













Avening is a most picturesquely-situated and large village on the high road from Nailsworth to Tethury, and about two and a half miles from Nailsworth Station. The Church is a very ancient cruciform building, most of it Norman. There is a curious monument to the Hon. Henry Brydgis, son of Lord Chandos of Sudeley, who was buried here in 1615. Avening Court, now the property and home of Mr. F. C. Minoprio, was formerly one of the manor houses of Sion Monastery (1534), mentioned in Cromwell's inventory, and at the Dissolution was exchanged by Henry VIII. with Lord Windsor, for the manor of Stanwell, near Windsor. 2.—Avening Court, front view. 
