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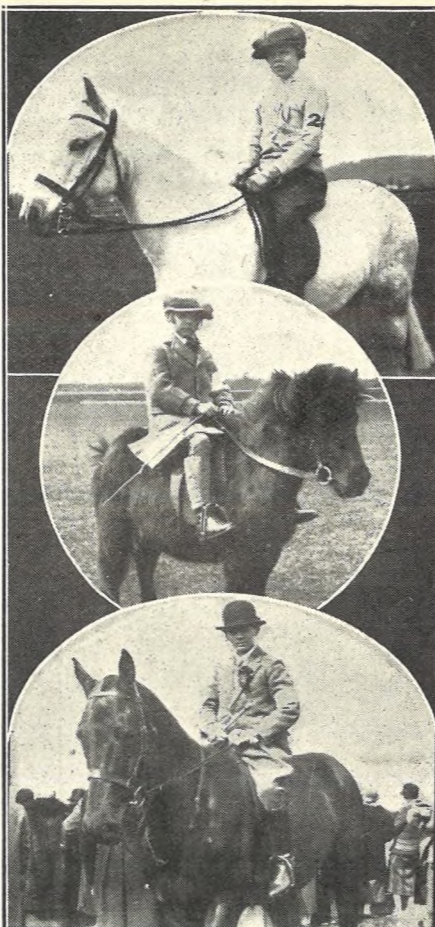


UNBEATEN FOR THREE YEARS.

