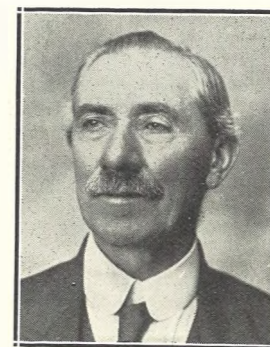

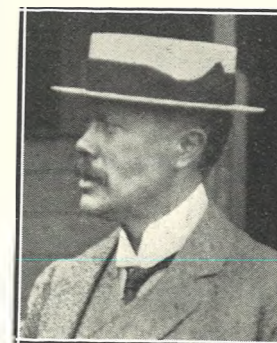
MR. PERCY HUTCHISON,

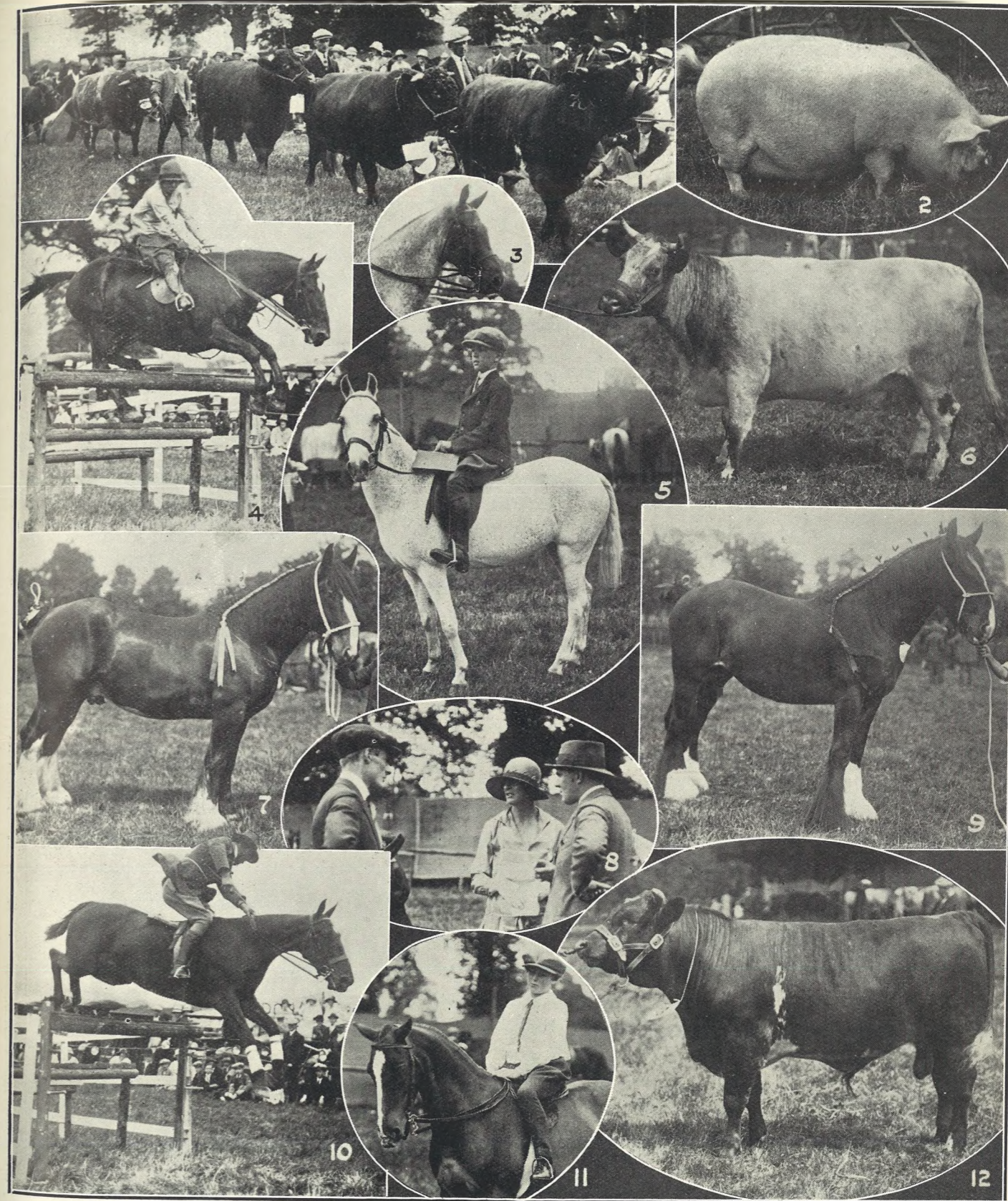

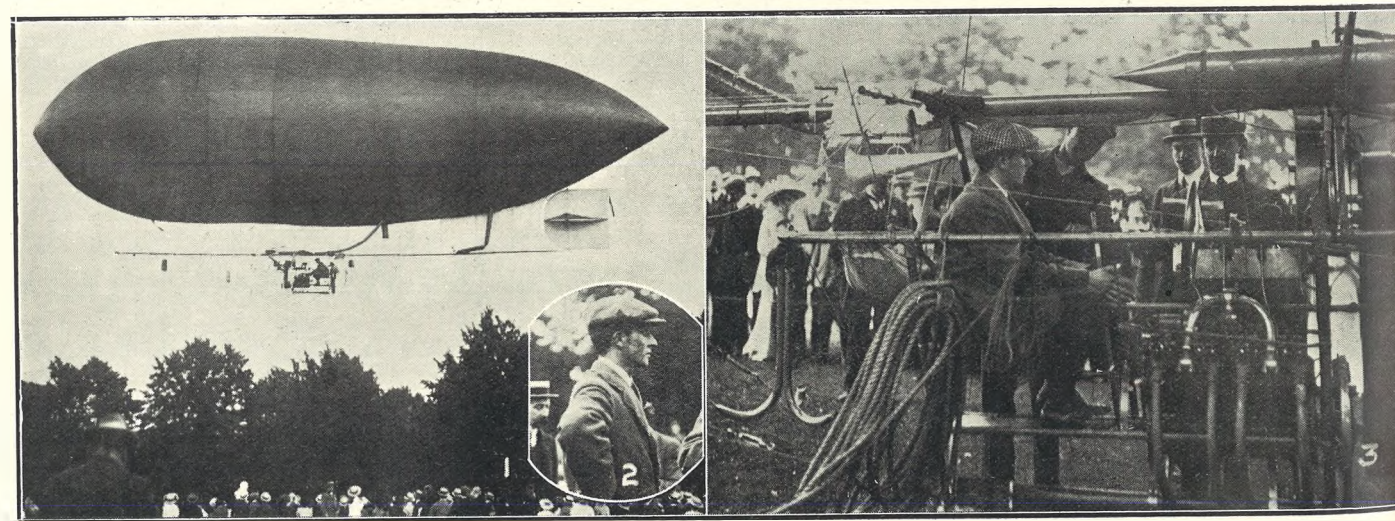

