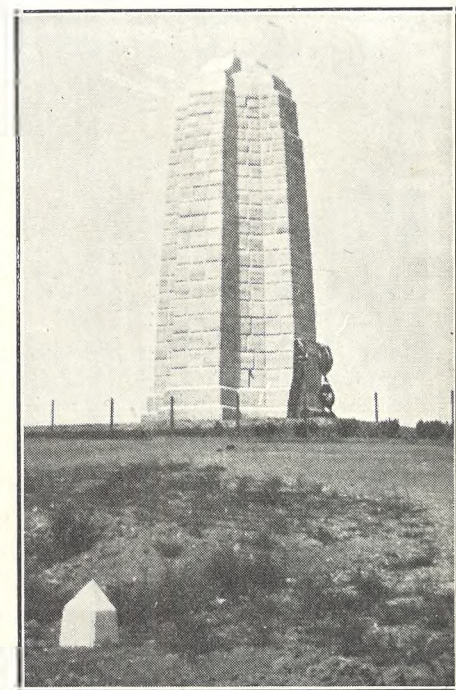
MUNICIPAL TREASURERS VISIT CHELTENHAM.

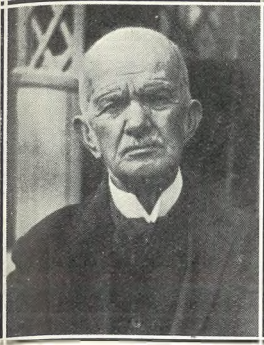

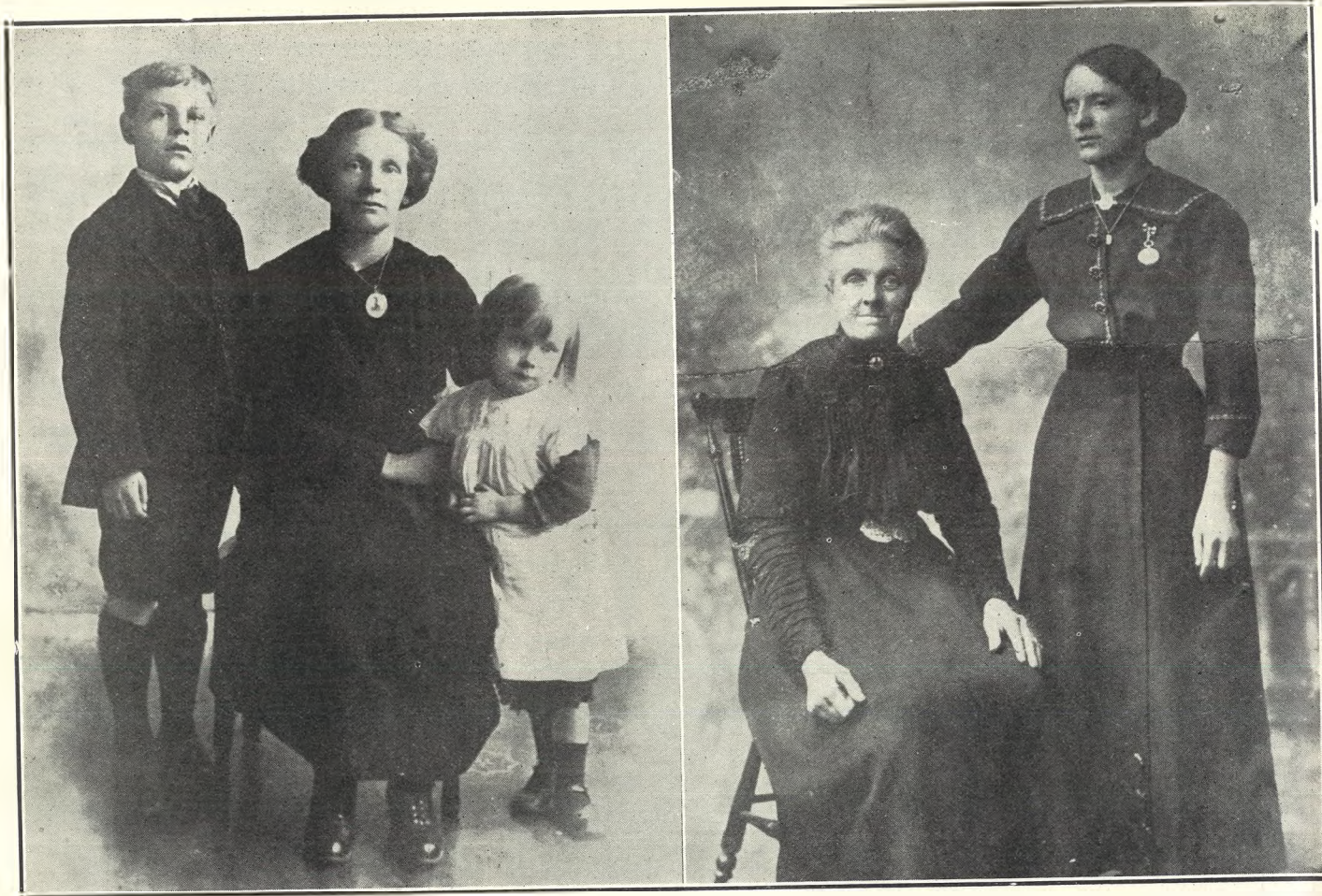

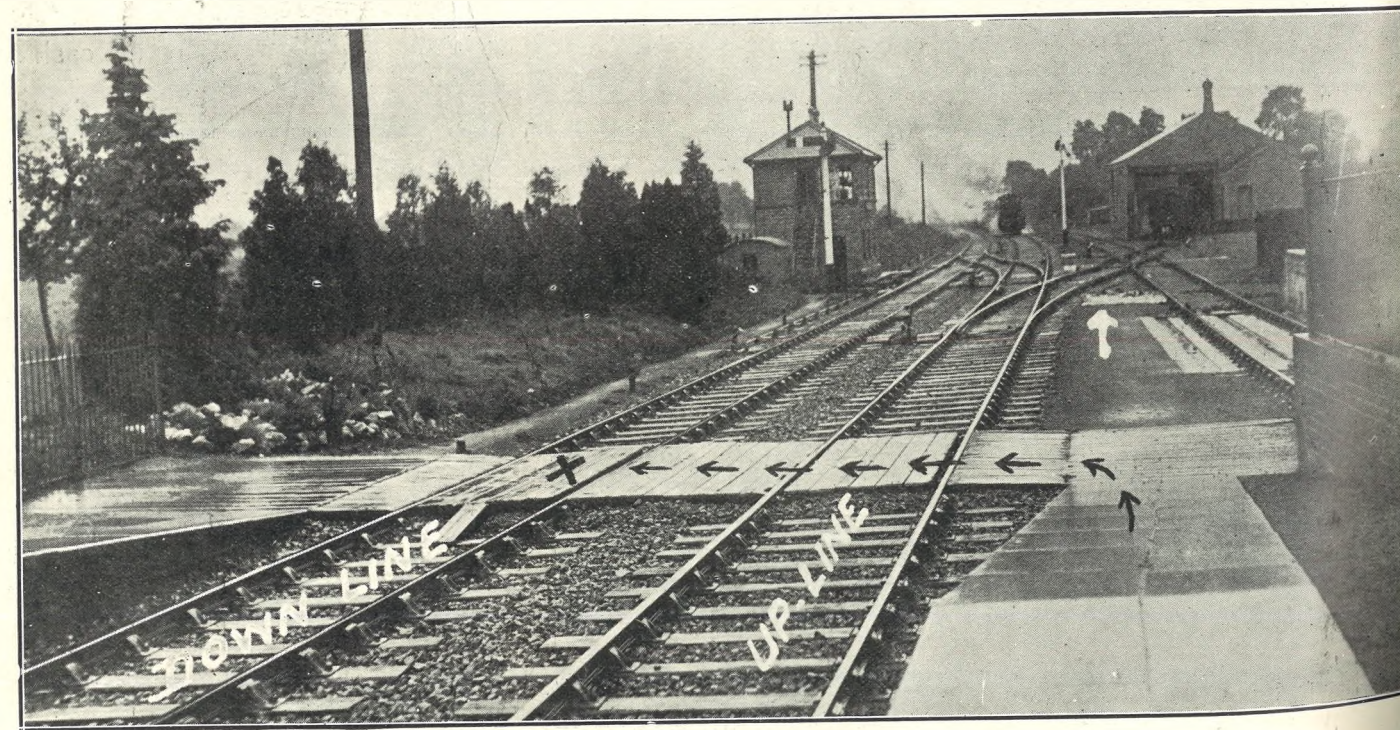


TRAGEDY AT A CHELTENHAM SCHOOL TREAT.

Cheltenham was shocked by a terrible tragedy on Saturday evening, when two married sisters who had gone with their children to a Sunday School treat at Bishop's Cleeve were knocked down by an express goods train in that station and killed instantaneously, while their mother and their own children were eye-witnesses on the platform.

