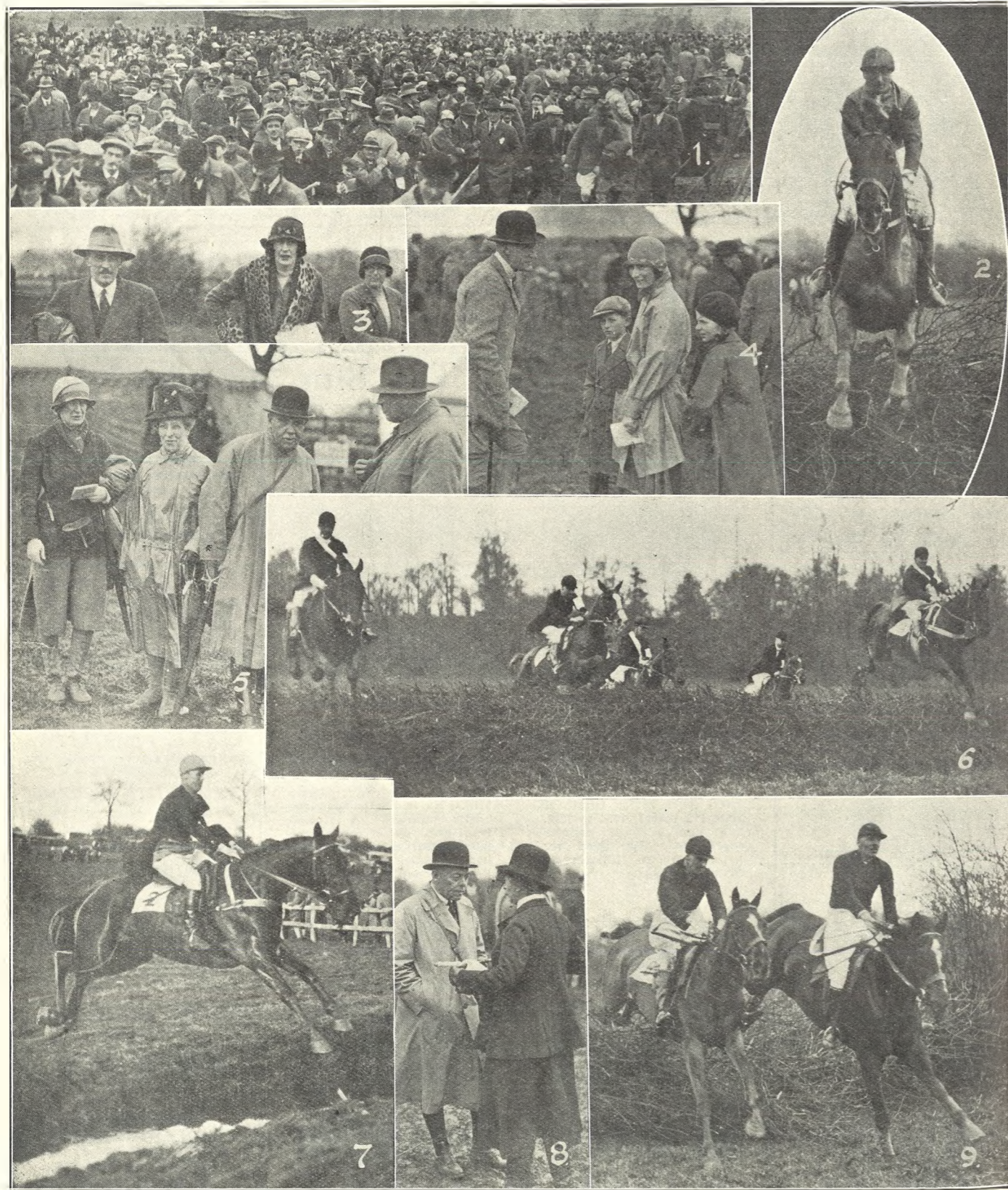

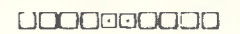

