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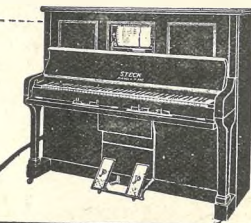

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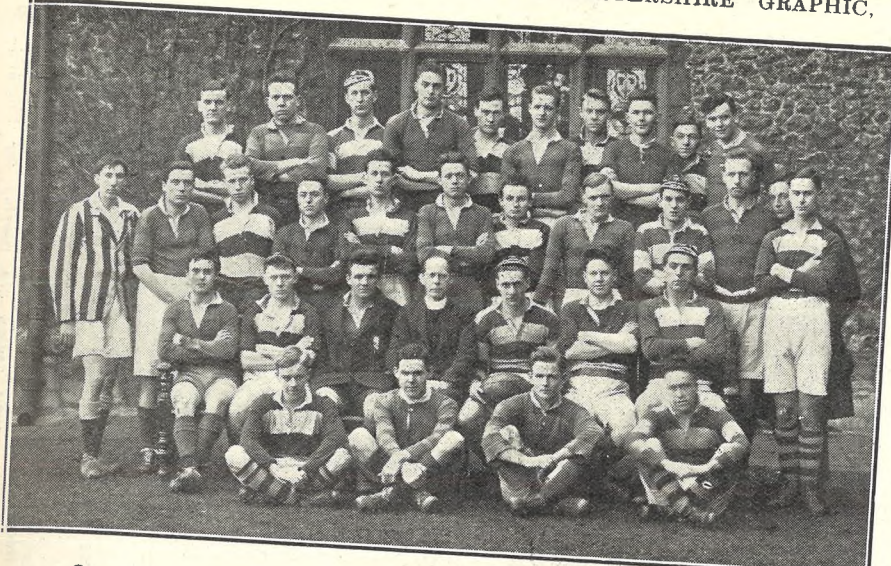

