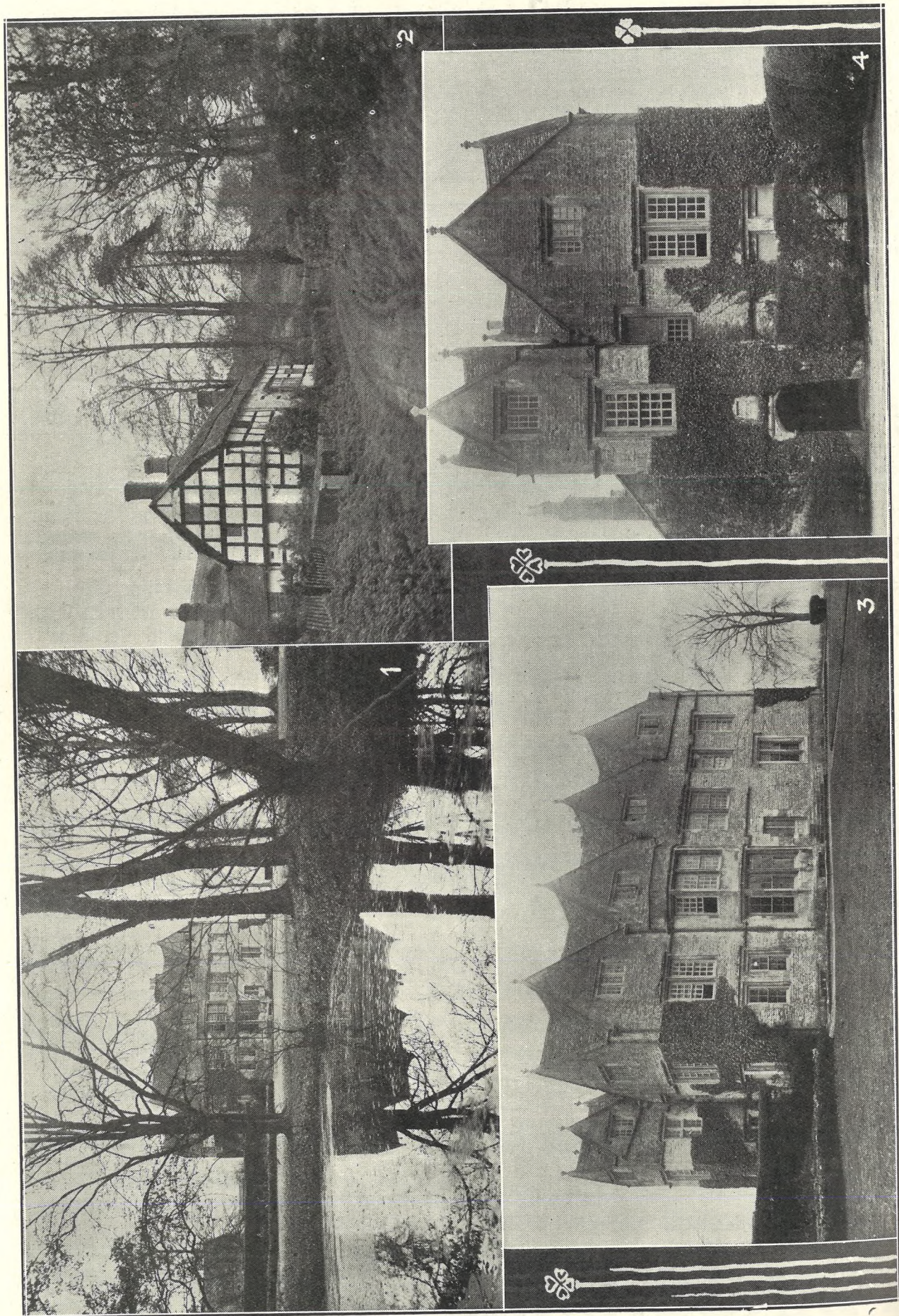

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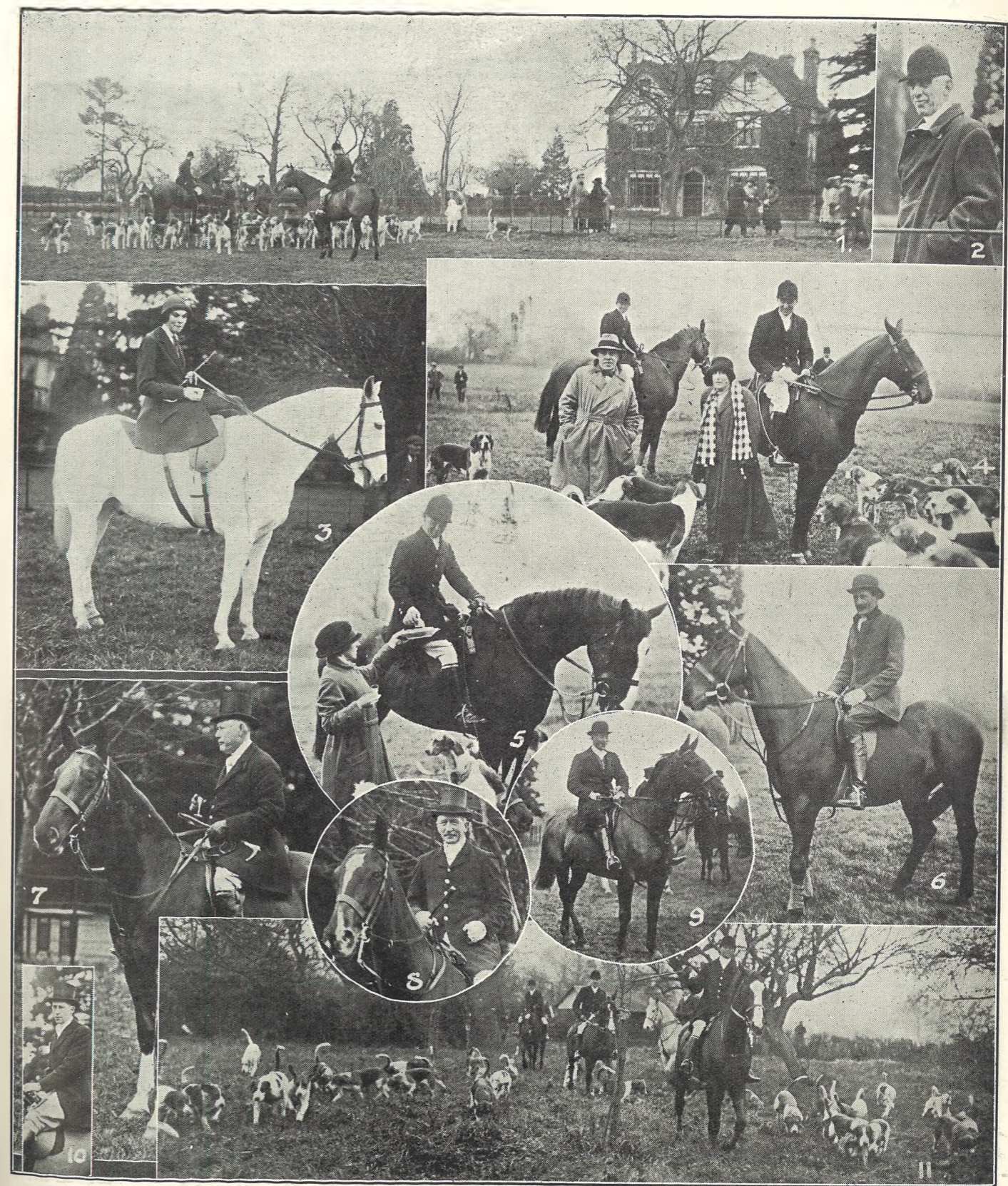


CHELTENHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOL WAR MEMORIAL UNVEILED BY EARL BEAUCHAMP.

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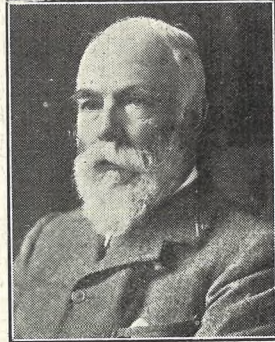