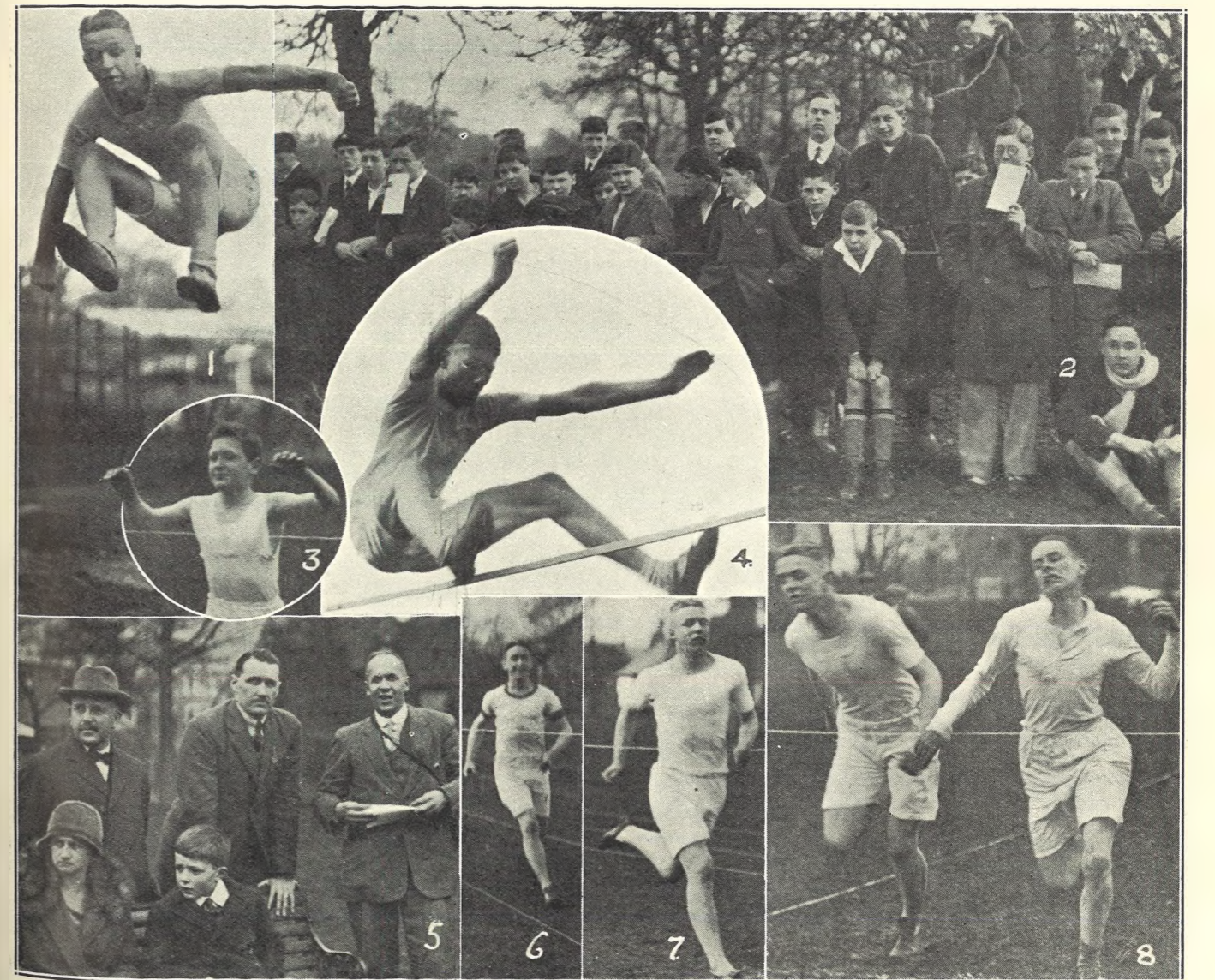

THE AVENING VILLAGE SCANDAL: SCENES AT THE ENQUIRY.