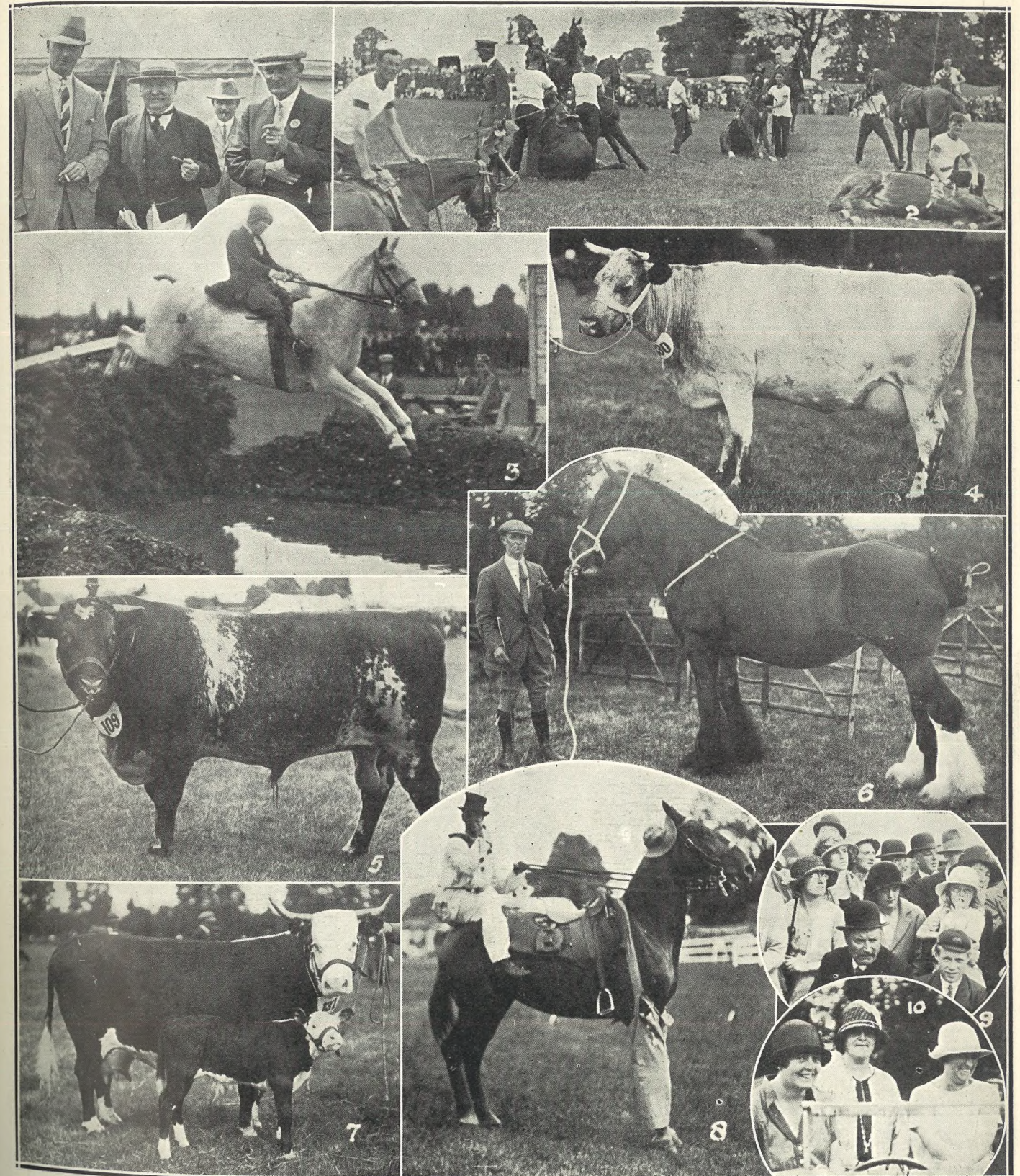

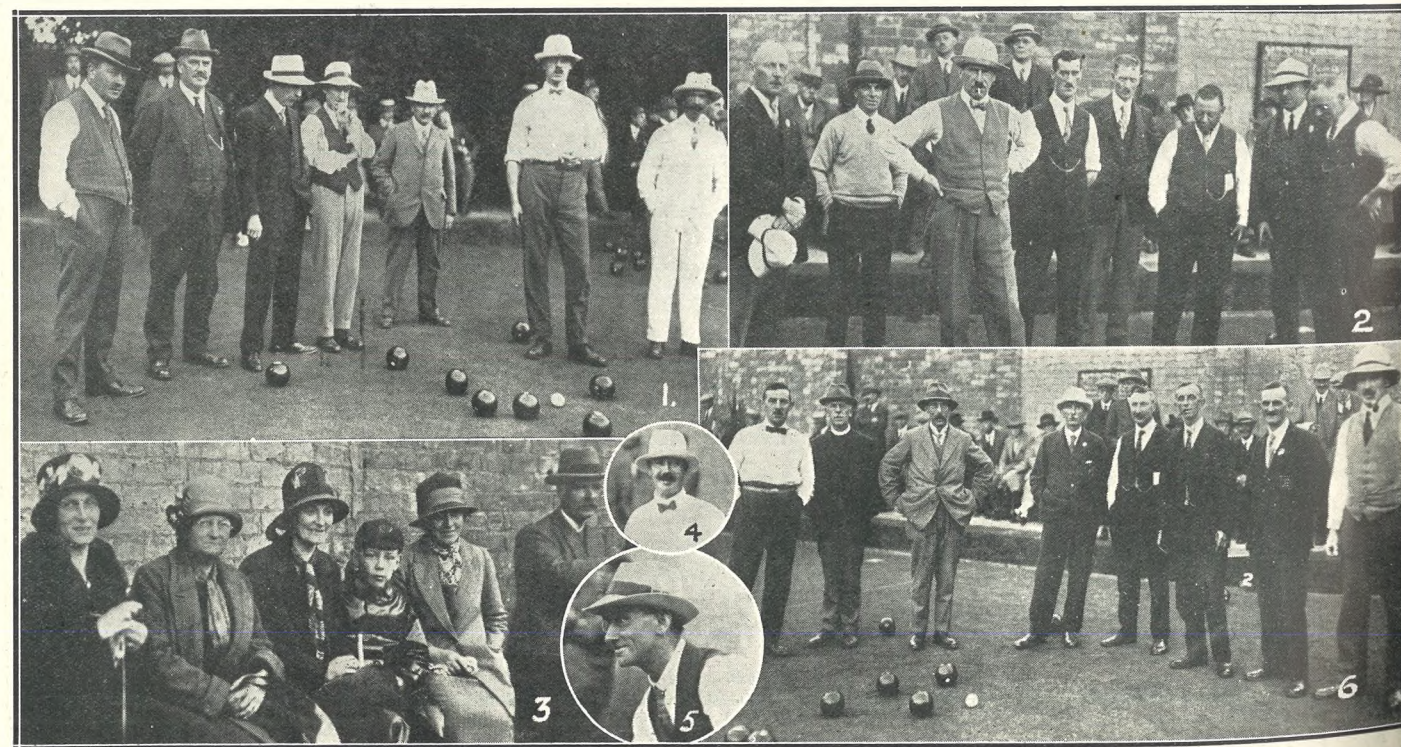

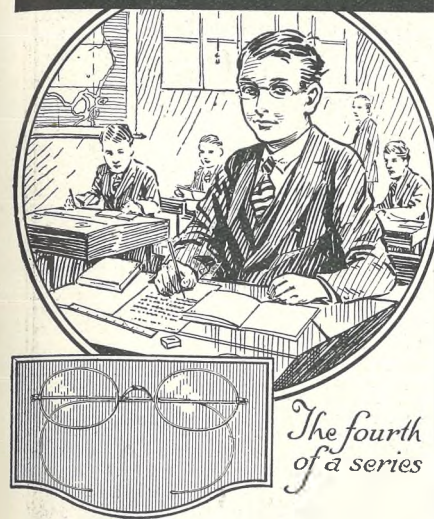

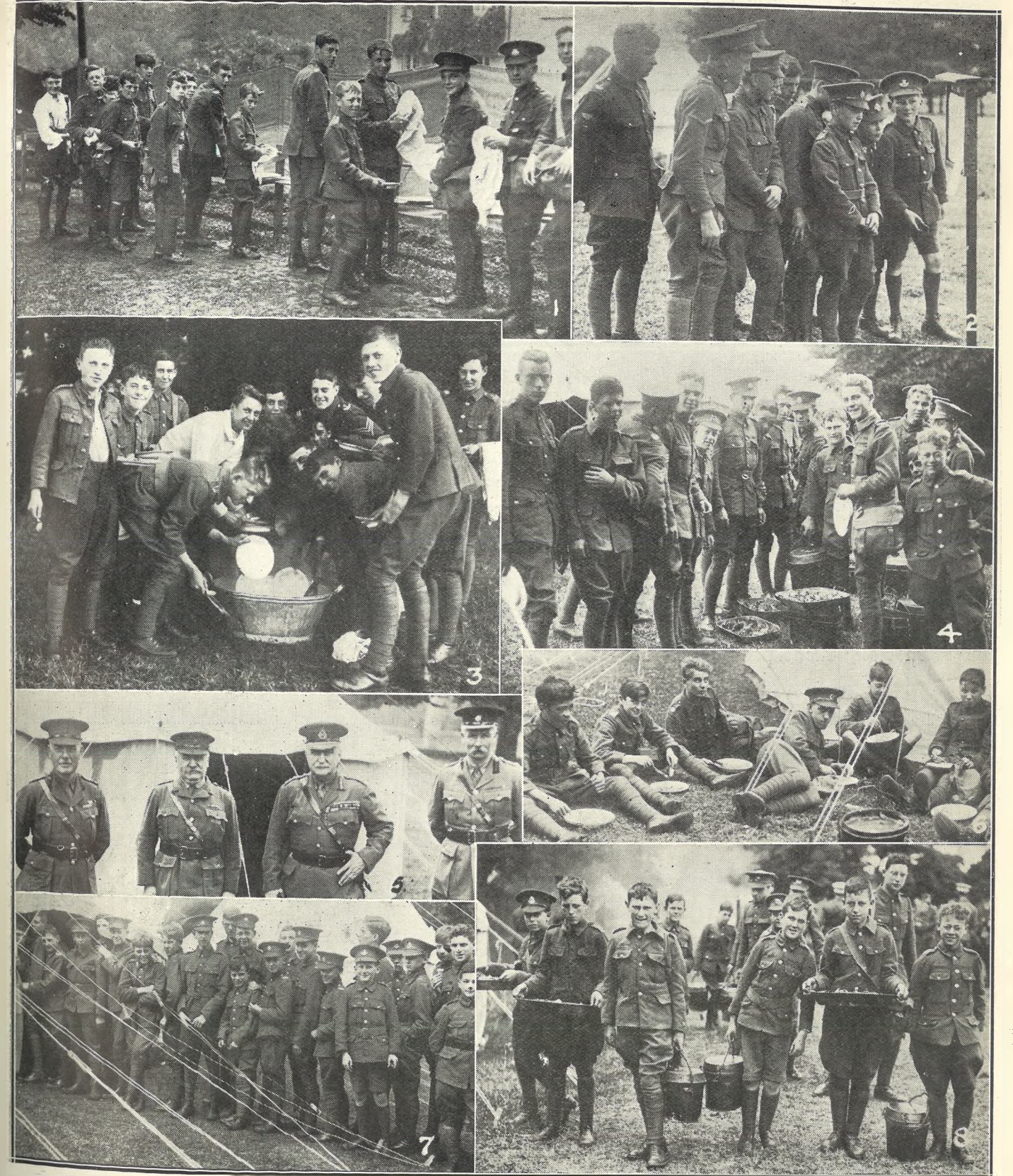


THE BISHOP'S CLEEVE STATION TRAGEDY.

The funeral of the two poor women (Mrs. R. E. Berry and Mrs. N. L. Hyde) killed at Bishop's Cleeve Station on July 25th took place at Cheltenham Cemetery on Thursday, July 30th, amidst poignant scenes. Hundreds lined the streets from Albert-street, St. Peter's, where the funeral started, to Pittville-street, and there was a great crowd congregated at the graveside. The coffins of the two sisters were in one hearse, and they were both buried in one grave.

