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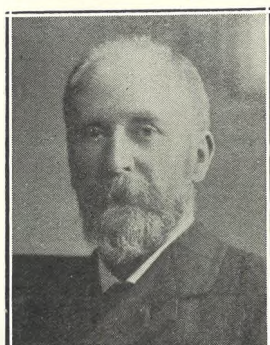

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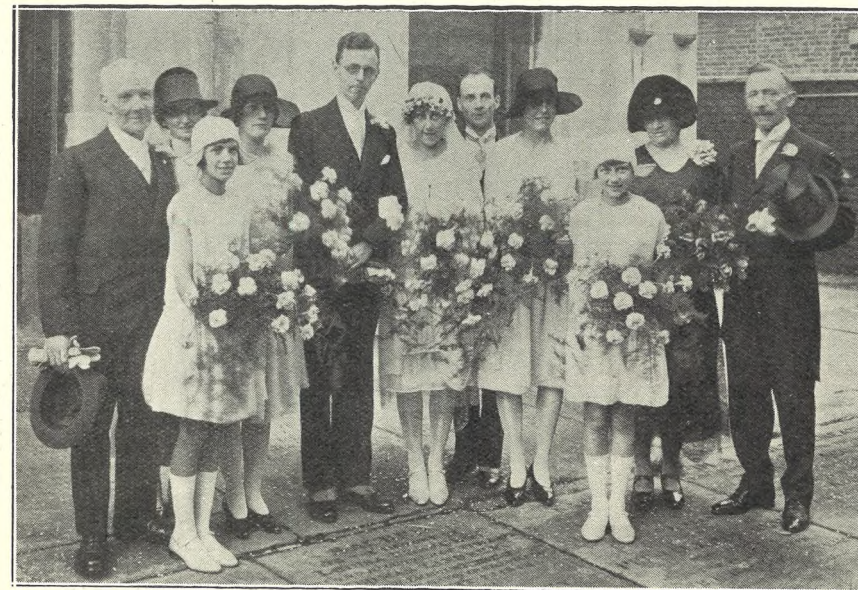


FASHIONABLE WEDDING IN CHELTENHAM.

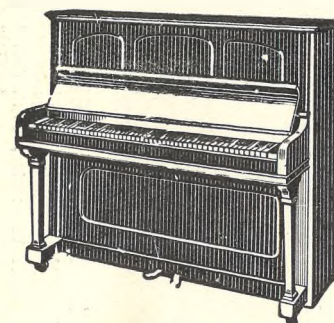

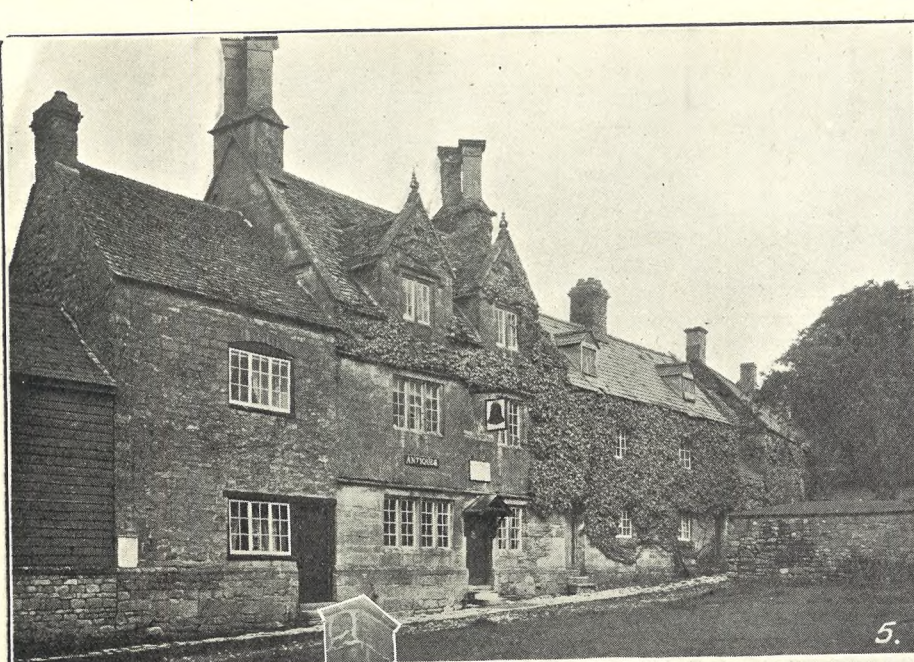

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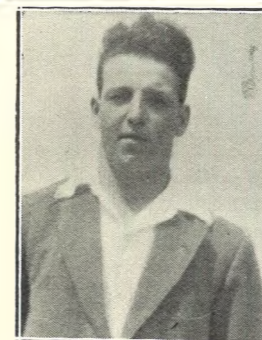
CHELTONIAN'S WEDDING AT HARROGATE.

