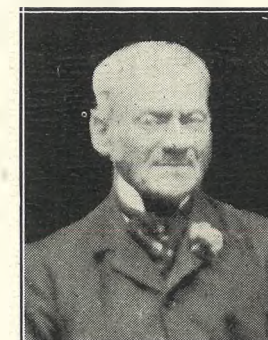

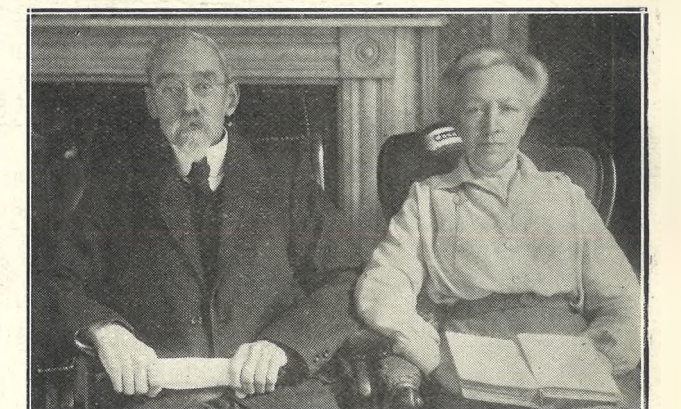

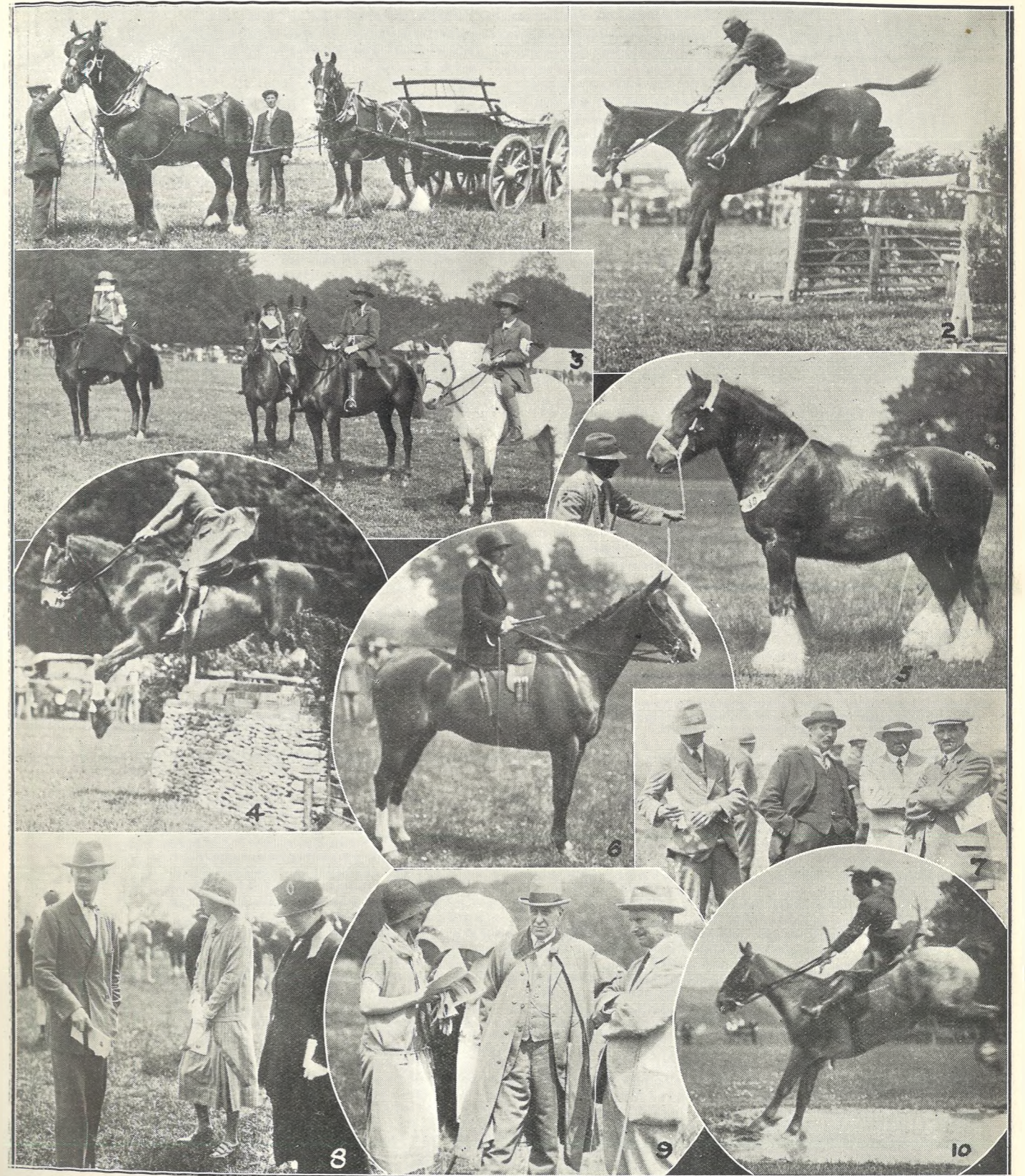

