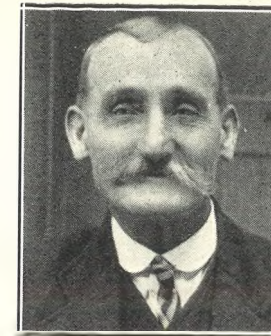
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MR. G. F. (DICKY) DERE,

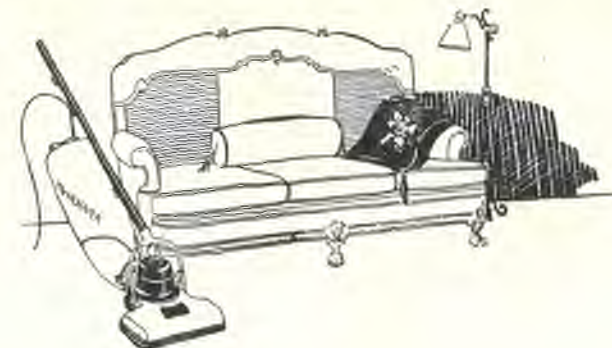

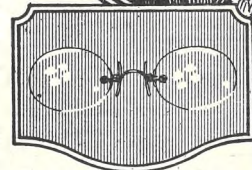


MR. HAROLD MILLER,

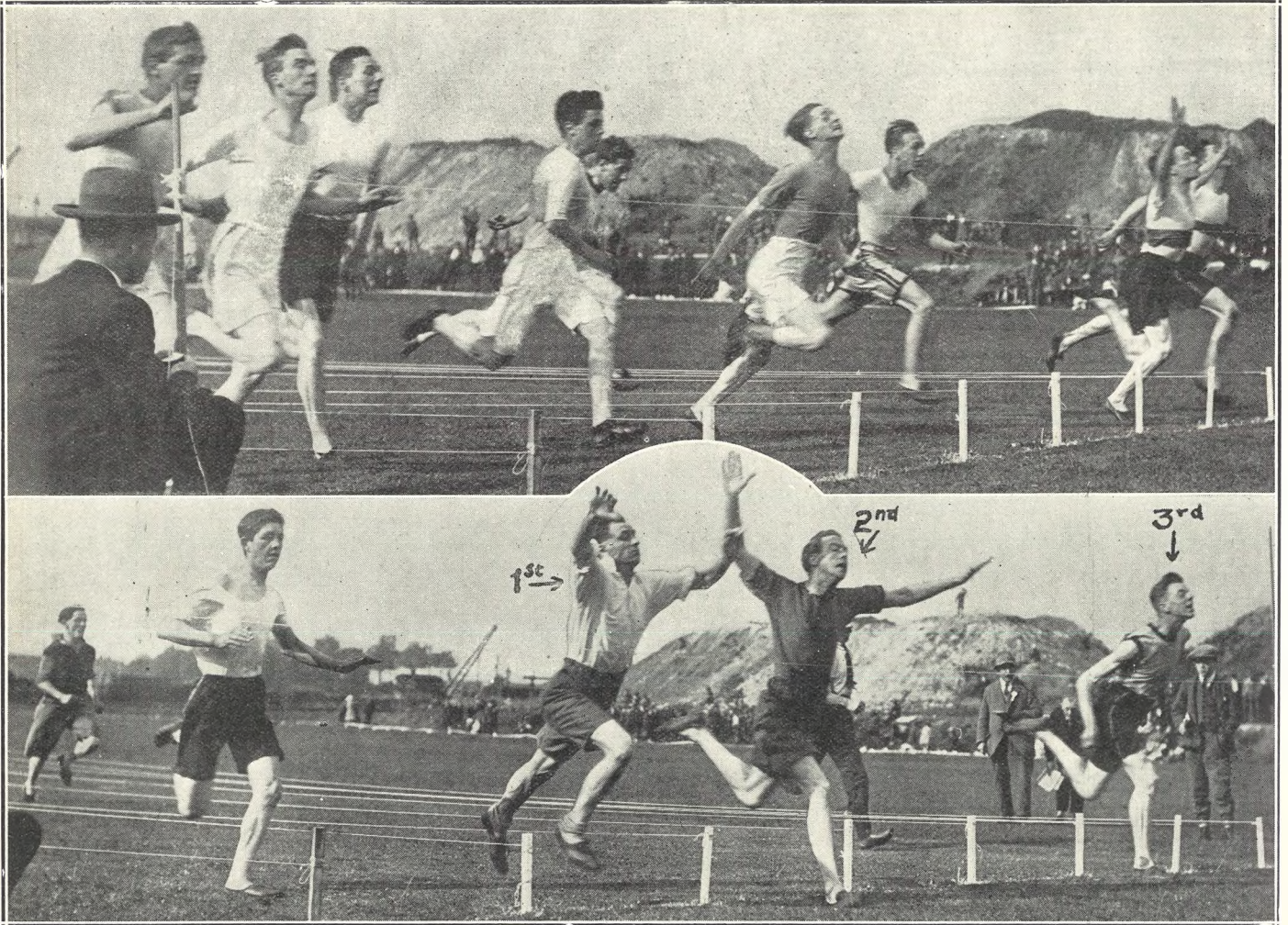

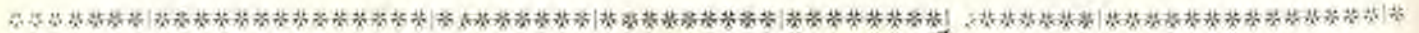

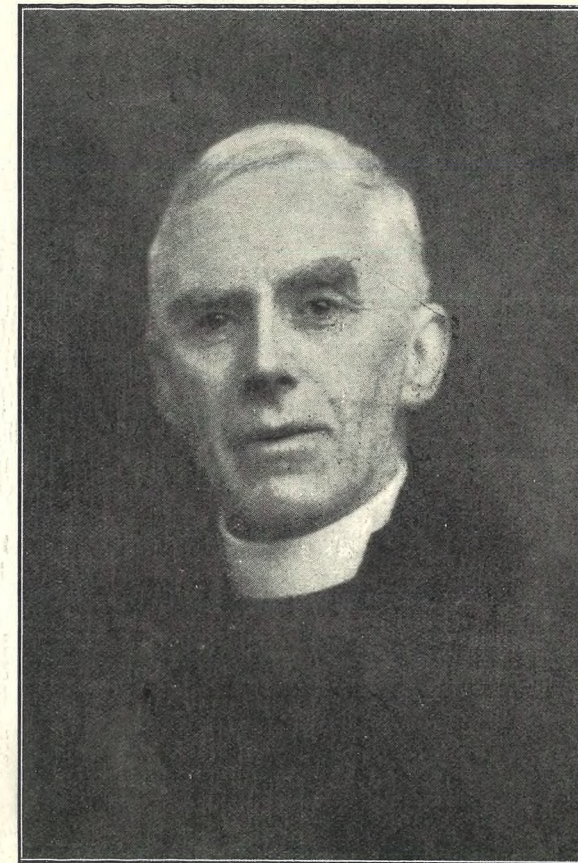

CANON GEORGE GARDNER.

Former Archdeacon of Cheltenham, who died on Sunday last at The Deanery, Marlow, the residence of Mrs. Himo, his sister, aged 71 years. Canon Gardner was for 26 years at All Saints', Cheltenham, curate for the first two, and vicar for the last 24, and during that time devoted energy, zeal, and means to the adornment of that church and development of the parochial organisation. From December, 1910, until January, 1920, he was Diocesan Chaplain to the Bishop of Birmingham, and part of the time Archdeacon of Aston. He then became Archdeacon of Cheltenham, and lived here until September, 1924, when, owing to ill-health, he retired. He was an Old Cheltonian; a son of the late Mr. Wm. Gardner, J.P., of Cheltenham, and he never married. He was a highly cultured gentleman, greatly respected by all who knew him, and was a fine musician, and a recognised authority on Church Music. 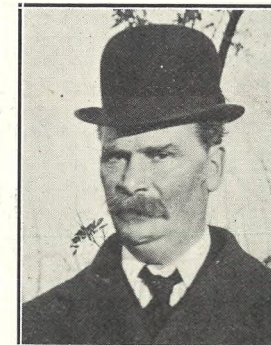

- 10.—Part of the big ring in the "Clipping" ceremony.