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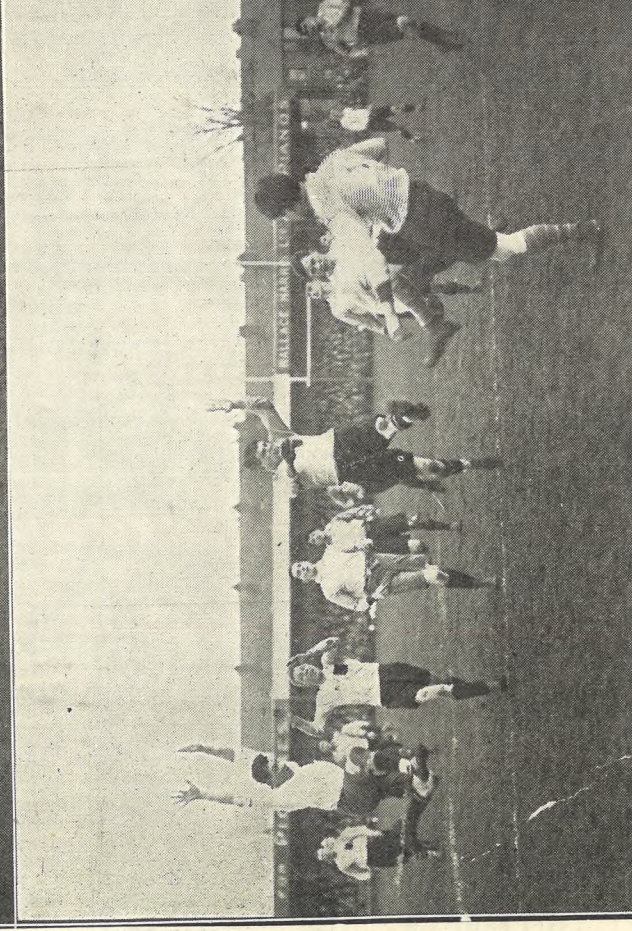