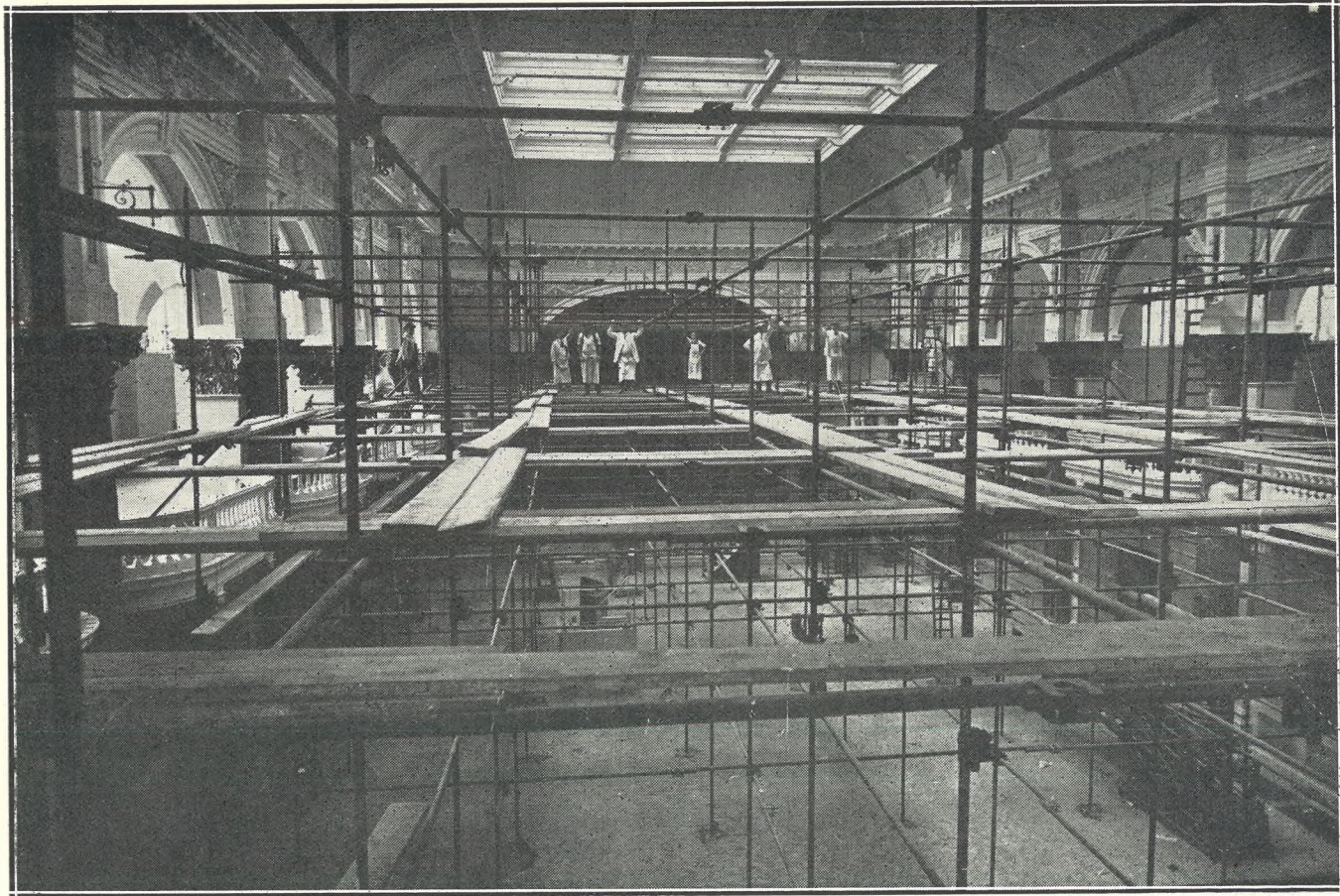

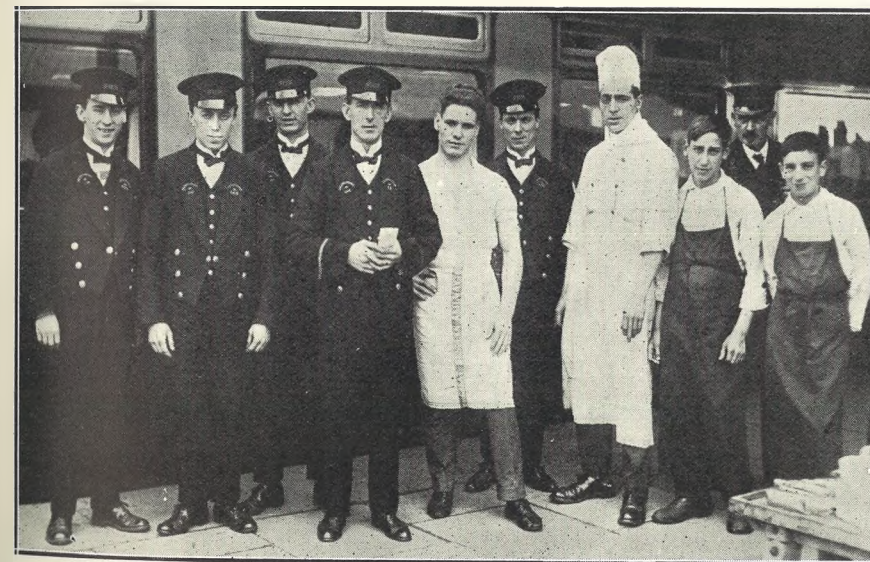