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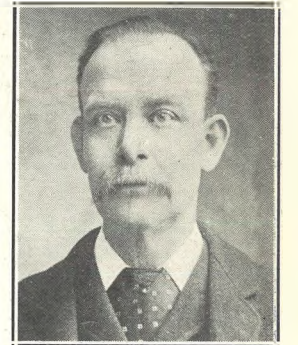
MR. & MRS. W. A. RICHARDS.

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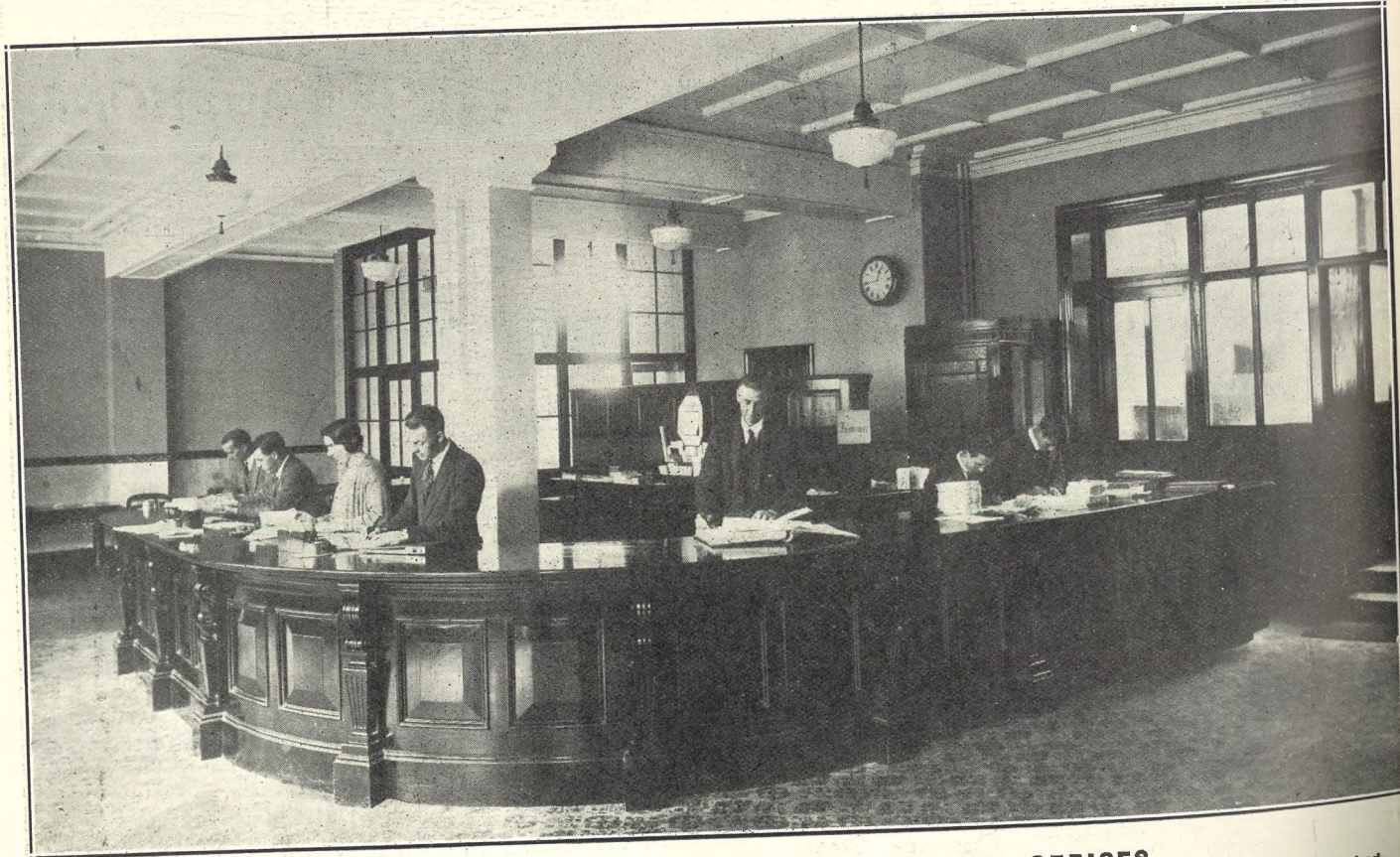
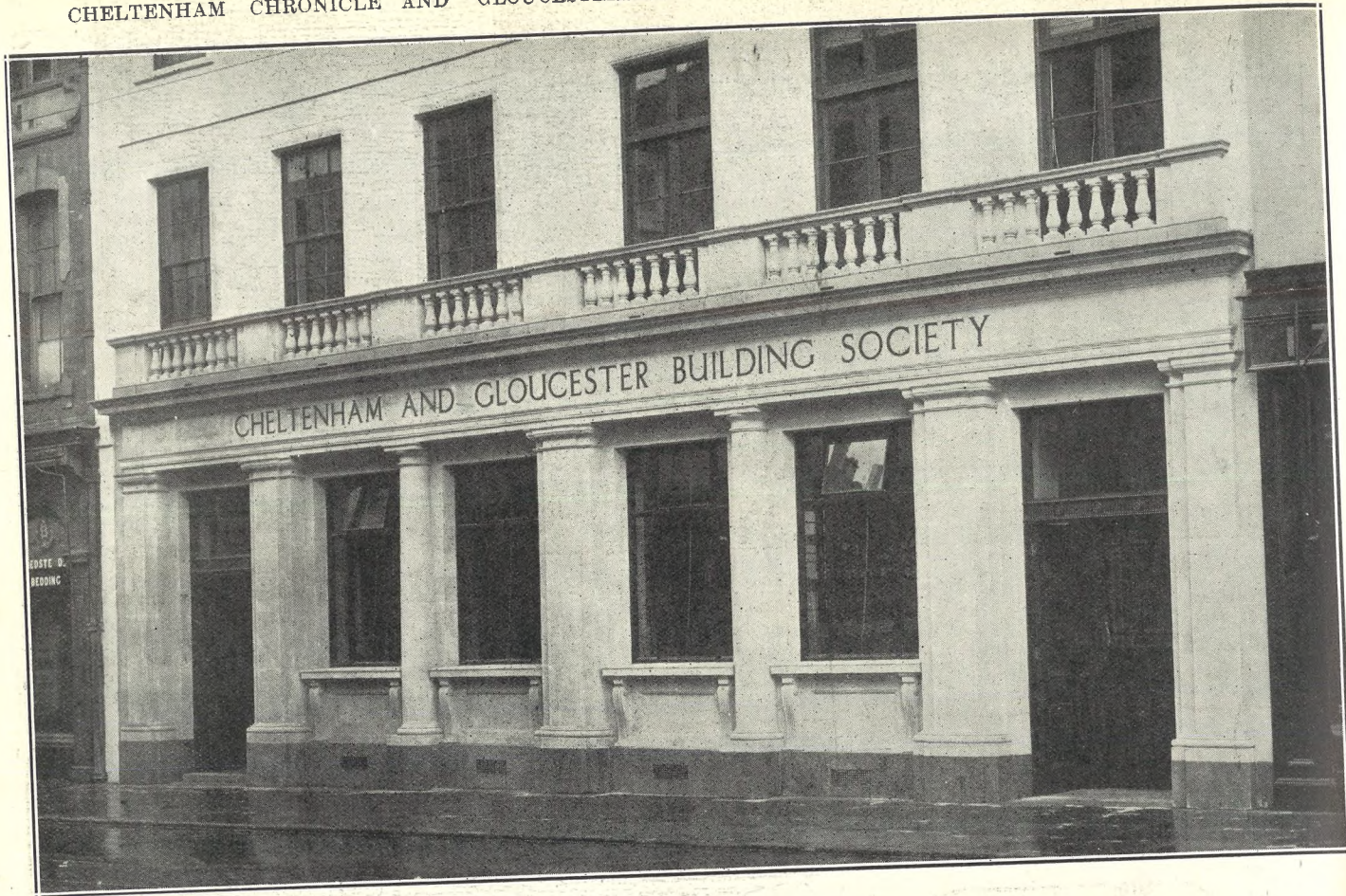

