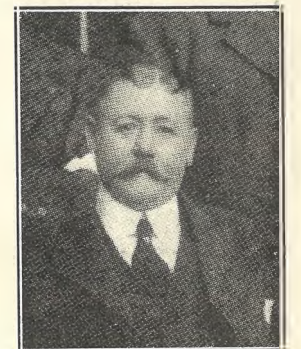

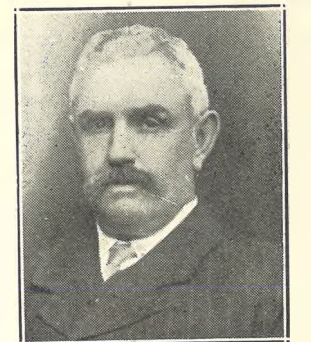

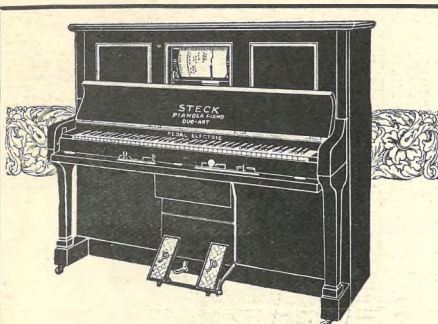


INSPECTOR G. DAY,

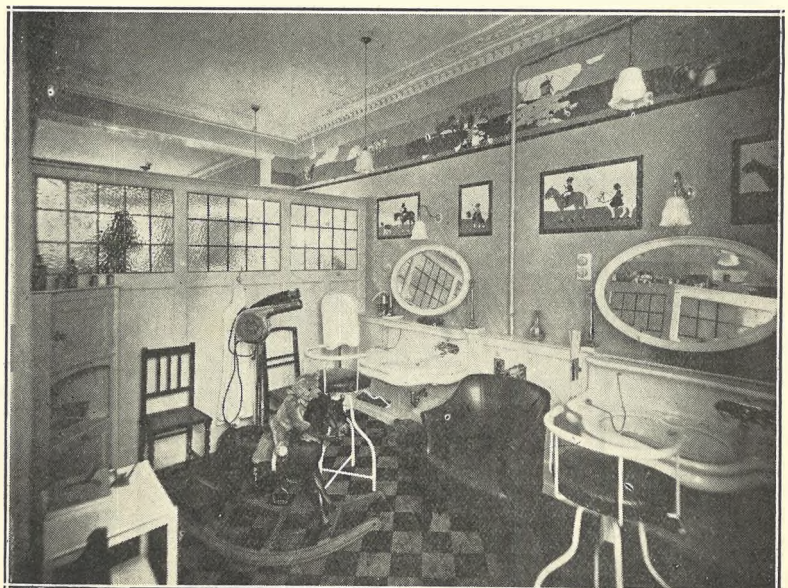

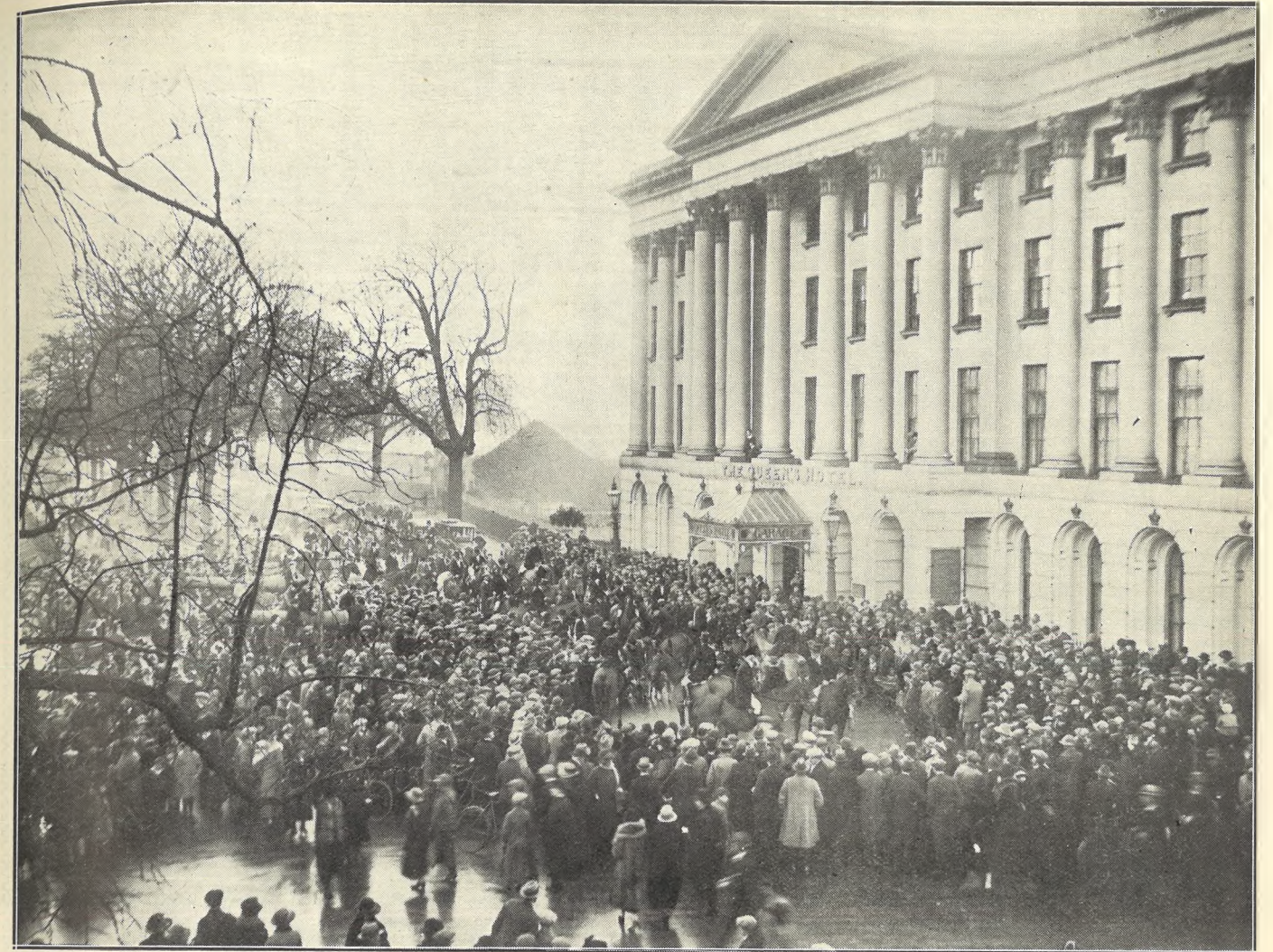

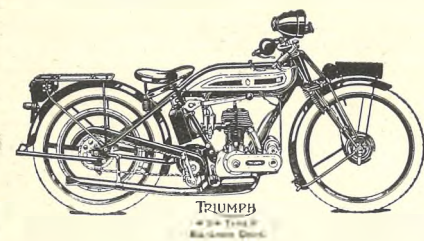

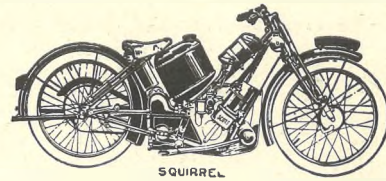

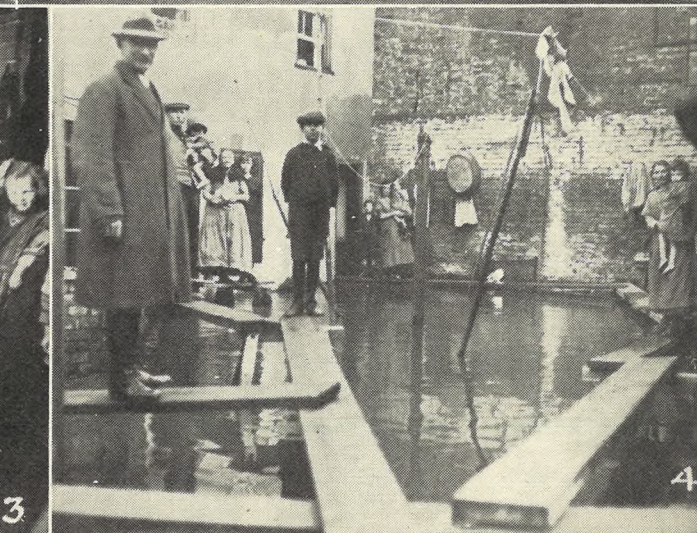

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BISLEY.

Bisley is one of the most picturesque and interesting villages in Gloucestershire. It lies about four miles east of Stroud, and is situated on very high ground, is very compact, and should be very healthy. It has a most absorbing history, for over 150 years being in possession of the famous Mortimer family, one of whom, Richard, Duke of York, was