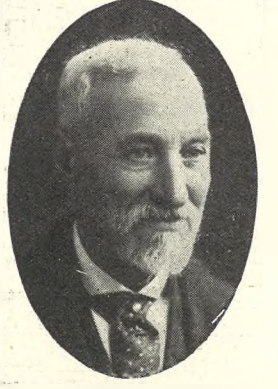

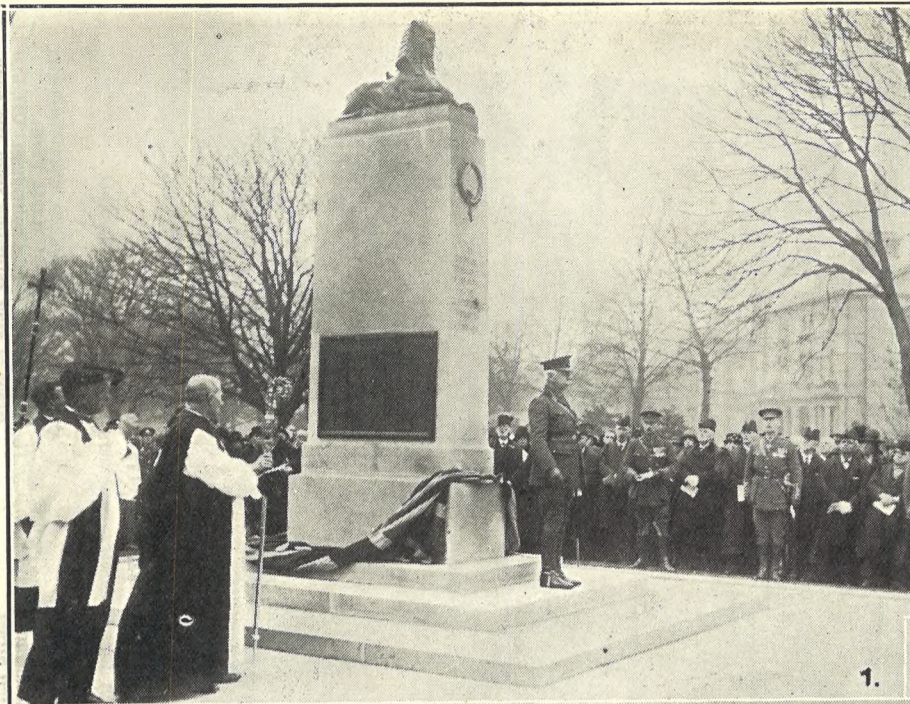

5th GLOUCESTERS' MEMORIAL UNVEILED BY LORD PLUMER.

In Saturday afternoon last, with befitting ceremonial, and before an enormous concourse of soldiers, ex-soldiers, and citizens of Gloucester, Field-Marshal Lord Plumer, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., K.C.B., G.C.V.O., unveiled the tasteful and dignified War Memorial which has been erected in the Park, Gloucester, to men of the 1/5th and 2/5th Gloucesters who fell in the Great War.

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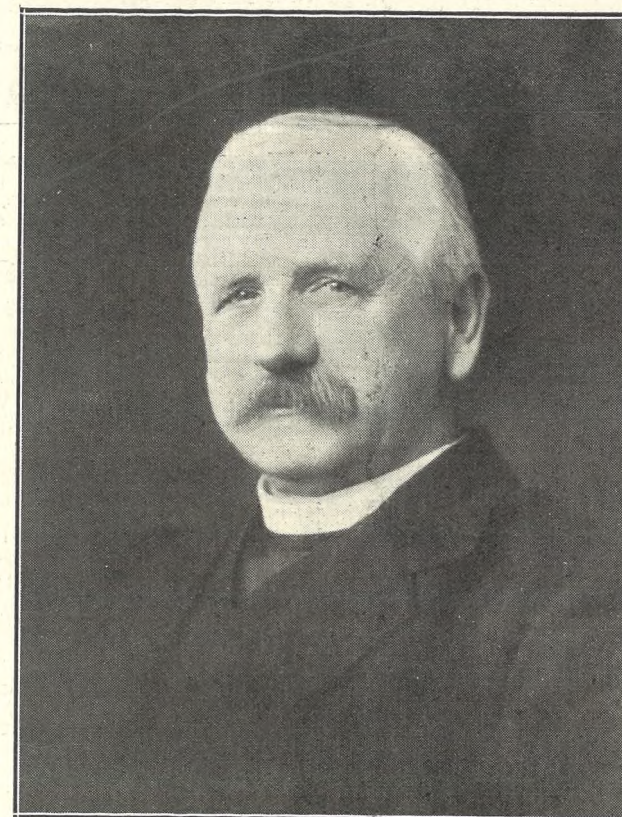
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REV. SAMUEL JACKSON, M.A.

