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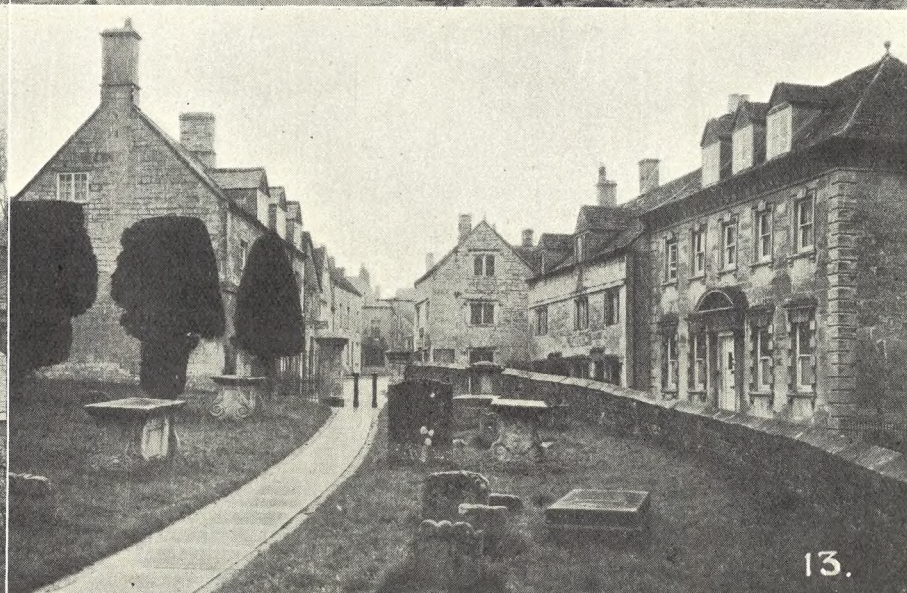
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—PAINSWICK.

Certain public-spirited gentlemen of Painswick have made life-long endeavours to keep the little town free from brick buildings and in its pristine purity of style. Up to the present their efforts have been happily successful, and at every turn and in every one of the twisting little streets beautiful old stone houses are found, all built in the native stone.

10.—View at back of Churchyard, showing a fine Georgian house, in which the roof, of a Pagoda type, shows the first trace of the influence of Chinese architecture.

12.—Hill Farm, Painswick, a fine old pile of buildings, delightful in its irregularity, but rather spoilt by modern monstrosities of corrugated iron and slate added to the front.

11.—A fine old house and shop in Friday Street.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—PAINSWICK.

Painswick is one of the beauty spots of Gloucestershire. Its wonderful old stone houses, so perfect in their purity to Cotswold style, are as picturesque as their history is interesting. The natural surroundings are as beautiful as the architecture, and Painswick Valley is one of the loveliest in the County.

6.—Lower Holcombe House (c. 1668) with George II. elements, and George V. additions by Mr. Detmar Blow, F.R.I.B.A., now the residence of Dowager Countess of Plymouth.

8.—Newhall House, the residence of Mrs. Nelson, a fine example of an old stone Cotswold house. Parts of this date from 1420.

7.—Castle Hale, the residence of Mr. W. St. Clair Baddeley, J.P. Back view of house. This stands on the site of the old Norman Manor.

9.—The Gables in Friday-street. The house on right was the old George Inn, dating from 1664. The other stands where the old Market House stood. The markets were held on Friday, hence the name Friday-street.

