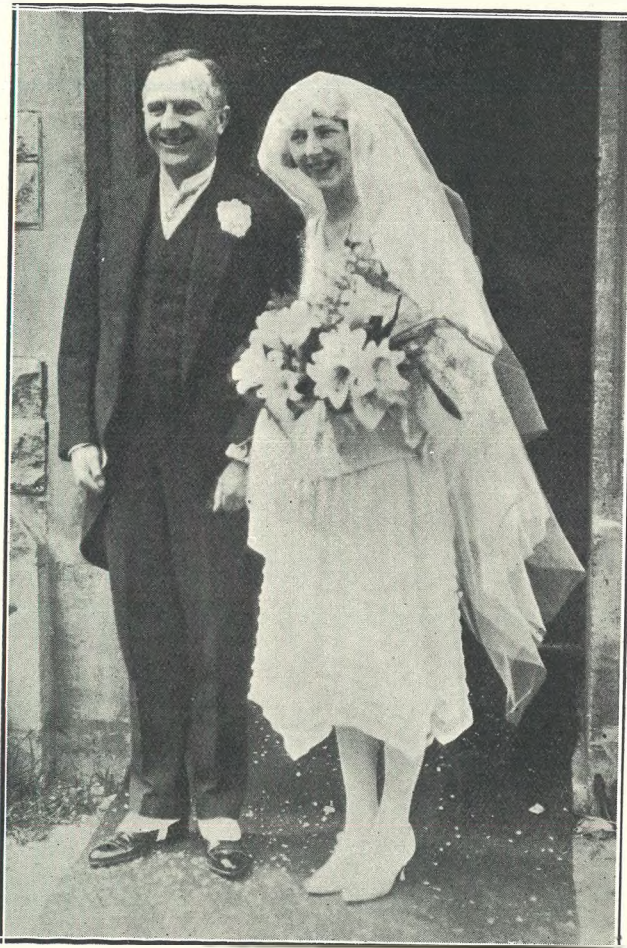

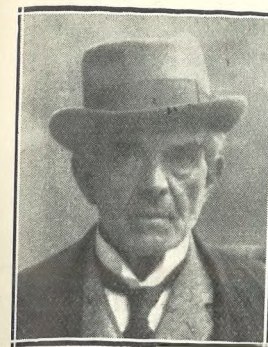


CHELTENHAM FLORAL FETE.