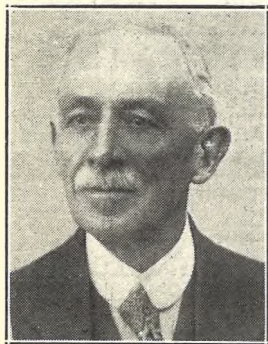

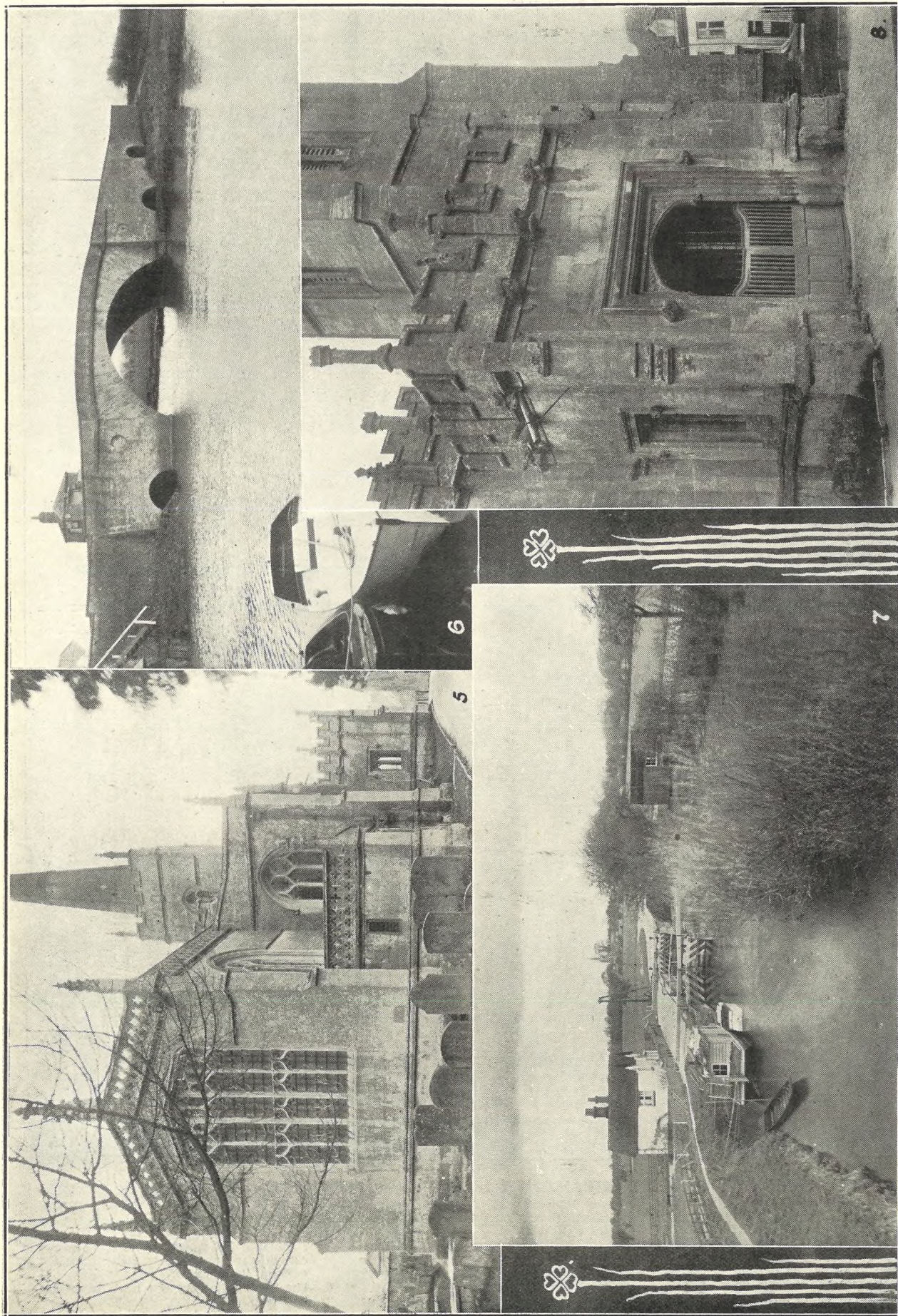


THE WYE VALLEY OTTER HOUNDS IN THE BOURTON DISTRICT.

Two otters were killed on Tuesday, April 21st, one on Thursday, and one on Friday, the latter after a capital three hours' hunt from Windrush to Great Barrington. 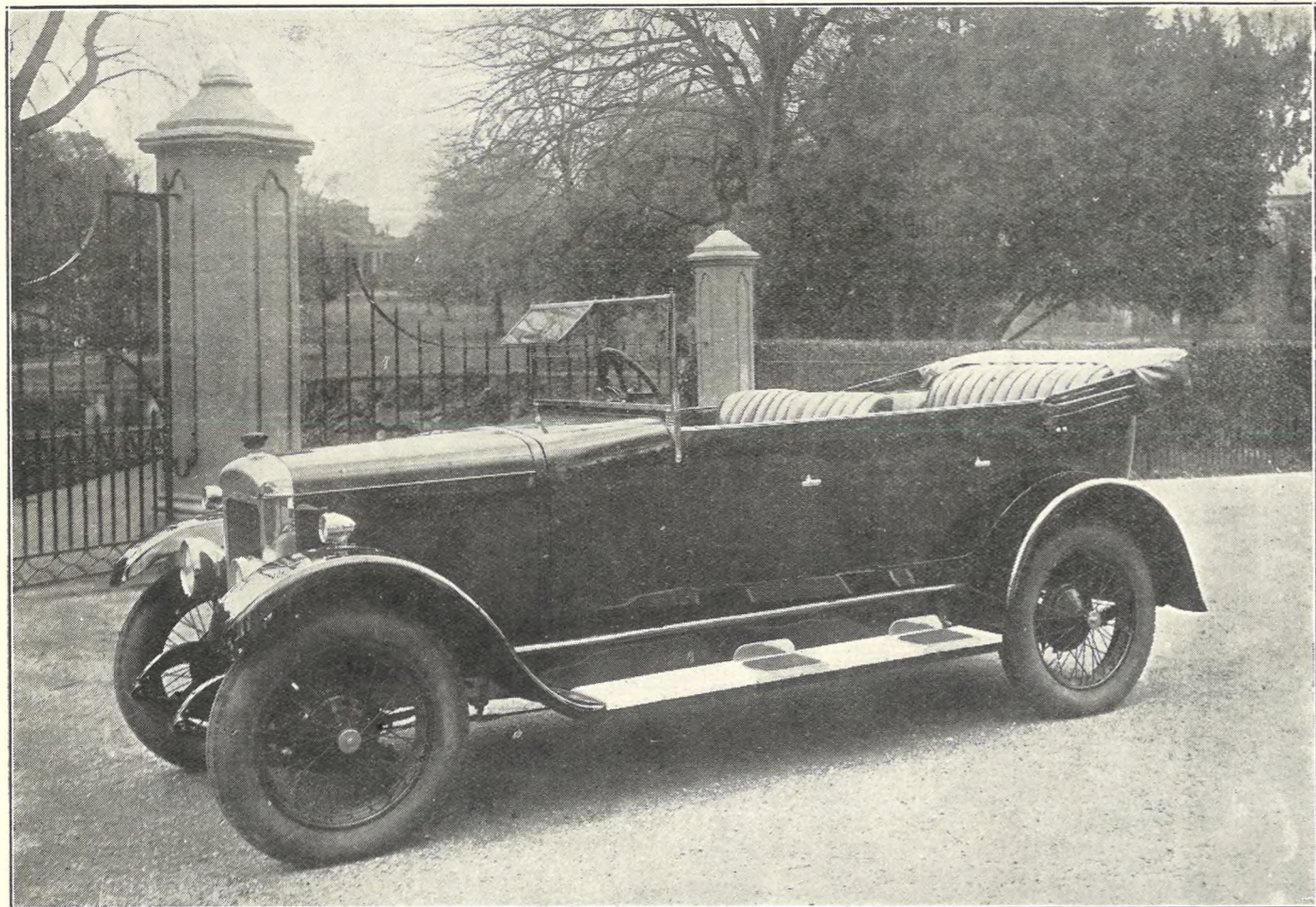