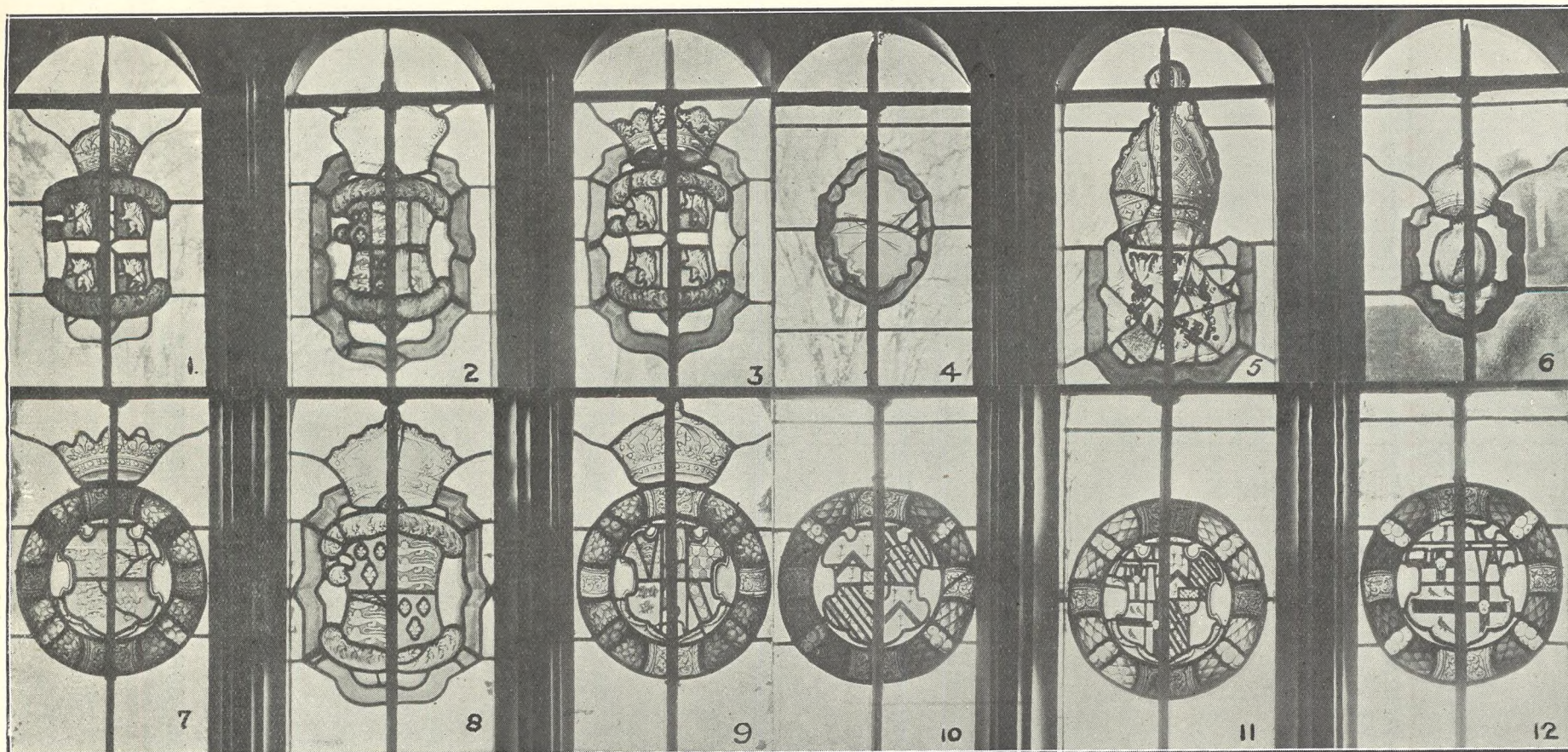

CAN THESE WINDOWS BE SAVED FOR GLOUCESTERSHIRE?

