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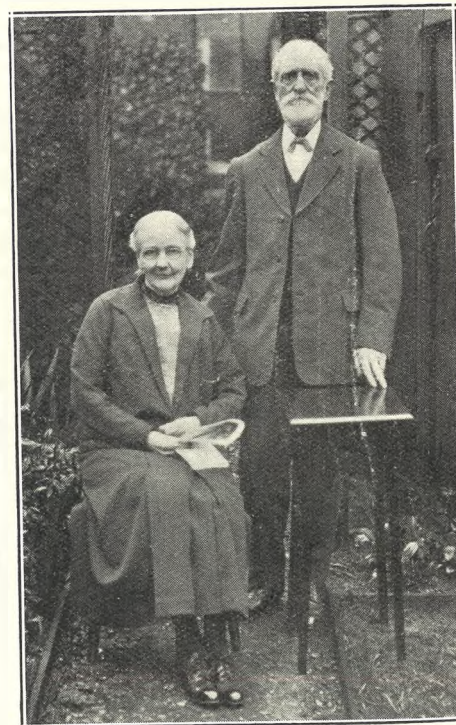
"HOOPER" BILLIARD SHIELD WON BY CHELTENHAM.

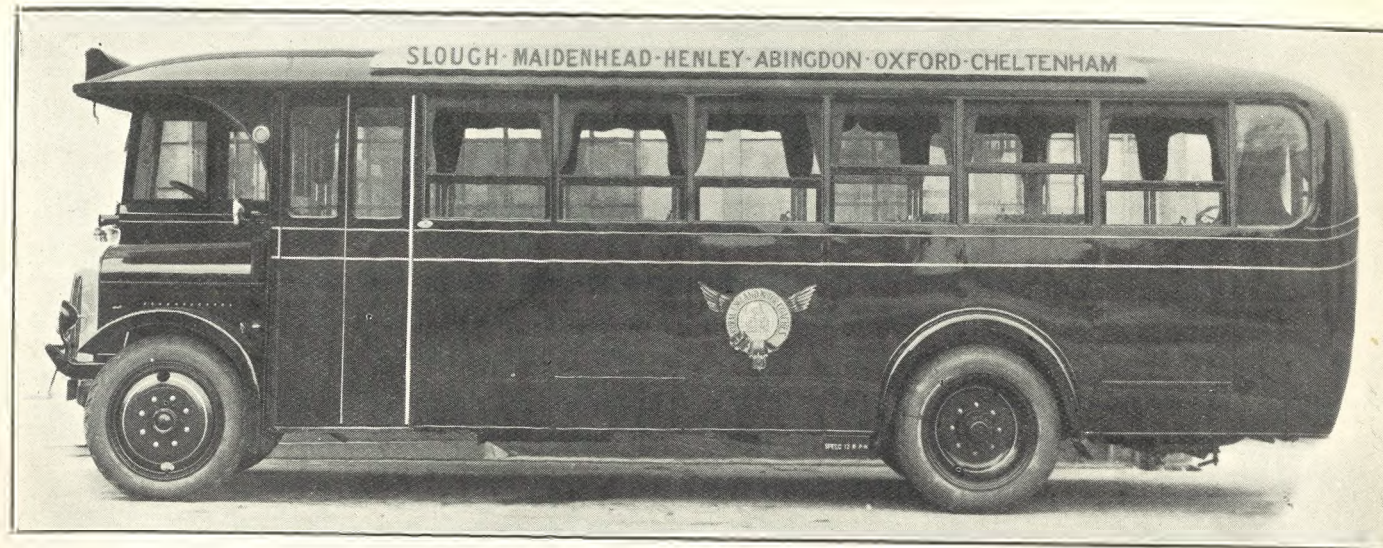

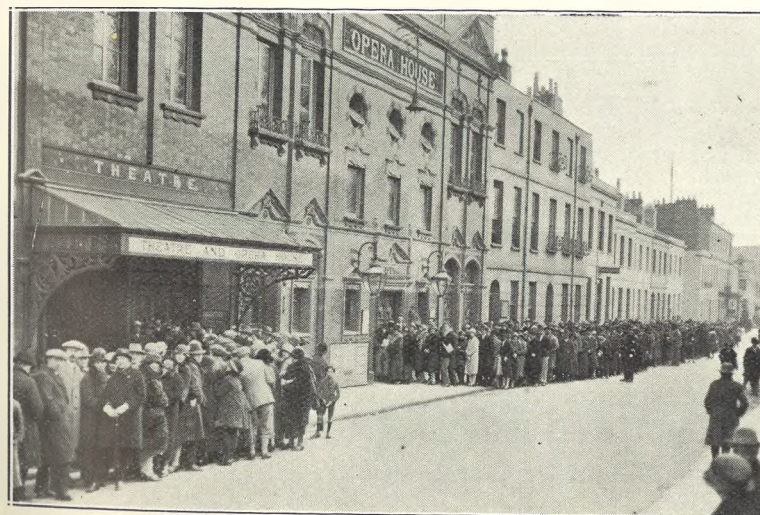

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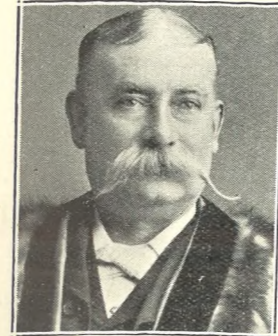


