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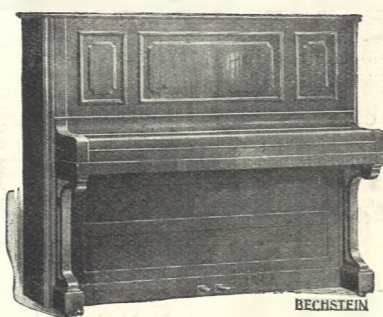

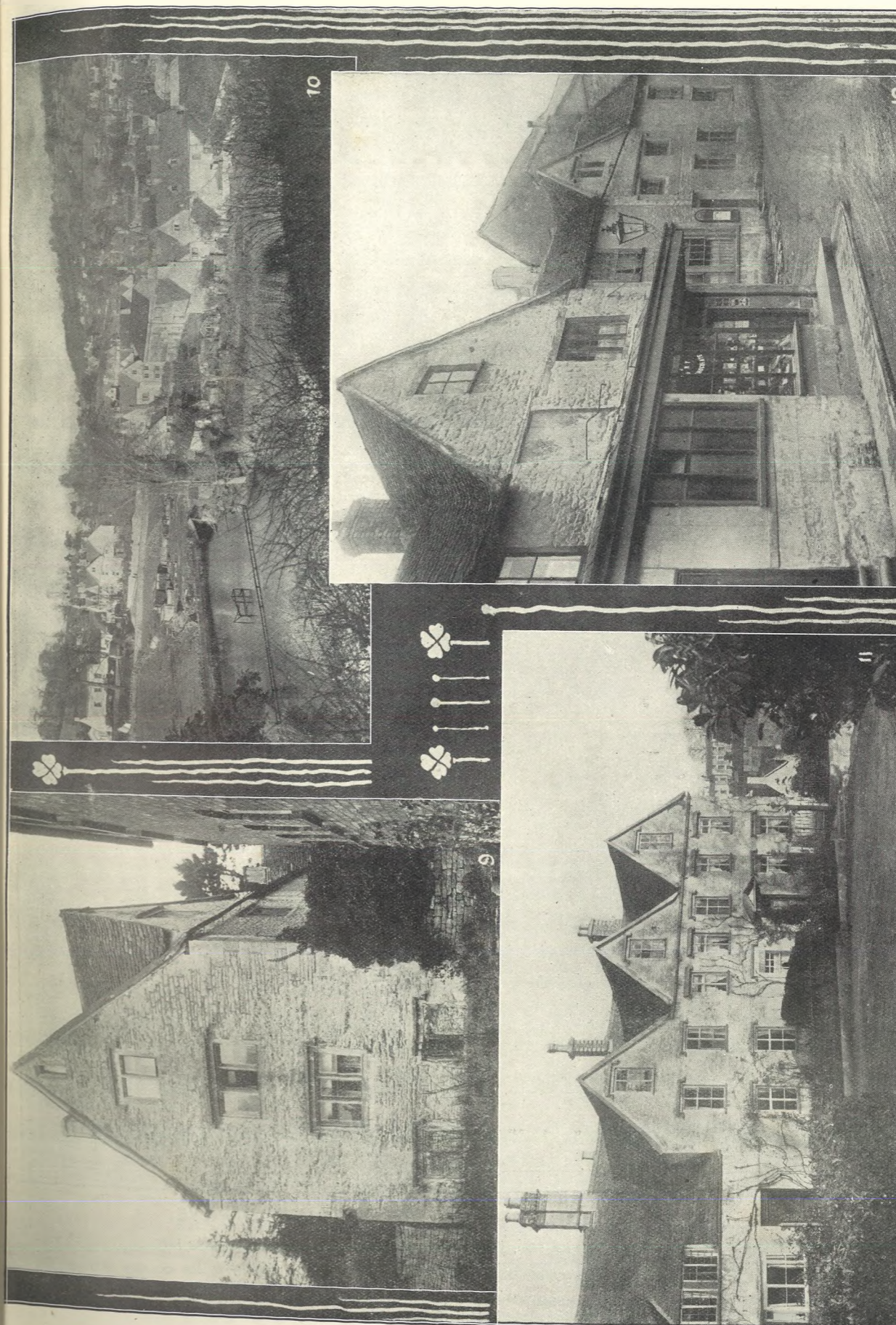

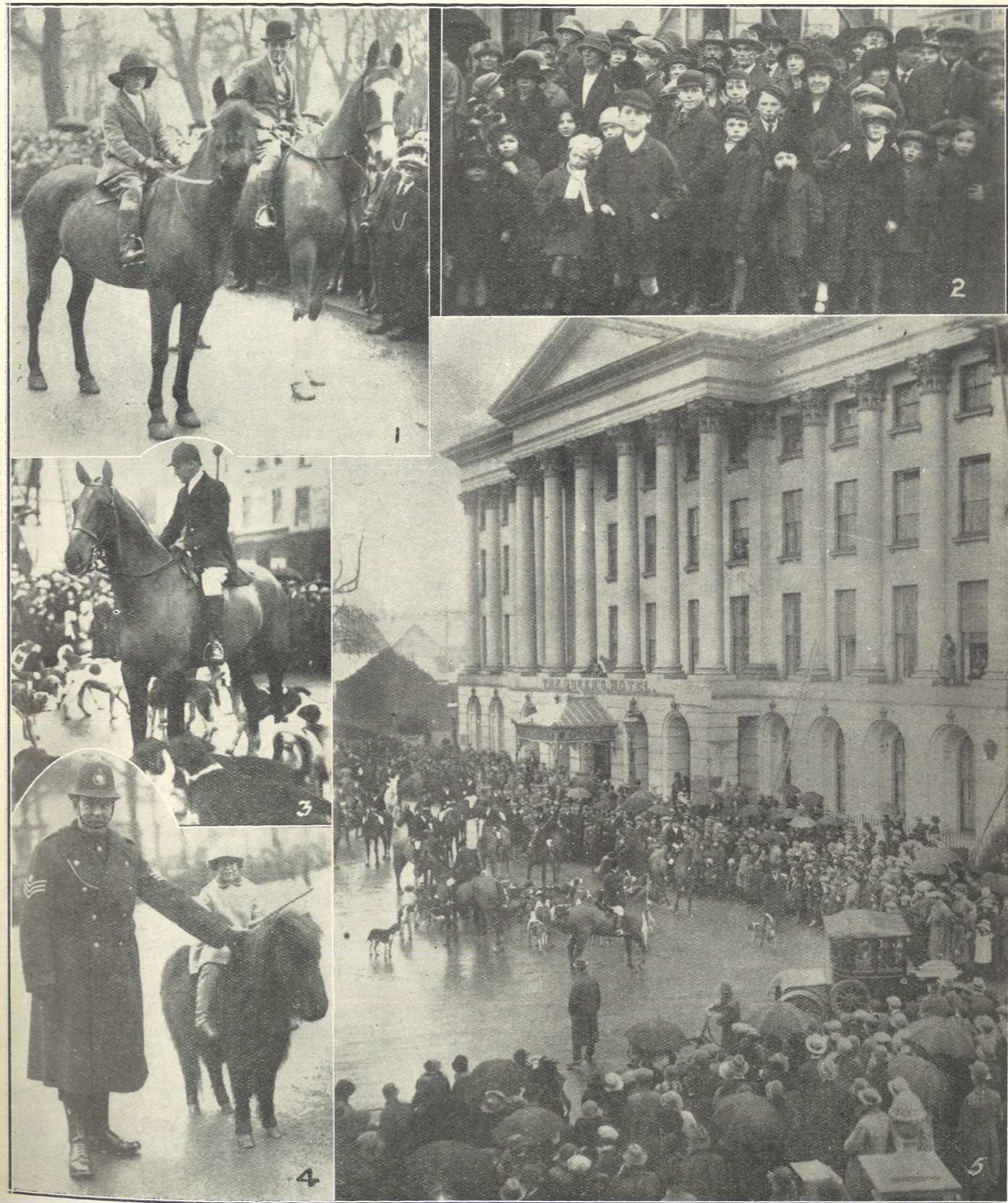

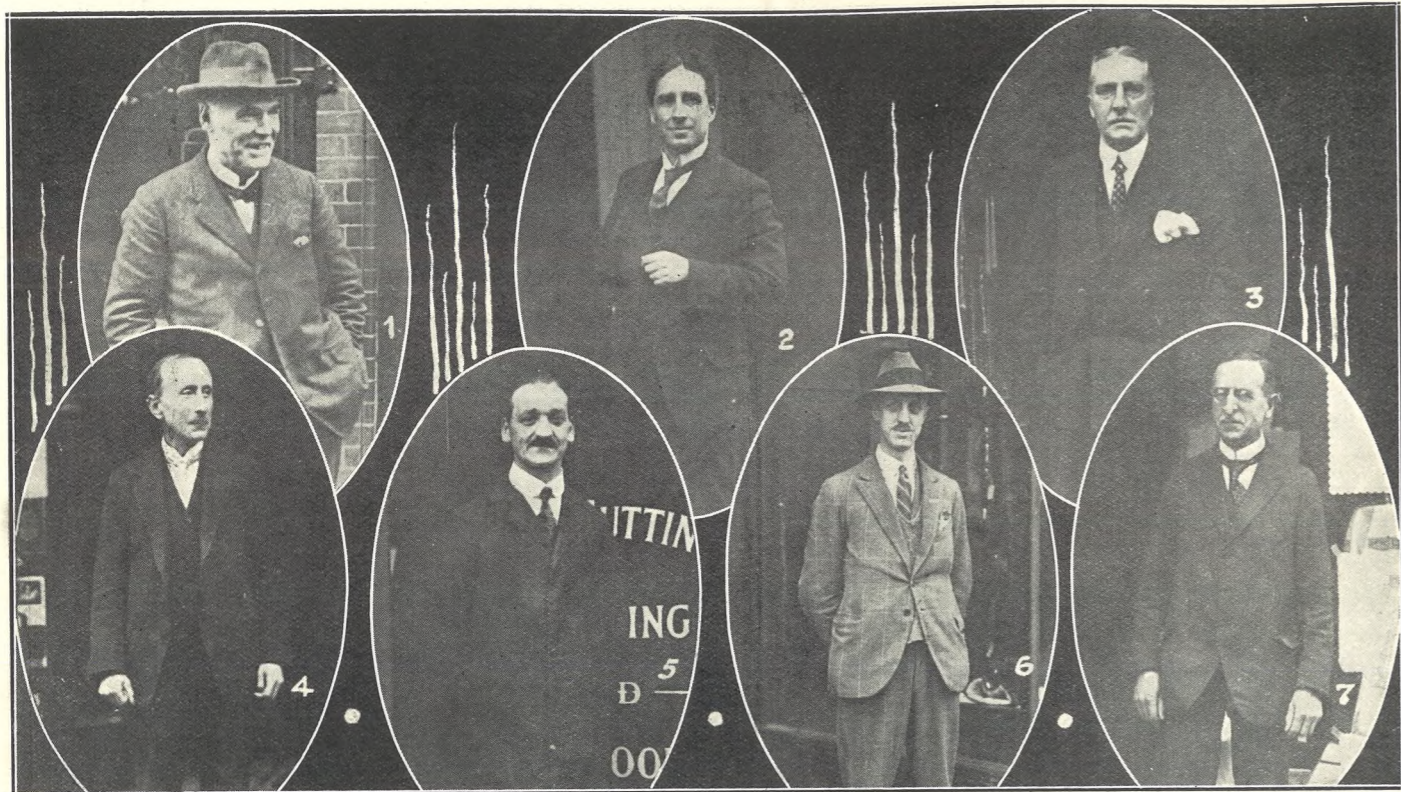

BISHOP BOWERS, OF THETFORD,

Who died suddenly on Wednesday, January 6th, aged 71 years. The Rt. Rev. Dr. John Philips Alcot Bowers, M.A., D.D., was a prominent Mason, being Provincial