In our issue of last Saturday a letter appeared from Mr. W. St. Clair Baddeley, of Castle Hale, Painswick, asking for subscriptions towards buying some wonderful old Tudor stained glass panels now in situ at Prinknash Park, in order to preserve them for the County. The Dean of Gloucester has promised to allow them to be placed in a window in the Cathedral if they are thus bought. The glass has a most interesting history. It was placed in the same windows where it now is, some of it by Abbot Parker in memory of a visit there for two days of Henry VIII. and his Queen, Jane Seymour, and other by Dorothy Bray, the heiress of Henry VIII.'s old tutor, to whom Henry presented Prinknash on the Dissolution. This lady, Dorothy Bray, married Sir Edmund Brydges, of Coberley, son of Lord Chandos, of Sudeley. If not bought for the County by subscription, there is a probability that the glass will be sold and split up, some possibly even going to America. 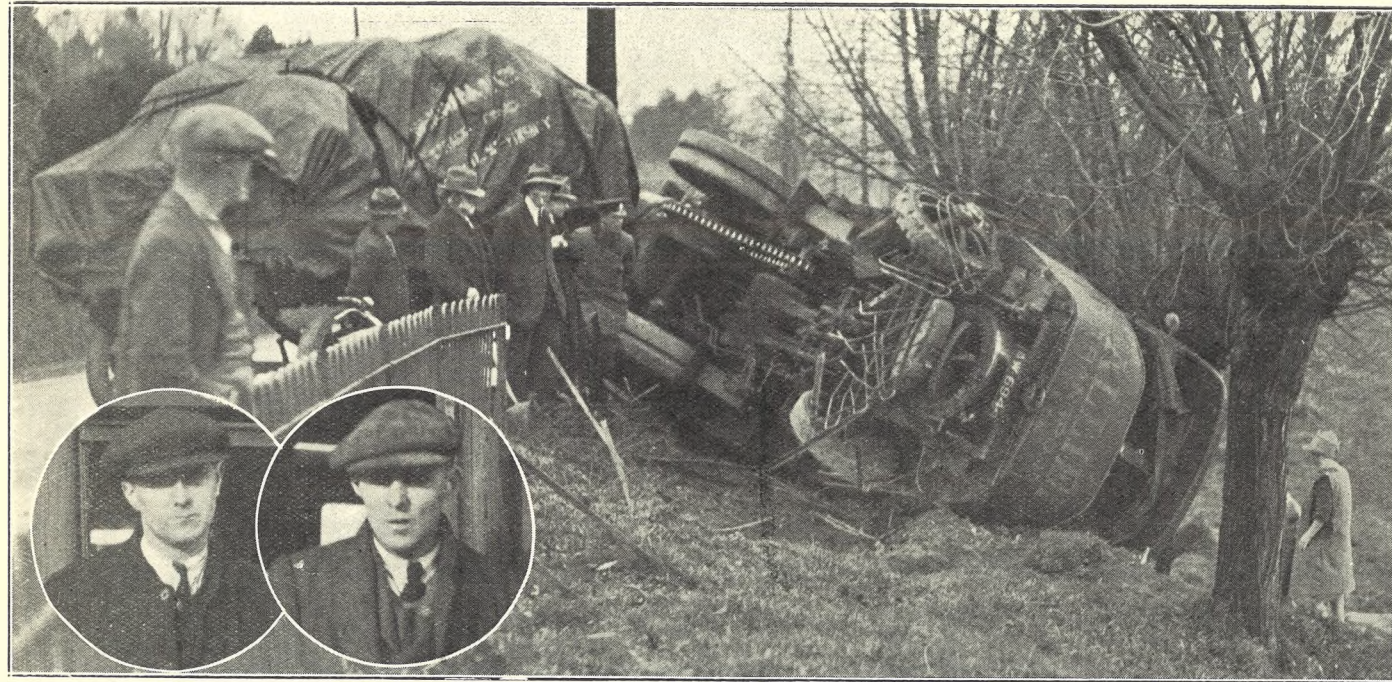

