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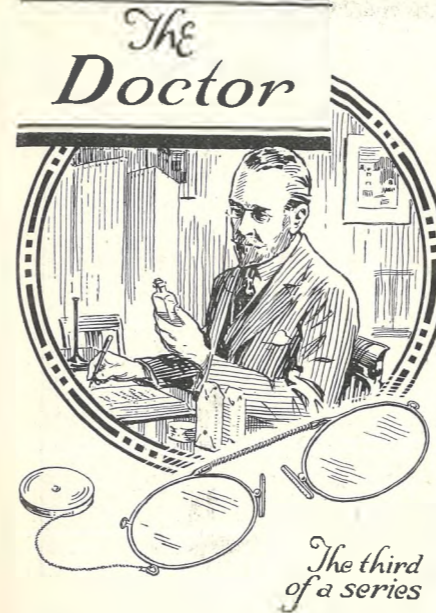


FUNERAL OF MR. R. SWANWICK AT CIRENCESTER.

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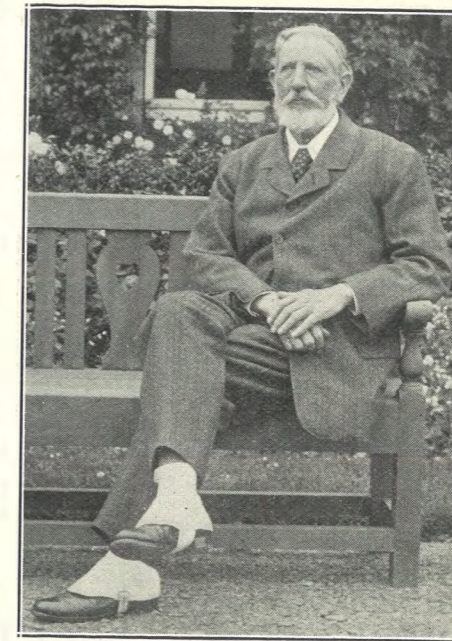

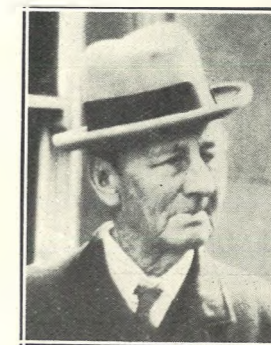

MR. RUSSELL SWANWICK, Of Royal Agricultural College Farm, Cirencester, who died on Thursday, September 24th, aged 82 years. He was a noted breeder of bloodstock, Berkshire pigs, and Gotswold sheep. Horses bred by him have won over £114,000 during the last 35 years in Great Britain and Ireland, and included the following notable winners: Drake, Sancy, Mr. Bliss, Diamond Stud, Sir Eager, Stardrift, Arausio, and Fairy Gold. Mr. Bliss won seven races for him last season.



MR. JOSEPH HARRISON, Of Beech Copse Lodge, Cirencester Park, who died on Sept. 25th, aged 84 years. He had been employed on Earl Bathurst's Estate for about 70 years, and for many years past was Head Woodward. He was a brother of ex-D.C.C. Harrison, of Gloucester.