Grand Master of Norfolk and attended a Masonic function on Tuesday night, retiring to bed apparently in good health, and his death came as a great shock. He will be long and gratefully remembered in the Gloucester Diocese for his work in the City and County, where he was Resident Canon, Archdeacon, and Diocesan Missioner for many years before his appointment to the Bishopric in 1903. He leaves a widow, one son (Mr. Basil A. Bowers, M.A., head of the Junior School, Cheltenham College), and one daughter.

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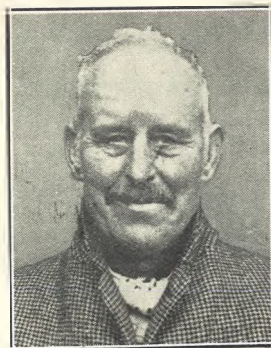


OPENING OF NEW BOY SCOUTS' HUT AT GLOUCESTER.

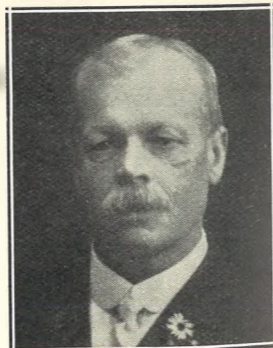


MR THOMAS POCKETT,

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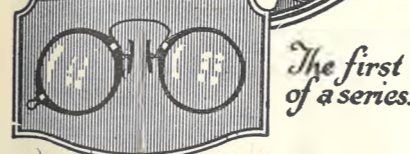

