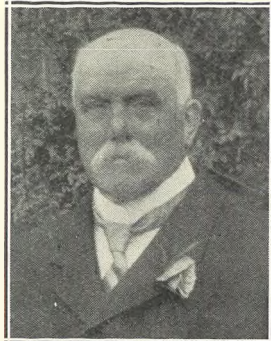

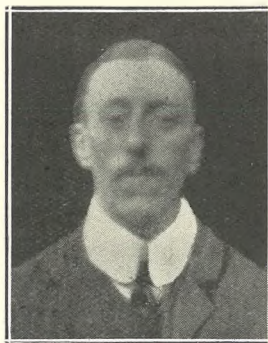


MR. HENRY ERNEST WODEHOUSE, C.M.G., AND MRS. WODEHOUSE,

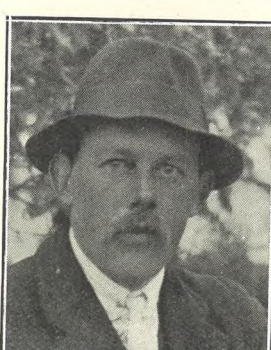
MRS. E. M. BOWLES,

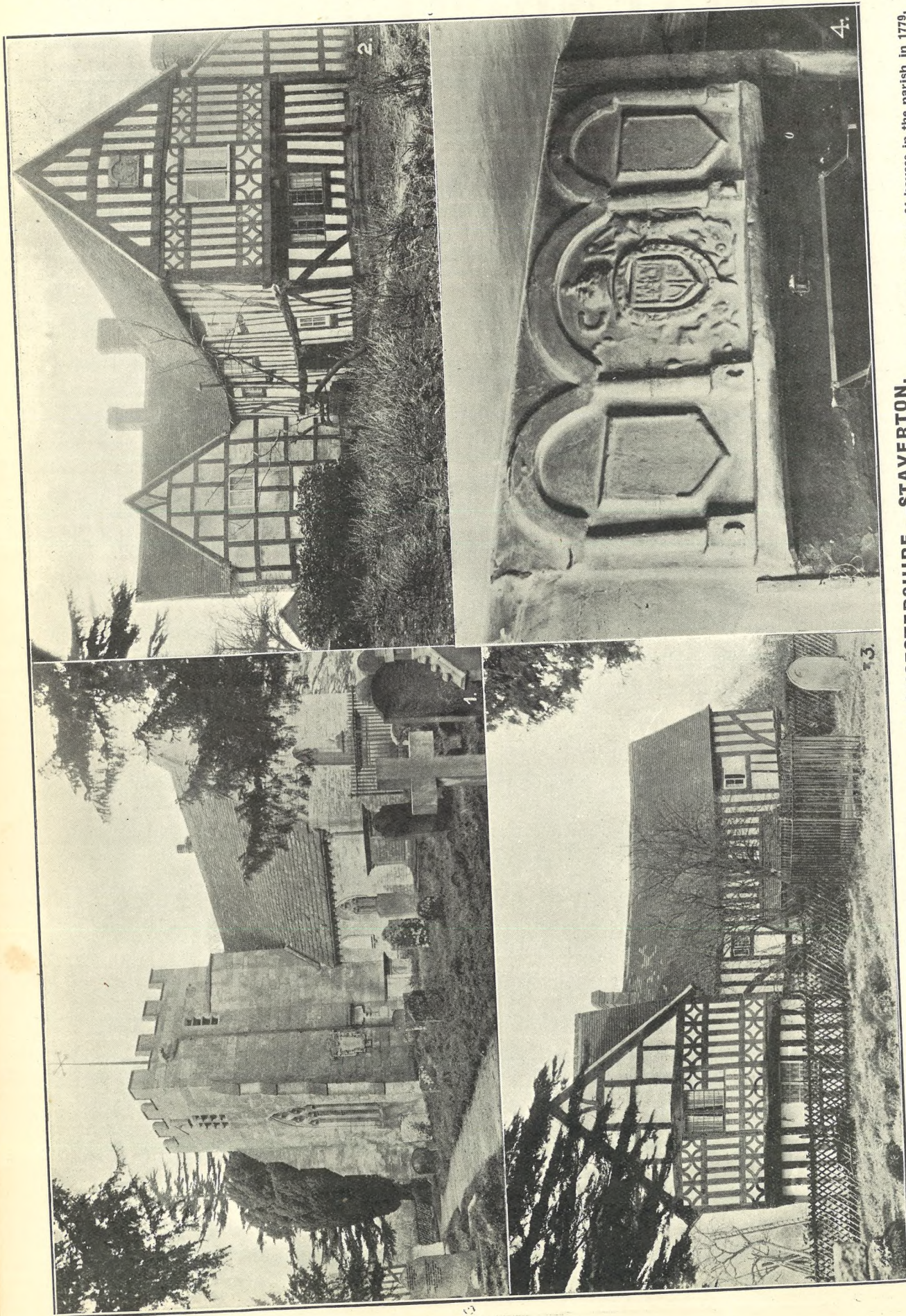

Staverton is a small village about four miles west of Cheltenham, and lies on the side of the main Cheltenham to Gloucester Road. The only interesting and ancient house is The Manor, illustrated above, and is owned by Mr. Gilbert McIlquham. The house was worse for wear, but the "C.R." (Carolus Rex) stands out boldly. The house was probably built about 1600. It is very much in the old Manor House. Photos. Copies 1s. 9d. each, post 2d. extra.

1.—Staverton Church, built of stone in Early English style, with low embattled tower; was much restored in 1897. The register dates from 1538.

2.—The ancient Manor House, of which little appears to be known, is a very picturesque half-timbered house adjoining the churchyard, and now used as cottages.

3.—The church is a very ancient one, originally dedicated to St. John the Baptist, but later to St. Catherine.

4.—The Royal Coat of Arms of King Charles Rex) stands out boldly. The house was probably built about 1600. It is very much in the old Manor House. Photos. Copies 1s. 9d. each, post 2d. extra.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—TURKDEAN.

Turkdean is a most picturesque village both in situation and environment, about three miles north from Northleach, on the Roman Fosse Way. There are some fine old houses in the village, the principal being the Manor House, belonging to Mr. William A. Rixon, J.P., C.A., who is Lord of Upper and Lower Turkdean Manor, and is well-known in Cheltenham as a most capable and prolific artist of no mean calibre. Lower Turkdean at one time belonged to the Priory of Llanthony, Gloucester, until the Dissolution, and later was for many years in possession of the Coxwell family. Rudder says in 1779 that there were 25 families, and exactly 113 inhabitants.

- 2.—The entrance to Turkdean Manor. The present house was built by the Bannister family, and over an upstairs doorway is cut in quaint letters "W. Bannyster, Anno, 1588." It was still in the possession of that family in Sir Robert Atkyns's time (1700).

- 4.—A Norman Window or Doorway left in the exterior of the Chancel of Turkdean Church.