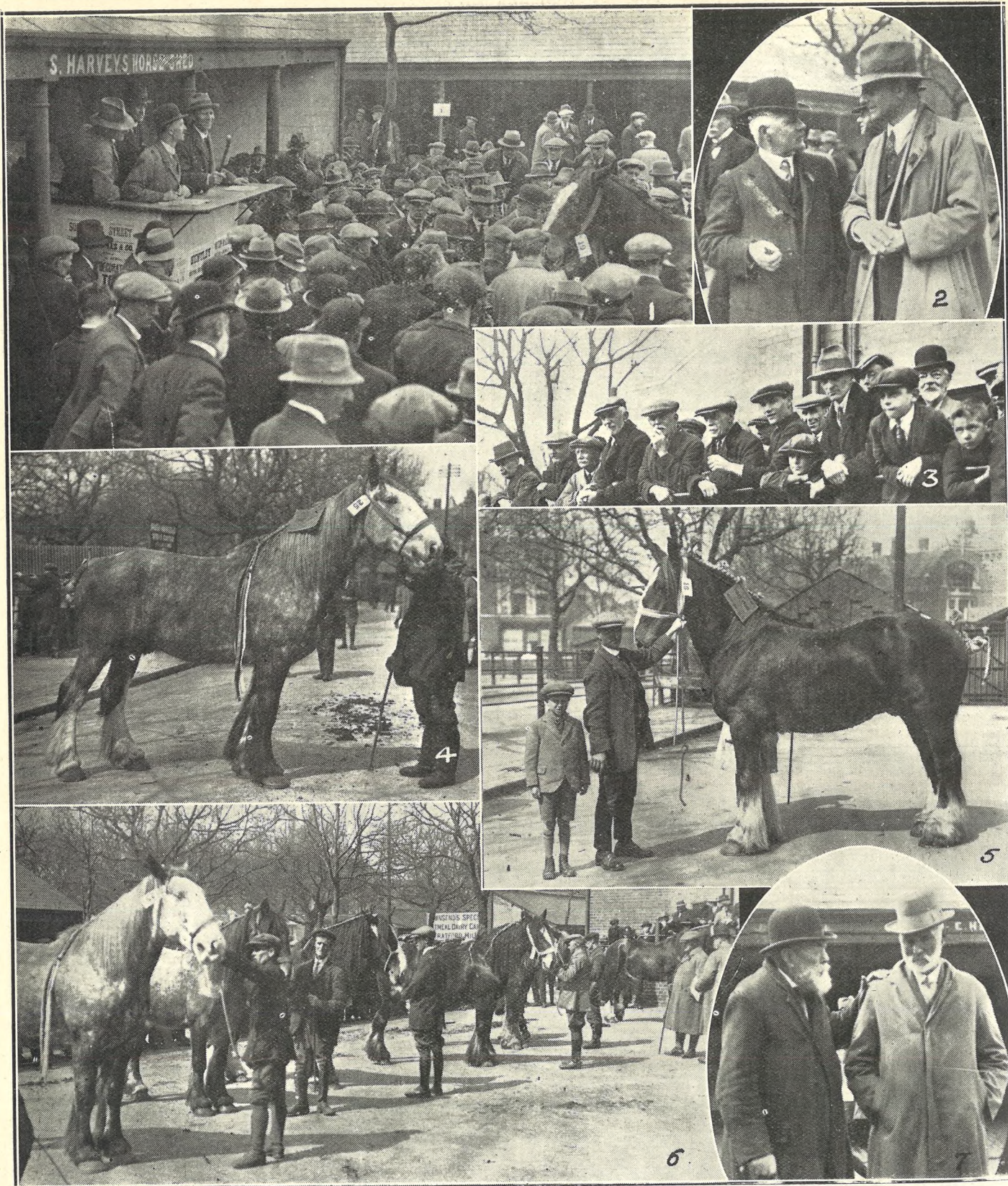