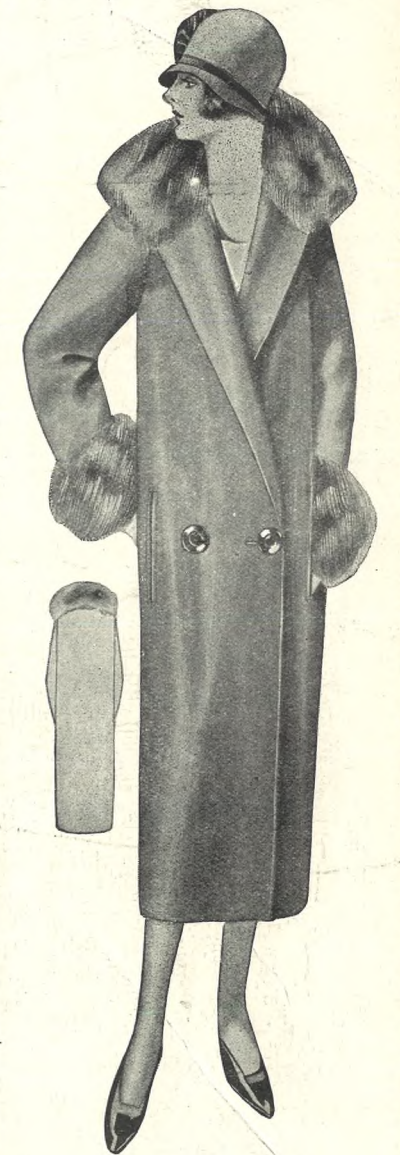
GOLFERS BEATEN BY THE WEATHER.

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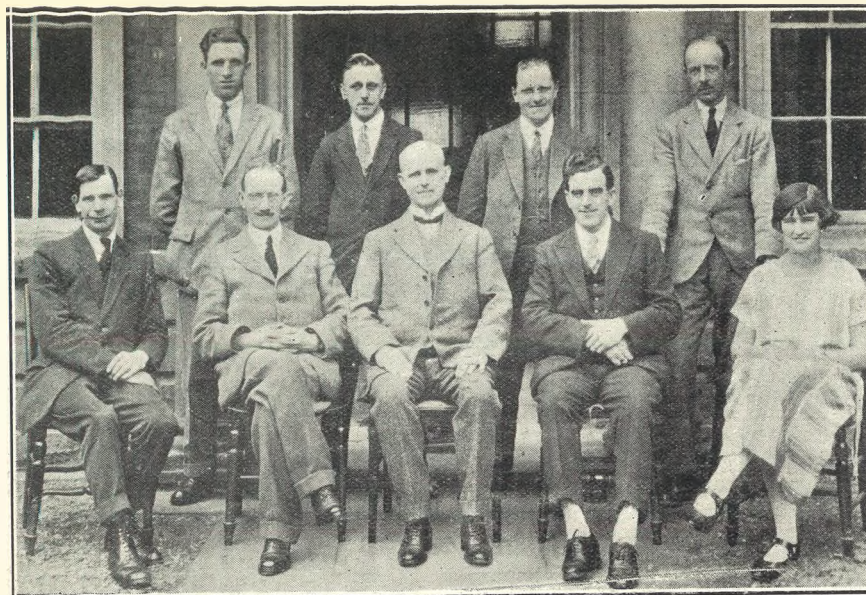
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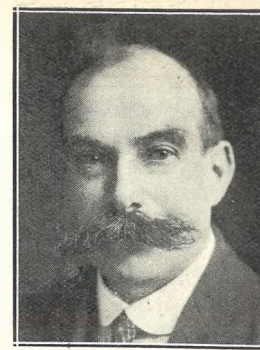
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GLOUCESTER TELEPHONE OFFICIAL'S RETIREMENT.

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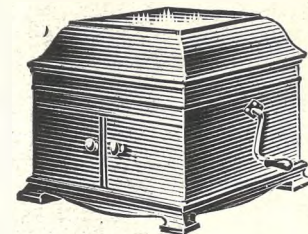
