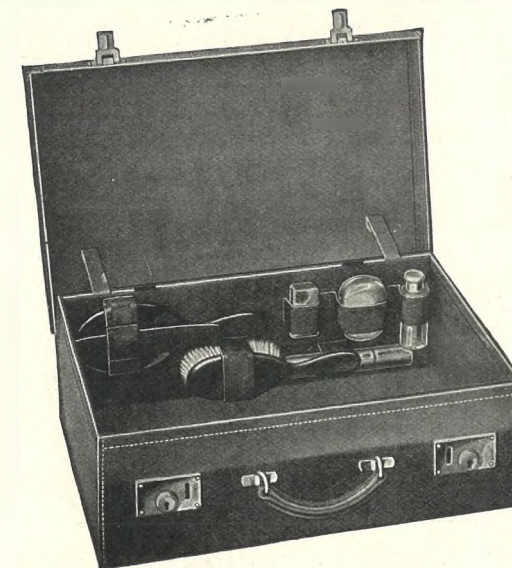


DEDICATION OF BECKFORD WAR MEMORIAL.

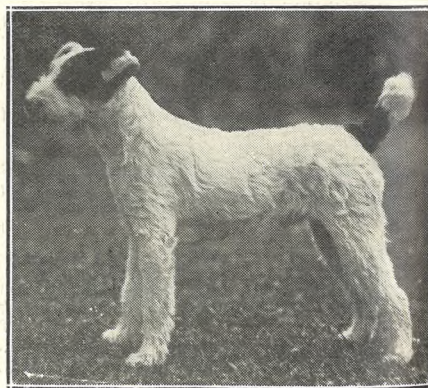

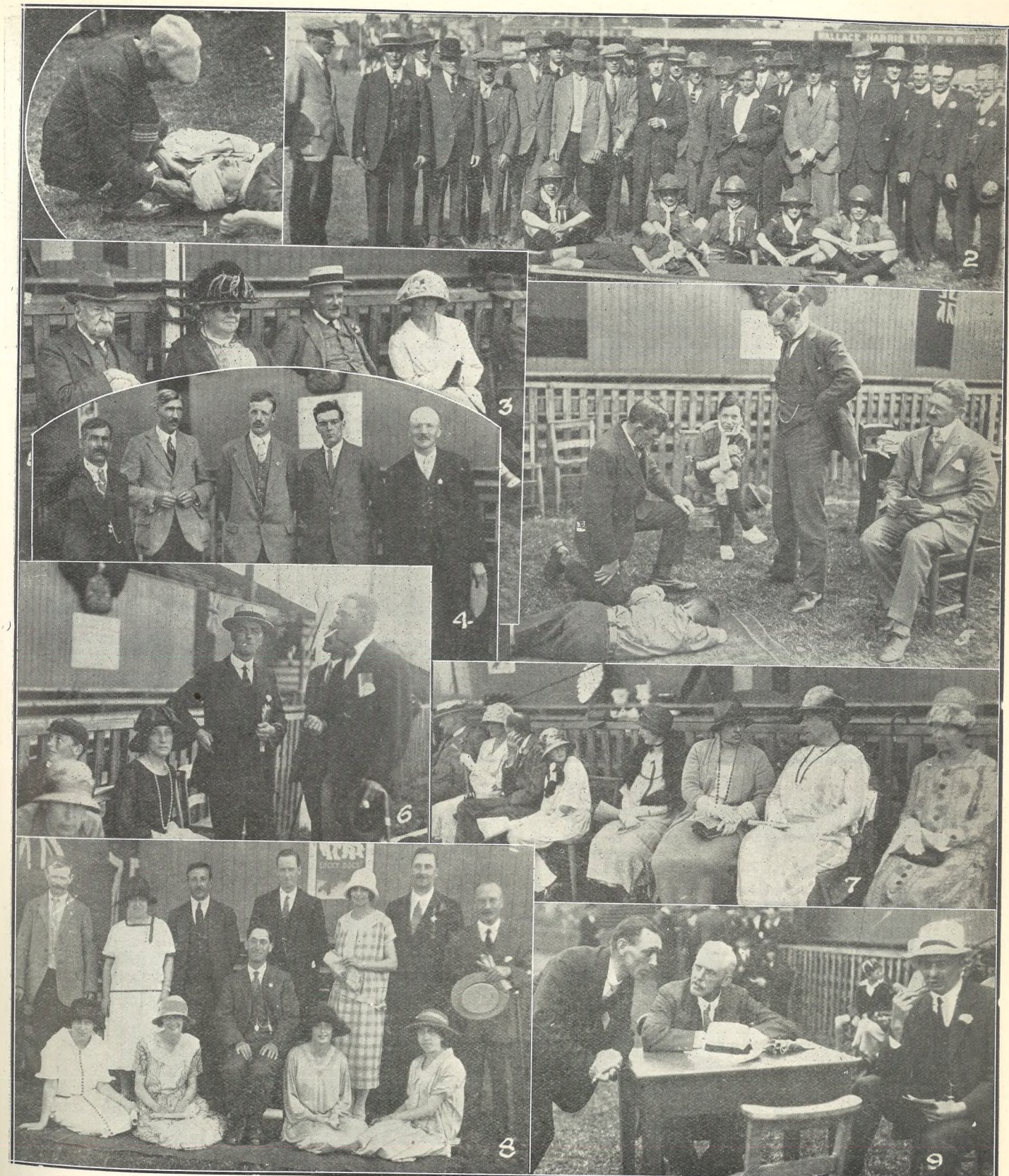

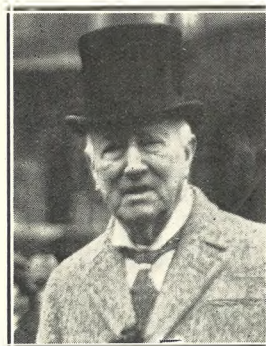


FUNERAL OF MR. HERBERT UNWIN.

The funeral of the late Mr. Herbert Unwin took place at Badgeworth Church on Tuesday, July 