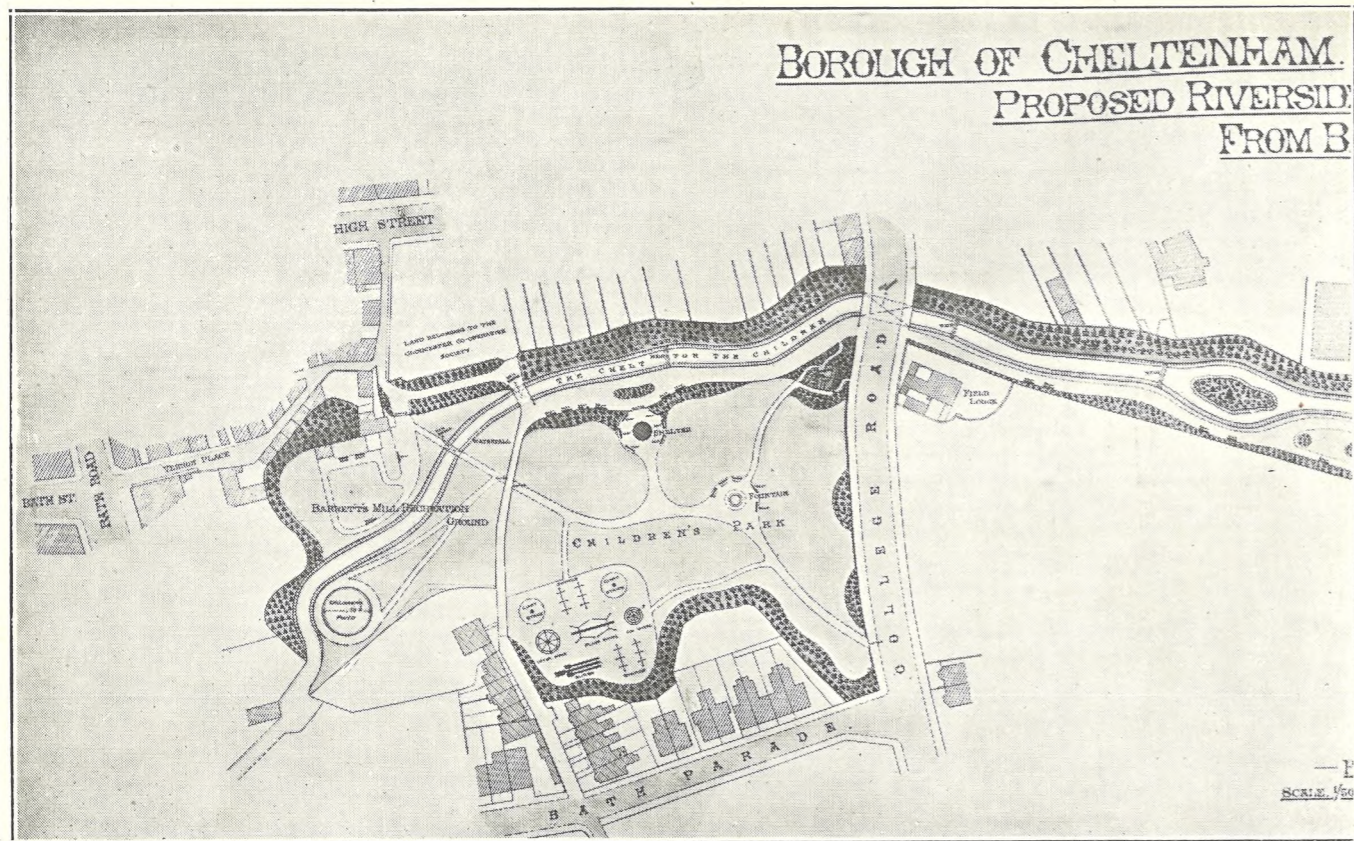

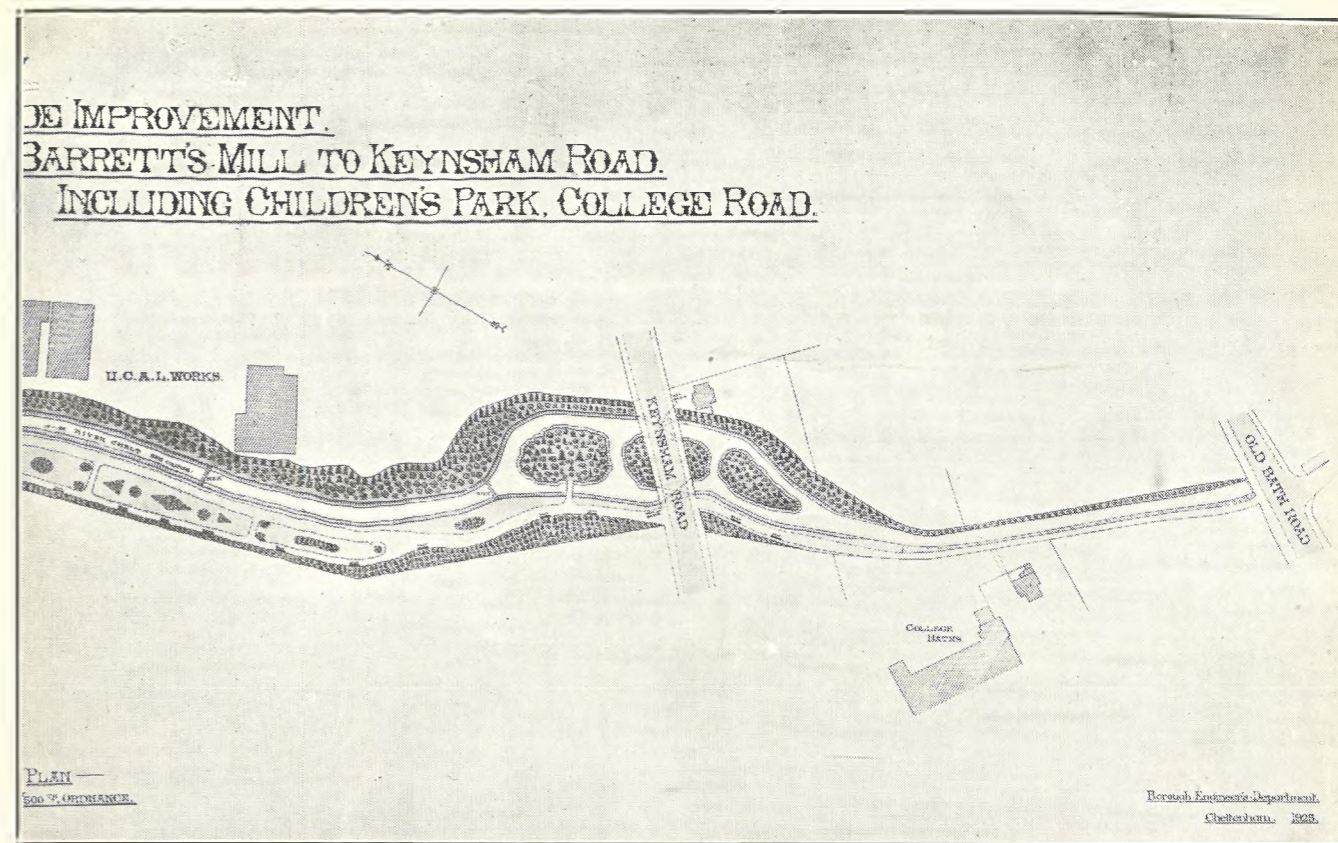

