Nursing Home on Monday last, Sept. 27th, aged 28 years. He
was a famous airman, having some wonderful foreign flights to his
credit immediately after the war, and he sprang into fame when in
1922 he won the Aerial Derby Handicap on a Bristol monoplane.
Joining the Gloucestershire Aircraft Company (Cheltenham) as pilot
in experimental and research work, he won the Aerial Derby in
1923 on "Gloster I." He had a bad crash on a secret Government
machine in June, 1925, and never flew again, not properly recovering
from his injuries.

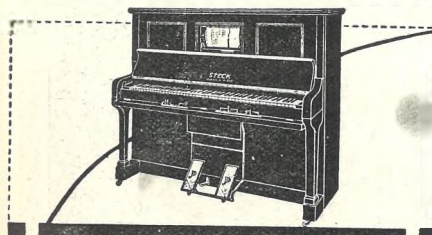
MR. EDWIN ILES,

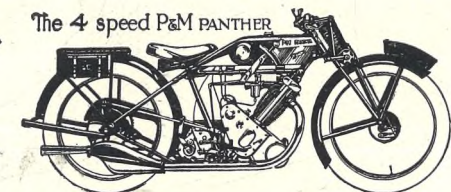

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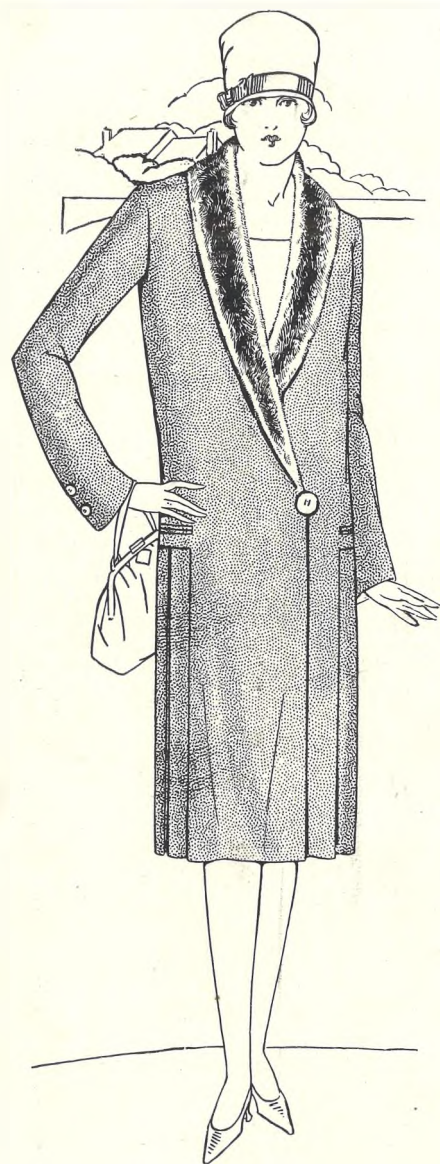
GLOUCESTER BARTON FAIR.