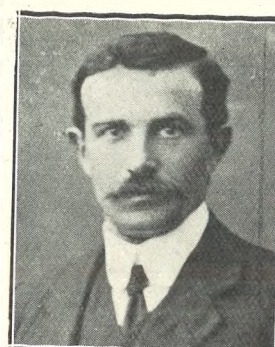

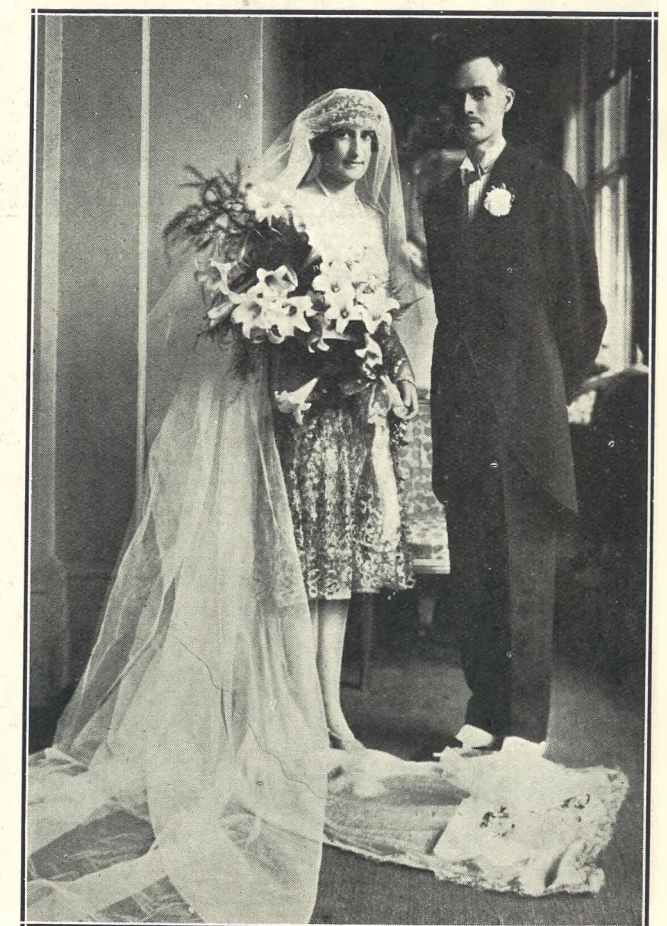