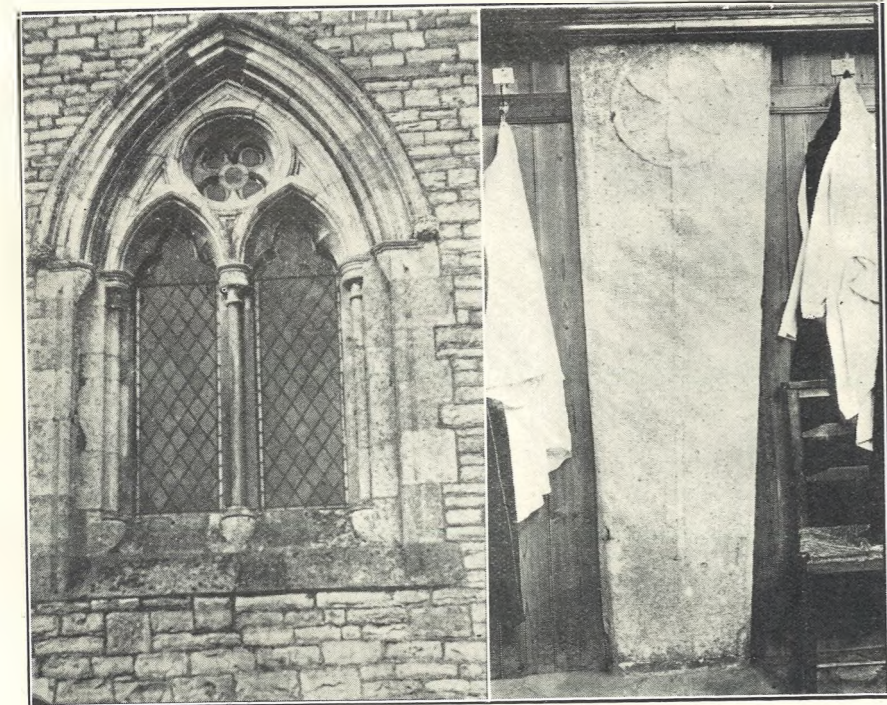

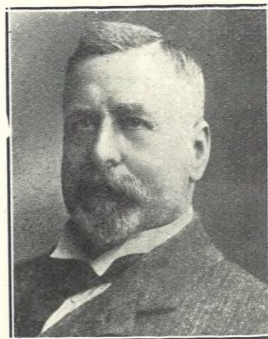