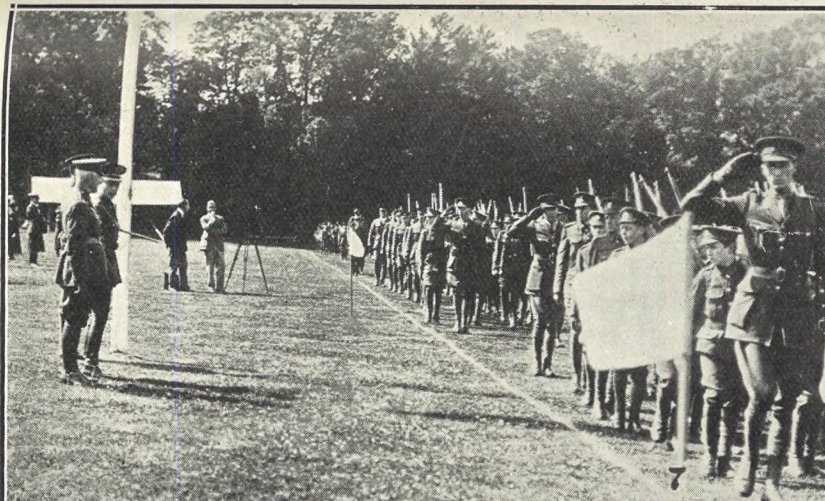

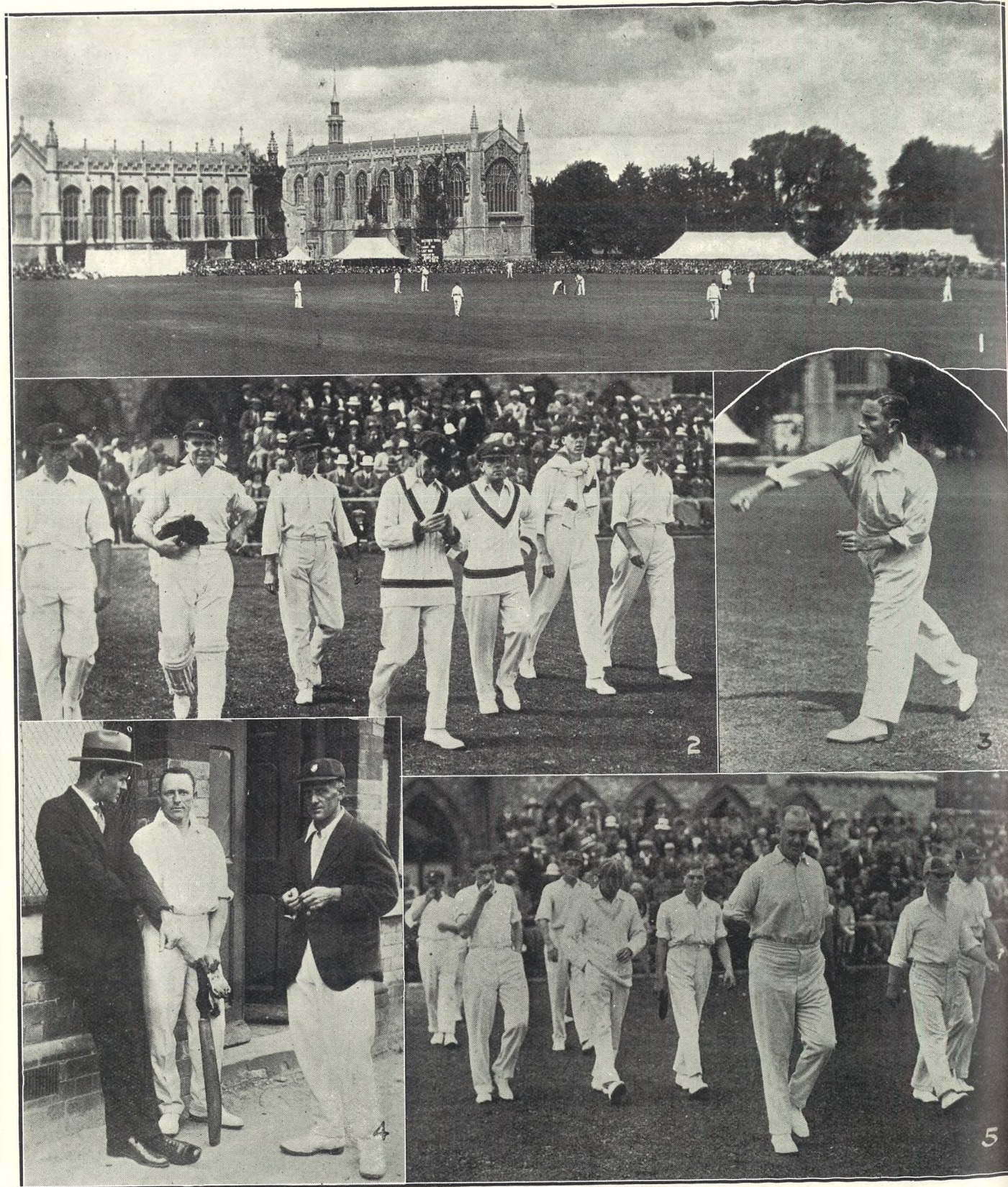

