



Representative Promenade tradesmen have held a meeting and appointed a deputation to interview the Cheltenham Corporation to urge upon them to increase the width of the roadway of the lower part of the Promenade (opposite the Post Office), in view of the increased traffic and consequent congestion at this spot. 





OPENING OF CHELTENHAM HOMEGROFT ESTATE.

On Saturday last Earl Beauchamp, K.G., opened the first six houses built by the Cheltenham Homecroft Association, Ltd. The object of the scheme is to provide homes and a plot of ground sufficient to grow all the garden stuff needed by a working man and his family, for town workers, and to make the rent sufficient that in 25 years' time the house becomes the property of the tenant. These houses are on the Tewkesbury Road, about a mile from the town: six are completed, and 25 are being built in all. Cheltenham is the first town in England to work this scheme, which was initiated by Professor J. W. Scott, of Cardiff University College.