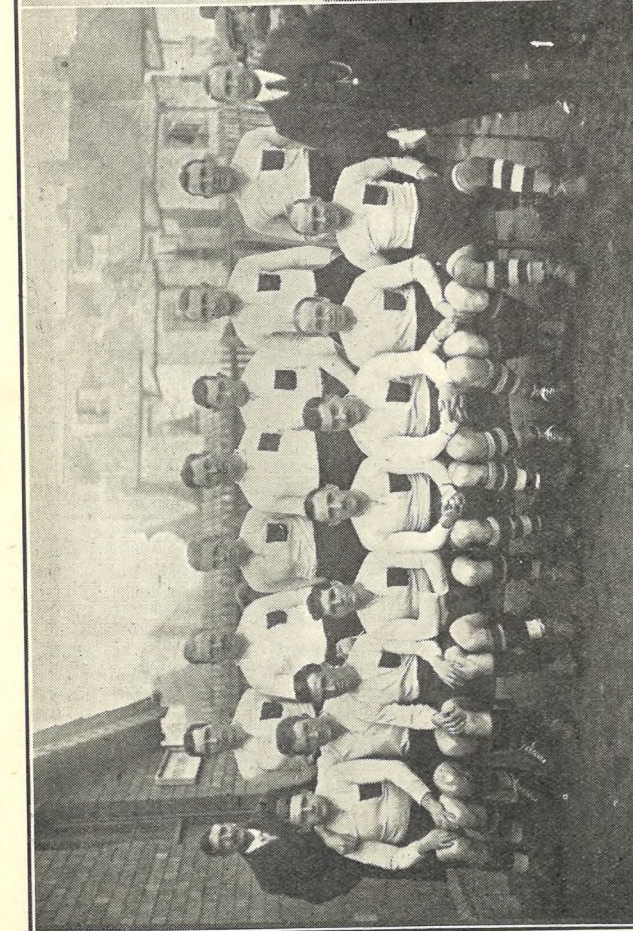
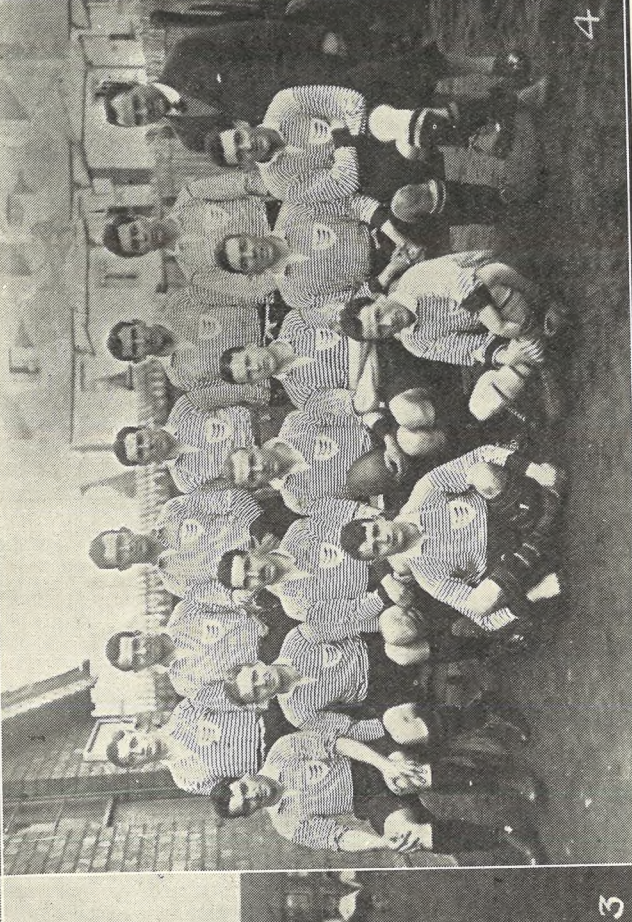
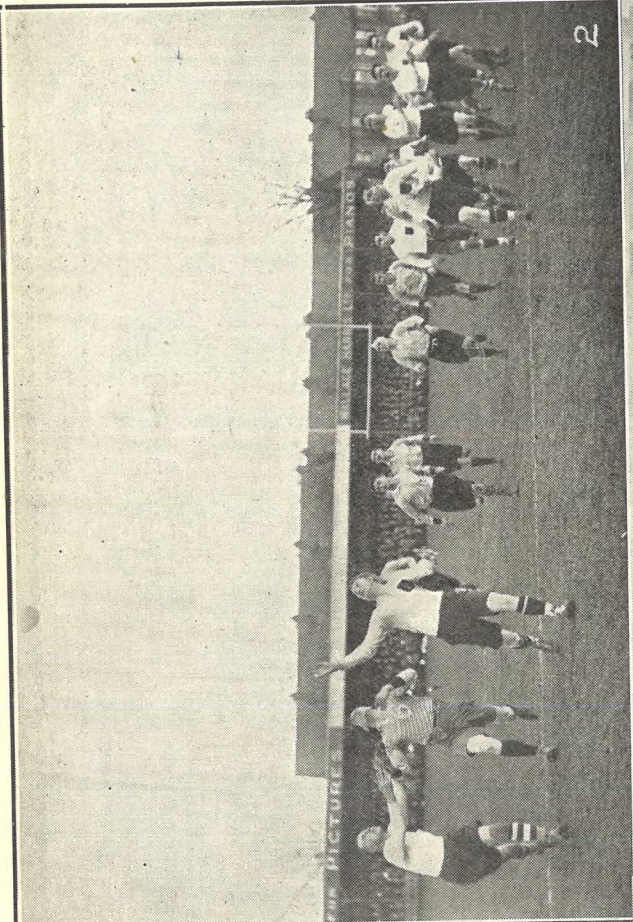