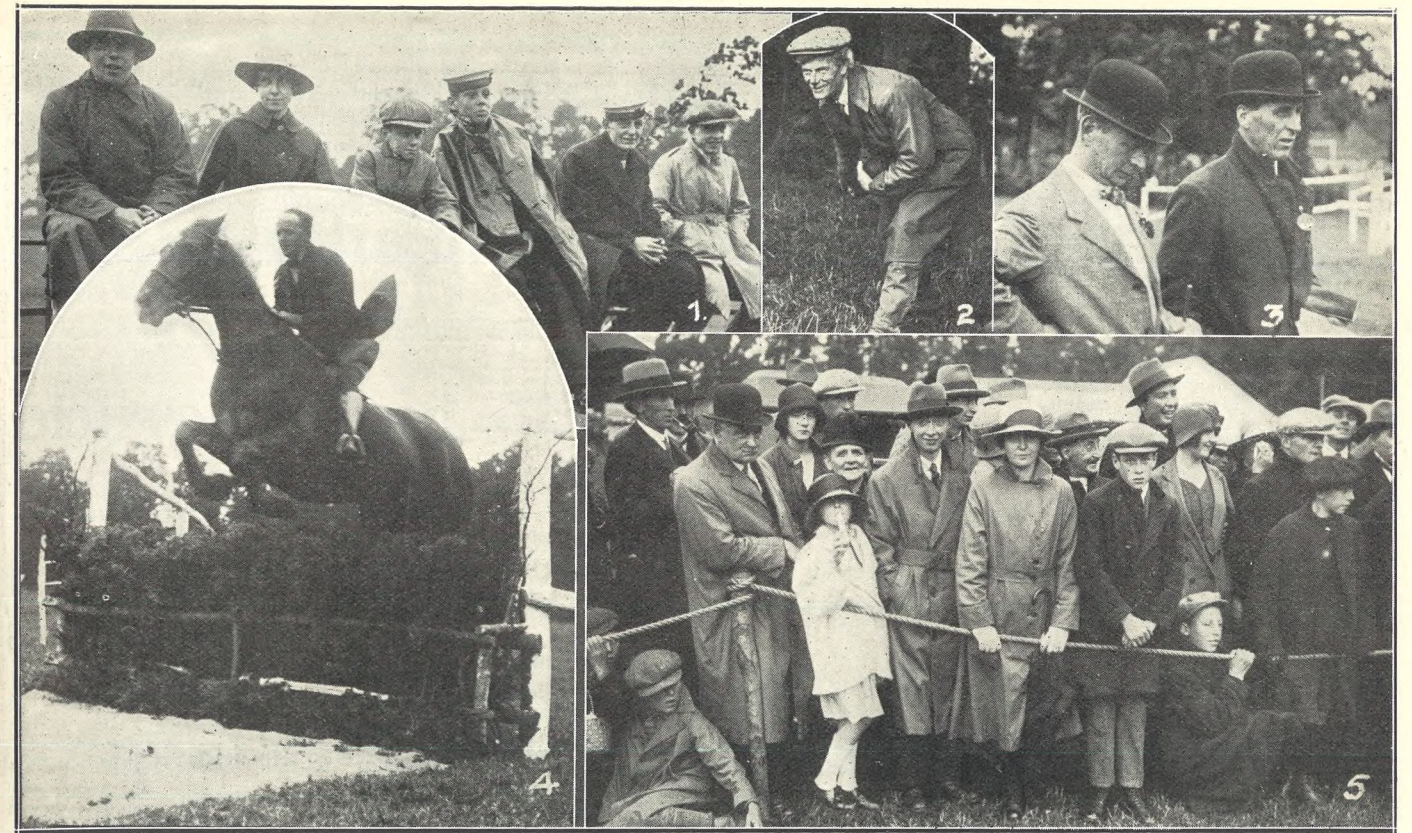

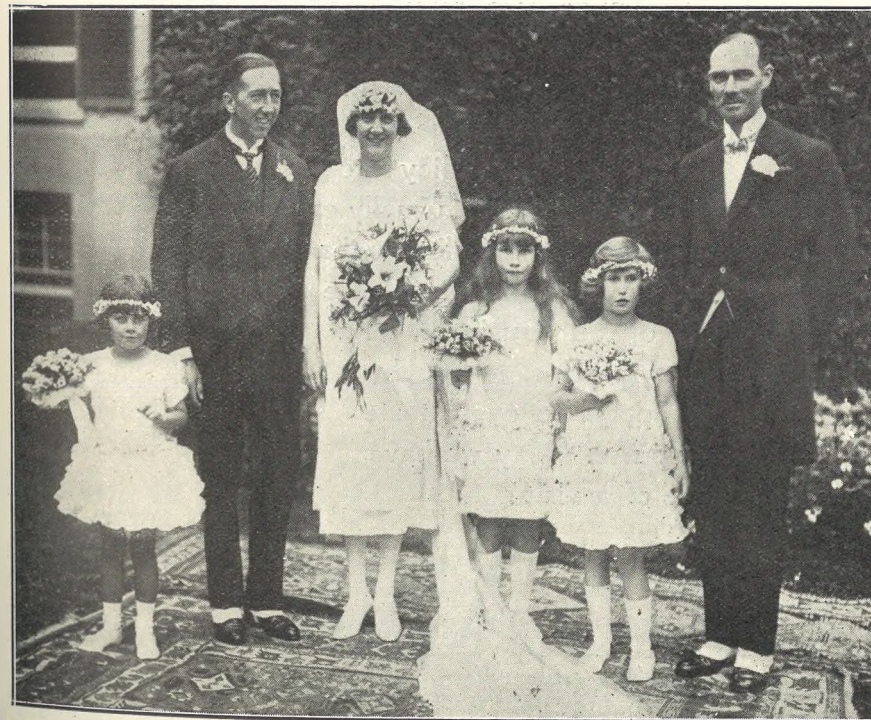

