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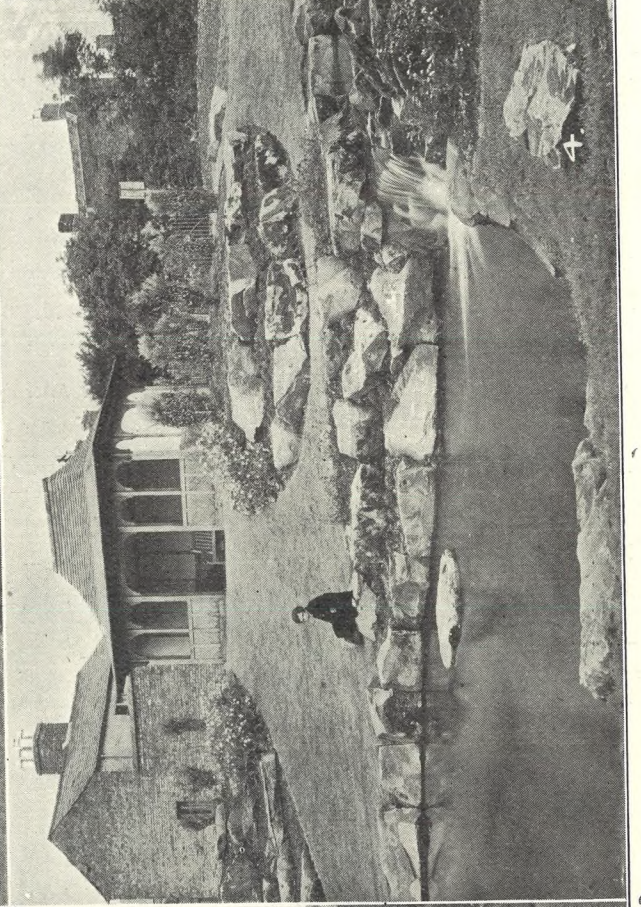
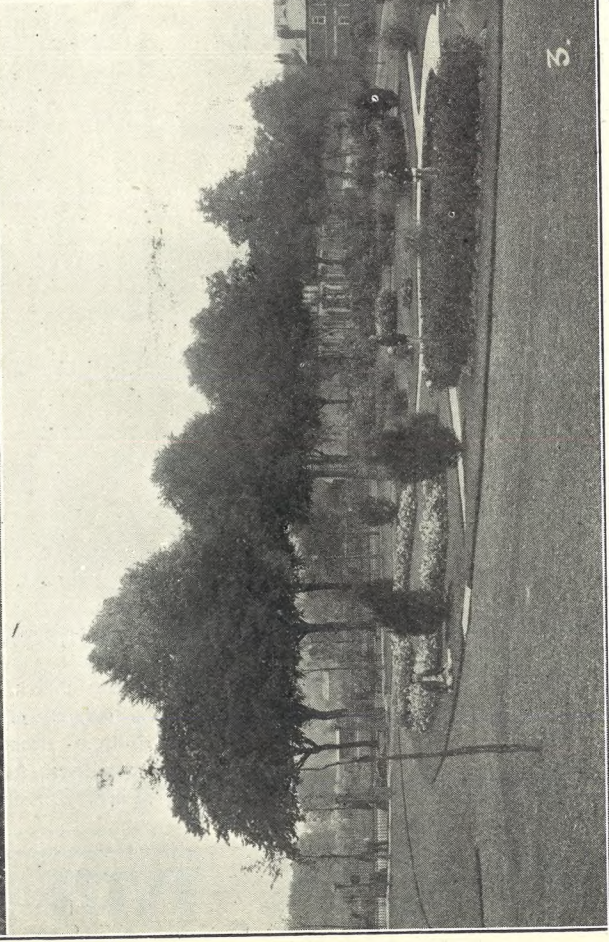