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GLOUCESTERSHIRE WIN SEMI-FINAL FOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP AT RUGBY FOOTBALL.

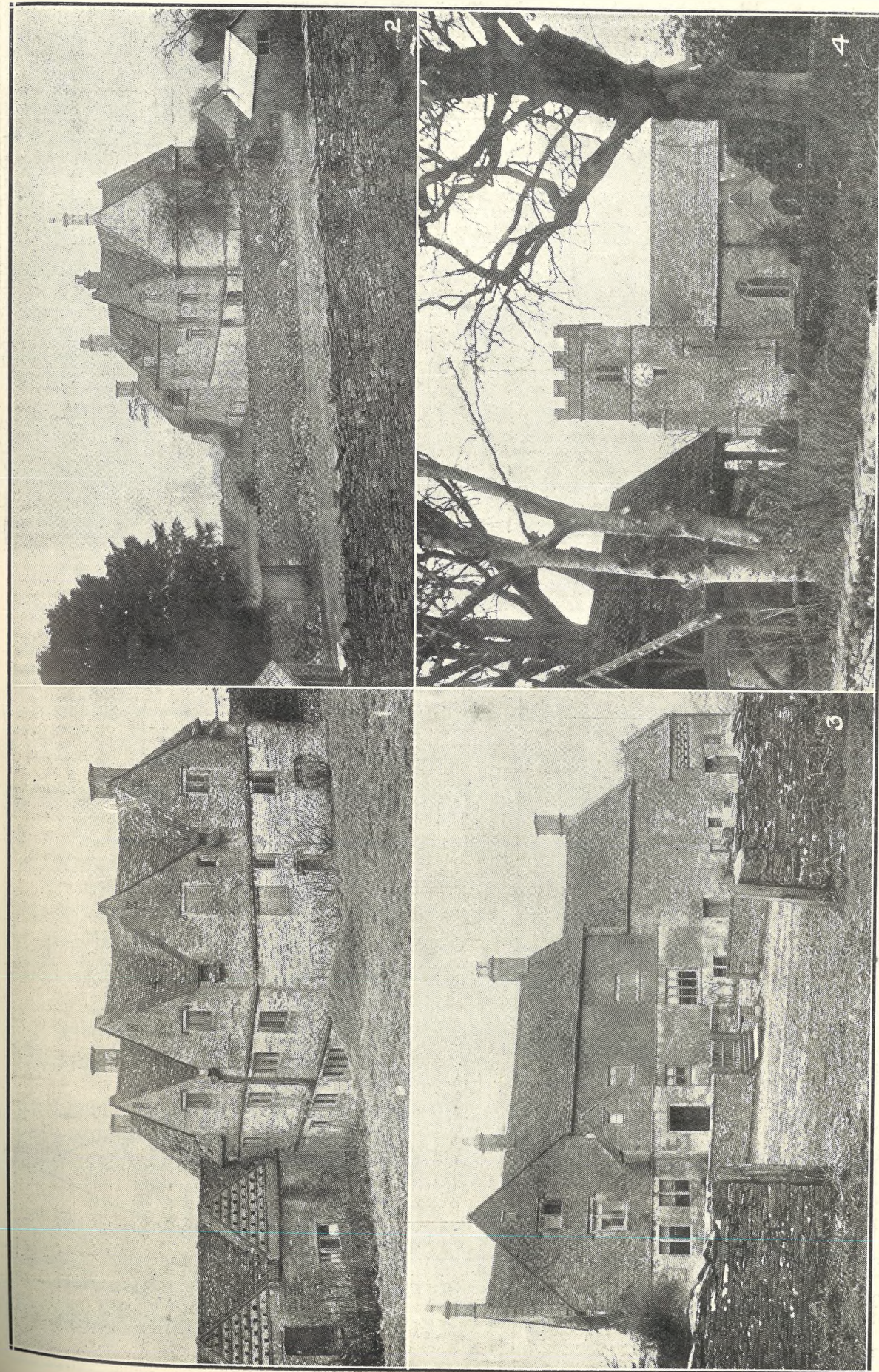

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—THROUGHHAM AND MISERDEN.

Throughham is a hamlet of Bisley, two miles N.W., and lies in a very secluded position on a side lane from the road leading from Birdlip to Bisley. It has one very fine house, unique in several features (No. 1, above), and two or three other nice stone farmhouses. Miserden is a village about three miles away from Throughham. 1.—Lower Throughham House, a splendid type of the Jacobean stone manor house. It has unique Drip Stone Gutters, an ancient Gabled Dovecote, and a Secret Chamber. At the present time it is empty, and is owned by Mr. W. B. Driver, of Stratton, near Cirencester. 2 and 3.—Upper Throughham House, an interesting stone farmhouse, owned and occupied by Mr. Bubb. 4.—Miserden Church, an Early English example, restored in 1866. It is very interesting.

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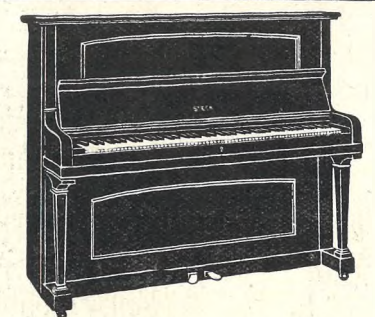