CHRIST CHURCH, CHELTHENHAM, BAZAAR AT THE TOWN HALL.

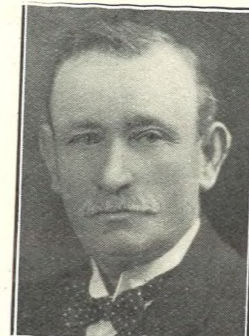

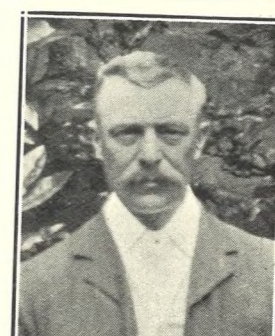

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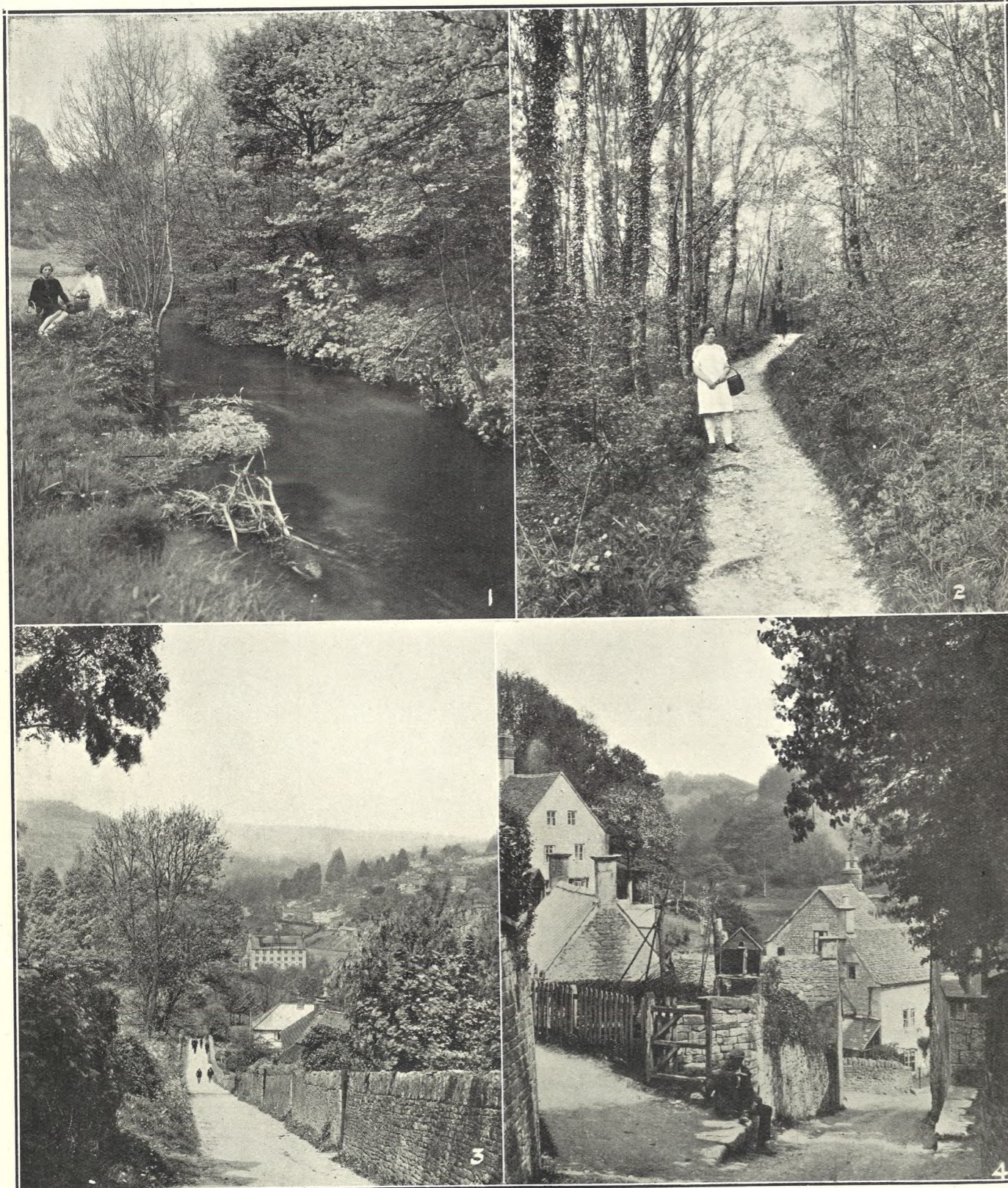
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—THE CHALFORD VALLEY.