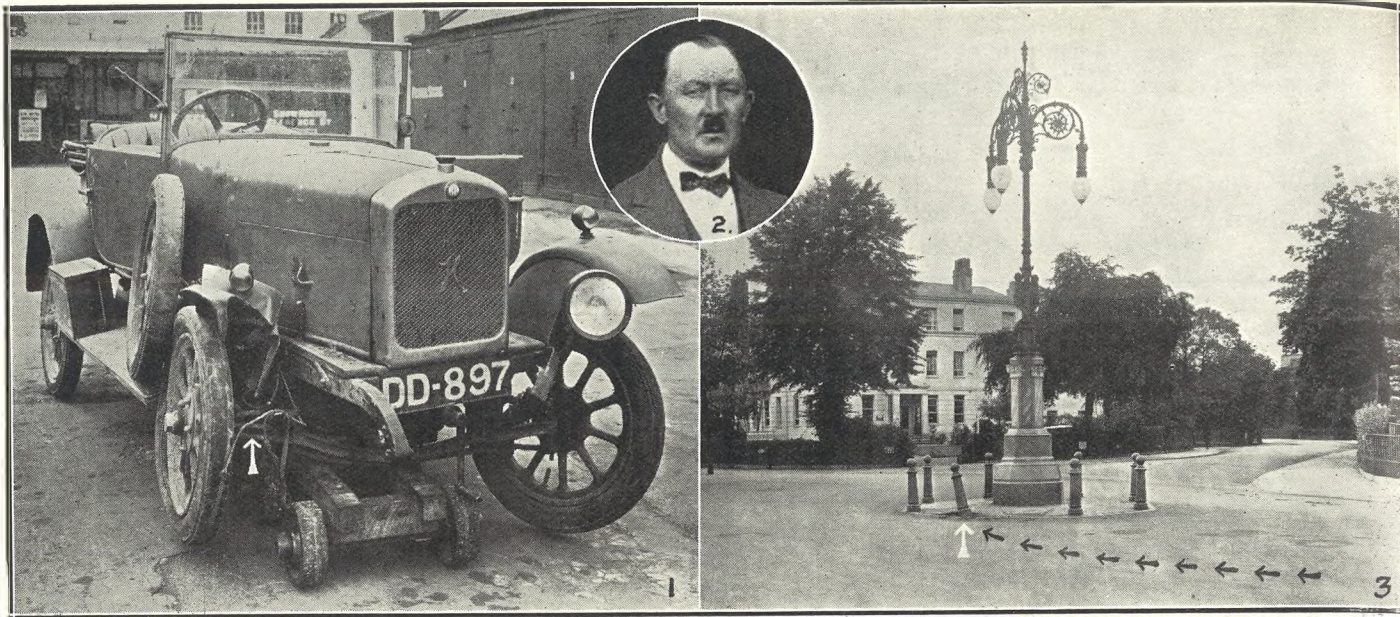

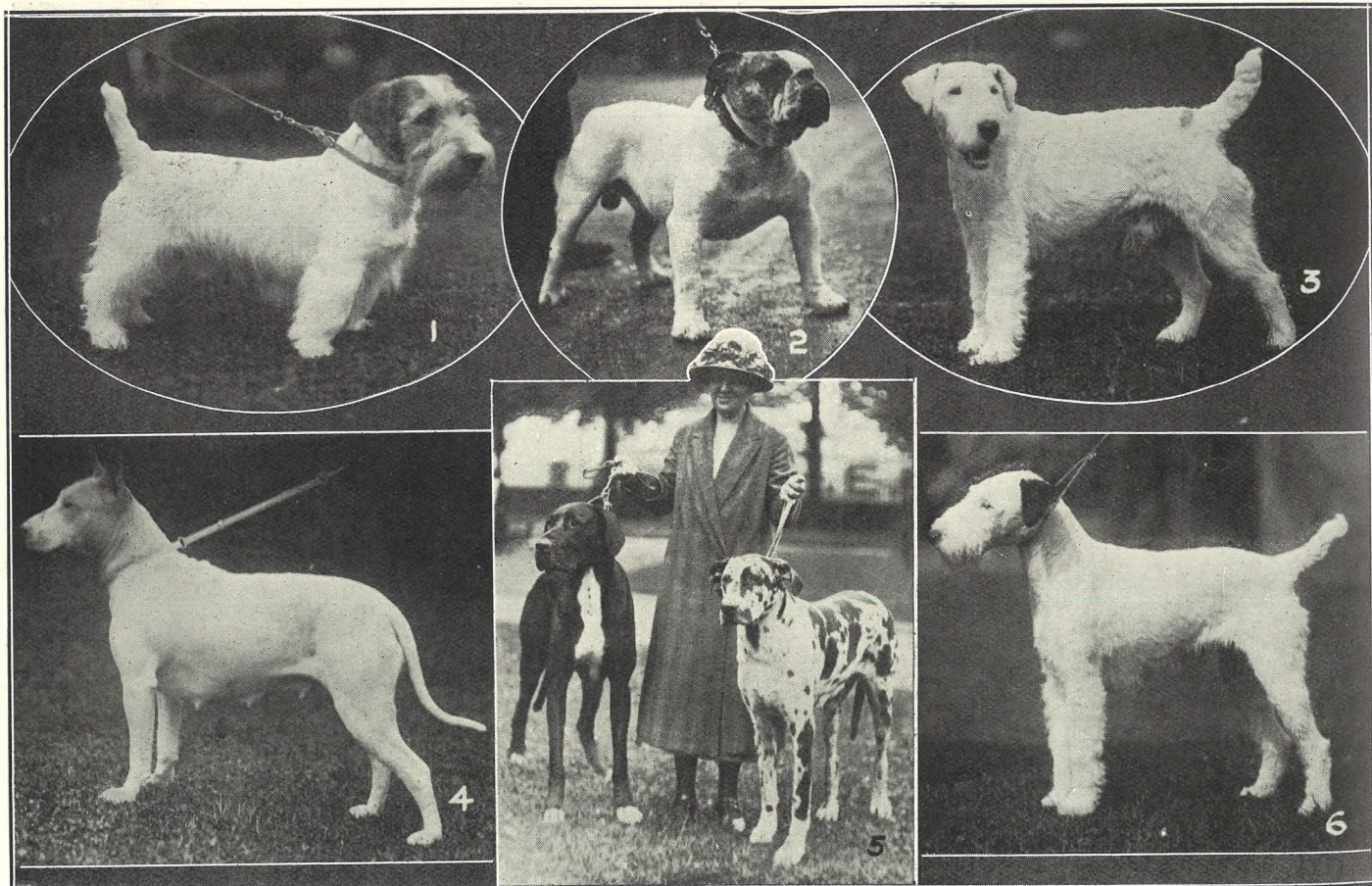


MOTORIST KILLED IN CHELTENHAM.