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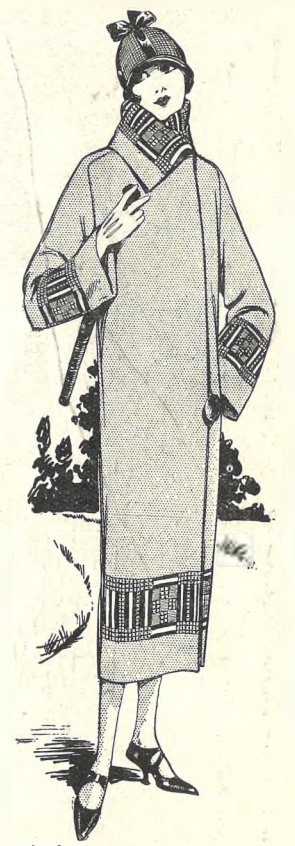
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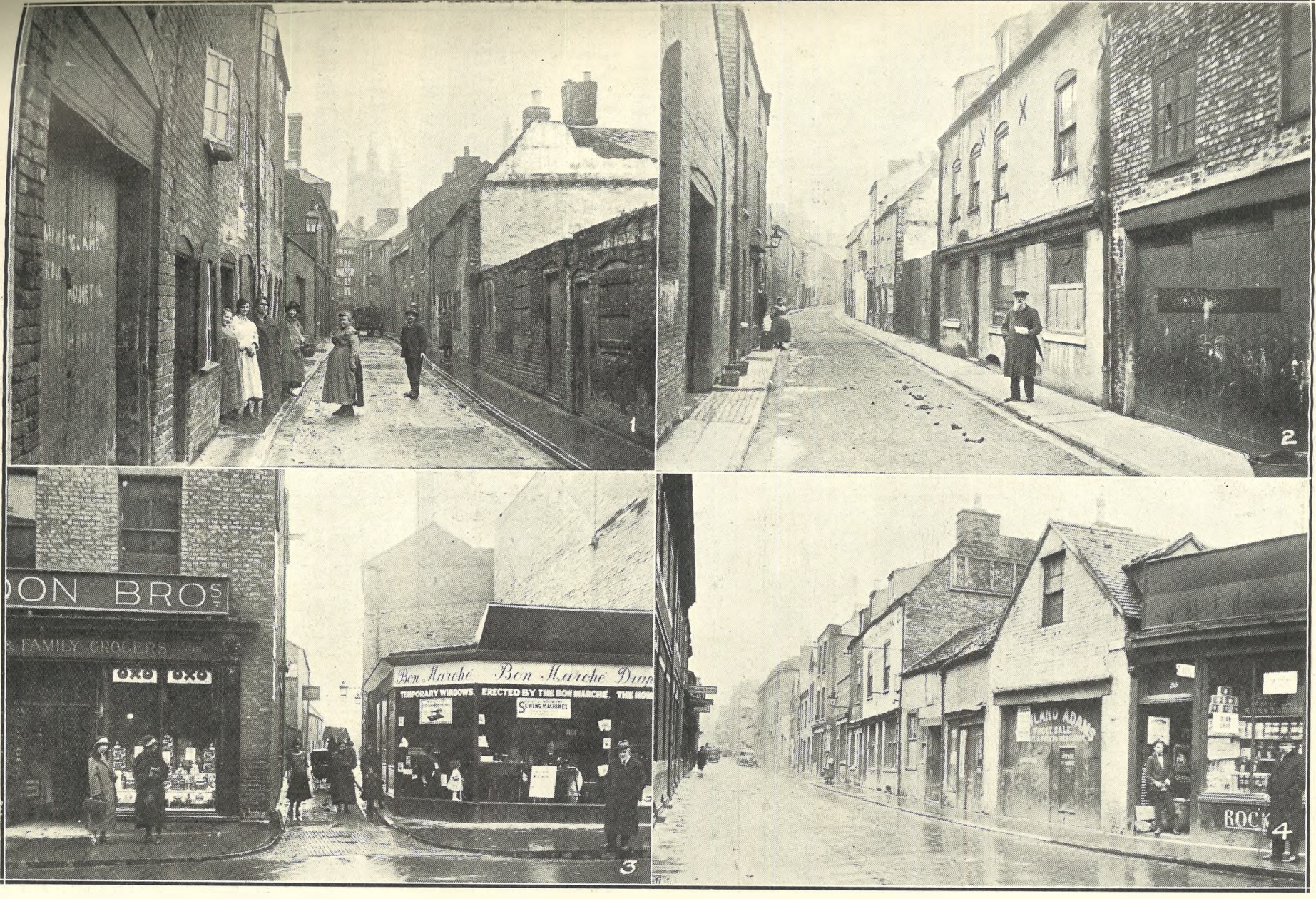
PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—CAMP AND WISHANGER.

Camp and Wishanger are hamlets of Miserden, Camp being two miles away, lying on the road from Birdlip to Bisley, and Wishanger only a mile away on the side road leading from the latter road to Miserden. Camp consists of a public house and a few small stone houses, all very ancient, while Wishanger Farm is a place with a past, the carriage drive to the front door being now part of a grass meadow, and the handsome porch is blocked with a hurdle to prevent the cattle from entering.

