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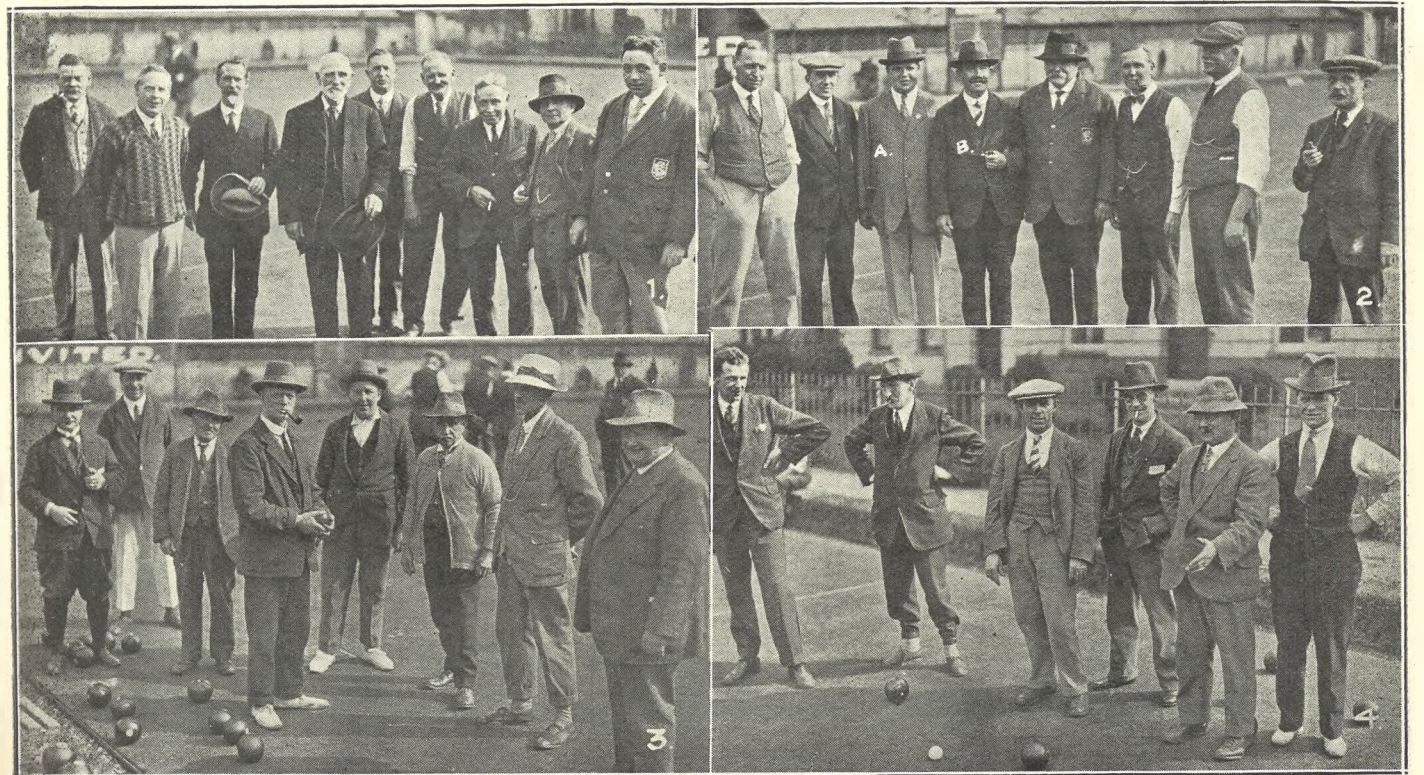


LICENSED VICTUALLERS' ANNUAL CONFERENCE IN CHELTENHAM.

