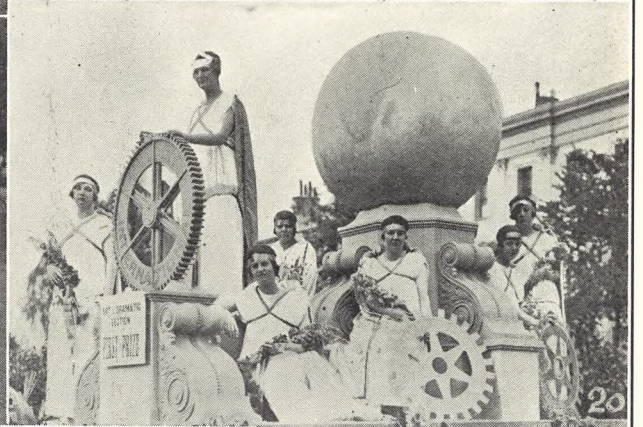
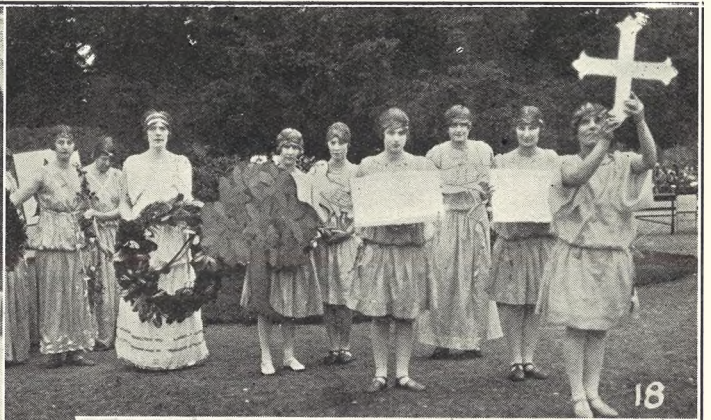


THE JUBILEE PAGEANT OF CHELTENHAM.

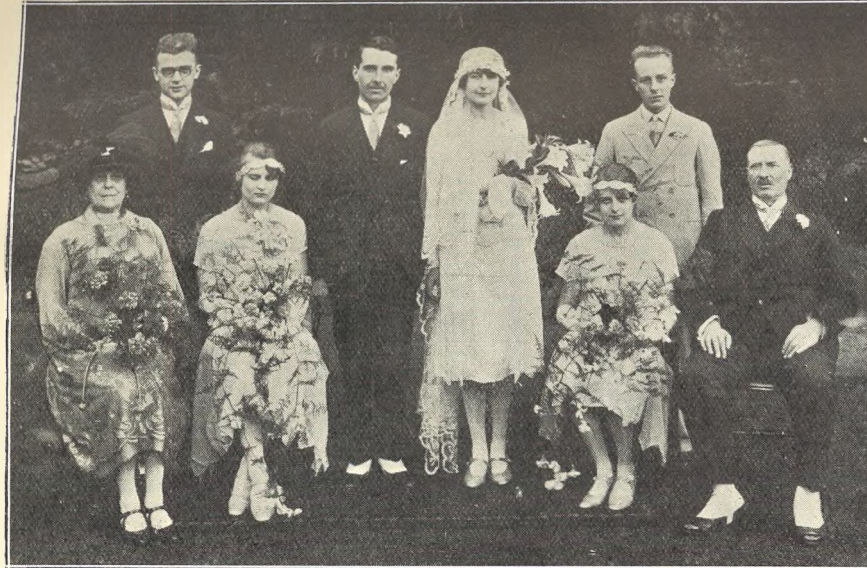
CHELTENHAM'S JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS.