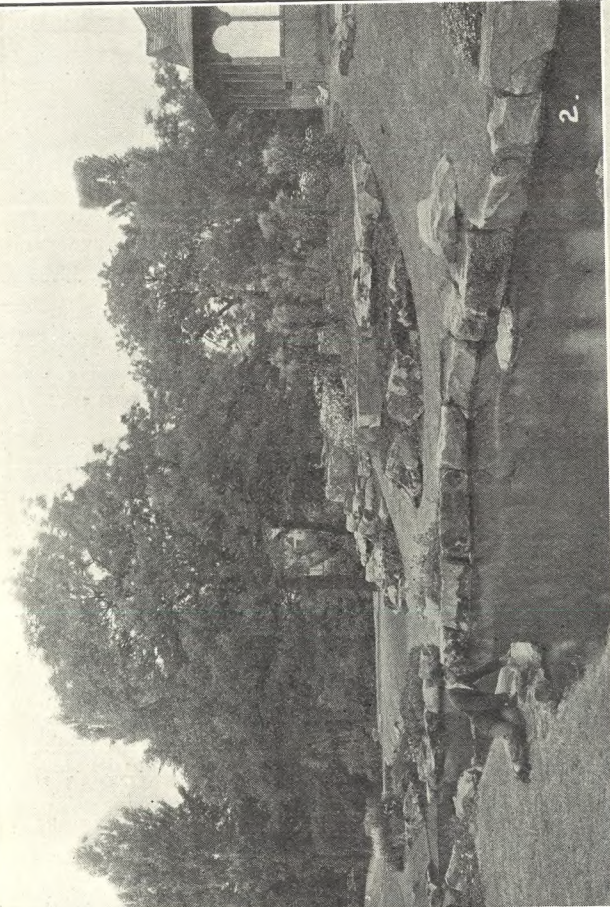
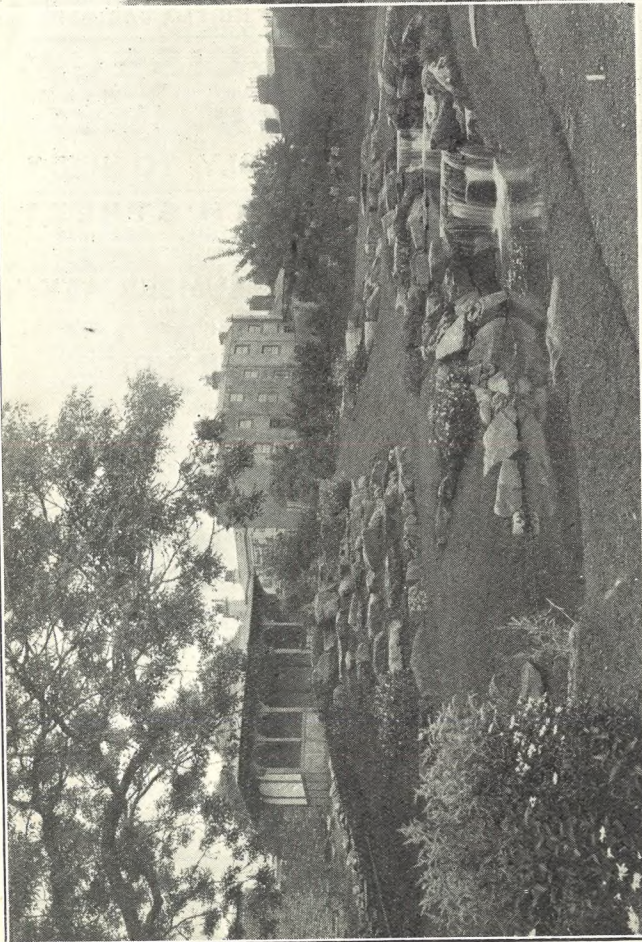
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CHELTENHAM'S NEW PARK.