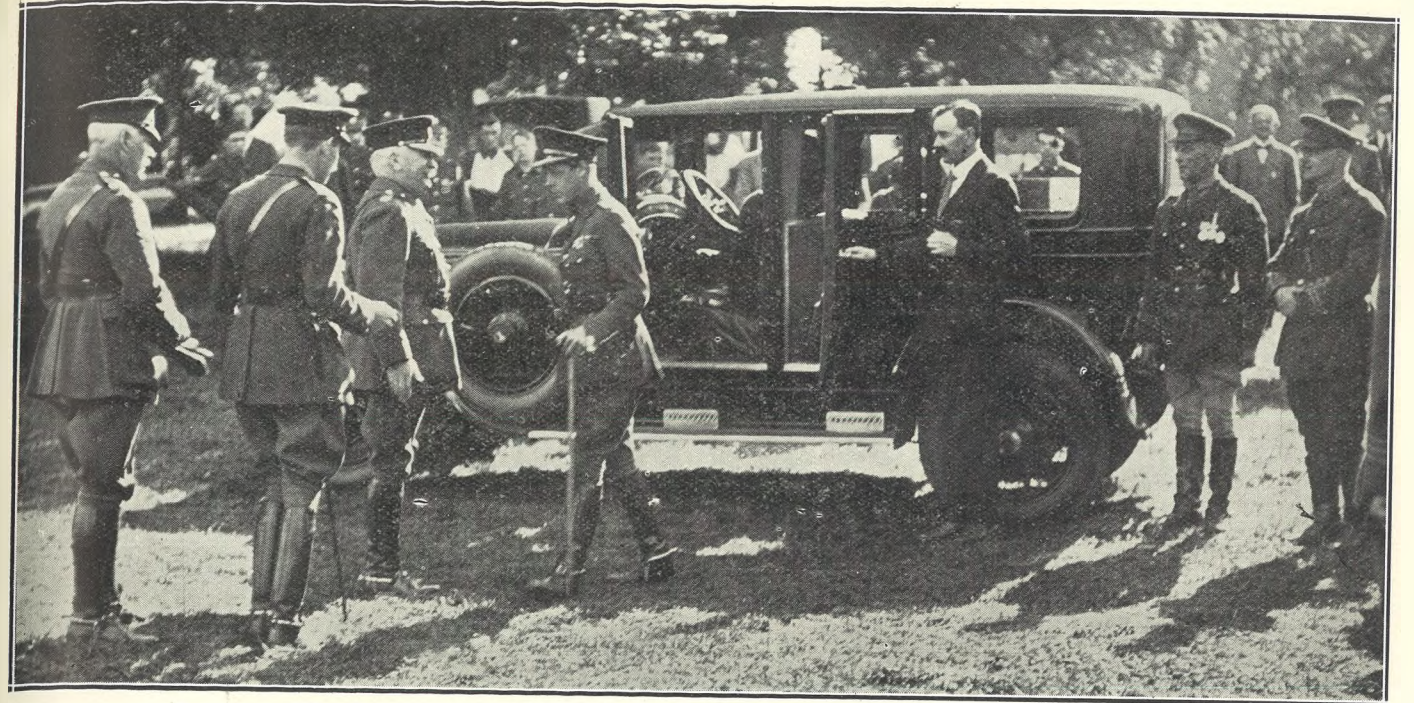


THE AUSTRALIAN CRICKET TEAM IN CHELTENHAM.