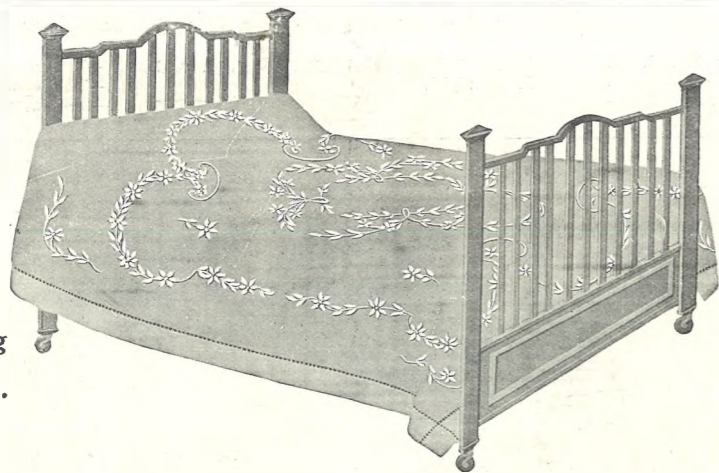

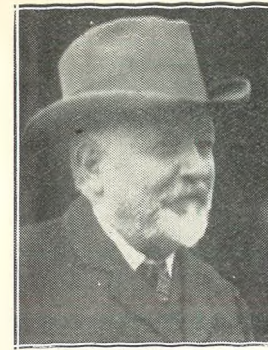

FAREWELL TO A WELL-KNOWN CHELTHENHAM LADY.