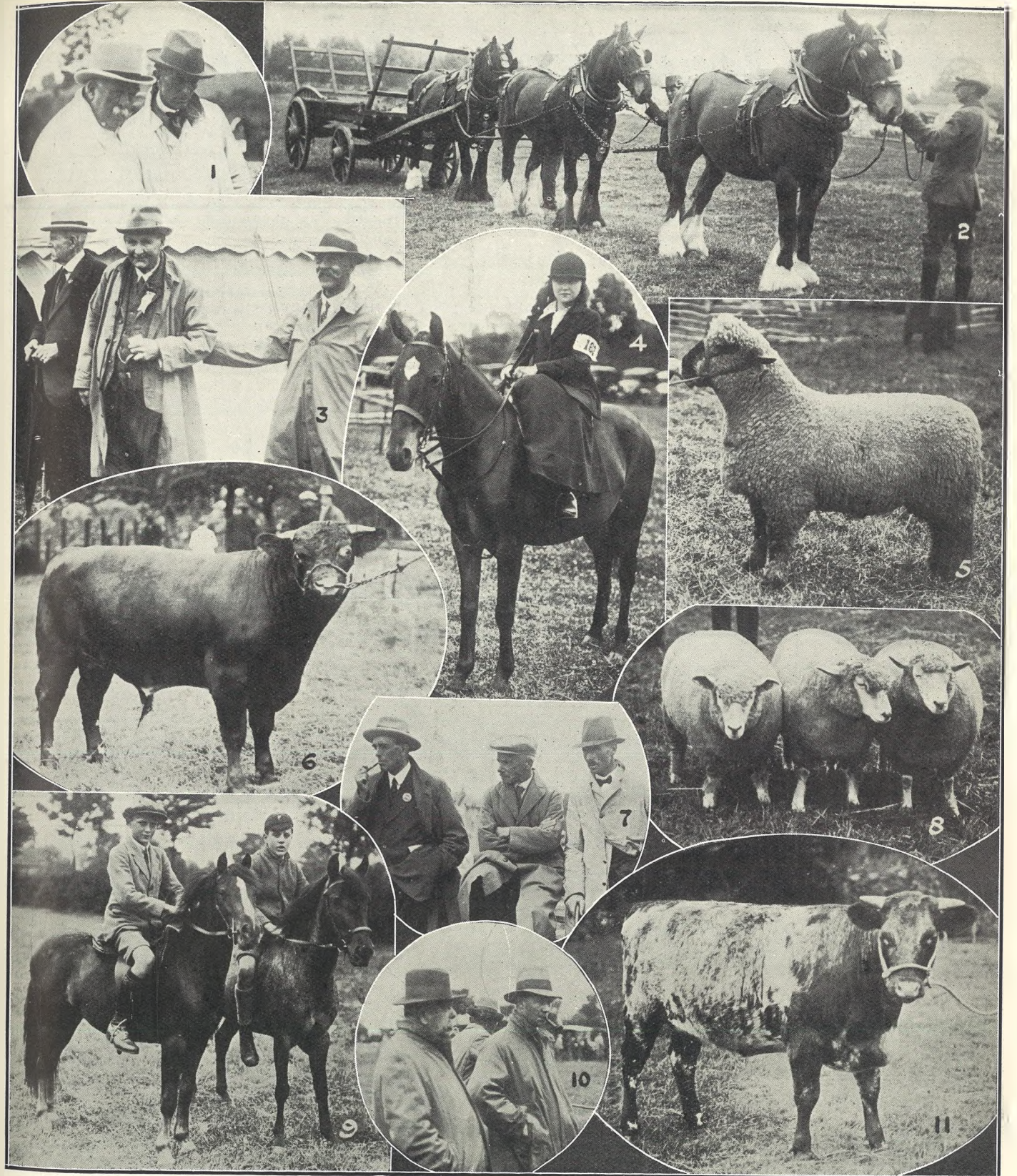