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SENSATIONAL MOTOR TRAGEDY AT PAINSWICK.

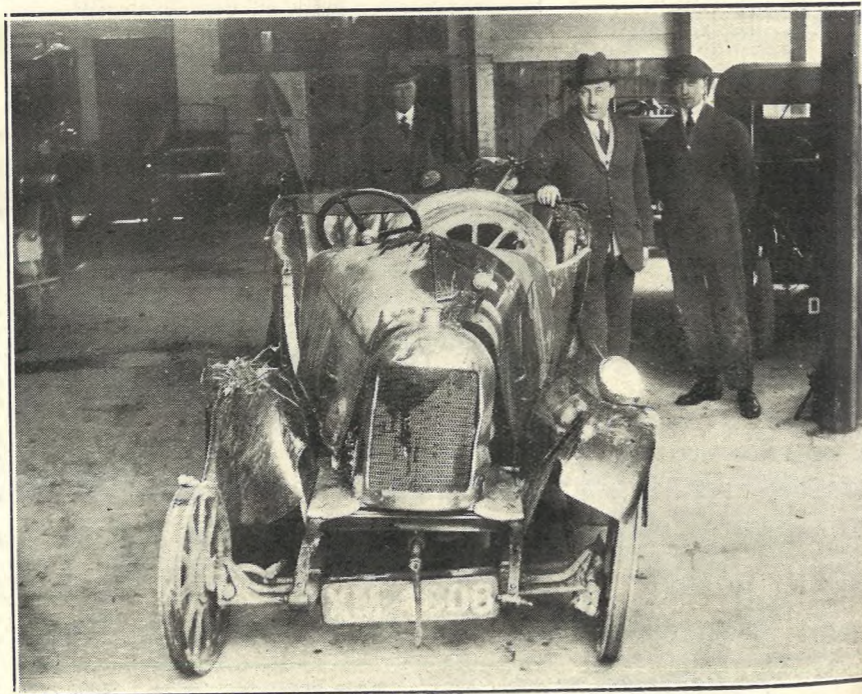

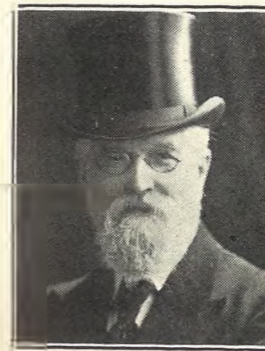

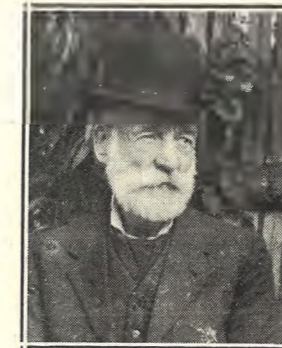
A largely-attended half-yearly Council meeting of the above was held at Montpellier Rotunda, Cheltenham, on Thursday, April 30th.

