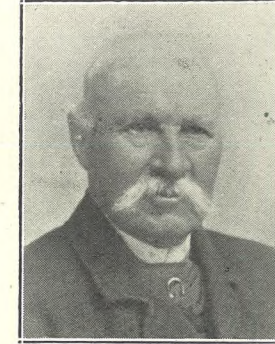
MR. J. W. WILLIS-BUND,

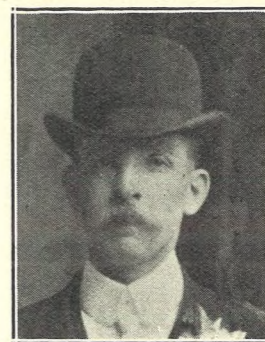

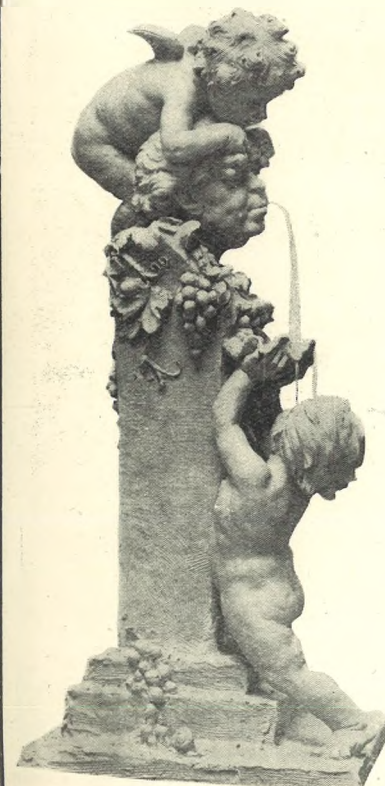
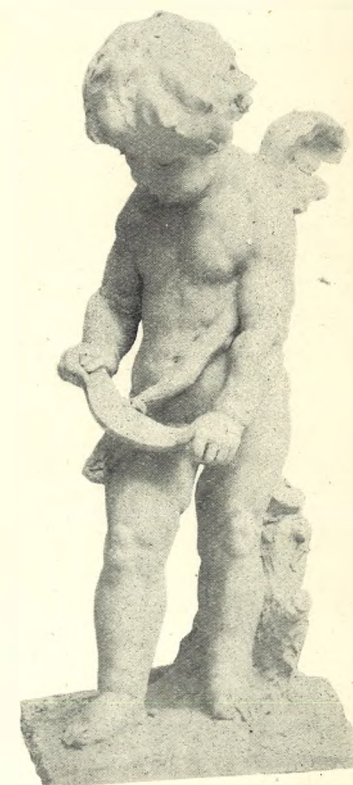

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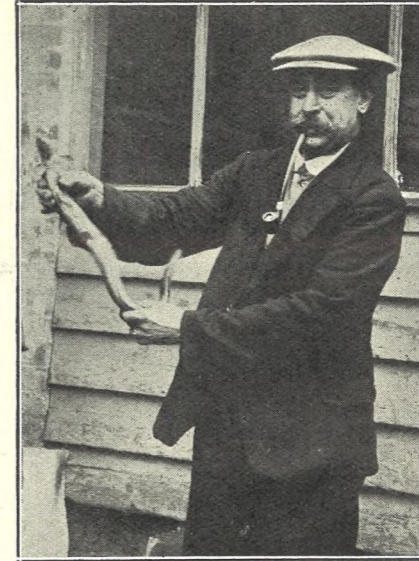
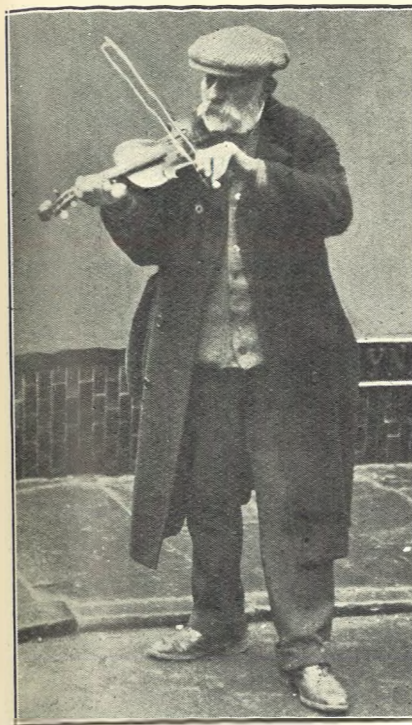


FUNERAL OF THE LATE MRS. LANGLEY-SMITH AT GLOUCESTER.

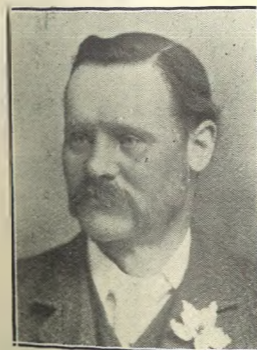


AN UNUSUAL CATCH ON THE HIGH ROAD.

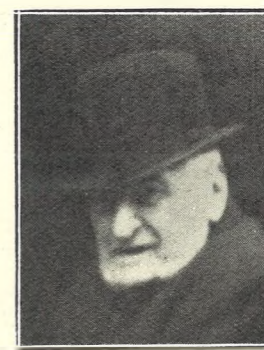

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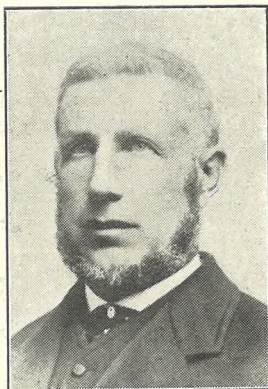
