





PICTURESQUE CLOUCESTERSHIRE.—NEWENT,

Newent is a small market town nine miles from Gloucester, and on the confines of Herefordshire and Worcestershire. It had a charter for a market and two fairs as early as the reign of Henry III., which was renewed in the reign of Henry VIII., and James I. granted a new one. Rudder in his "History of Gloucestershire," published in 1779, says: "The roads in this part of the county are so intolerable that the writer found it necessary to desert his horse and to travel with a guide on foot from one village to another." He also says, The town is very irregularly built, and though there are a few pretty good houses, the greater part are mean buildings,

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



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
PICTURESQUE GLOUGESTERS HIRE.—NEWENT.

Newent appears to have been a place of considerable importance in former days, having been a borough town and governed by a bailiff. It has two main streets, containing many well-built houses and some good stopt. The Church of St. Mary the Virgin is a handsome structure, originally erected in the middle of the 14th century, and contains many ancient and interesting memorials. On January 18th, 1613, the nave roof, owing to a heavy fall of snow, collapsed at midnight, and was rebuilt six years later with eighty tons of timber from Newent Wood, the gift of King Charles II. The whole has been considerably restored.