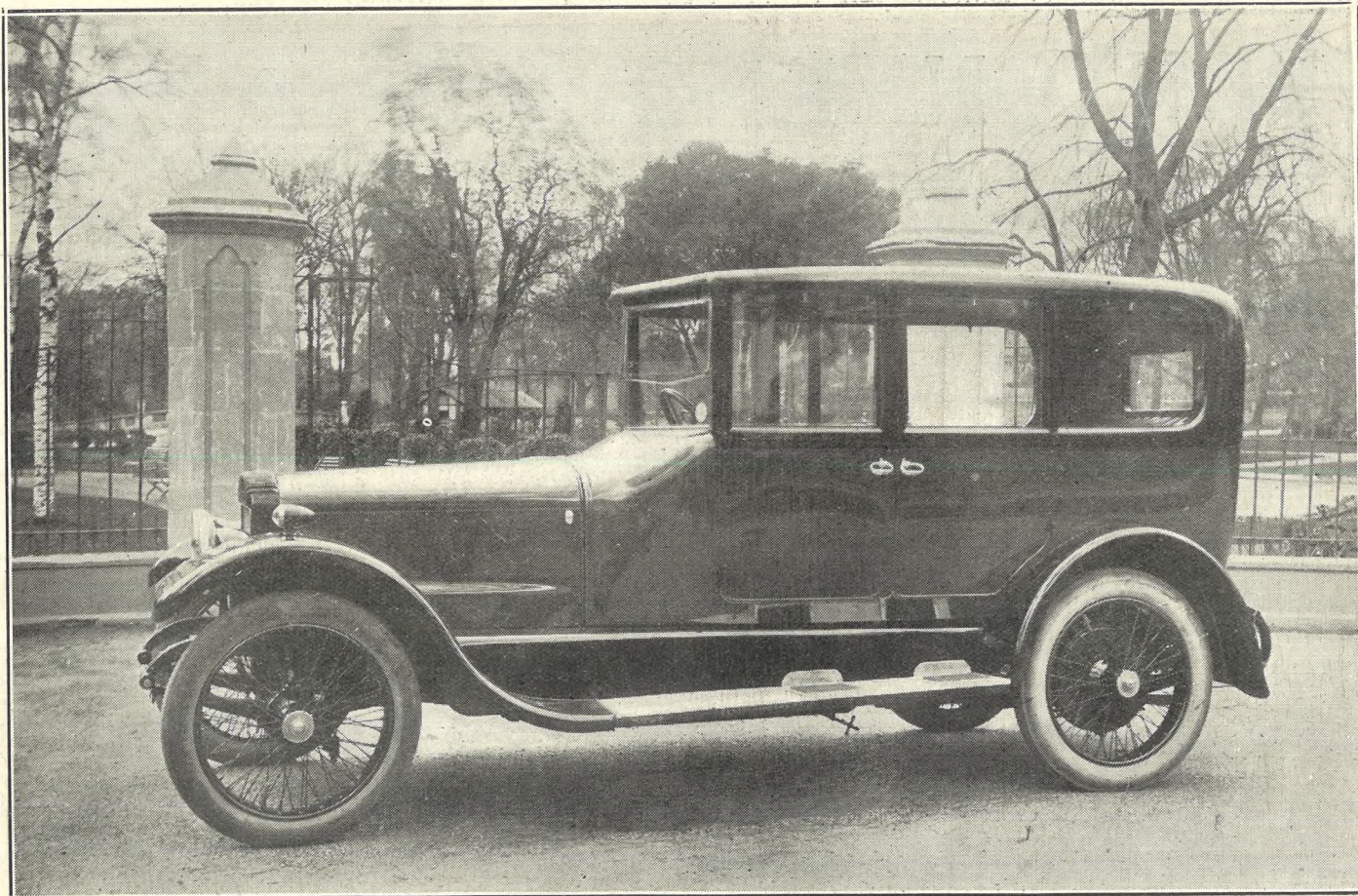