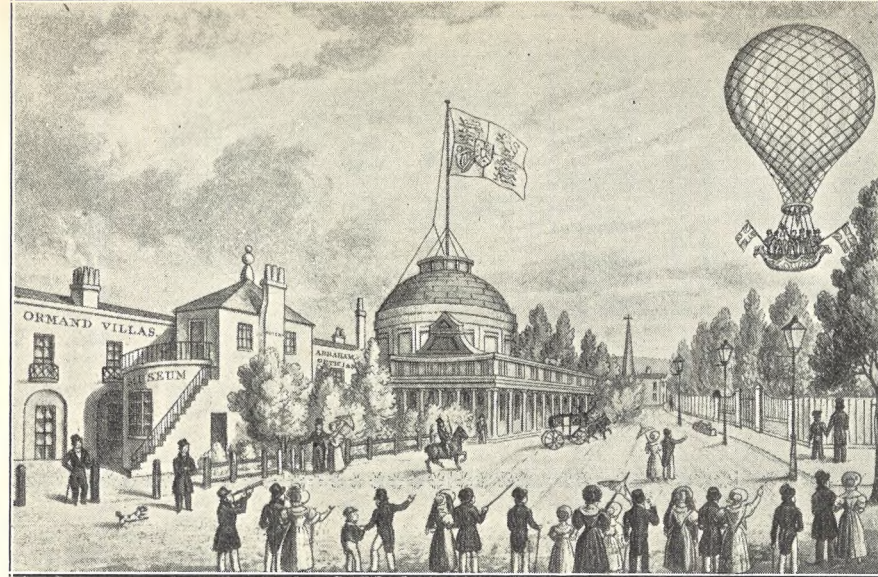

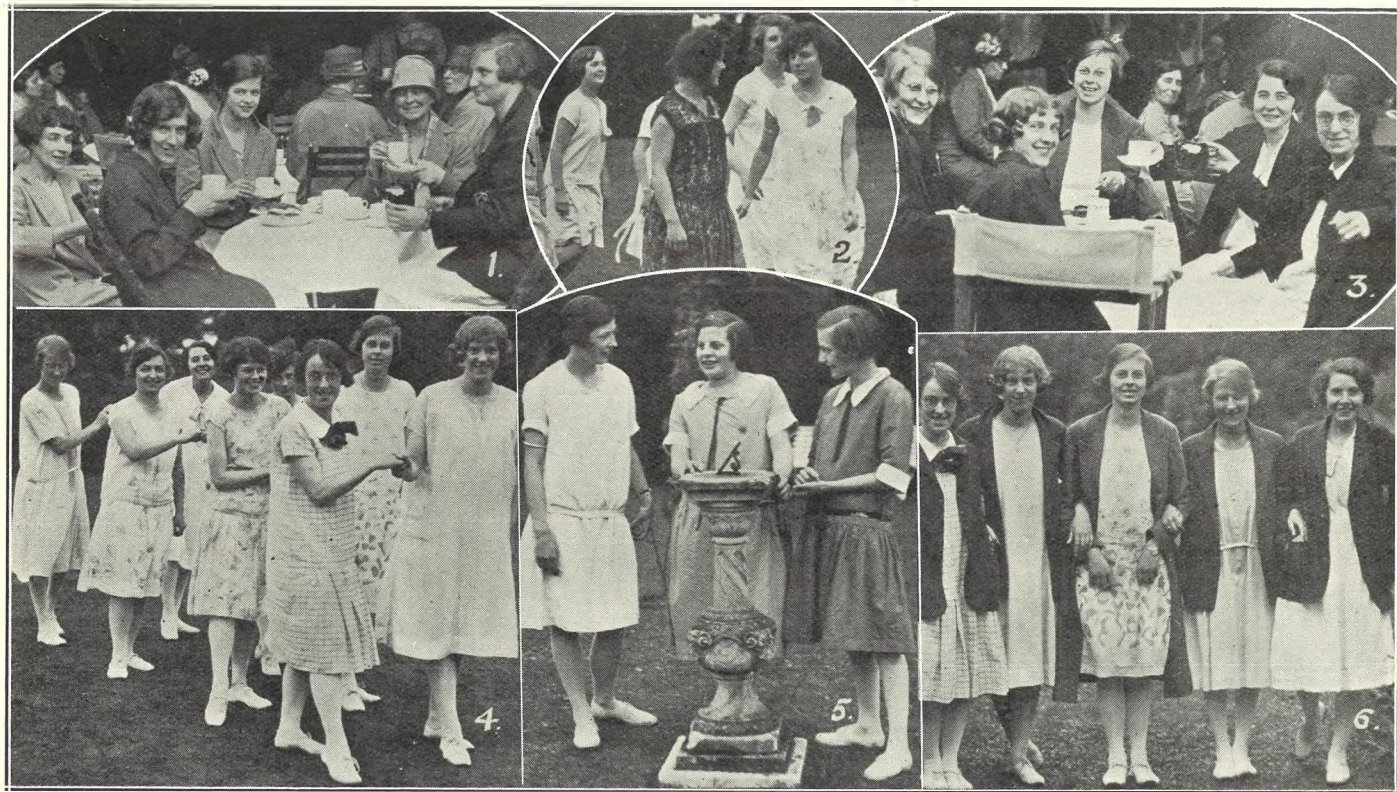