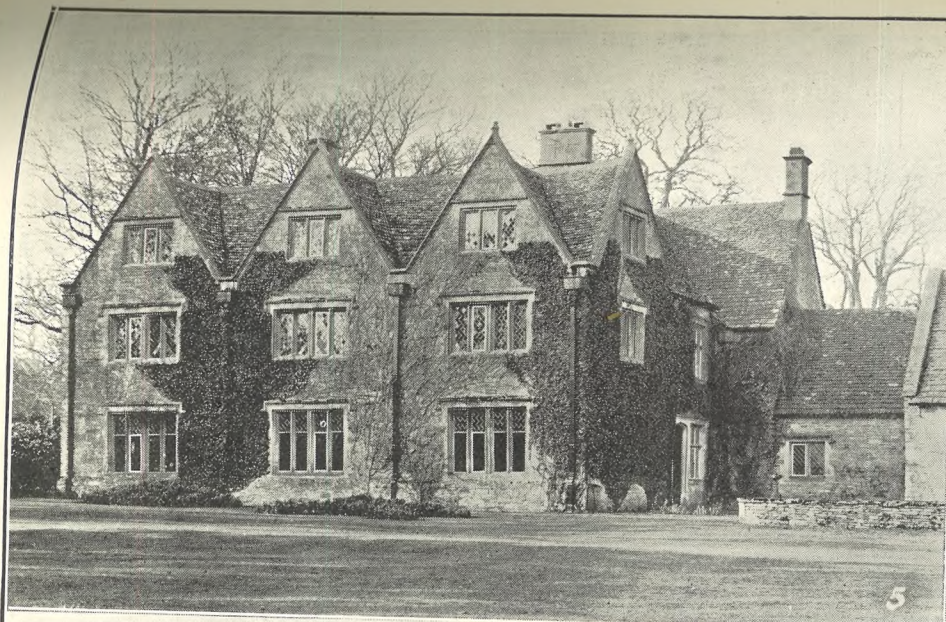


ROUND THE TOWN IN CHELTENHAM.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—TURKDEAN.

Although Turkdean is close to the old Roman Fosse Way, it has been left by the modern roads away from main traffic, and very few see the beautiful old village, which remains unspoilt in its Cotswold serenity, and probably almost as it was a century or even two ago. The fine old stone houses it contains were probably built in the time of the prosperity of the wool trade, and are perhaps contemporaneous with Northleach Church.

- 5.—Turkdean Manor, the residence of Mr. W. A. Rixon, J.P., C.A., and formerly the home of the Bannister family. Some idea of its age is given by the inscription over a bedroom doorway cut in quaint lettering, "W. Banyster, Anno, 1538."
- 6.—Turkdean Church. This is an ancient structure, part Norman, part Early English, but alas! also part Victorian. It has most interesting bits, but it was "restored" in 1857, and again in 1884. What a lot there is in that word "restored," and how it spoils so many Gloucestershire churches.

- 7.—The Rectory Farm House. Part of a Crypt of Early Norman work is still to be seen in the basement of this house.
- 8.—The drawing-room of the Manor House, showing the original stone fireplace.



10th GLOUCESTER MEMORIAL UNVEILED AT CHRIST CHURCH, CHELTENHAM.

On Sunday morning last, Feb. 20, the Wooden Cross which has stood for some years to the memory of Officers and Men of the 10th Glo'ster Regiment killed in the High Wood area of the Somme Battlefield was unveiled by Lieut.-Colonel Pritchard at Christ Church, Cheltenham. Owing to alterations and adjustments by the French Government, it has recently been sent to England from the battlefield, and it was decided to place it in Christ Church, where the Regiment worshipped during their training and formation period.

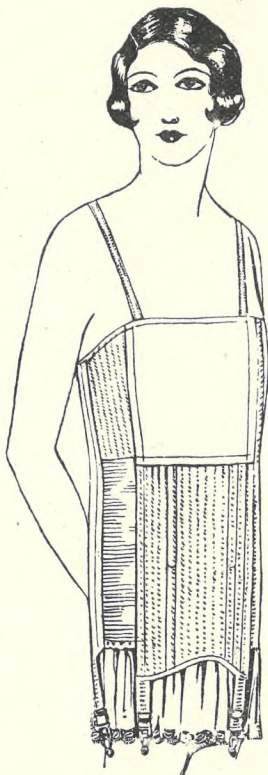

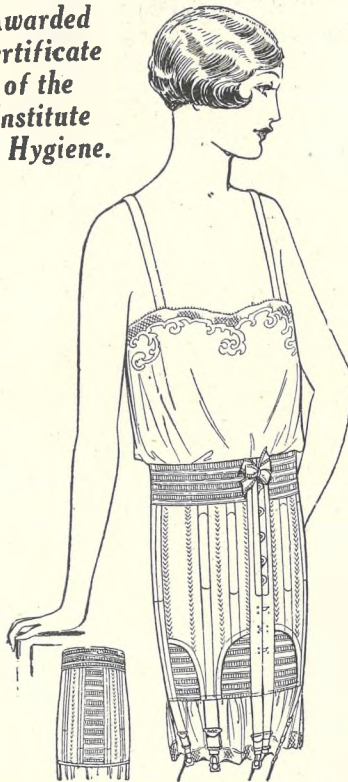