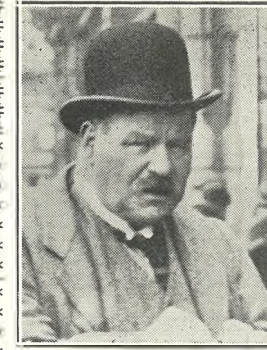

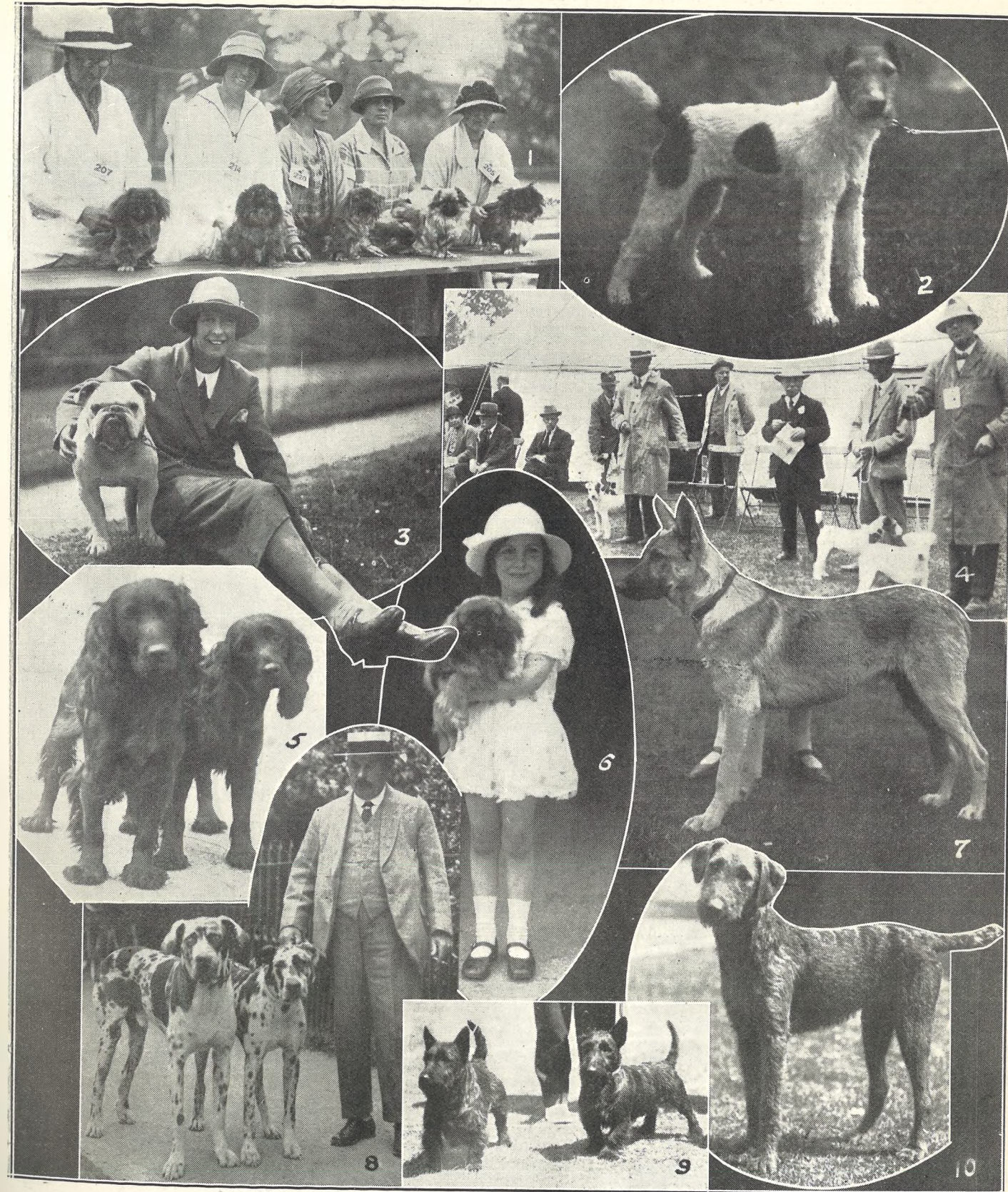