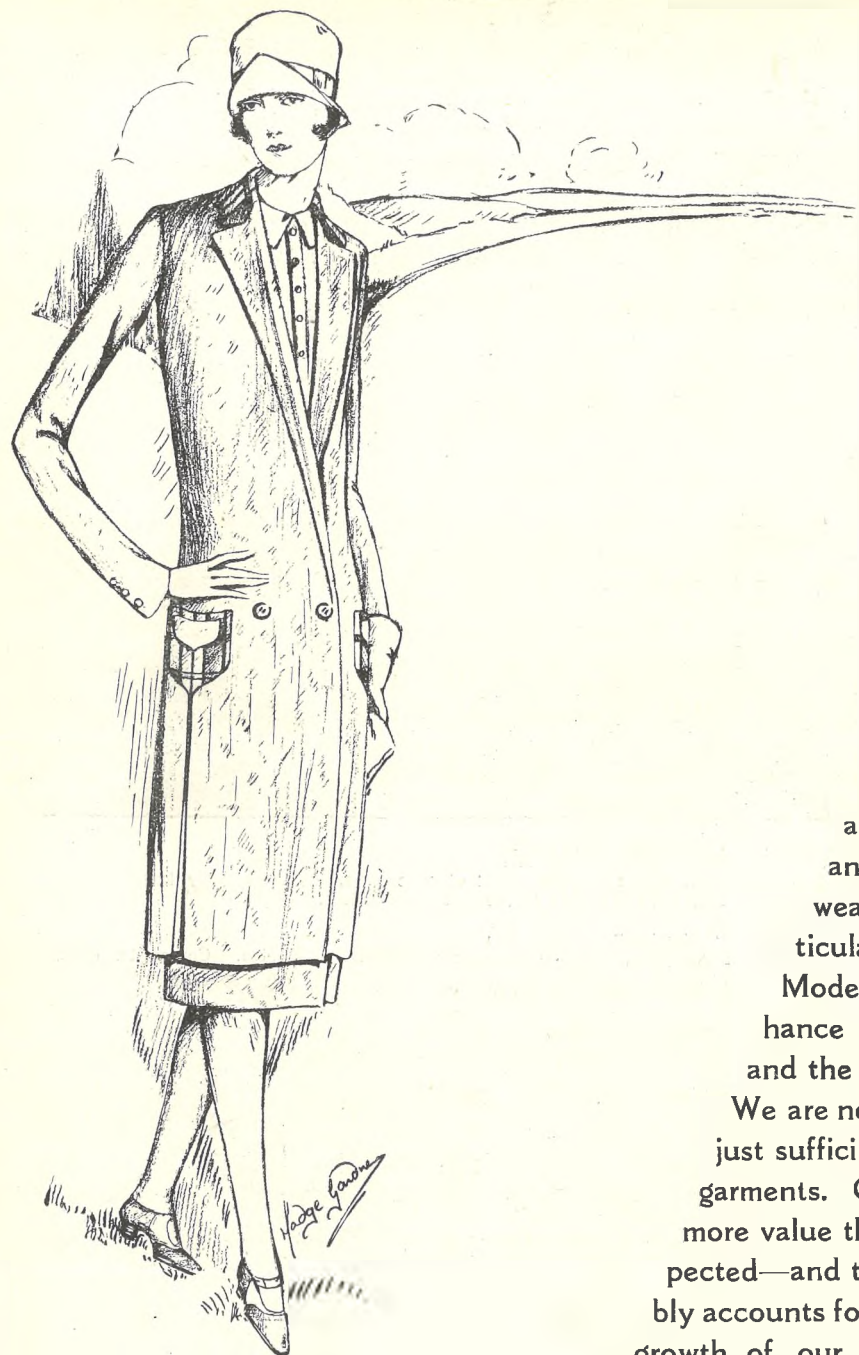


MRS. WAITE,

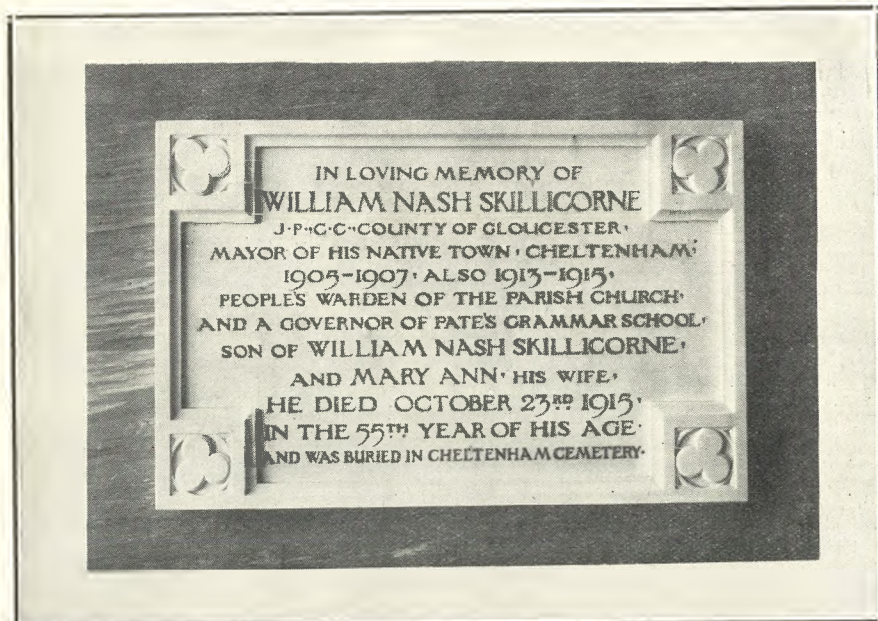