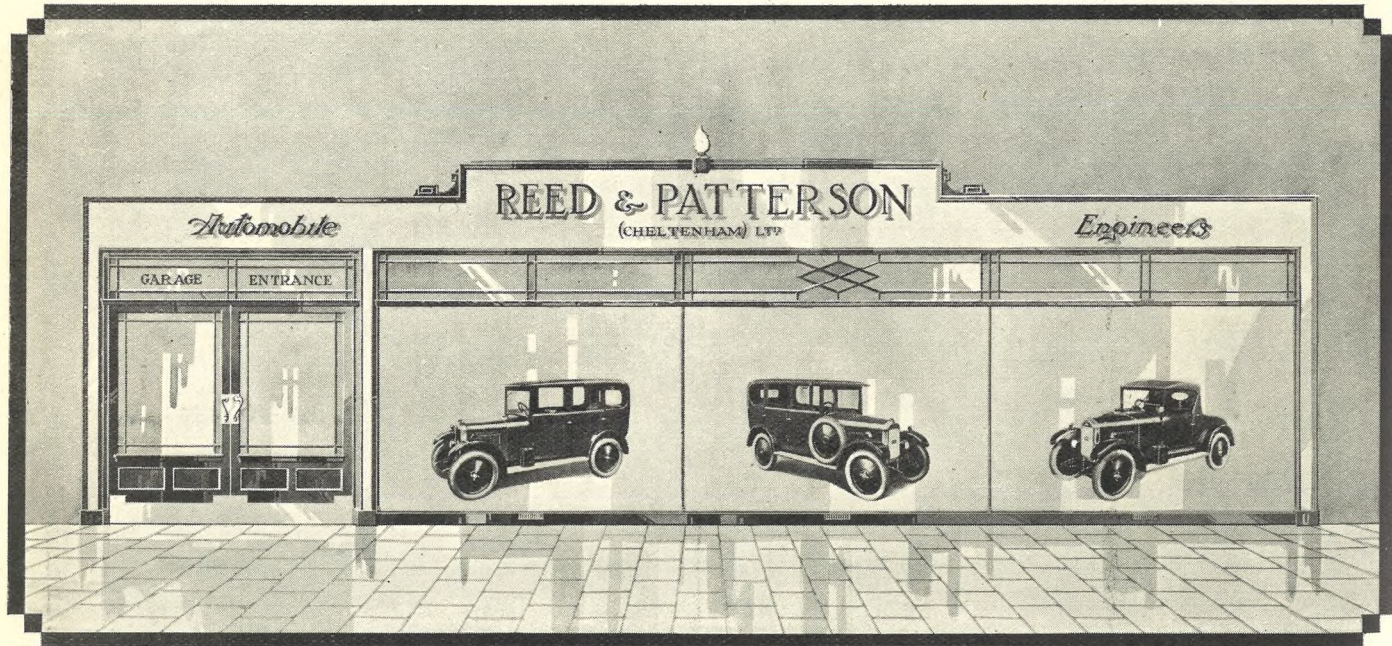

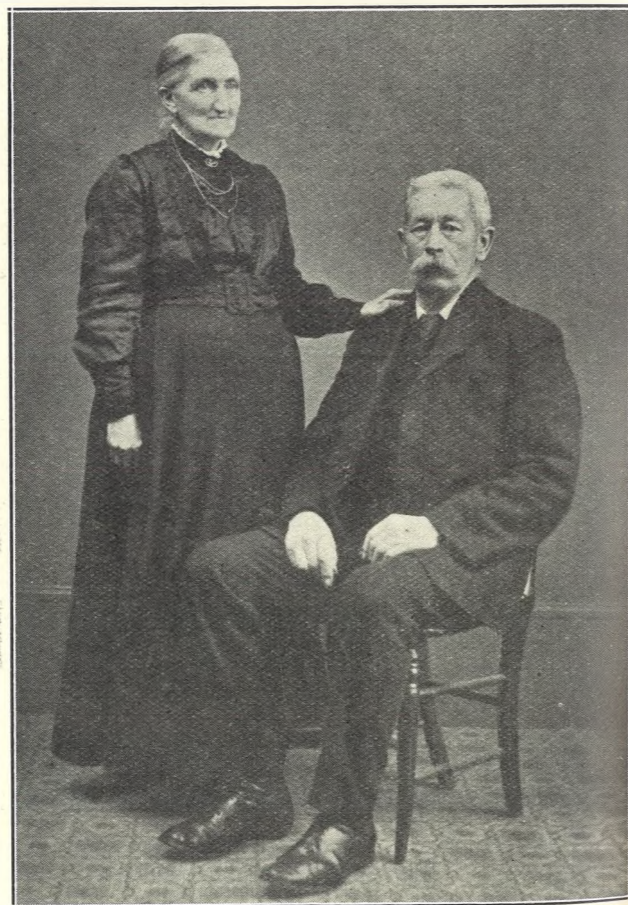

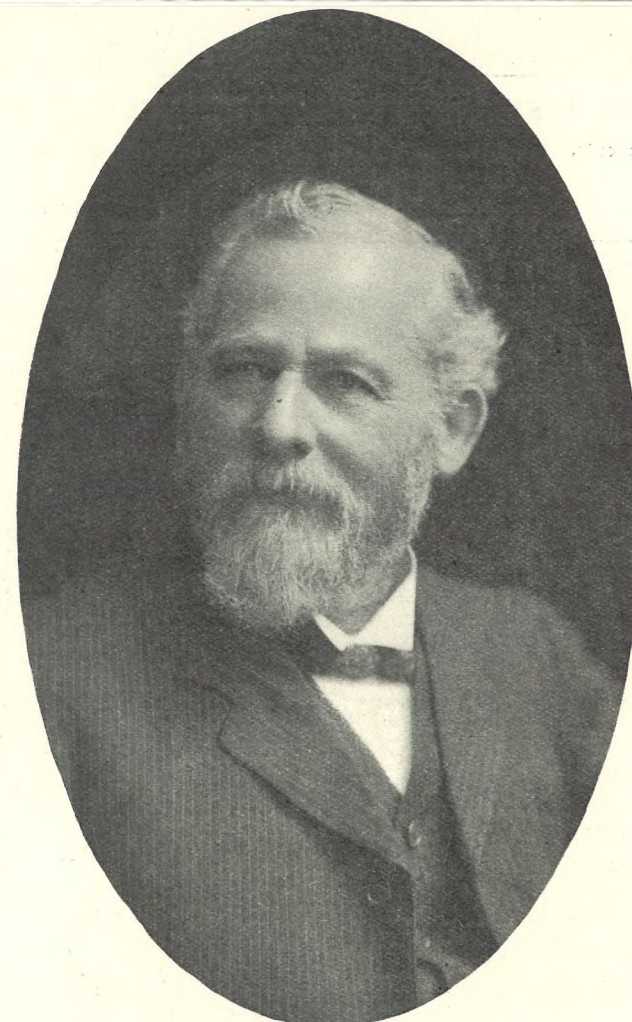

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE. — FRAMPTON-ON-SEVERN.

Frampton-on-Severn is a large and very beautiful village, and is comparatively little known, through lying in a cul-de-sac off the Gloucester and Bristol road. It is ten miles from Gloucester, and the lane which leads to it from the main road winds across the village green, takes you through the village to the Church, and ends abruptly. It is most interesting. It has the largest