Picturesque Gloucestershire.—Westbury-on-Severn. Westbury-on-Severn Church Tower, which is one of the few examples in the County where the tower is detached from the church. This tower was built in 1280, many years before the church, and was probably part of the original church. It is a heavy wooden broach spire and is 160 feet high. A chantry chapel of St. Mary, erected 1275, attached to the spire, probably the original church, was used until 1848 as the Parish School, and was pulled down in 1862. The present church was built in 1530, but has been much restored.

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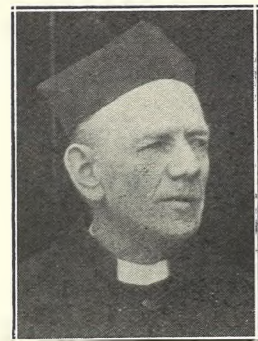
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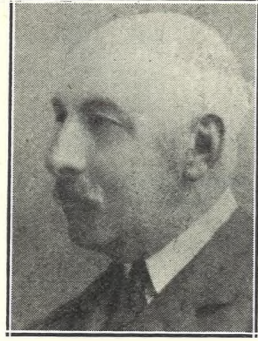
FUNERAL OF REV. H. R. HANSON.

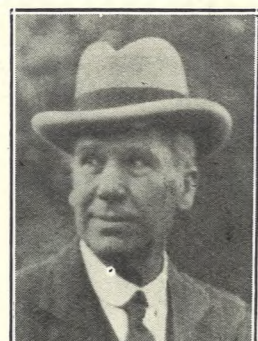

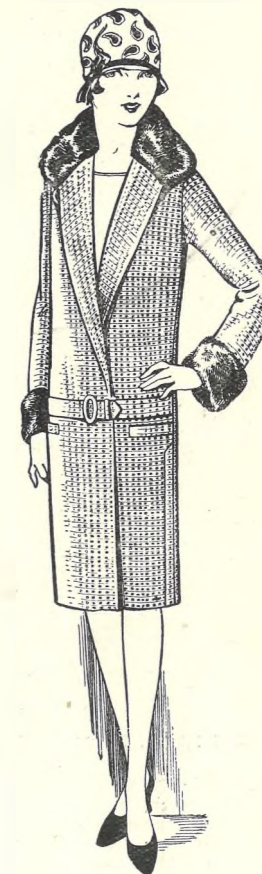

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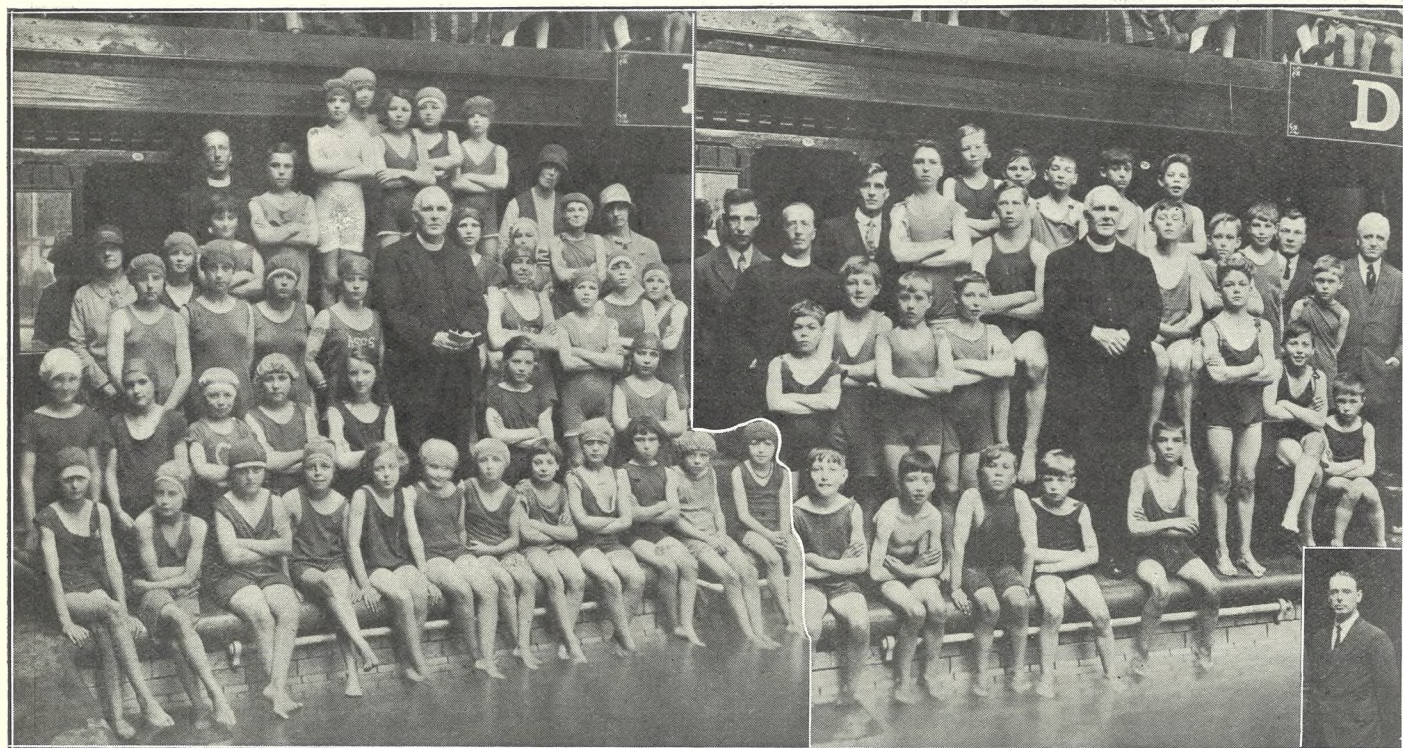

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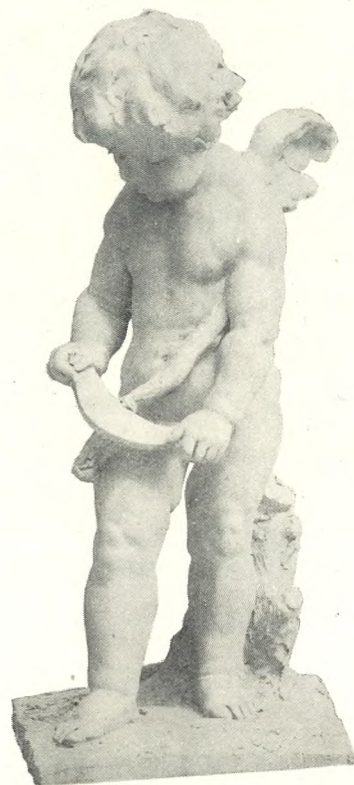

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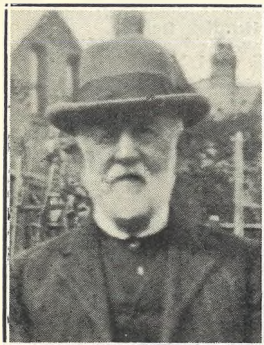

MOORISH BAZAAR AT CAVENDISH HOUSE.