21st, amidst manifestations of the greatest sorrow and regret from a very large congregation, which assembled from many parts of the country.

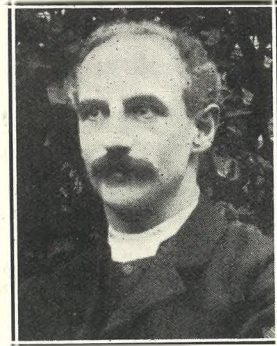

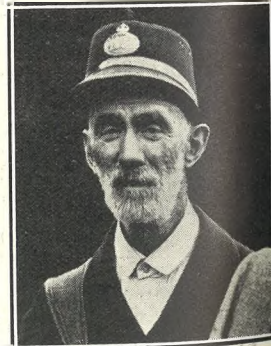
MR. F. BRANDT, J.P.,

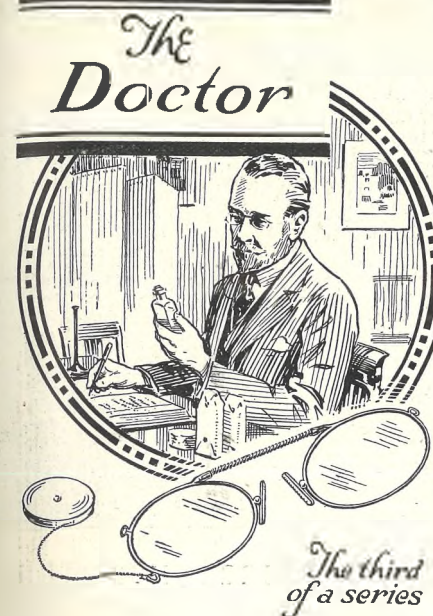


REV. A. BEYNON PHILLIPS.