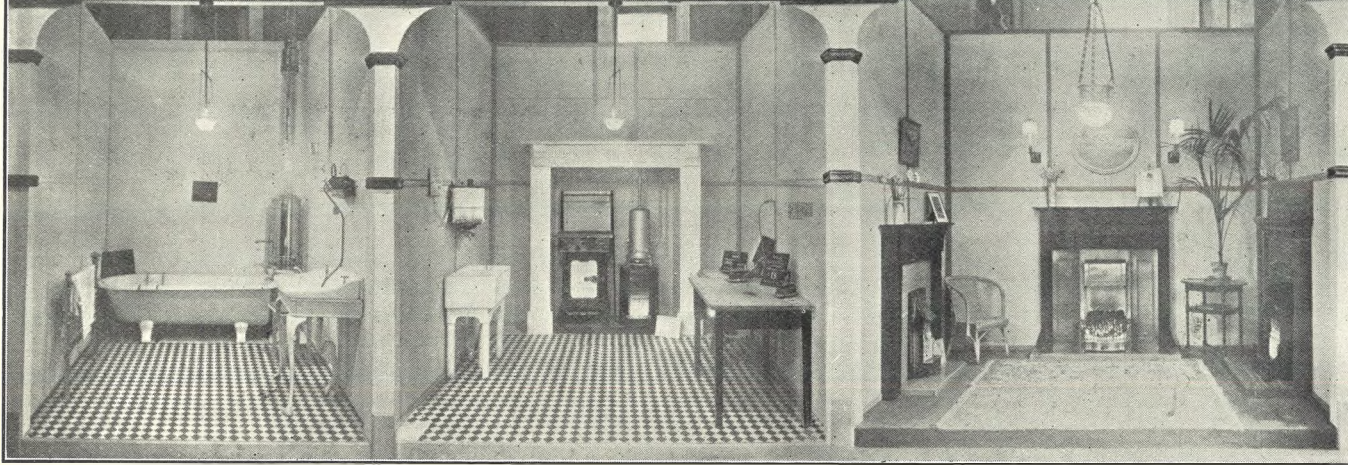
STROUD TENNIS CLUB'S HARD COURTS TOURNAMENT.