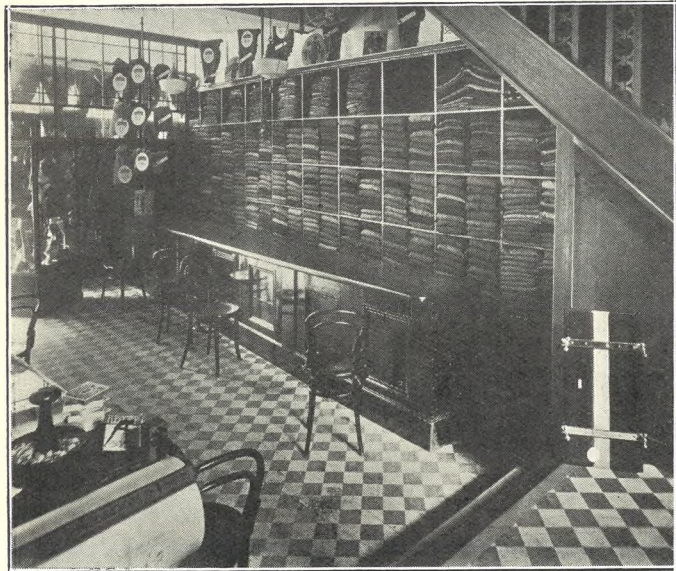