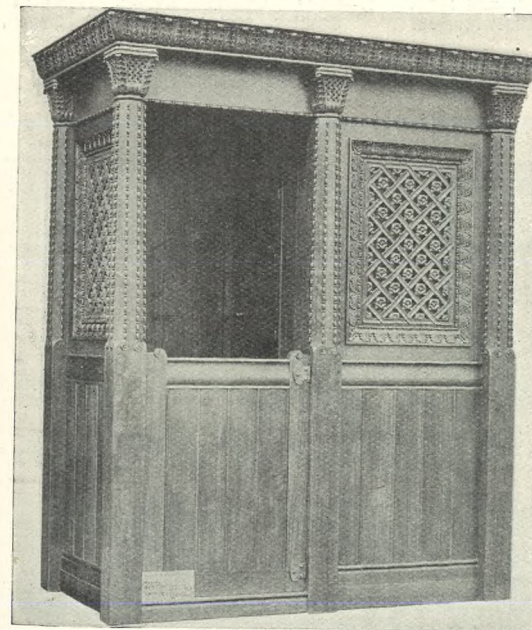


THE PRINCE'S FAREWELL.

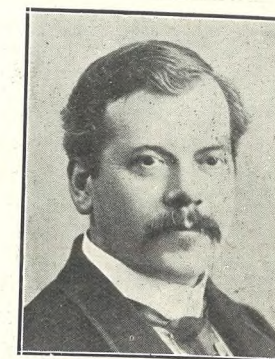

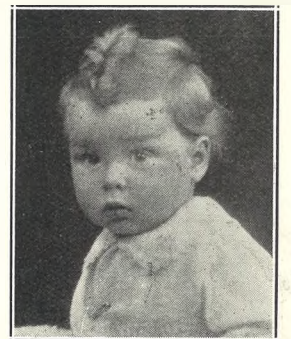

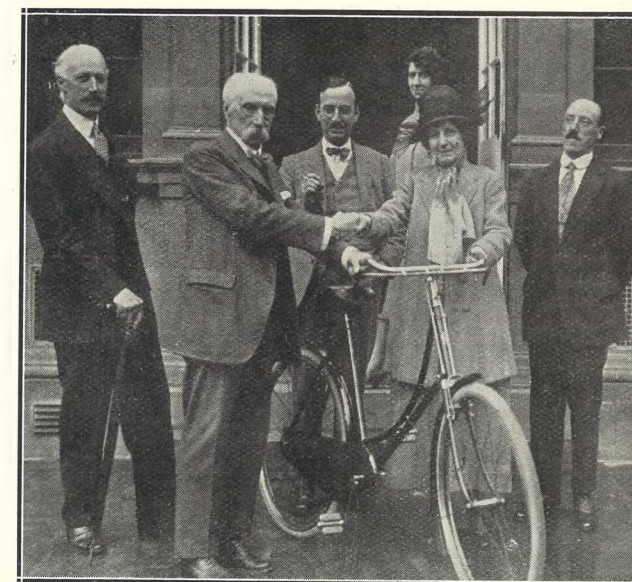