village green in England, comprising 22 acres, and is known as Rosamond's Green, for in the wonderful old, half-timbered house known as Manor Farm, tradition asserts that "Fair Rosamond," or Rosamond Clifford, the famous mistress of Henry II., was born. The collateral descendants of the Clifford family still live at the Court and Grange.

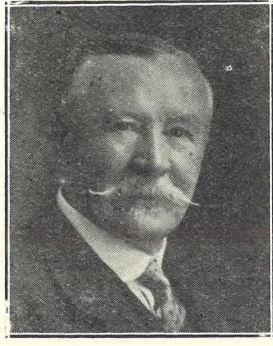

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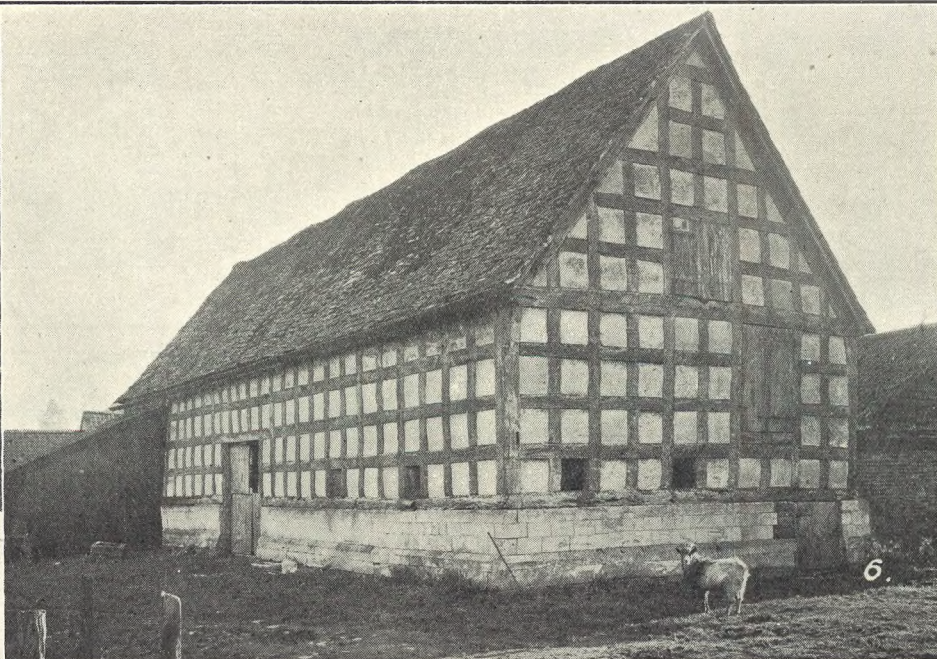
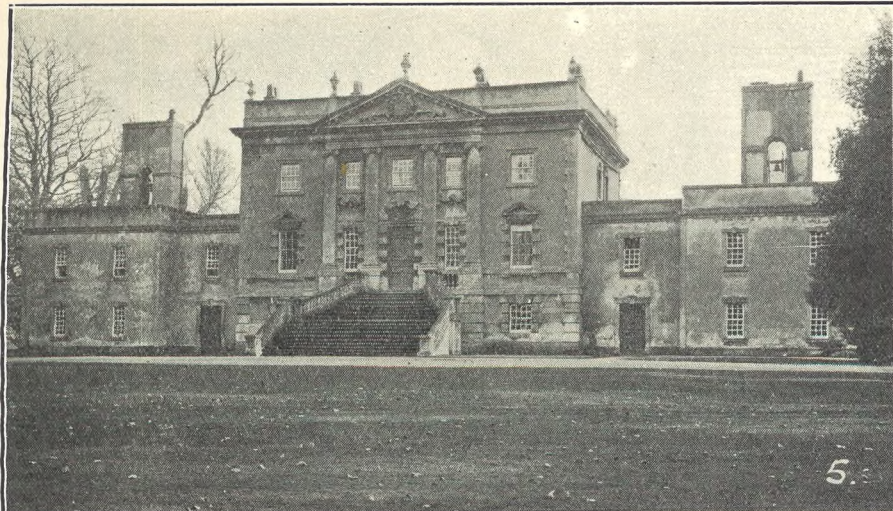
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—FRAMPTON-ON-SEVERN.

