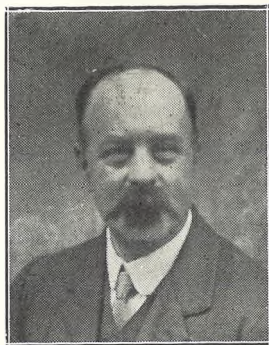

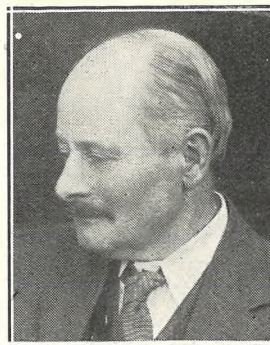

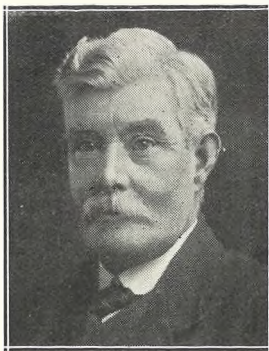


MR. HENRY H. HARTWELL.

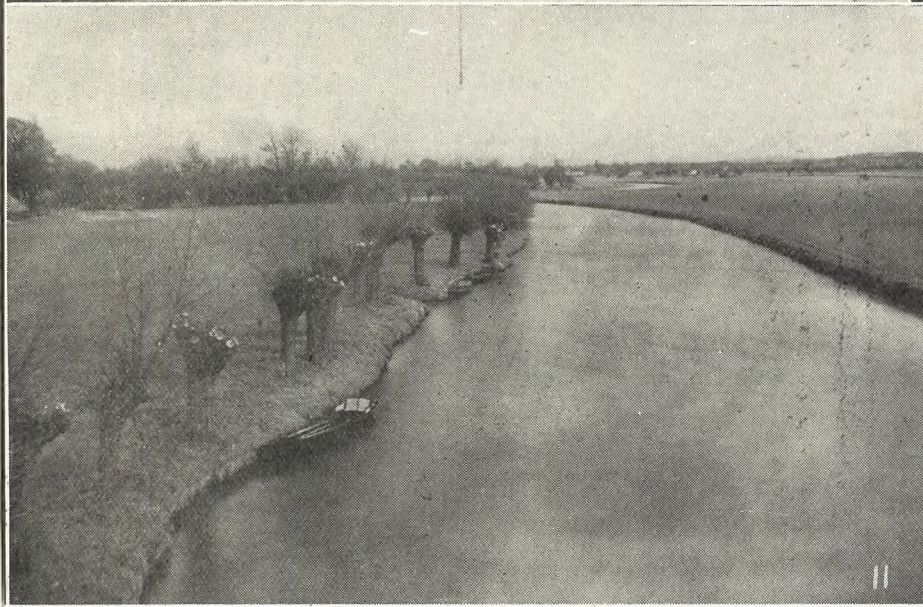

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—LECHLADE.

Further pictures of this Thames-side little town in Gloucestershire. 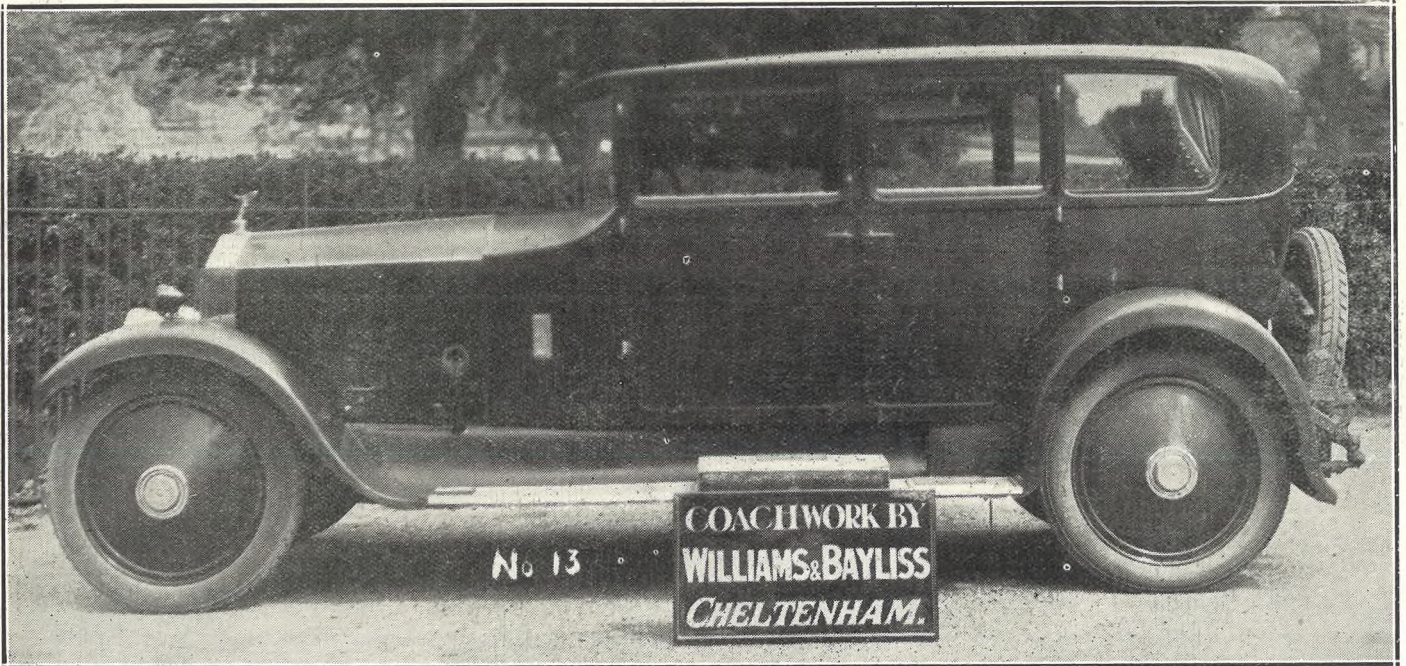