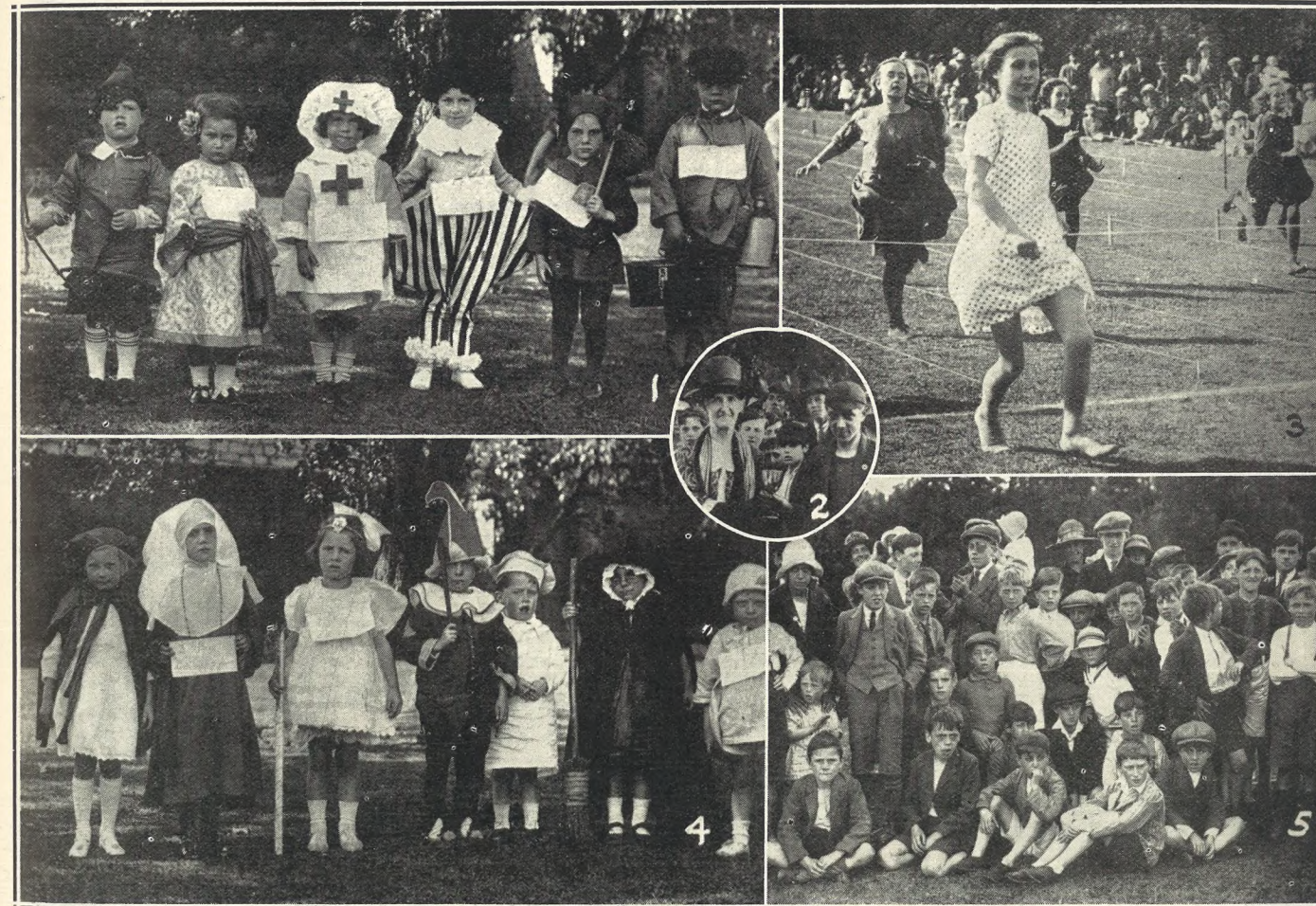

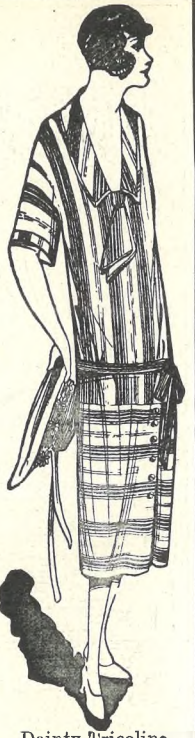

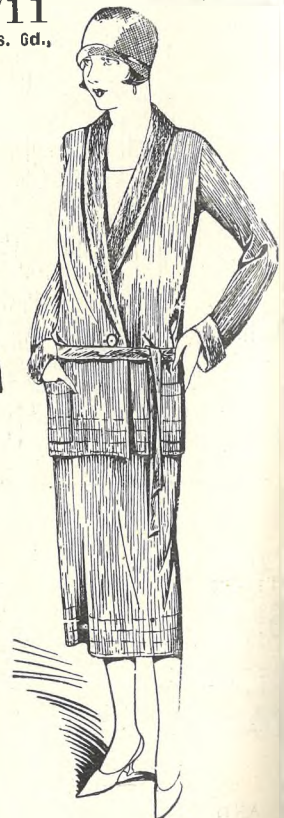