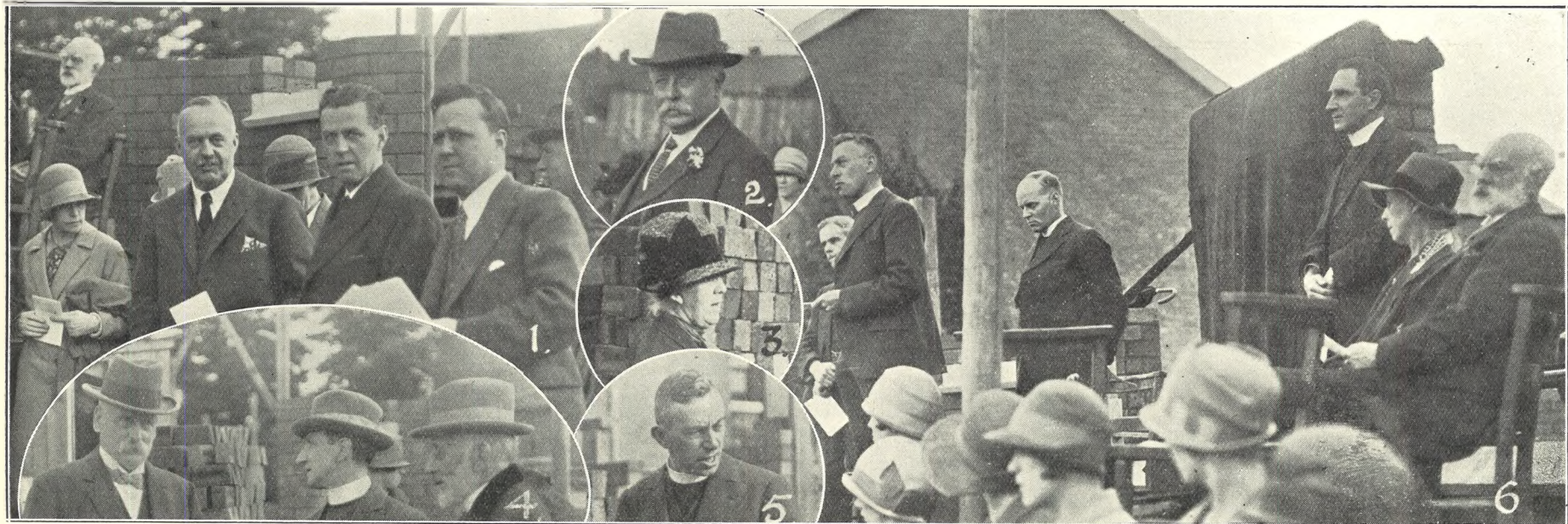

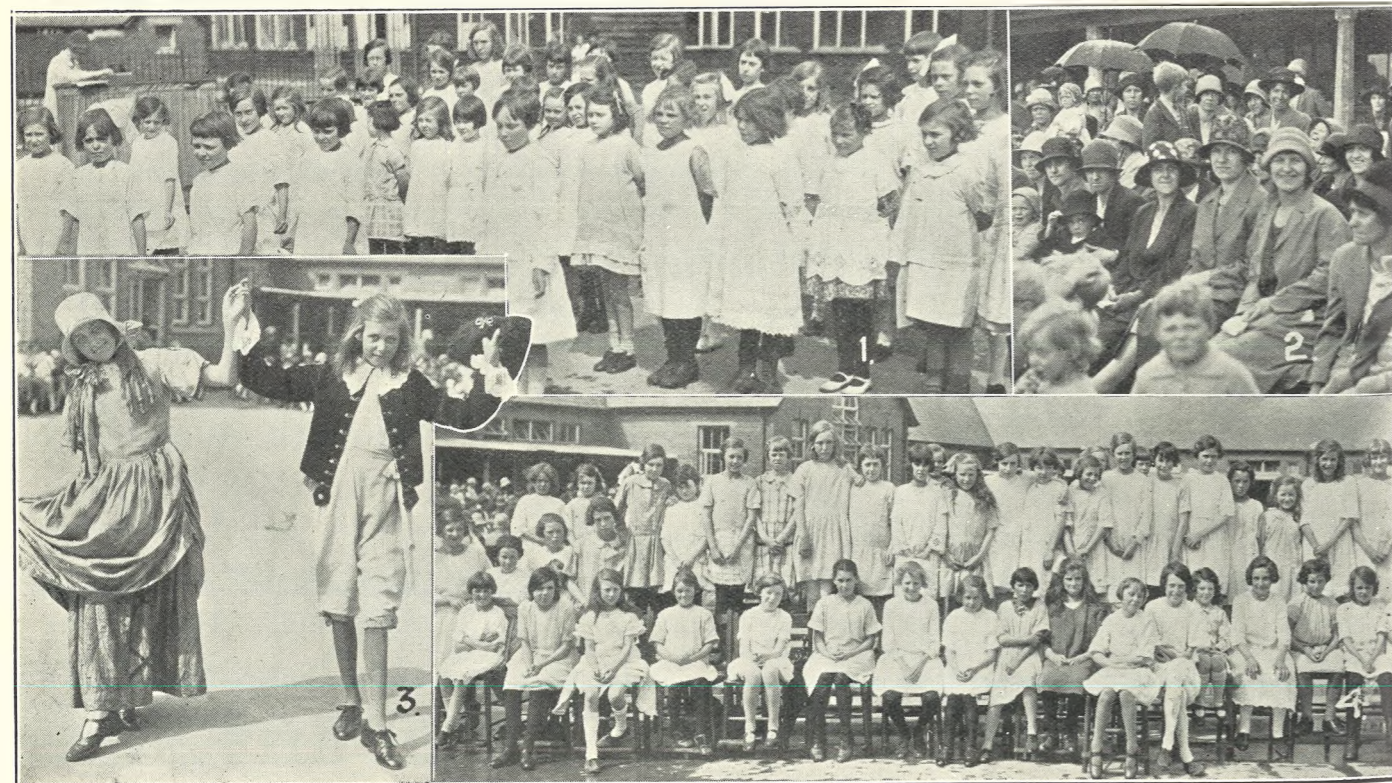