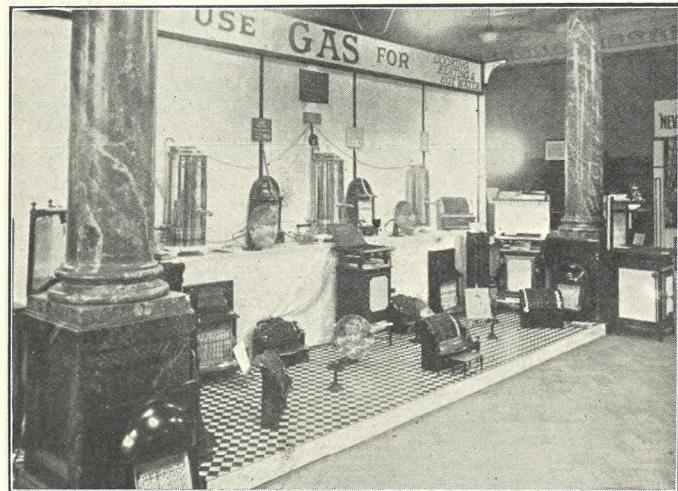

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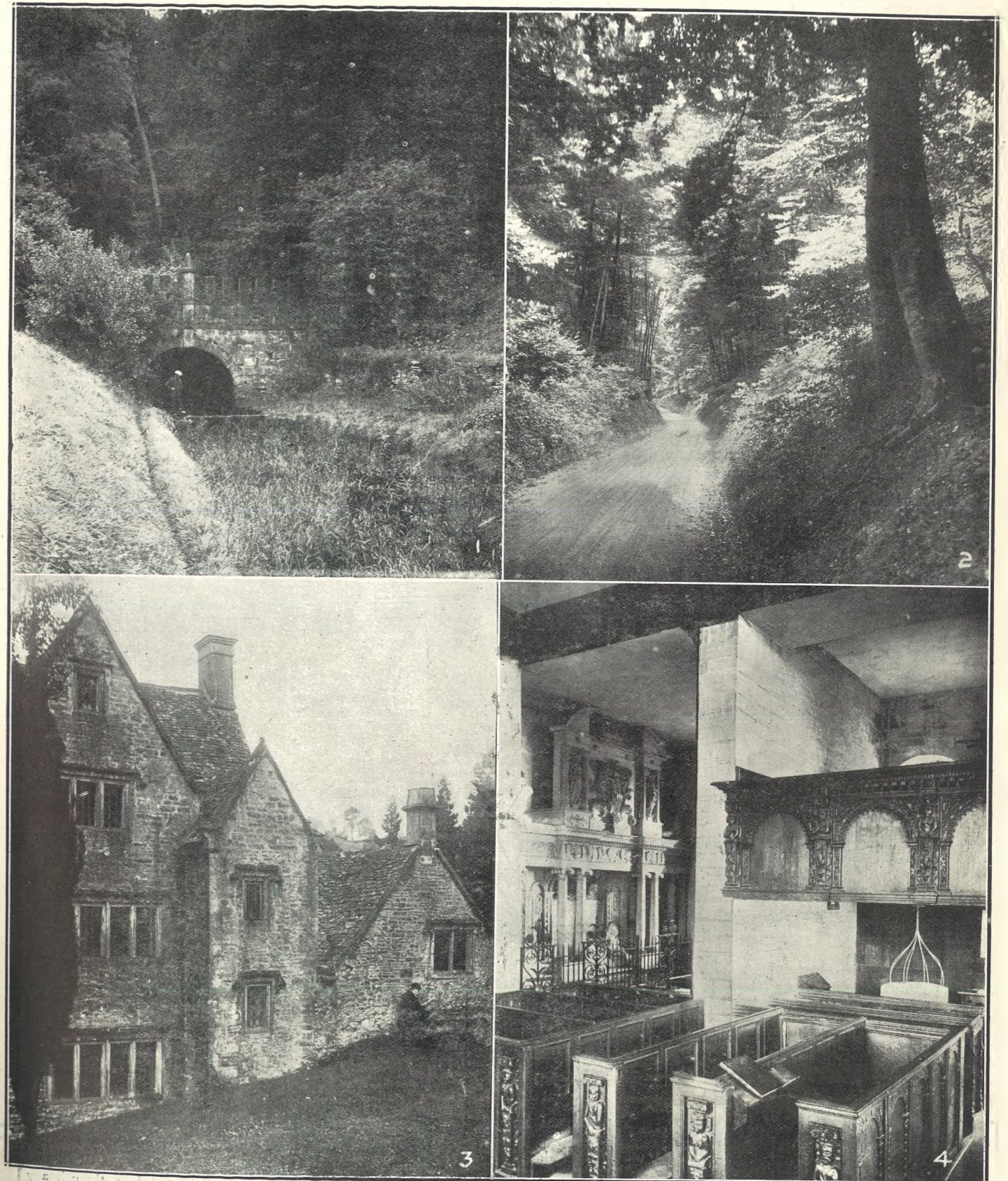

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—SAPPERTON AND DANEWAY.

- Sapperton is an ancient and picturesque village on the Cotswolds, about five miles from Cirencester; and about ten from Stroud. It possesses a most interesting church, erected about 1200 A.D., and reconstructed in the reign of Queen Anne, in which are some extremely interesting memorials, especially the one to Sir Robert Atkyns, the High Sheriff of Gloucestershire, who died in 1711.
- 1.—The entrance to the Thames and Severn Canal Tunnel in the parish. The canal is now derelict. The tunnel is two and a half miles long, and the barges used to propel their boats by lying on their backs and pushing their feet against the tunnel roof.
- 2.—A lovely bit of road through the woods in the parish.
- 3.—A side view of Daneway House, a very interesting old Cotswold house, close to the canal. It is really in the hamlet of Oakridge.
- 4.—Part of the interior of the church, showing on left the Atkyns memorial in a side chapel. Note the curious carving on the pew ends and on the quaint little gallery front.