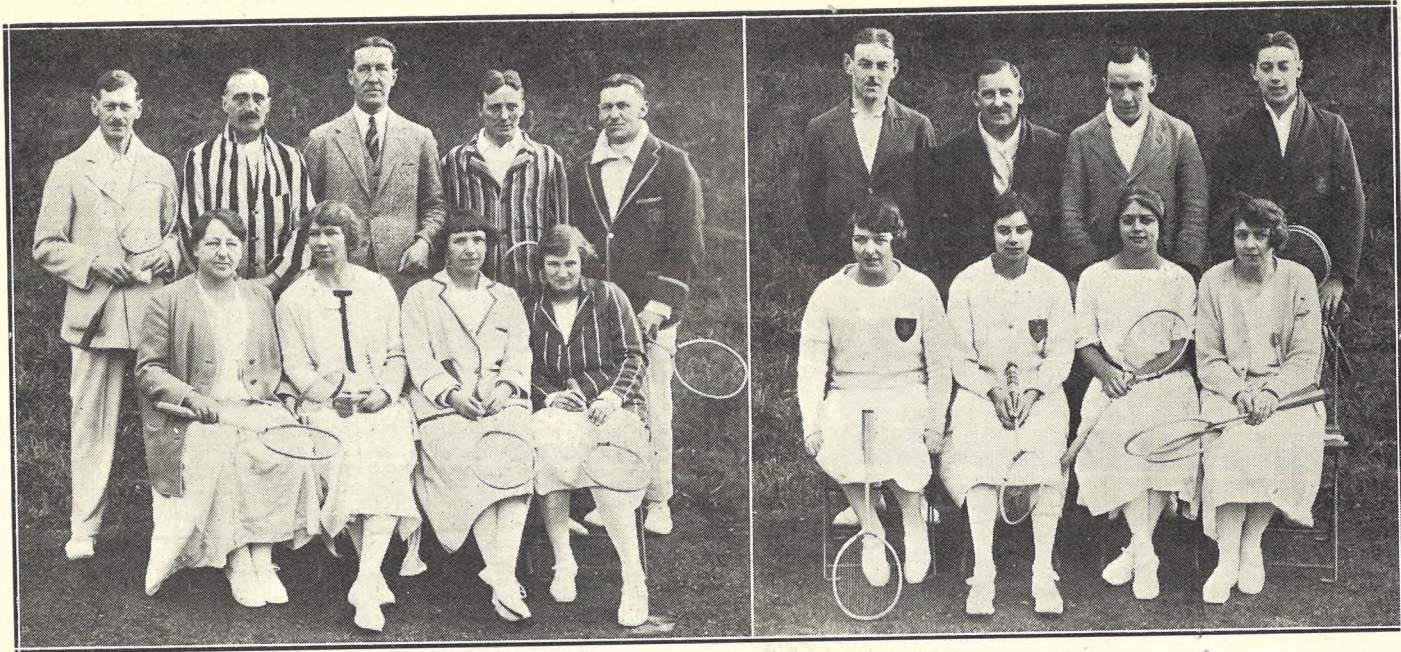


SUGGESTED NEW 'BUS AND SHOPPING CENTRE FOR GLOUCESTER.

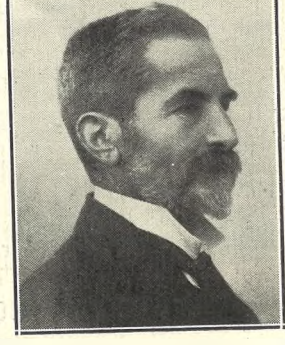

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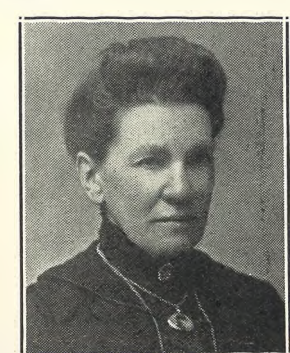

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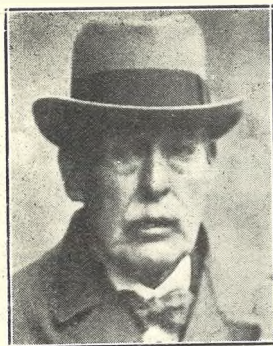


ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF BRITISH LEGION IN GLOUCESTER.

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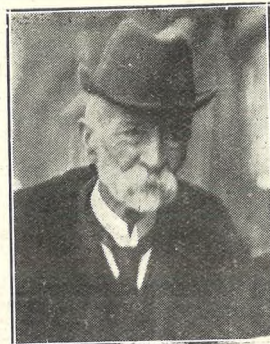


MAJOR-GENERAL C. A. CUNINGHAME,