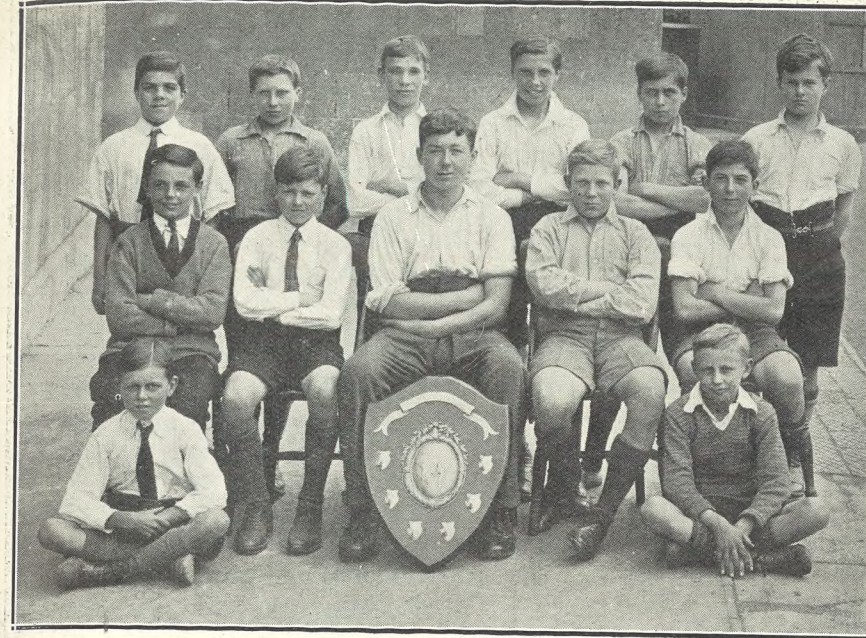

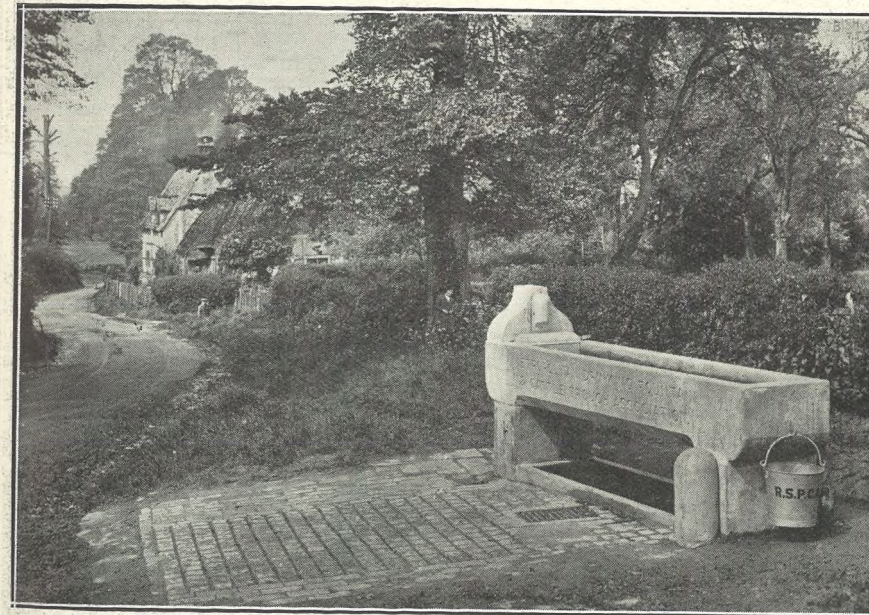

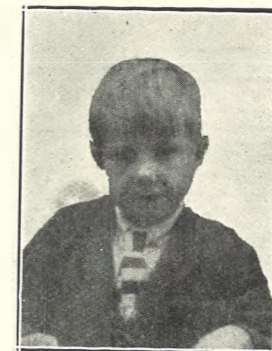
MR. FRANK IDIENS,

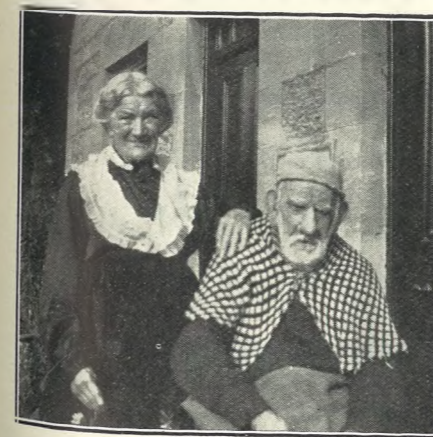
LIEUT.-COM. W. H. BARHAM, R.N.R., F.R.G.S.