The Stroud Valley, with its continuation through Brimscombe and Chalford, is well known to travellers by the main G.W.R. line from Gloucester to London, the line following the Valley for some miles, and the views are some of the most picturesque in the county. The Valley contains the pretty little river Frome and the Thames and Severn Canal, now, alas! partly derelict; but what the canal has lost in utility it has gained in beauty, for the neglected profusion of vegetable growths has covered its ugliness, and in its lonely reaches it is indeed picturesque in the extreme.

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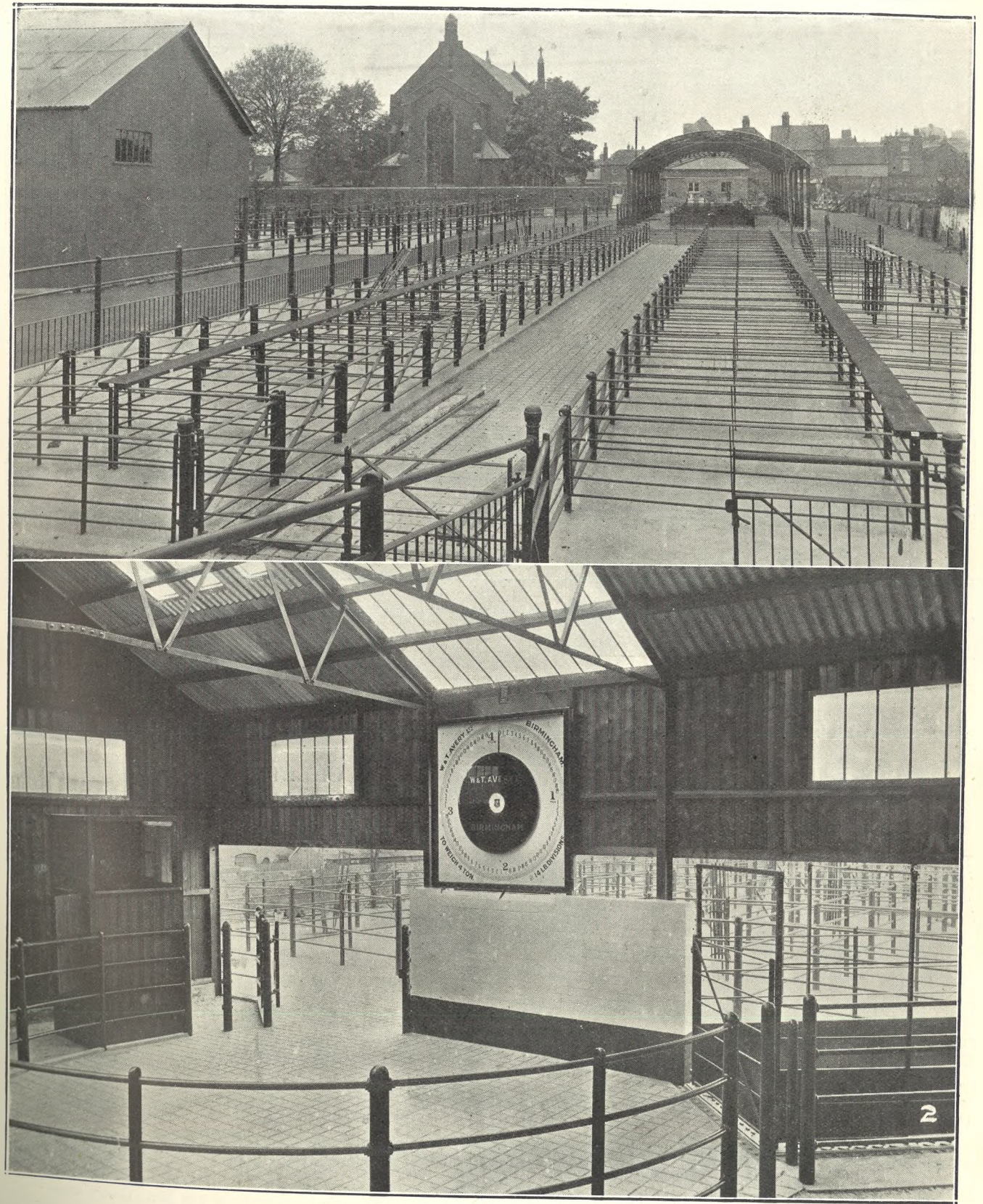