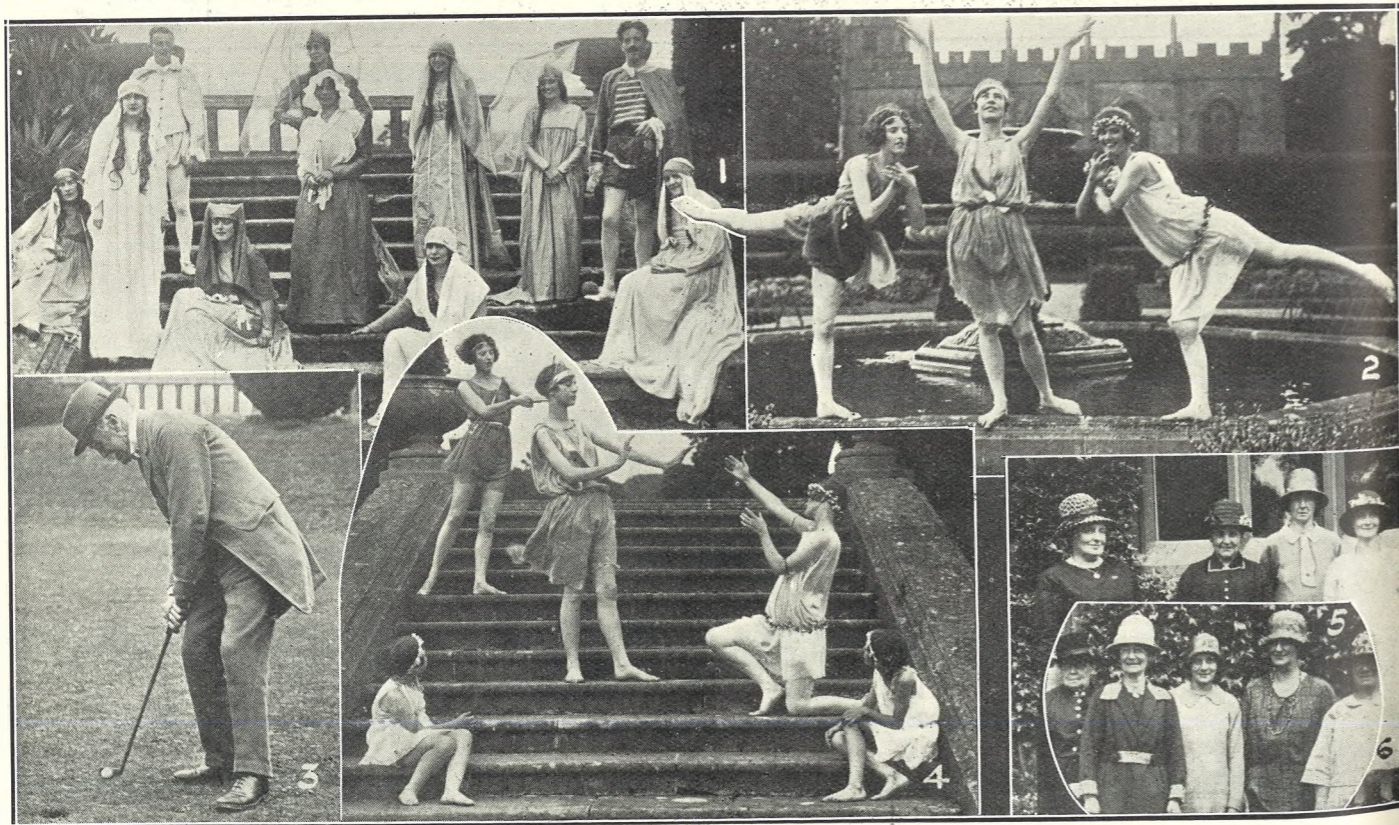