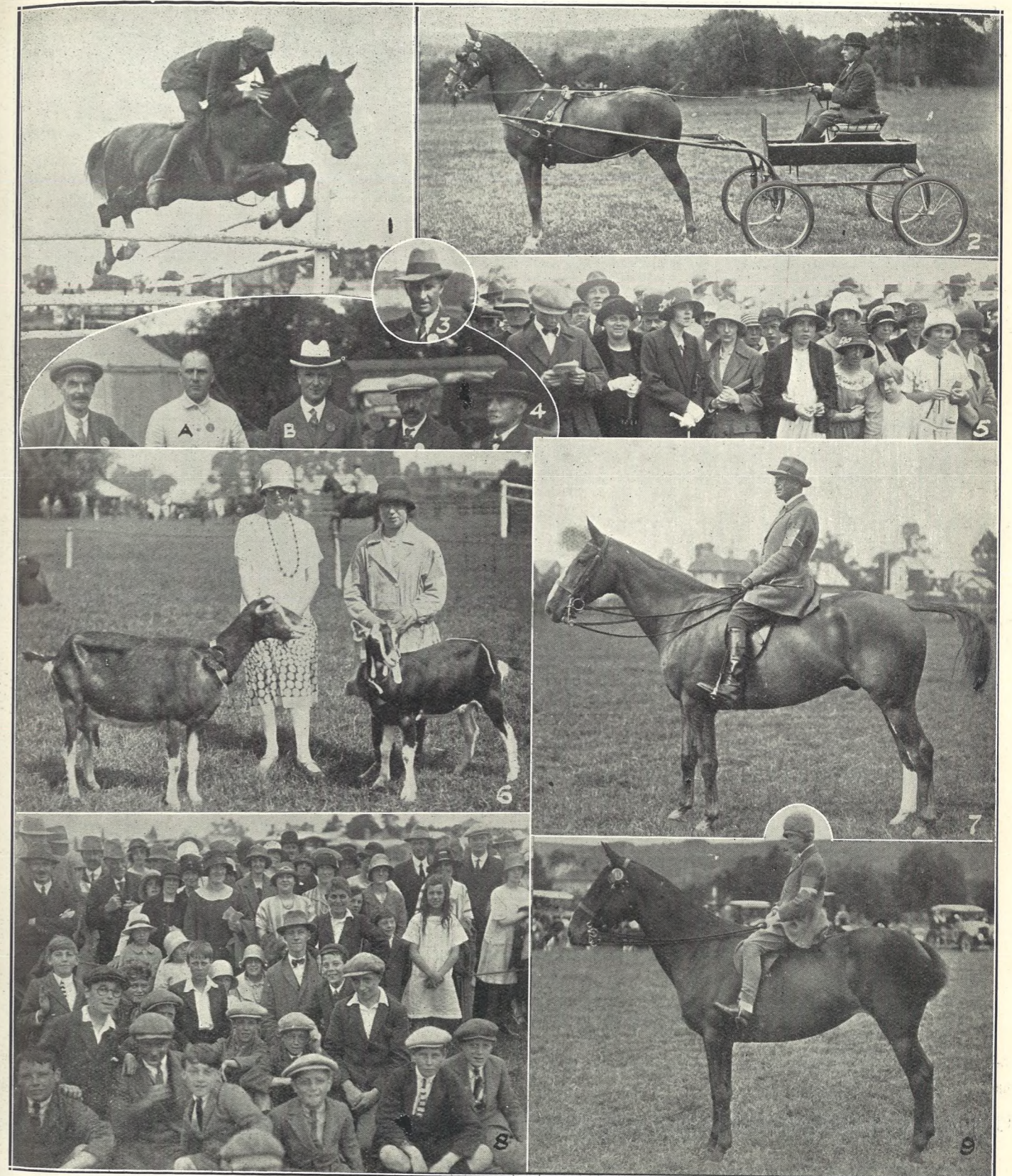