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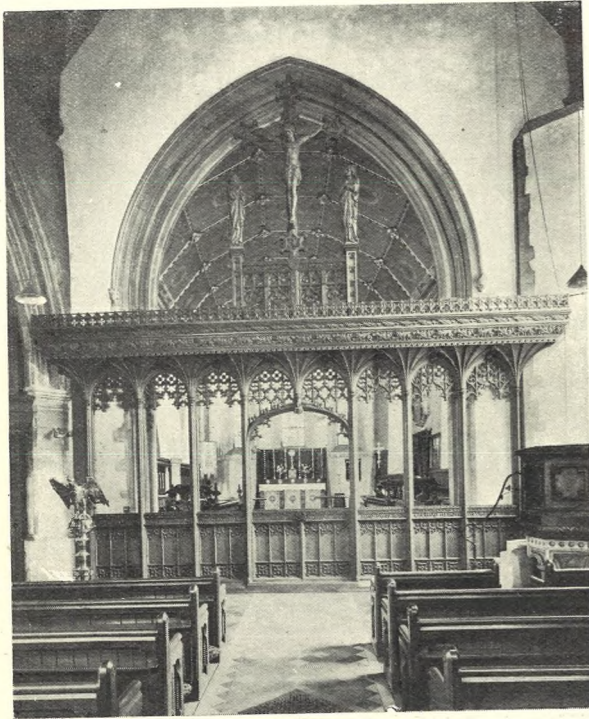

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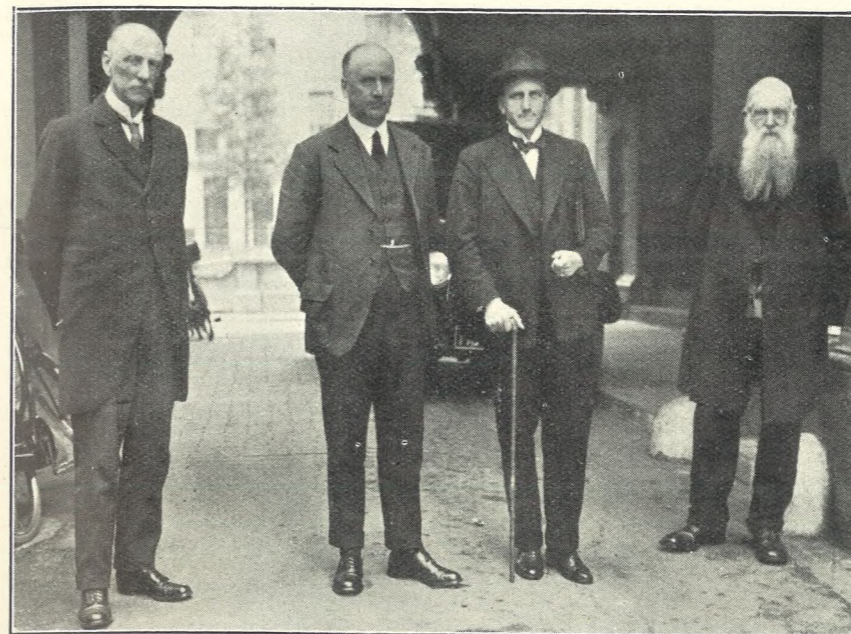