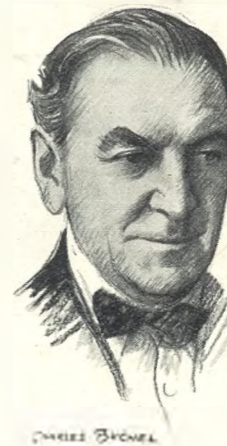

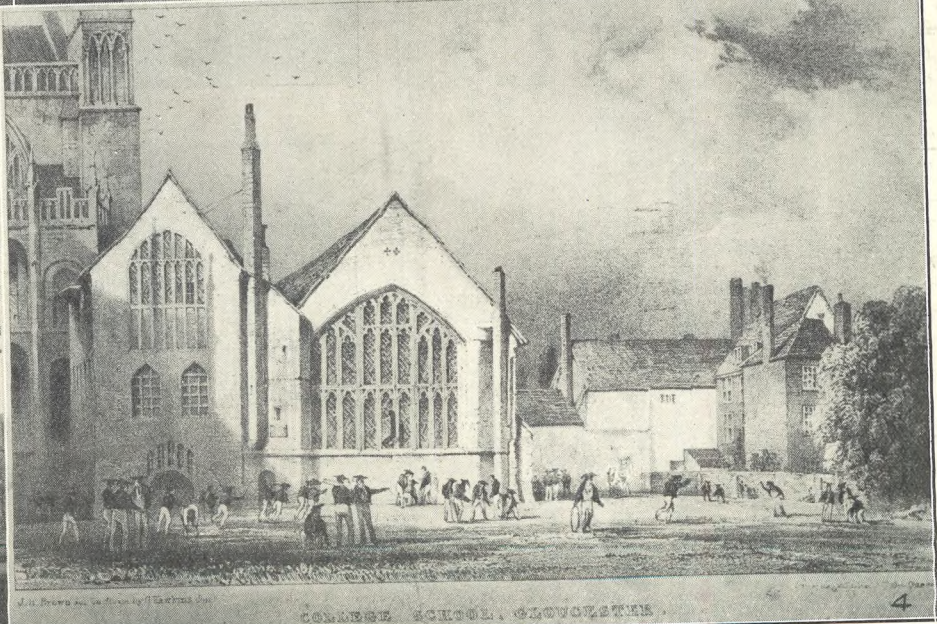
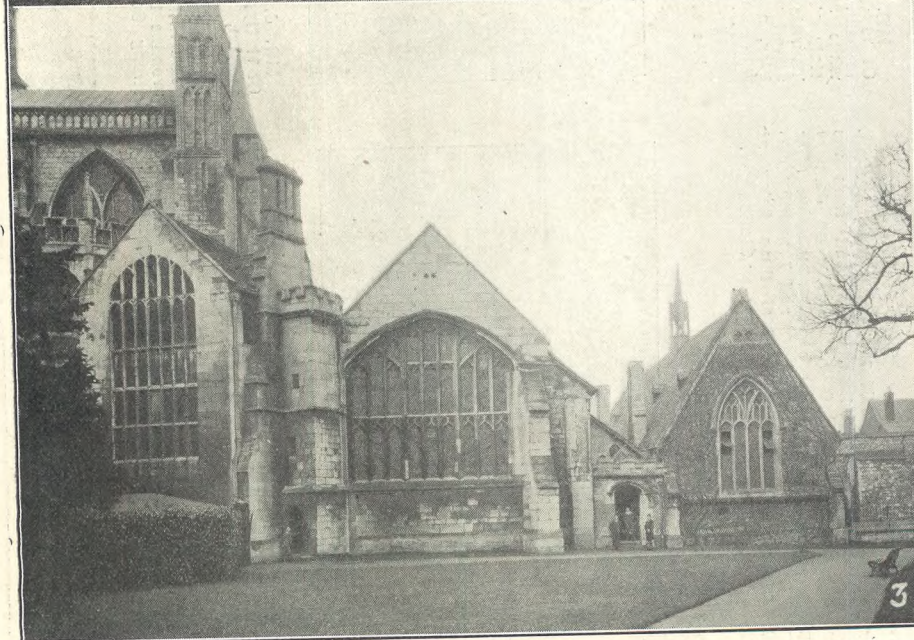