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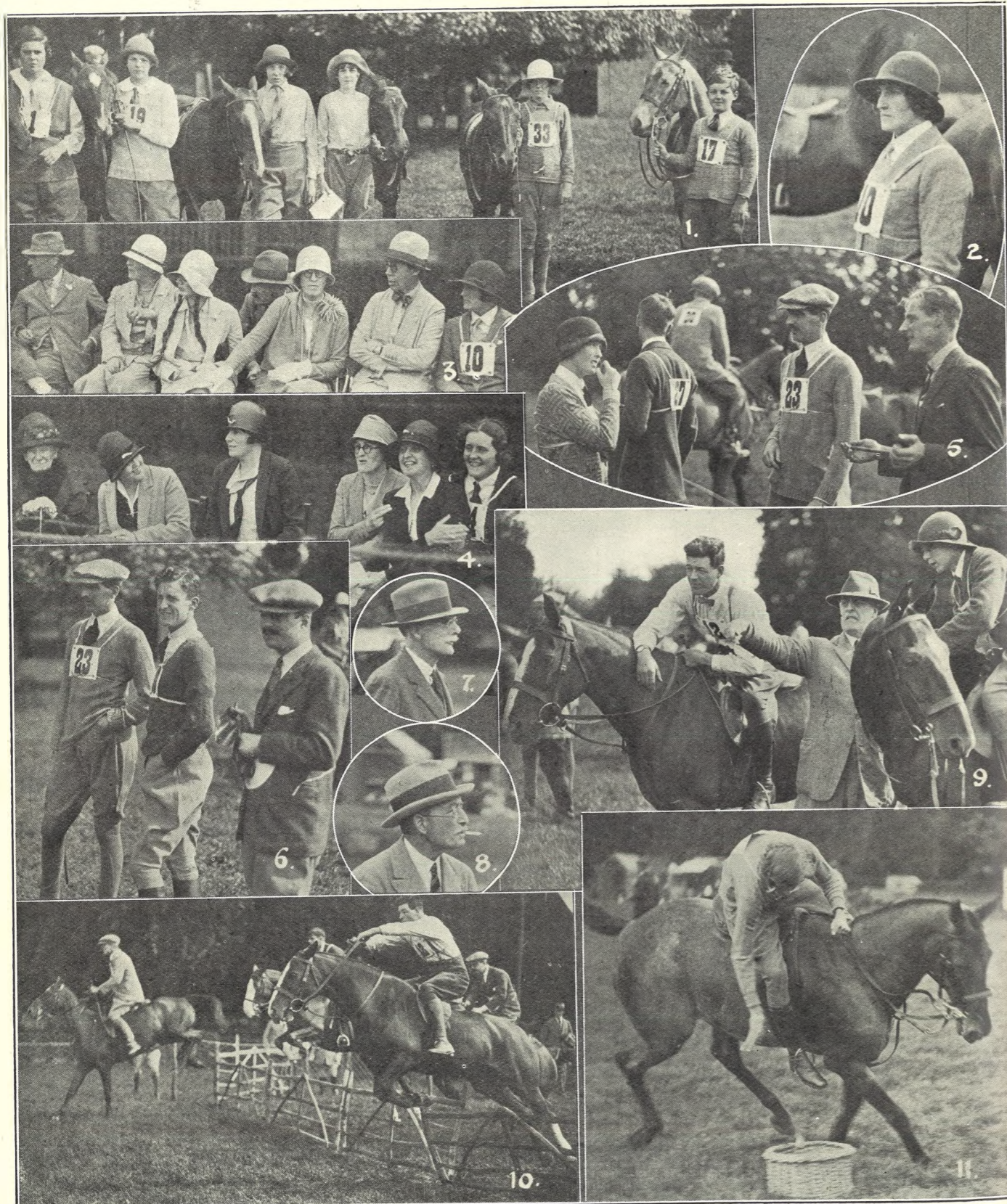