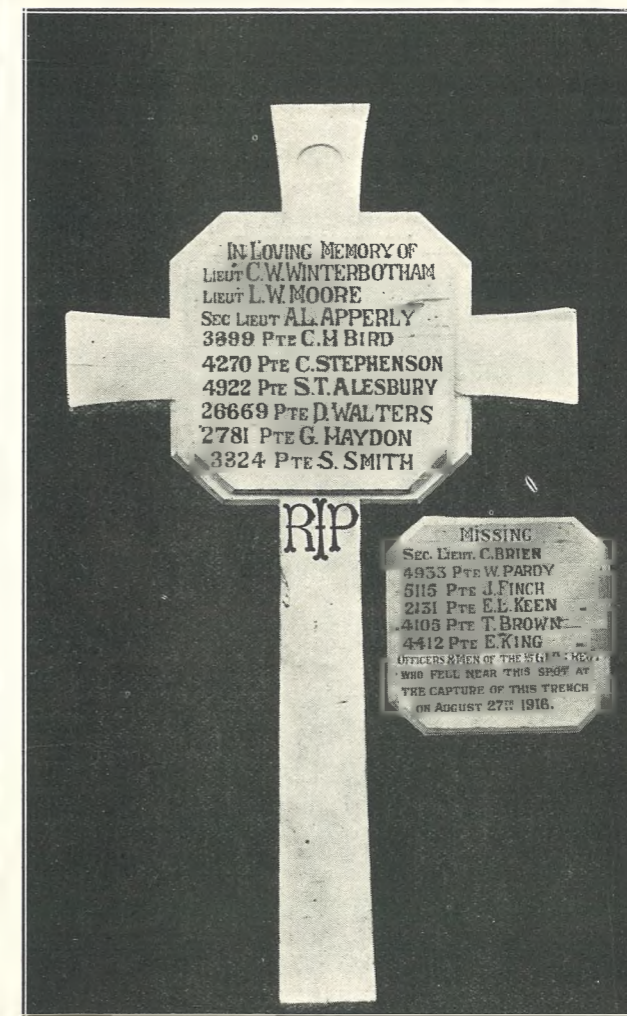

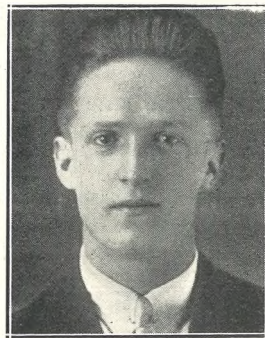

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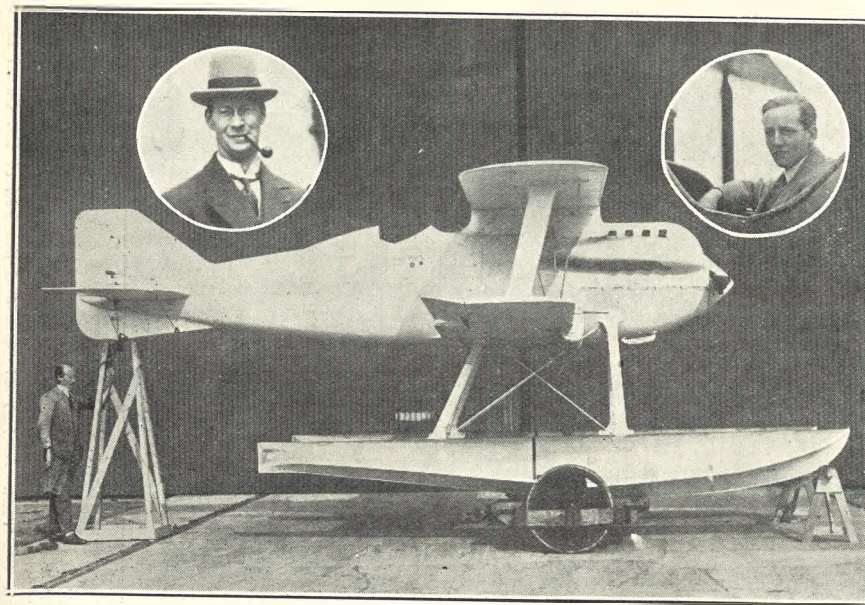

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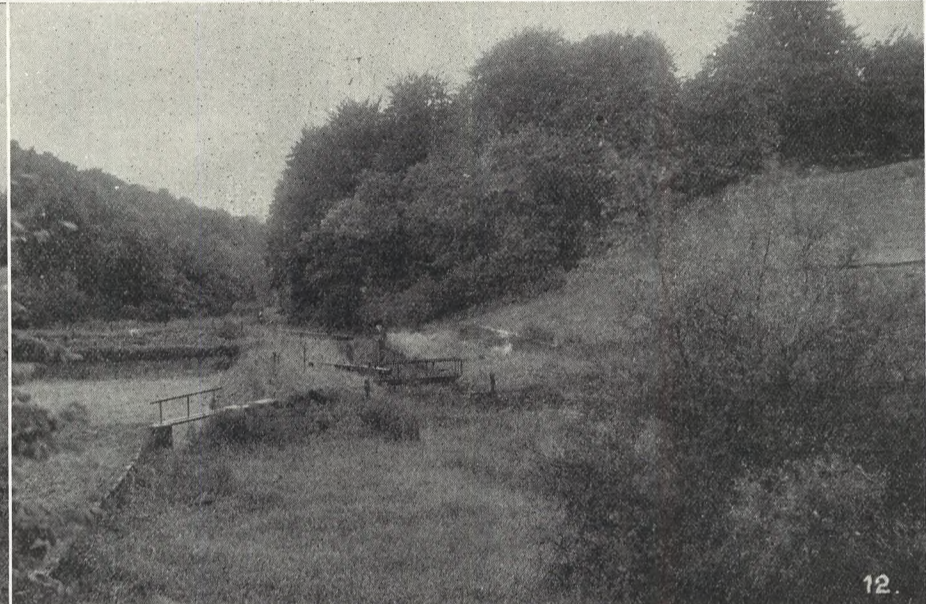