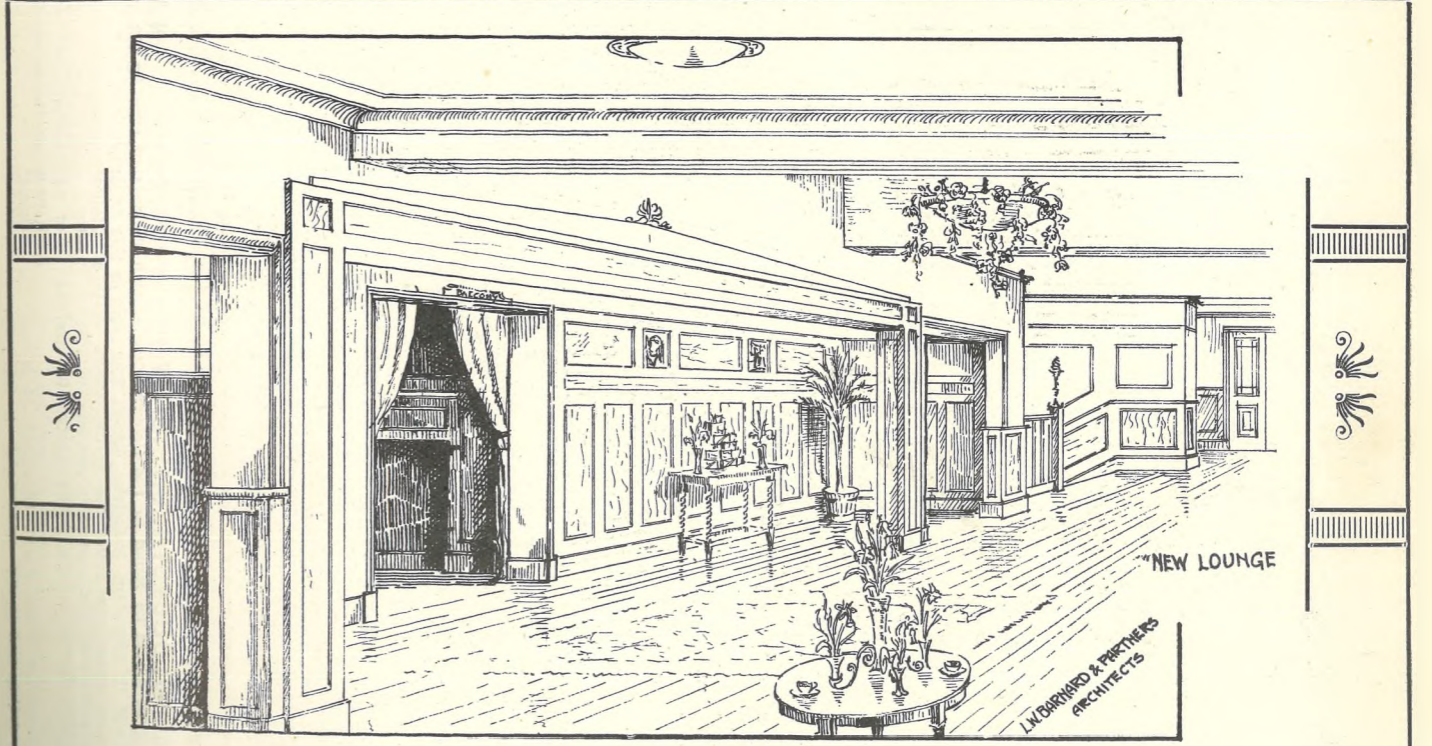

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—THE BRIMSCOMBE AND CHALFORD VALLEY.

Numbers of fine old stone houses of Gotswold type are to be found in the Brimscombe-Chalford Valley that runs by the main Gloucester to London G.W.R. line. They were all probably built at the time of the boom of the wool trade and its attendant industries, which flourished in this neighbourhood a couple of centuries or more ago. 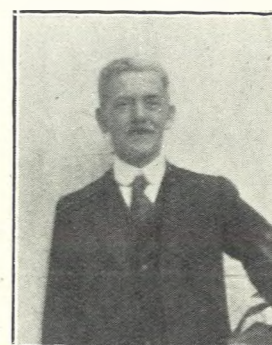