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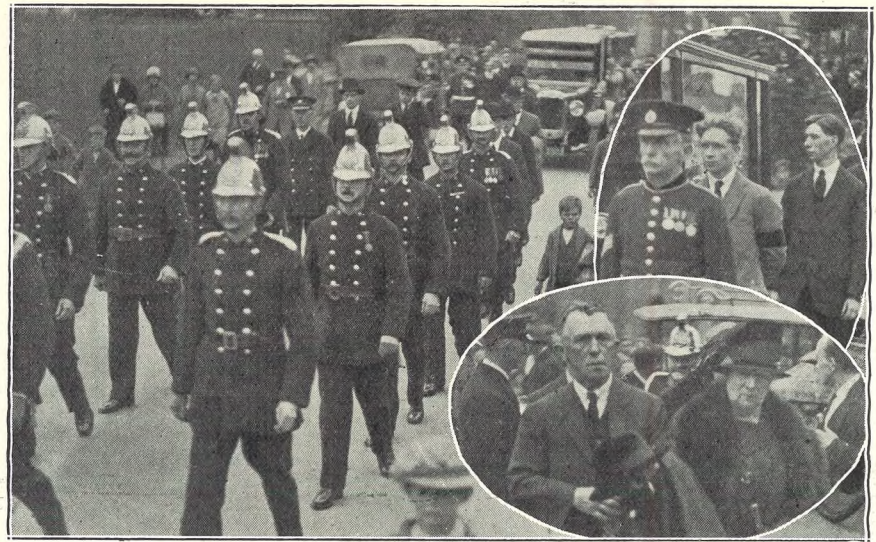