slain at the Battle of Wakefield attempting to gain the English throne. His son became Edward the Fourth, King of England. Overcourt, an old house (illustrated) was once granted to Queen Elizabeth, and in 1619 was given by James I. to Villiers, the Duke of Buckingham.

- 1.—An unusual tomb to be found outside a church: a canopied memorial to a Crusader, probably one of the de Mortimer family, and evidently at some time removed from the interior.
- 2.—A quaint bit in one of the main streets.
- 3.—Overcourt, the fine old Manor House, at one time belonging to Queen Elizabeth.
- 4.—An old summer house in the grounds of Overcourt; the church, partly obscured by fog, in the background.

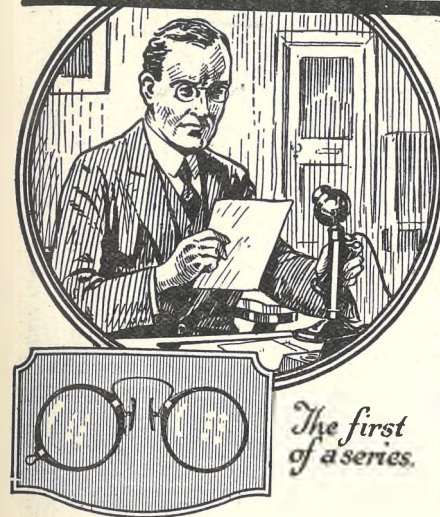

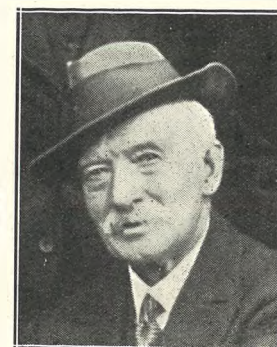