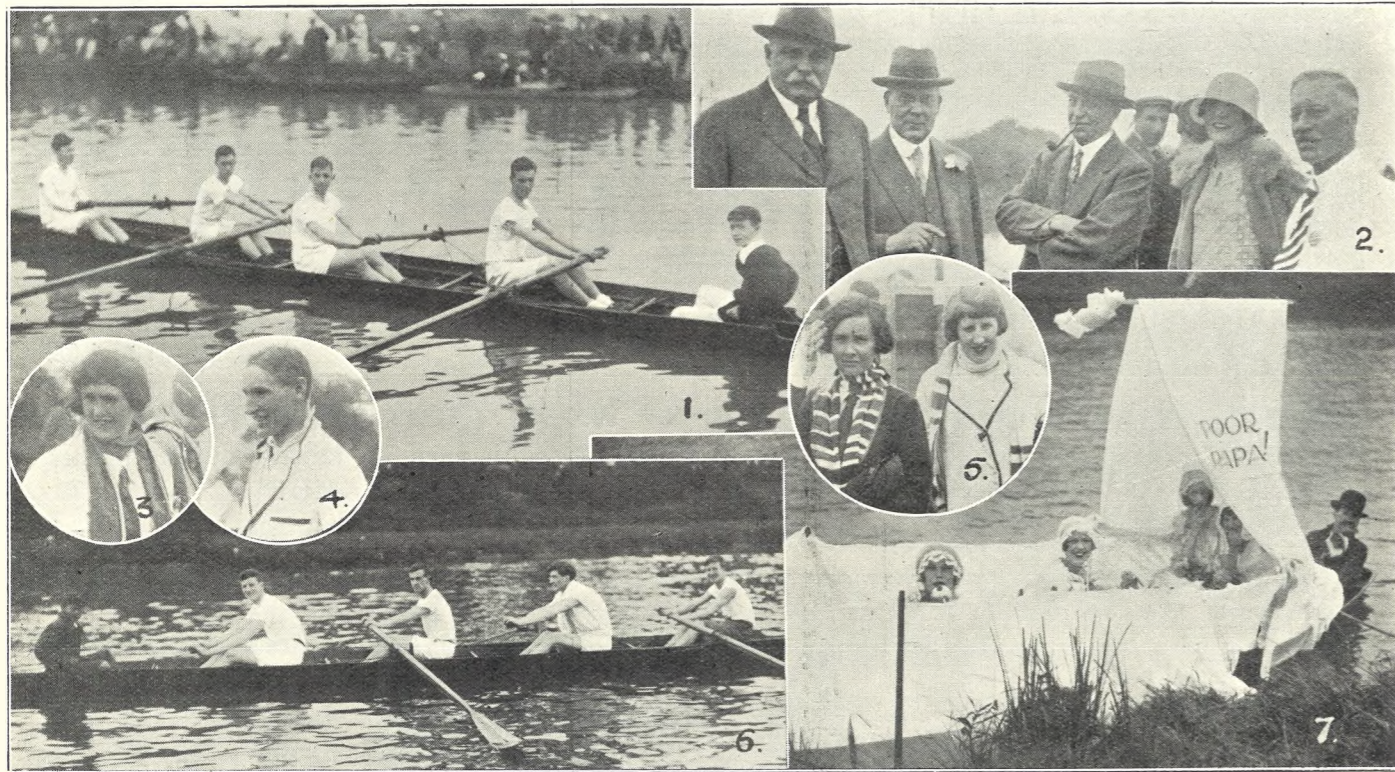

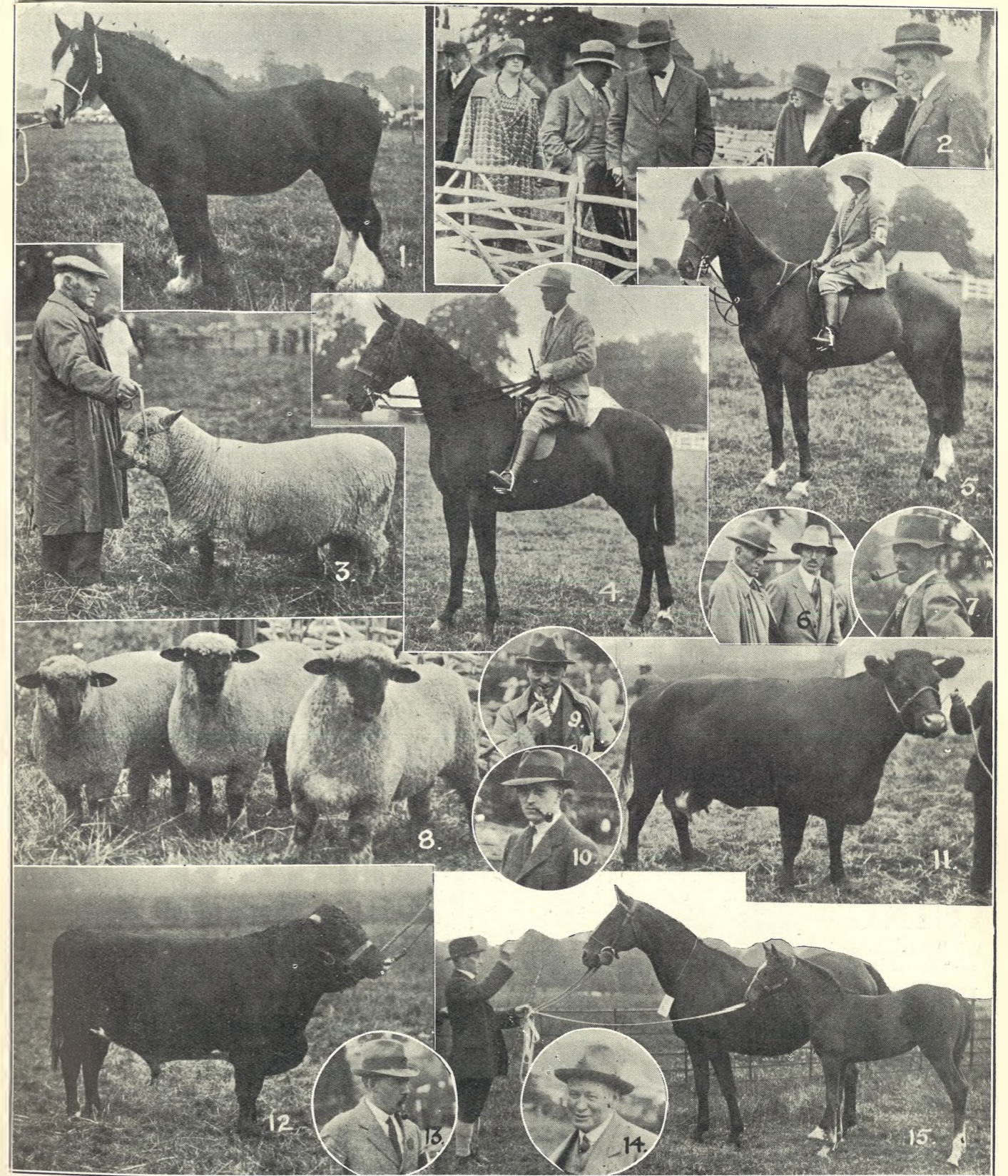