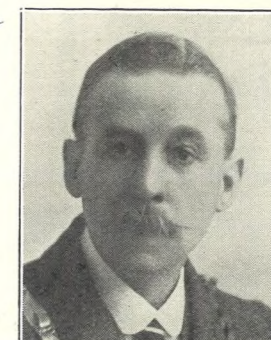
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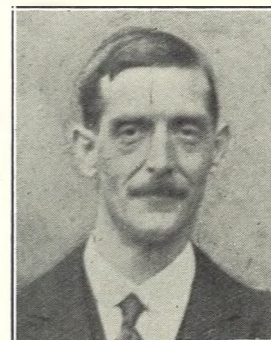
MISS PHEBE CAVE-BROWNE - CAVE,

who for the last two years has been training in St. Andrew's College (Church Missionary Society), left Cheltenham on September 2nd to take up missionary work in the Southern Sudan.

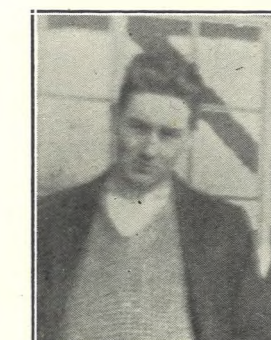


MR. J. A. INGRAM,

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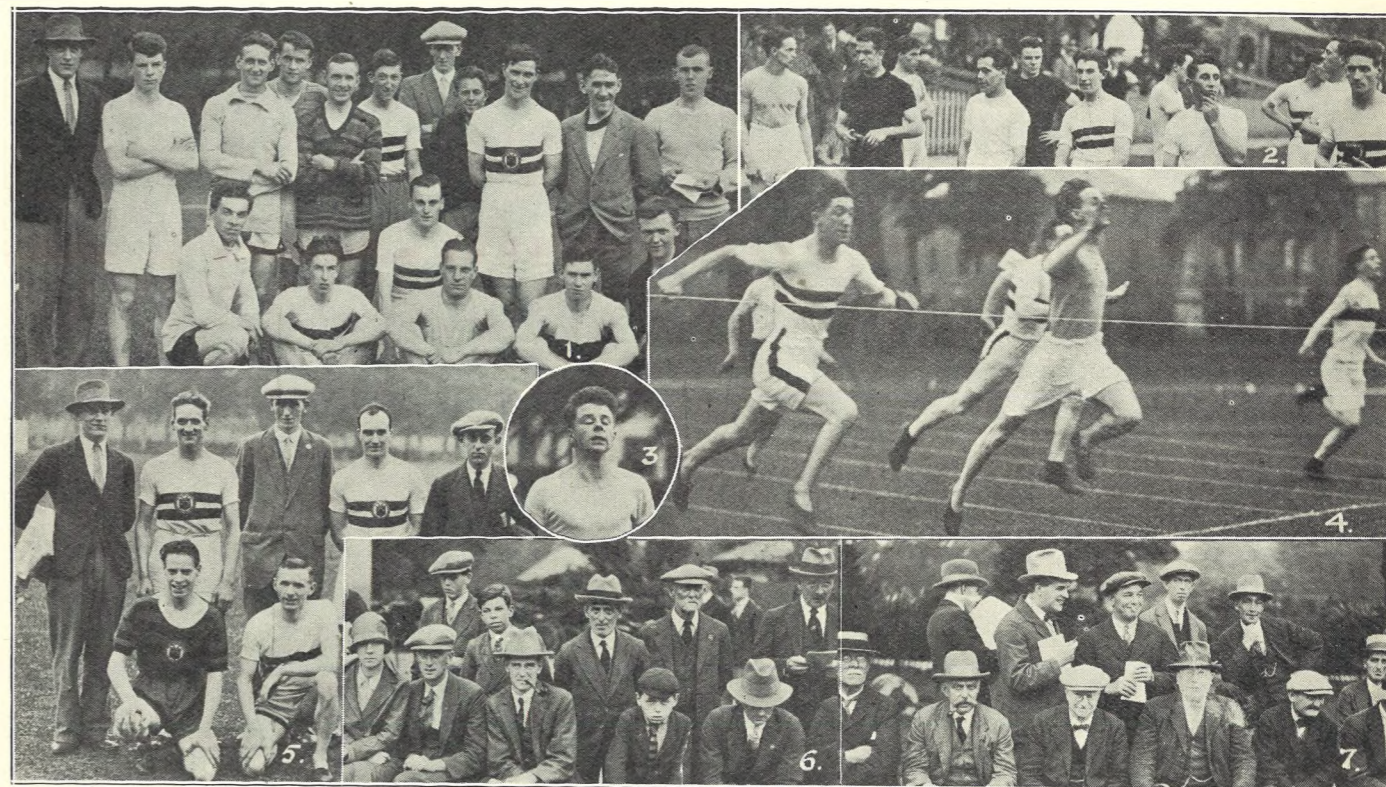