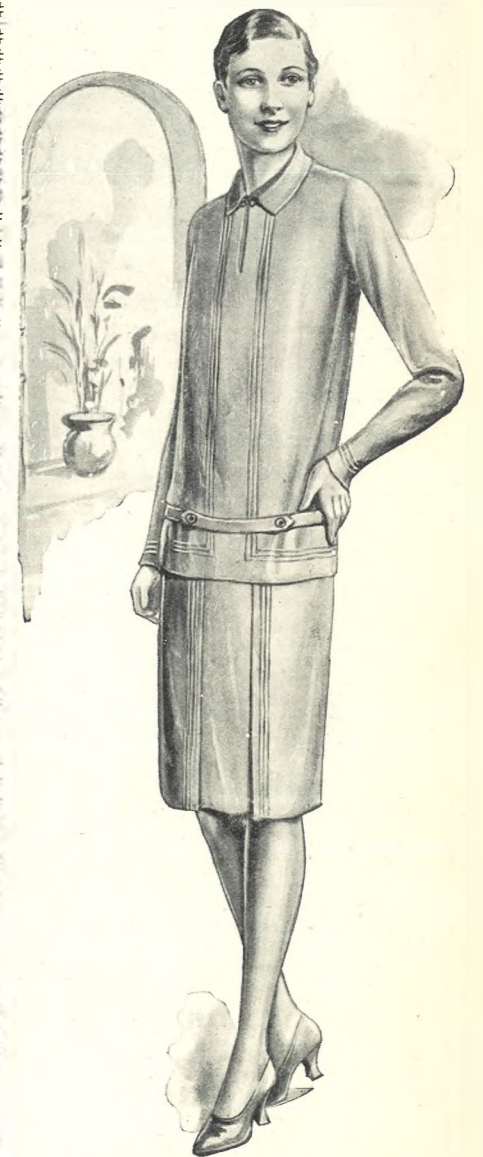

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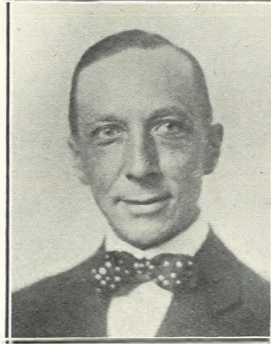

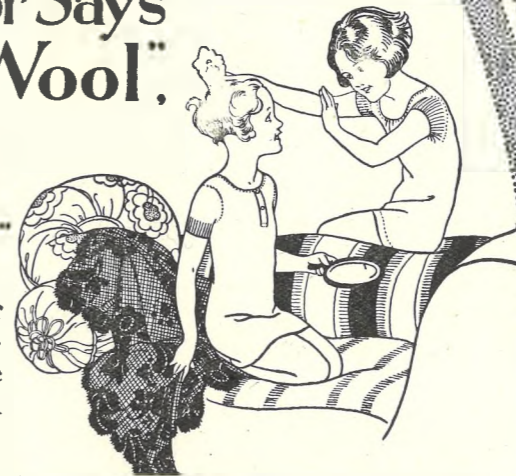

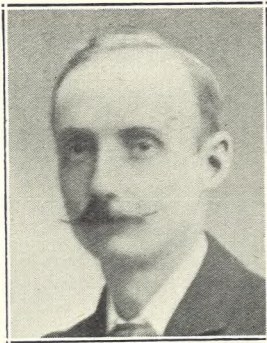
The above Colleges renewed their battles on Saturday last at Soccer football, St. Paul's winning by 3 goals to 1.

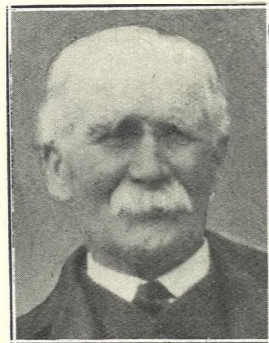
CHELTHENHAM FAMILY'S BEREAVEMENTS.

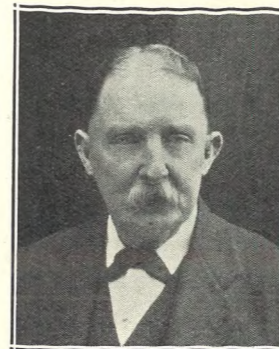

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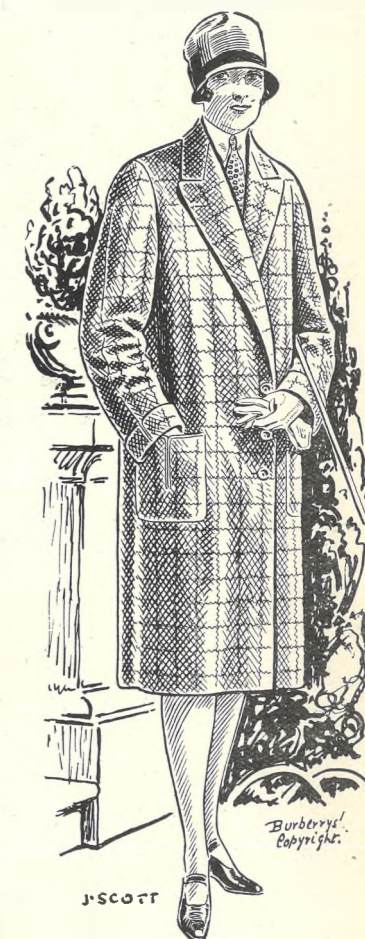
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NEW SALVATION ARMY "STATION" OPENED IN CHELTENHAM.