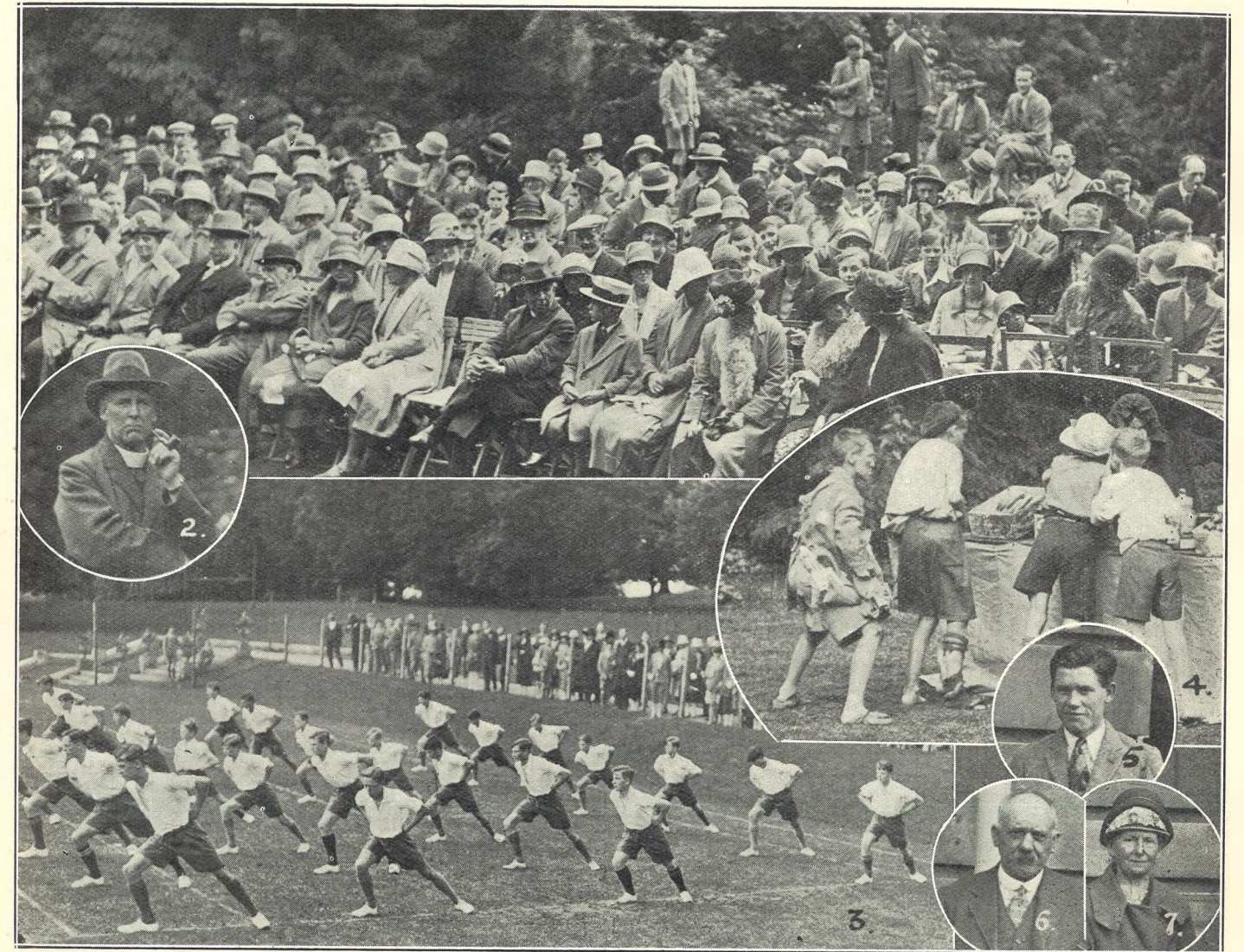


CHELTHENHAM WOMEN'S CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION VISIT TO LONDON.