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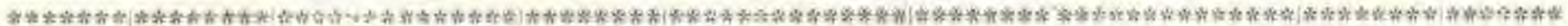
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POST OFFICE INSURANCE SOCIETY DELEGATES' CONFERENCE IN CHELTEMHAM.

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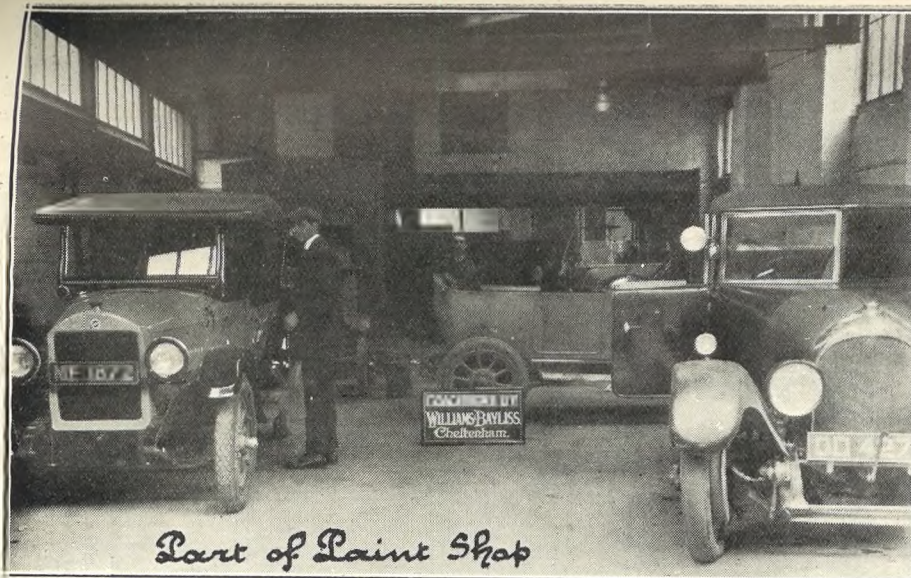
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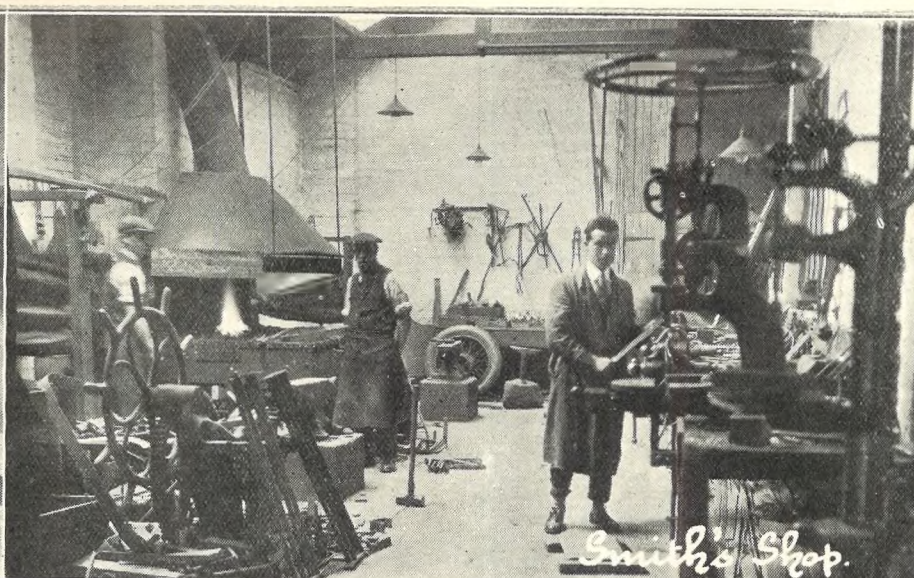

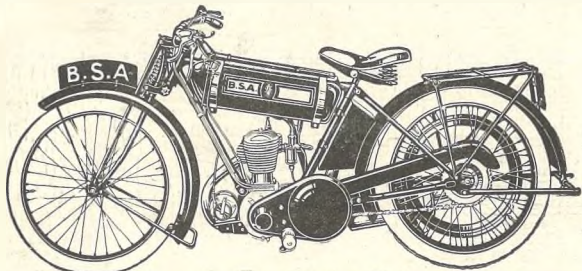