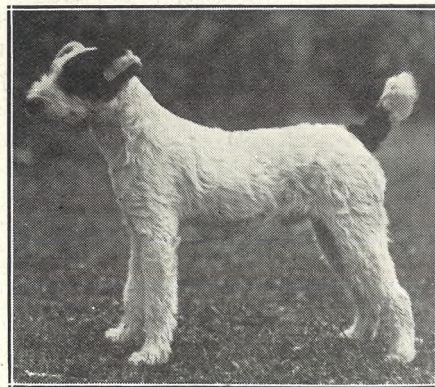

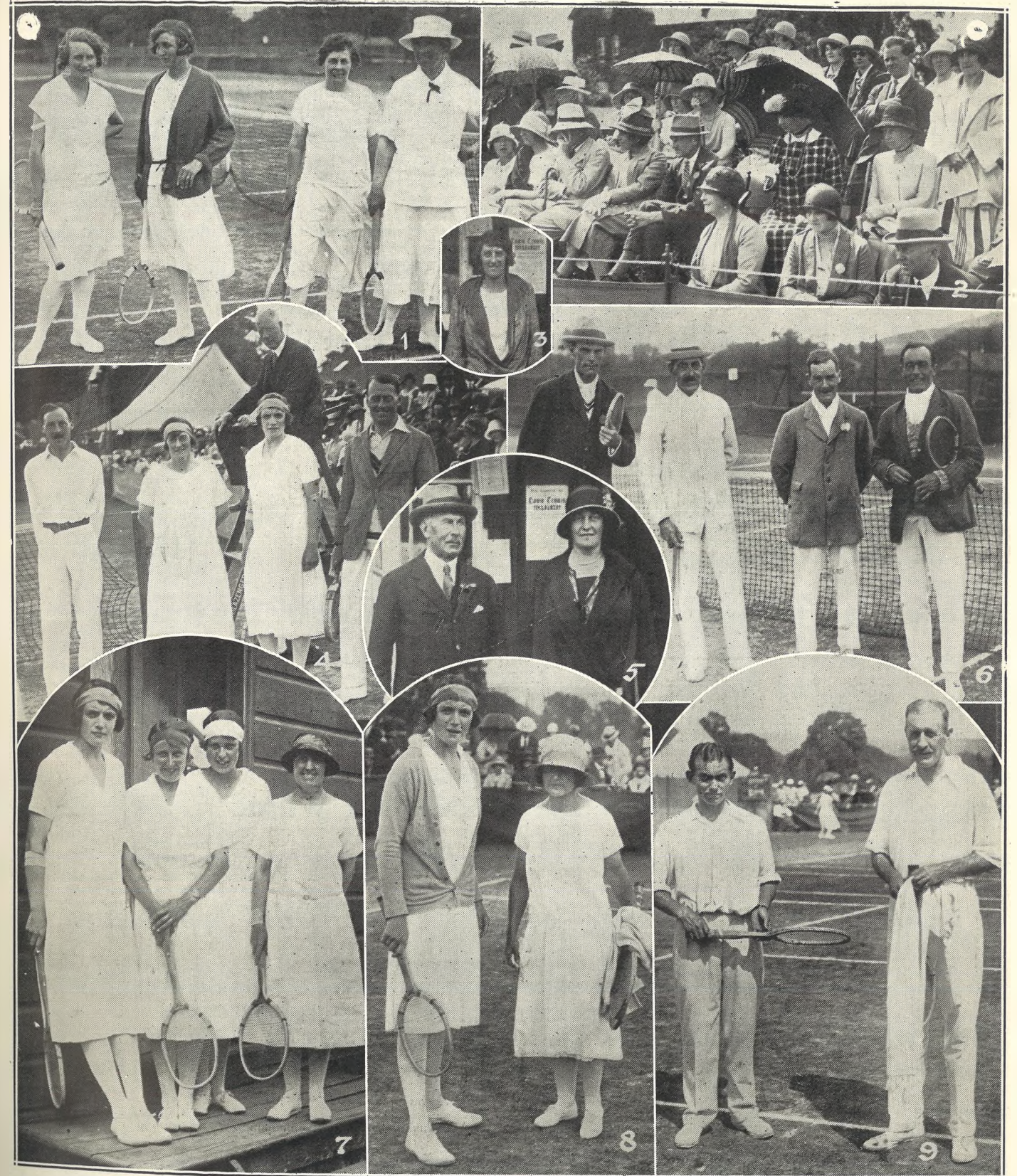