There are few villages in which will be found such fine and historic old houses as are at Frampton. Besides the fine old Manor Farm, illustrated on No. 2 and 3, there is a fine Georgian house on the opposite side of the Green, which was built by Richard Clutterbuck in 1731. Rudder in his History (1779) says "it is built on the very site of the antient family mansion of the Cliffords," which would disprove the fact that "Fair Rosamond" was born at the Manor Farm. The Clifford family still own the Court and live there. The same Richard Clutterbuck drained the green and made the gravel road across it.

7.—Thatched and whitewashed cottages in Frampton.

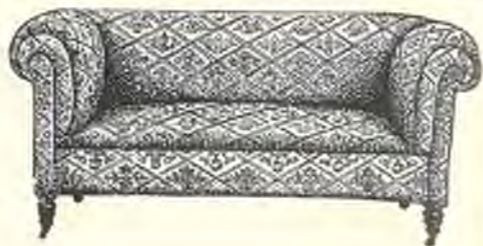

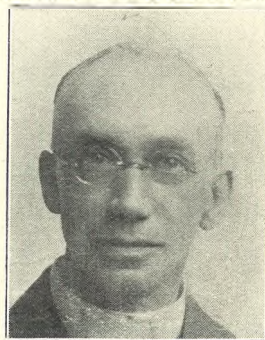

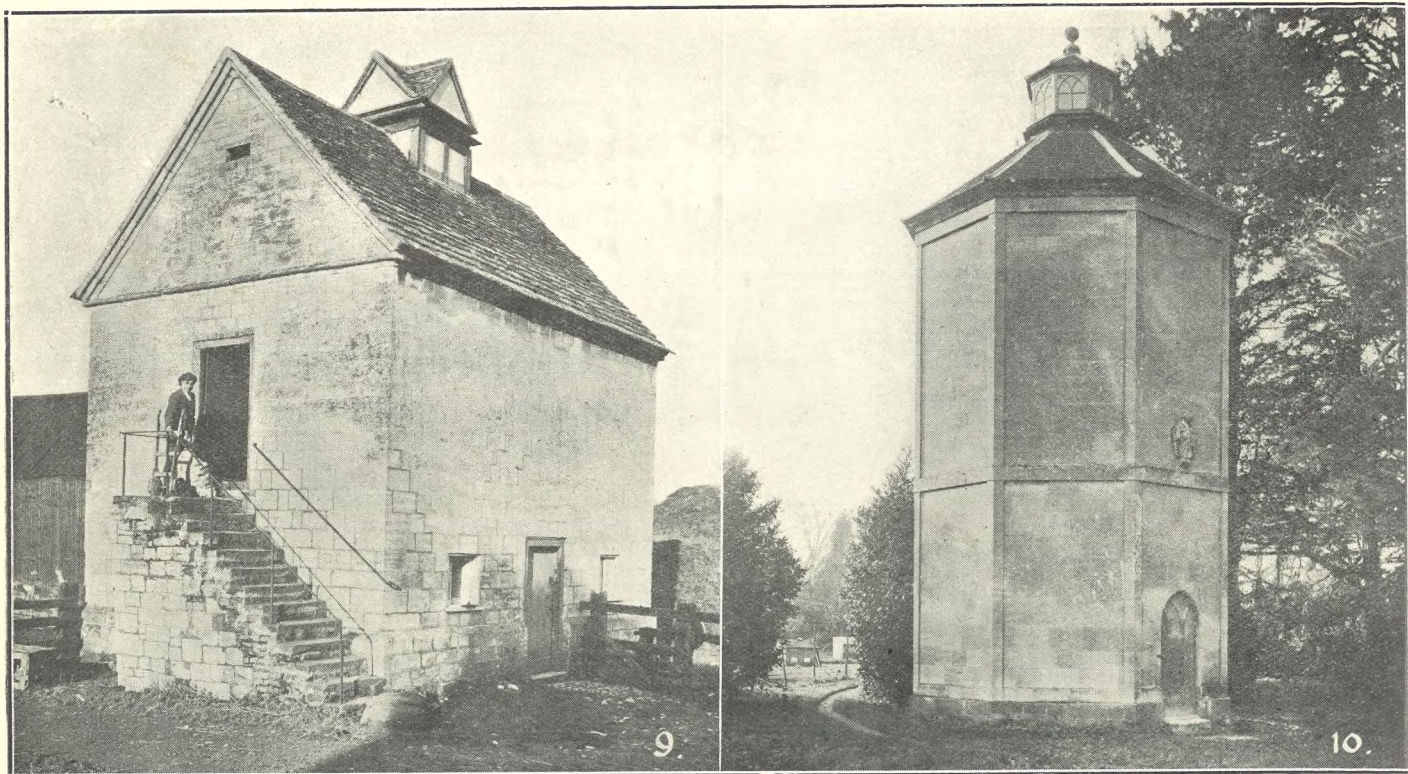

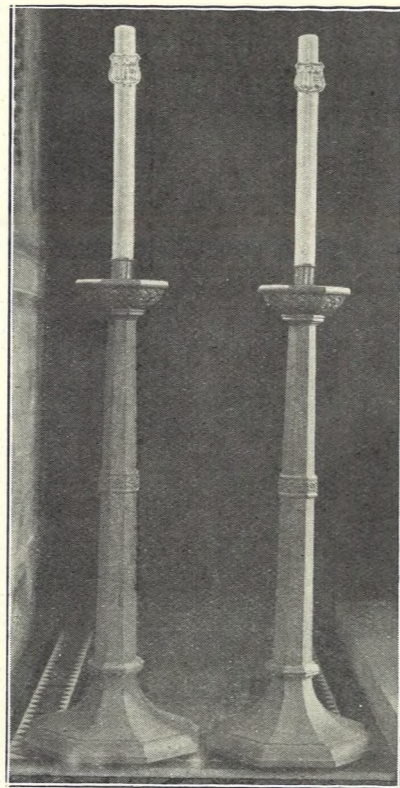

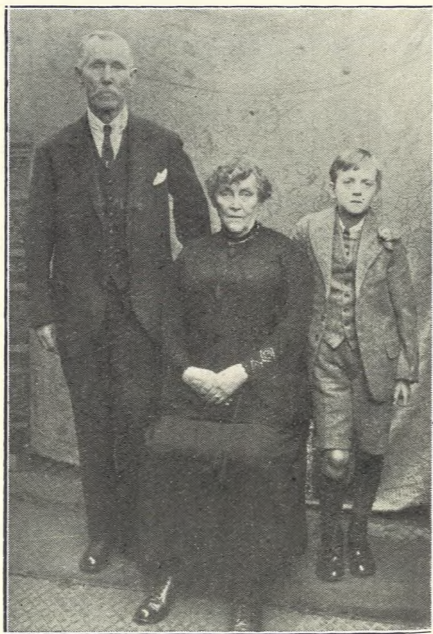

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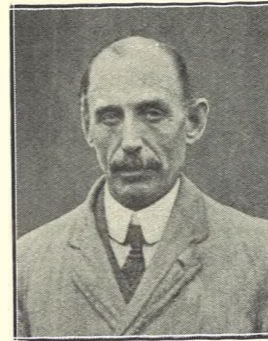


GLOUCESTER v. CHELTENHAM AT RUGBY FOOTBALL.

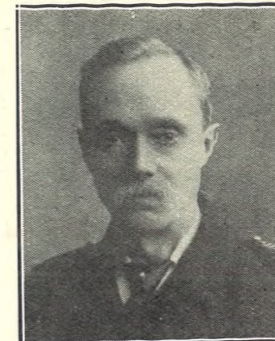