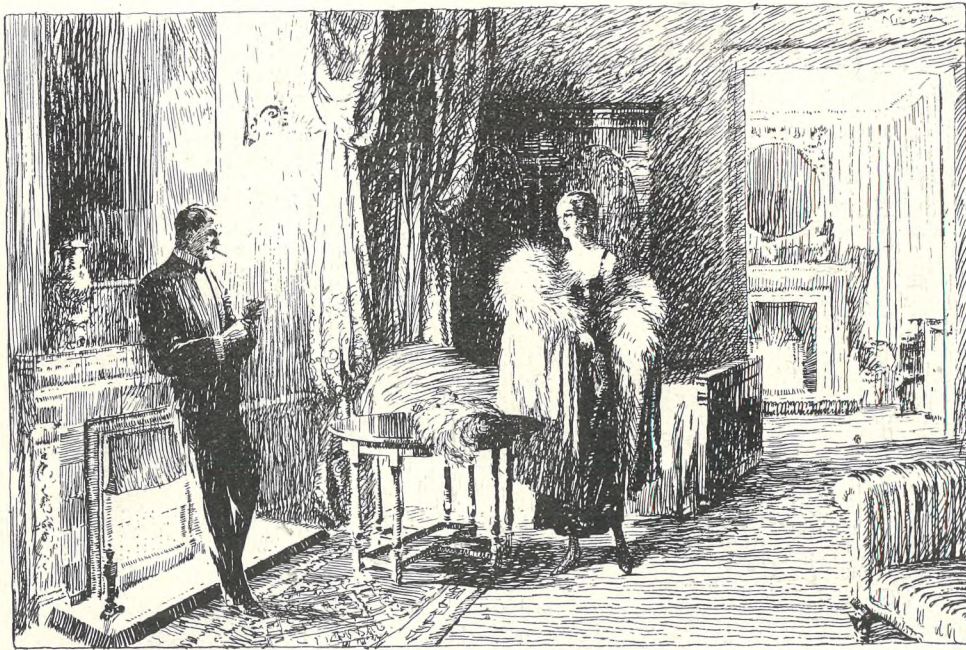

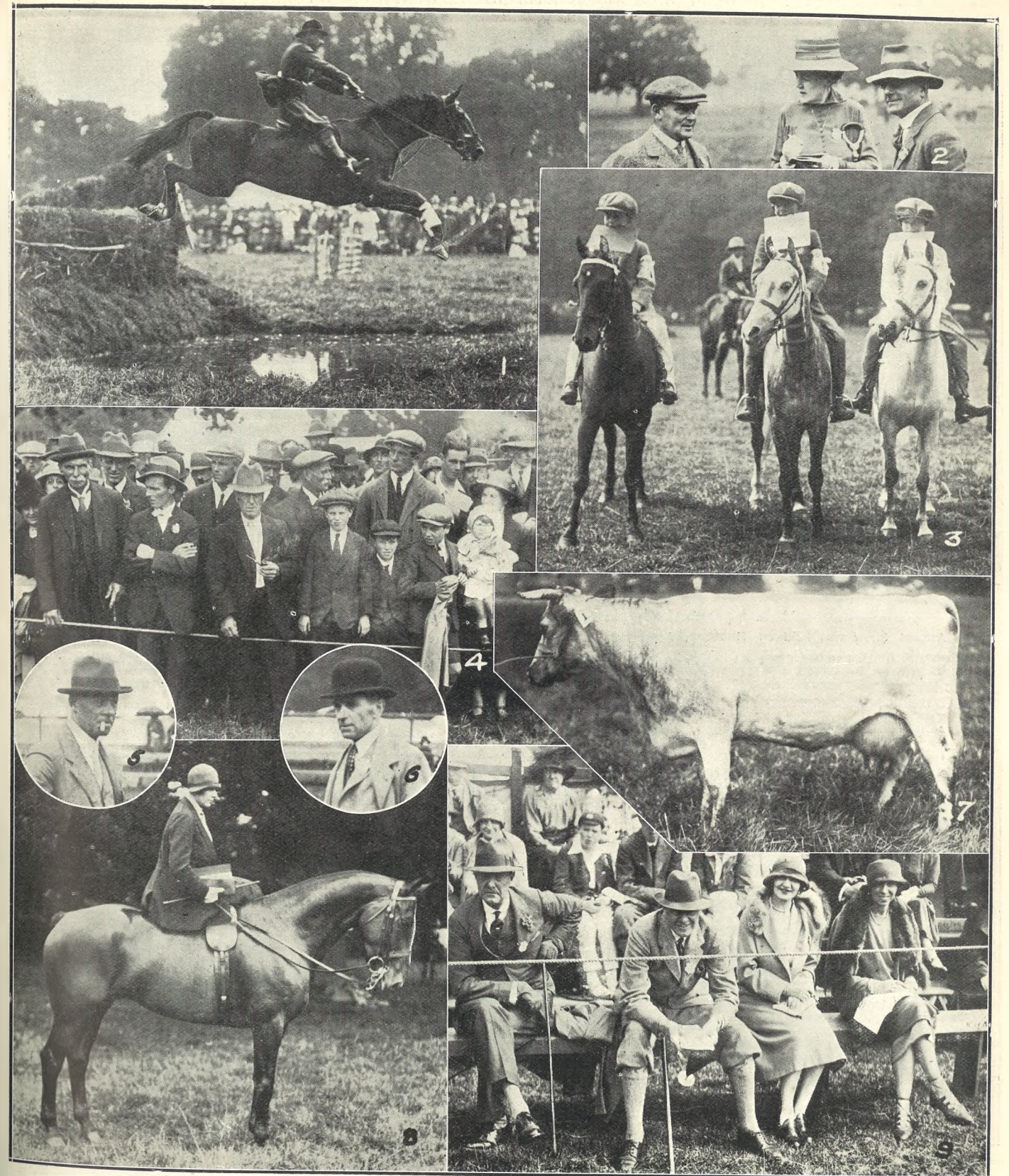