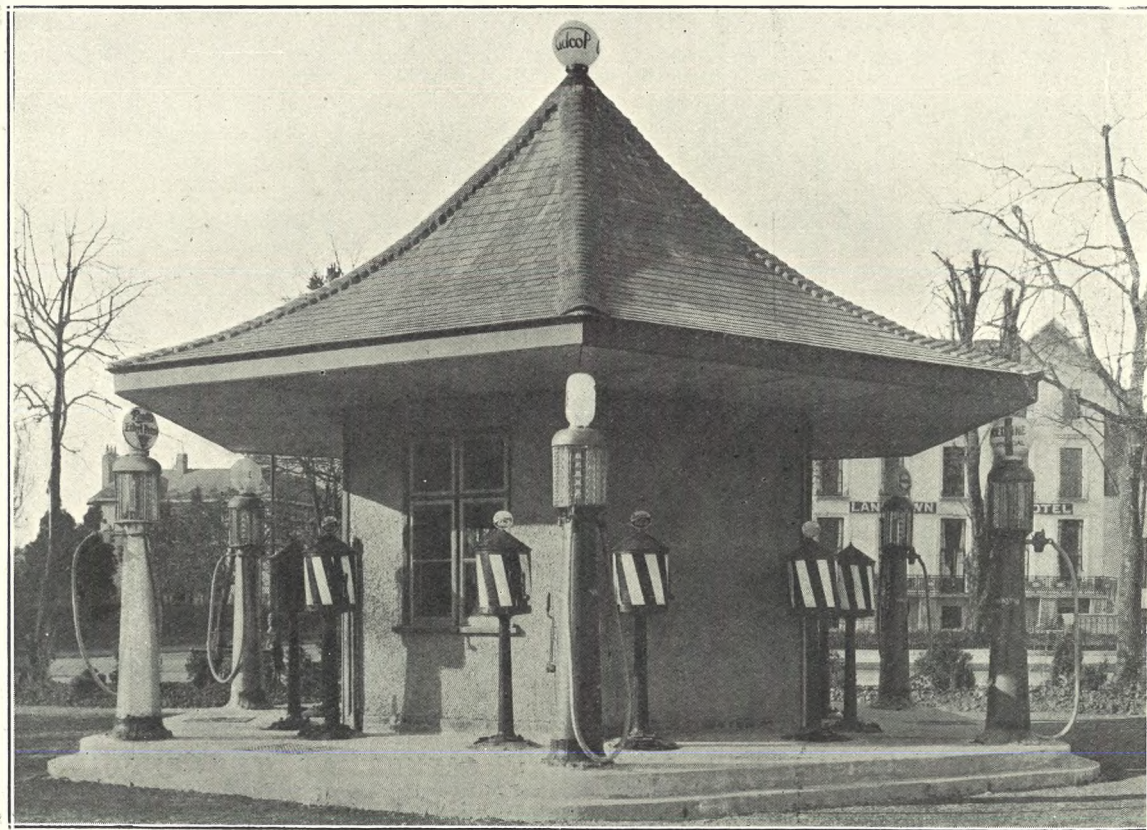

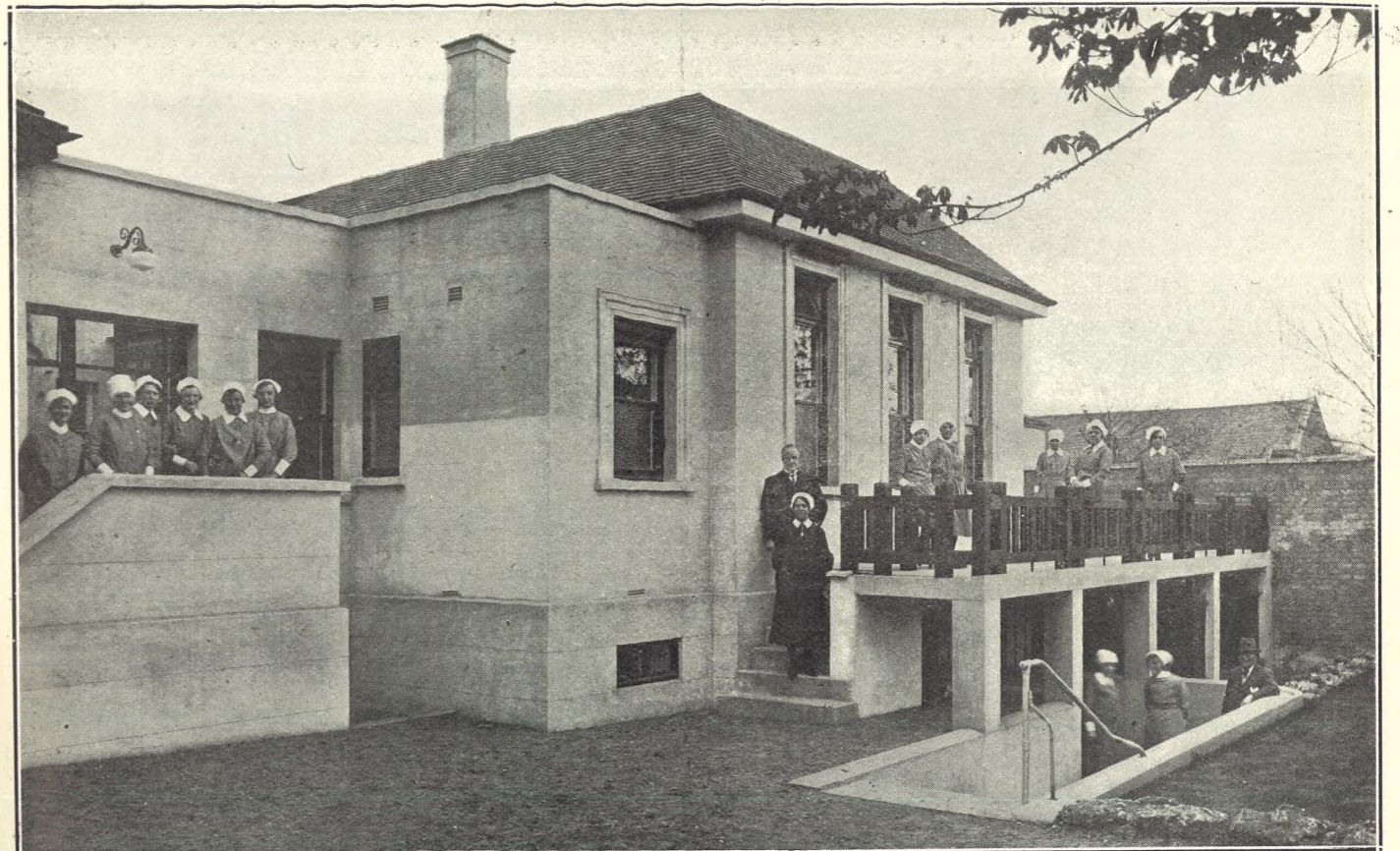