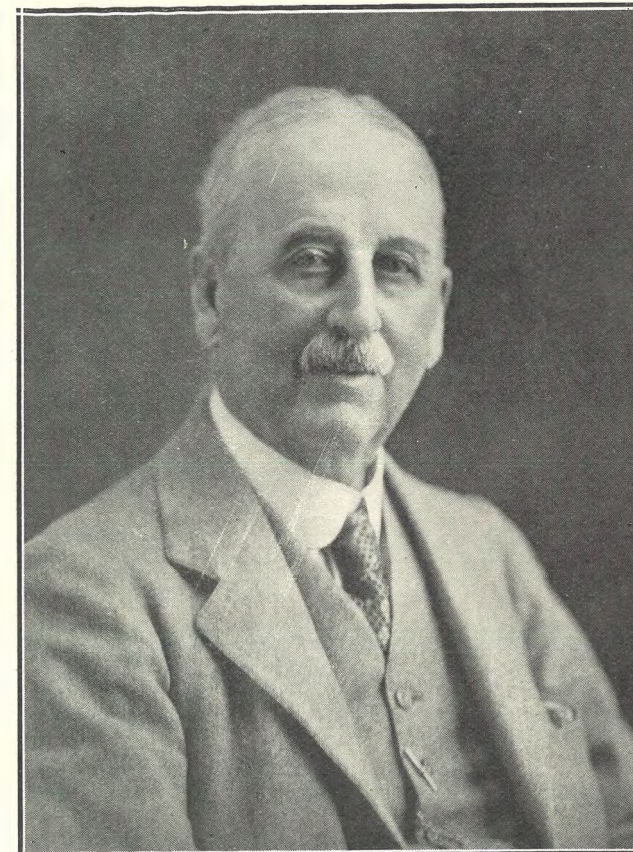

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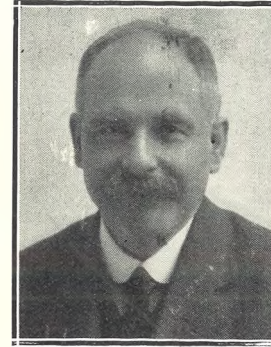


FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. JOHN NEWTH, AT TWIGWORTH.

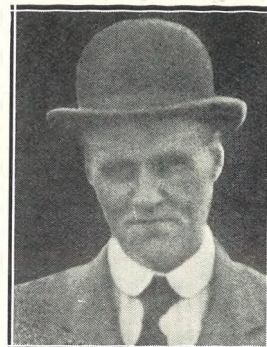

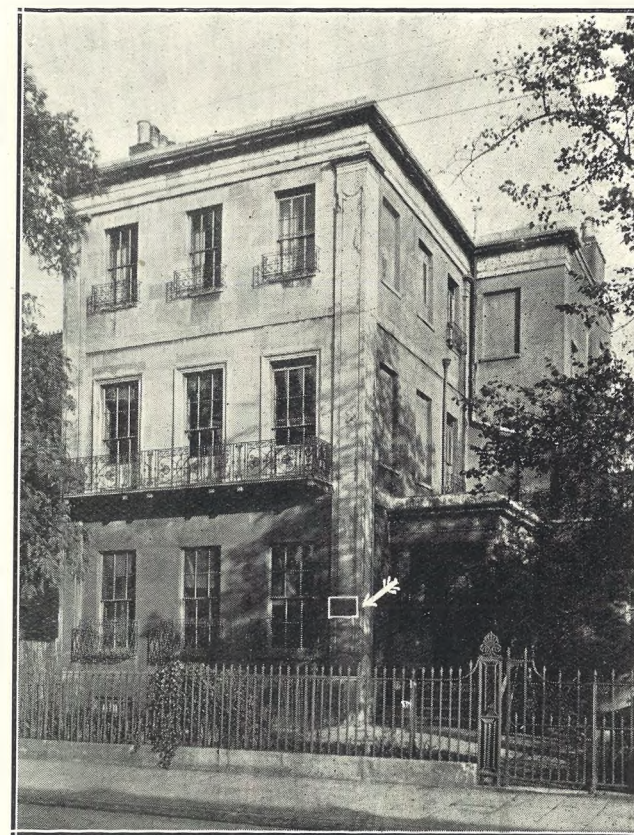
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Tennyson's Home in Cheltenham.