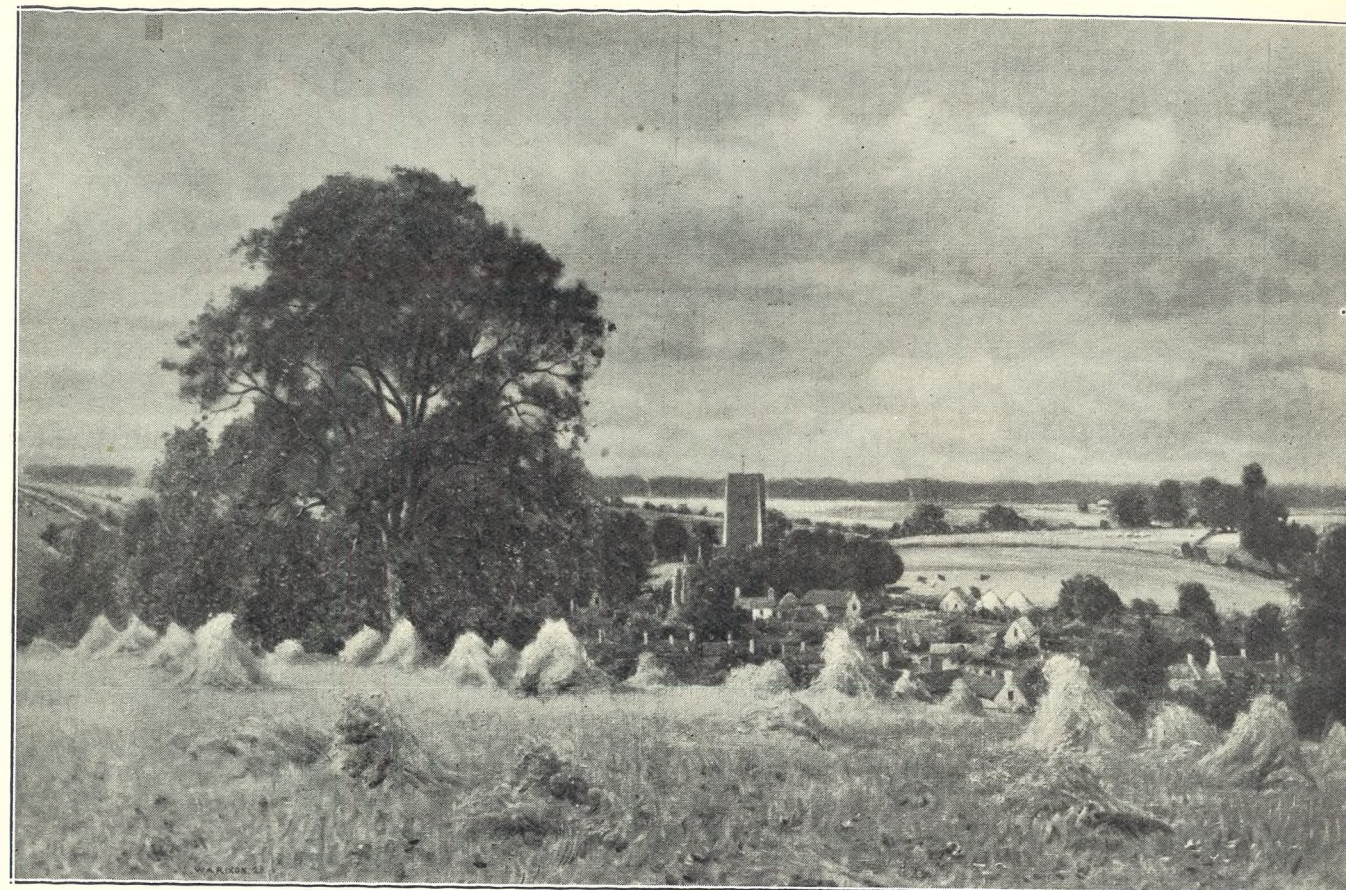