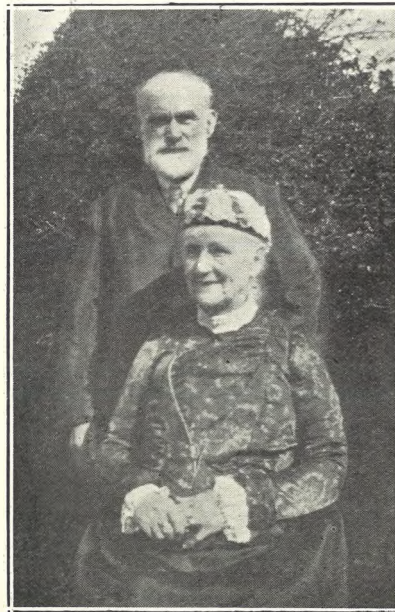

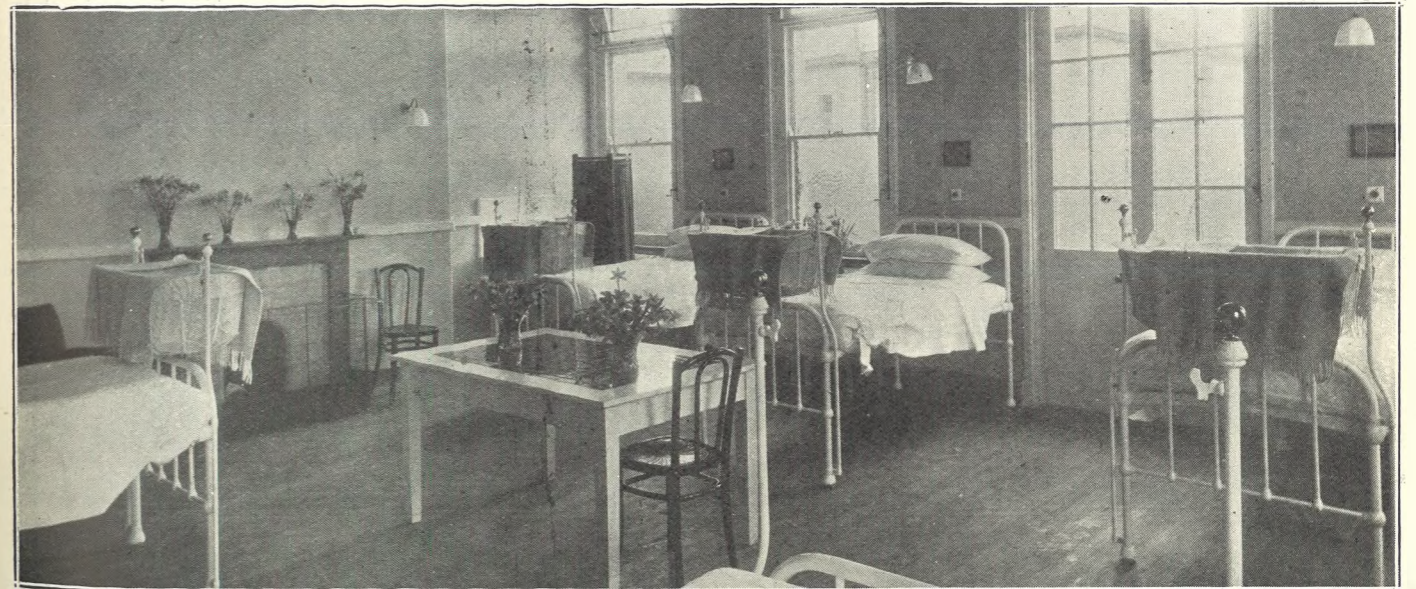