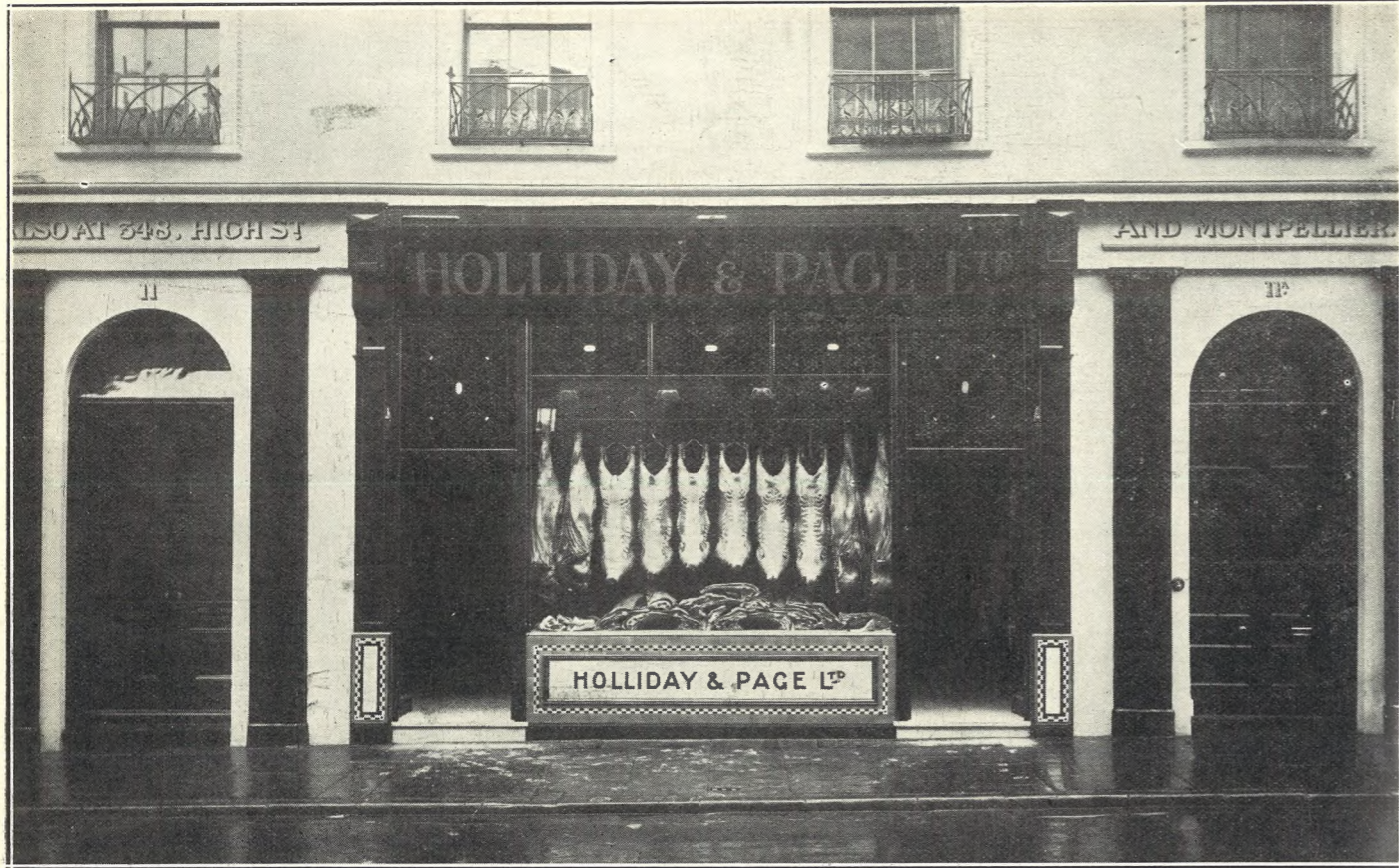


GLOUCESTER v. CARDIFF AT RUGBY FOOTBALL.

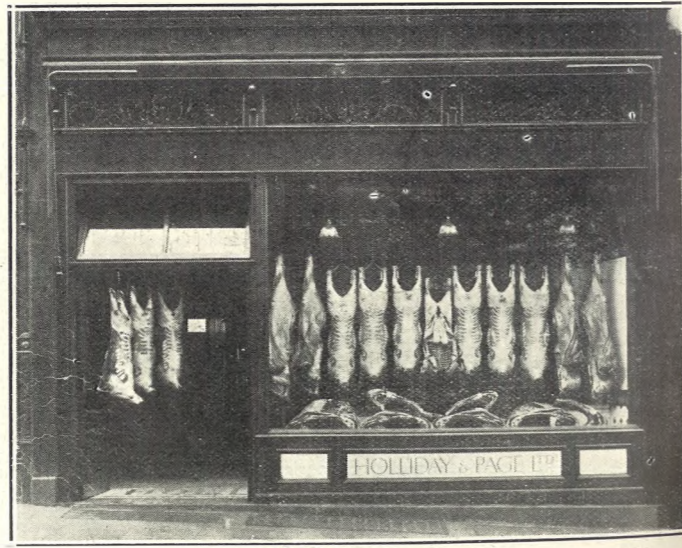