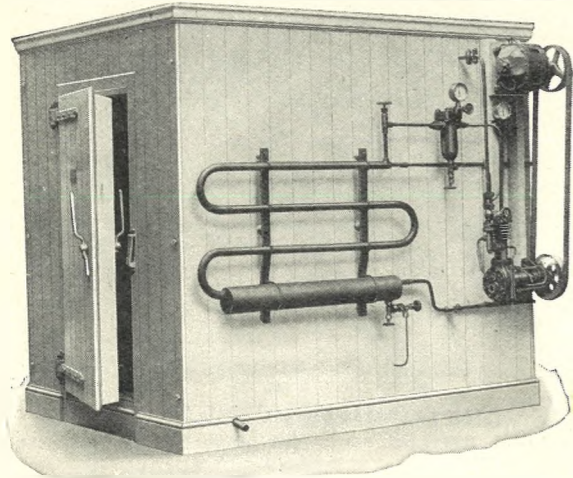

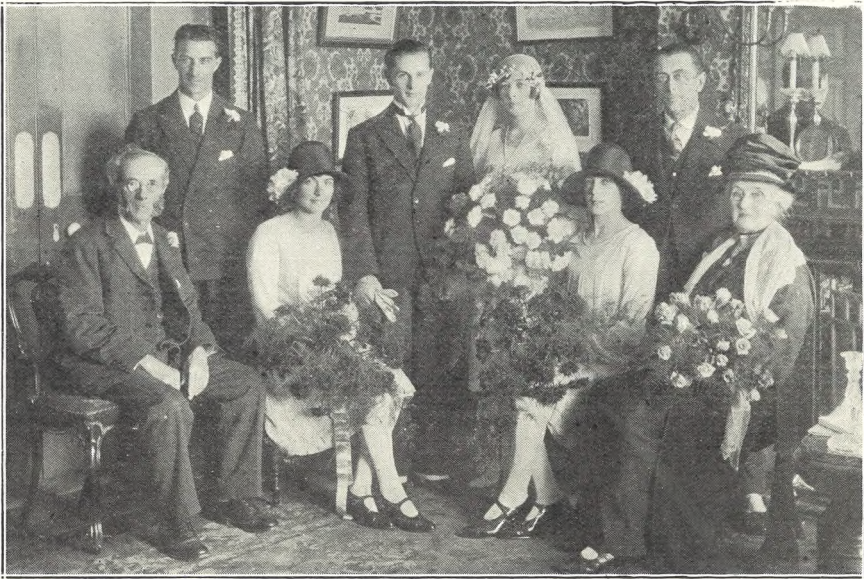

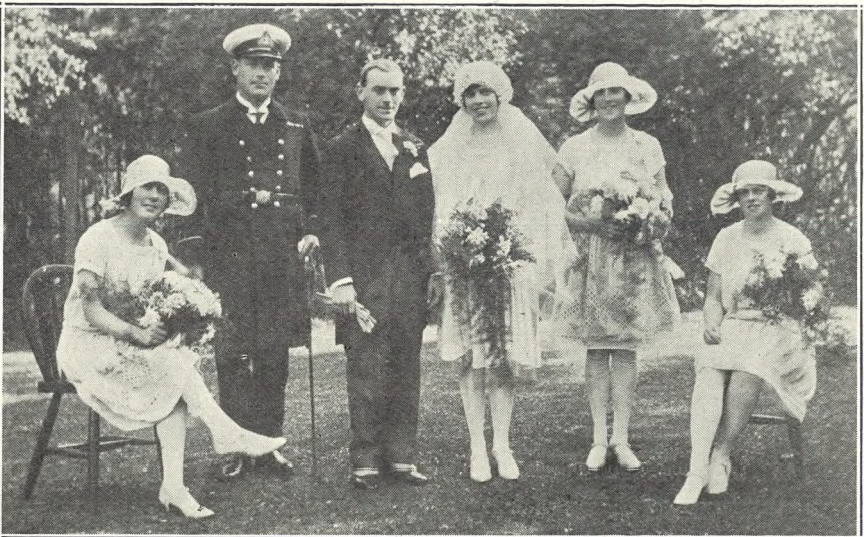

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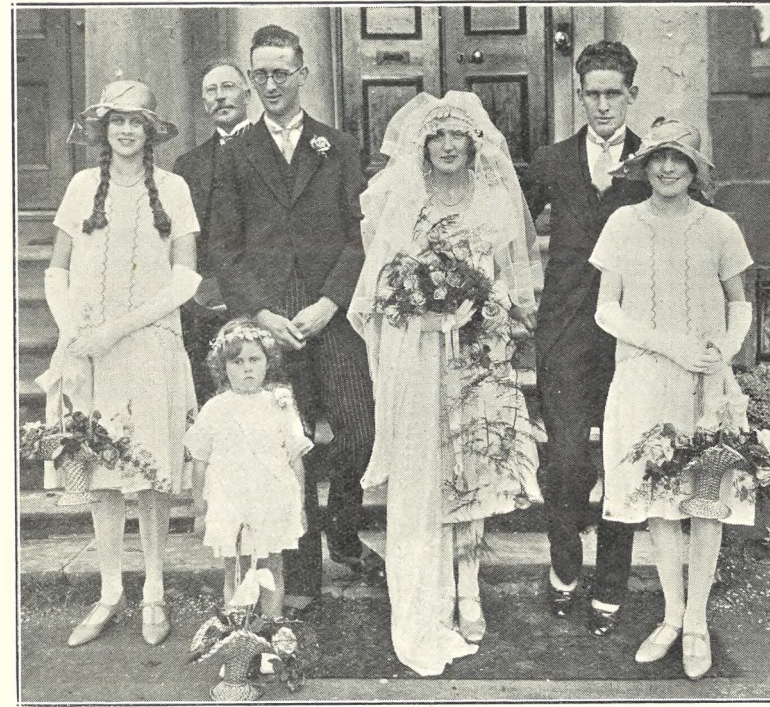

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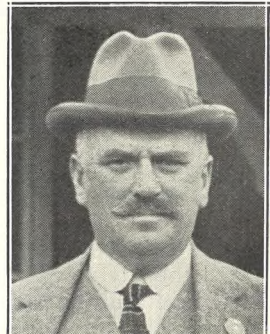