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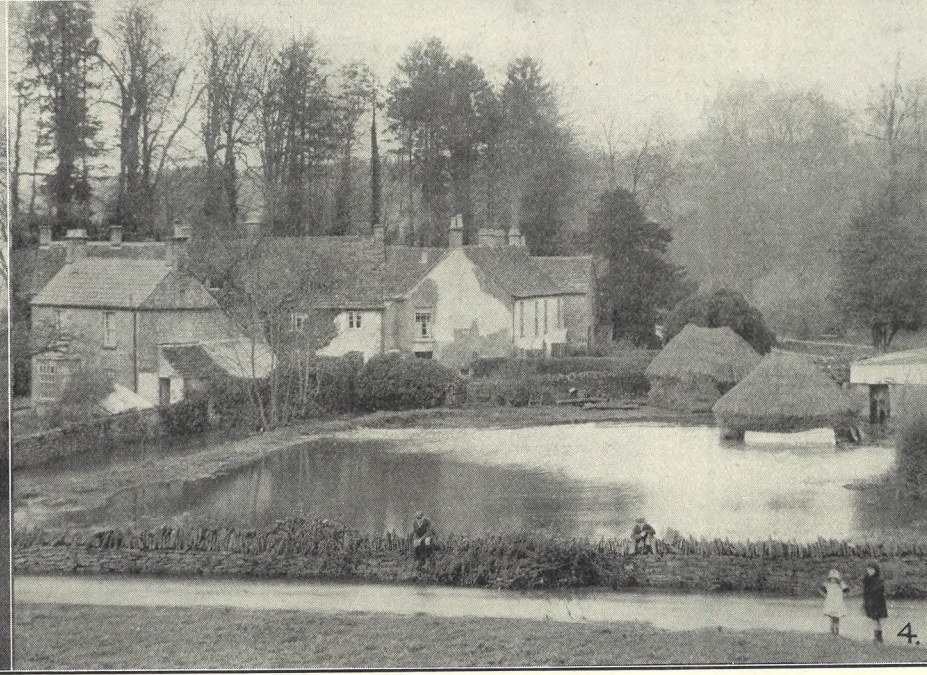
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—AVENING.

Avening is a most picturesquely-situated and large village on the high road from Nailsworth to Tetbury, and about two and a half miles from Nailsworth Station. The Church is a very ancient cruciform building, most of it Norman. There is a curious monument to the Hon. Henry Brydgis, son of Lord Chandos of Sudeley, who was buried here in 1615. Avening Court, now the property and home of Mr. F. C. Minoprio, was formerly one of the manor houses of Sion Monastery (1534), mentioned in Cromwell's inventory, and at the Dissolution was exchanged by Henry VIII. with Lord Windsor, for the manor of Stanwell, near Windsor.

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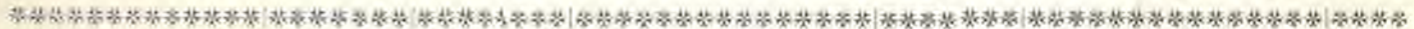

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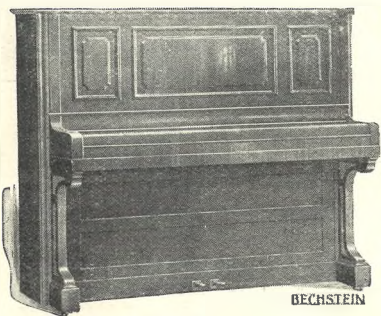
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