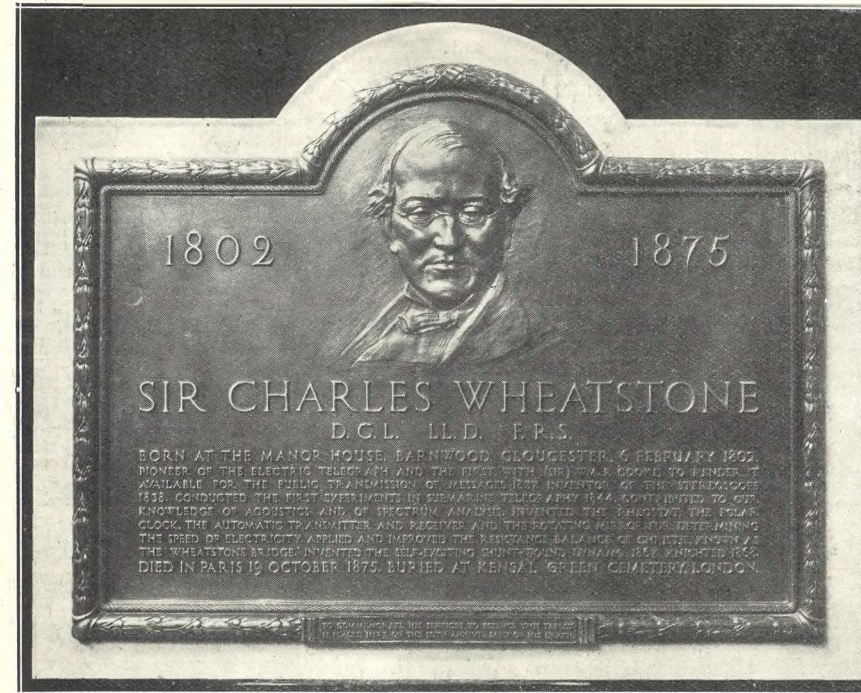

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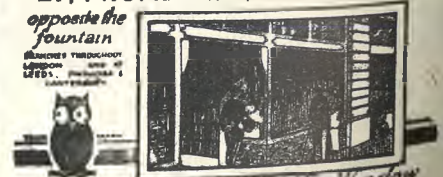
