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





CAN THESE WINDOWS BE SAVED FOR CLOUCESTERSHIRE?

In our issue of last Saturday a letter appeared from Mr. W. St. Clair Baddeley, of Castle Hale, Painswick, asking for subscriptions towards buying some wonderful old Tudor stained glass panels now in situ at Prinknash Park, in order to preserve them for the County. The Dean of Gloucester has promised to allow them to be placed in a window in the Cathedral If they are thus bought. The glass has a most interesting history. It was placed in the same windows where it now is, some of it by Abbot Parker in memory of a visit there for two days of Henry VIII. and his Queen, Jane Seymour, and other by Dorothy Bray, the heiress of Henry VIII.'s oid tutor, to whom Henry presented Prinknash on the Dissolution. This lady, Dorothy Bray, married Sir Edmund Brydges, of Coberley, son of Lord Chandes, of Sudeley. If not bought for the County by subscription, there is a probability that the glass will be sold and split up, some possibly even going to America. The description of the panels by Mr. St. Clair Baddeley is as follows:-



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

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





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