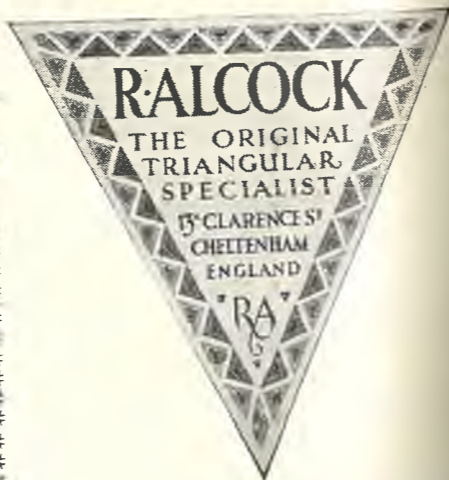

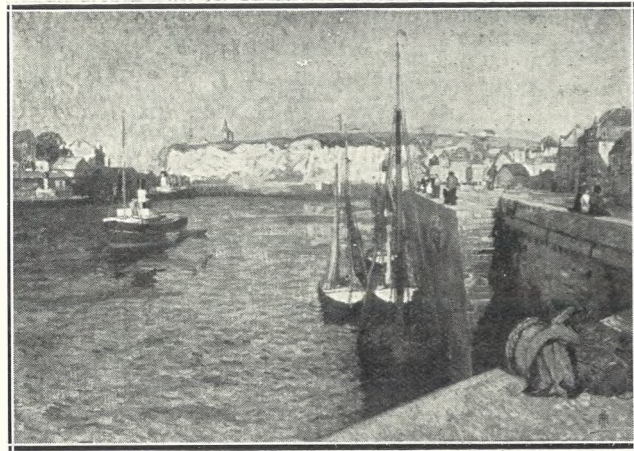

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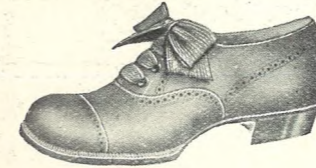
ROTARIANS' HANDSOME CHEQUES FOR CHELTENHAM INSTITUTIONS.

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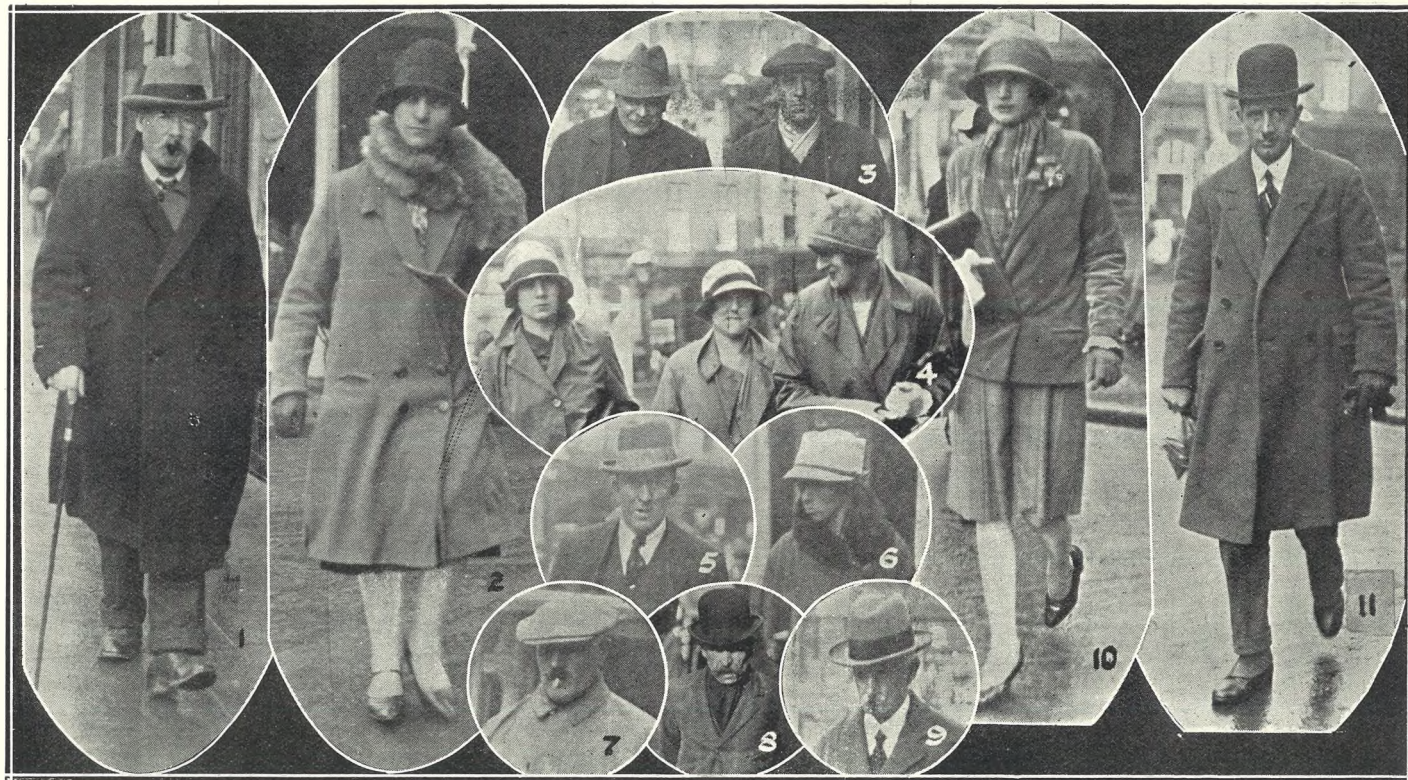


INTER-COLLEGE FOOTBALL MATCH IN CHELTENHAM.