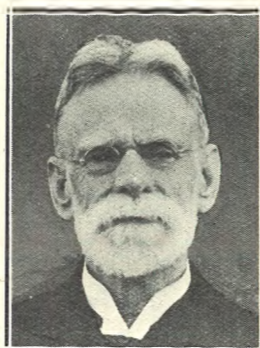

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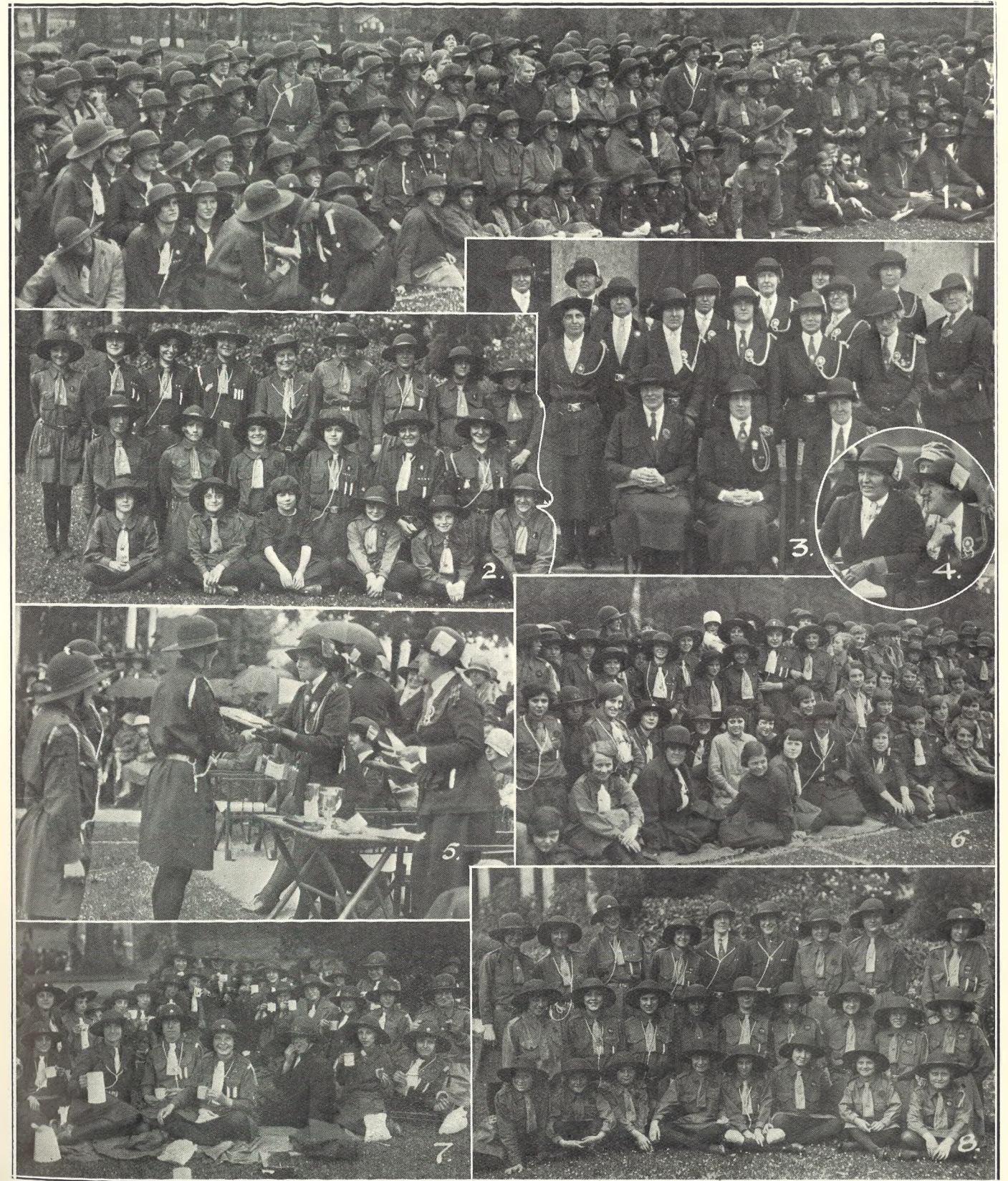

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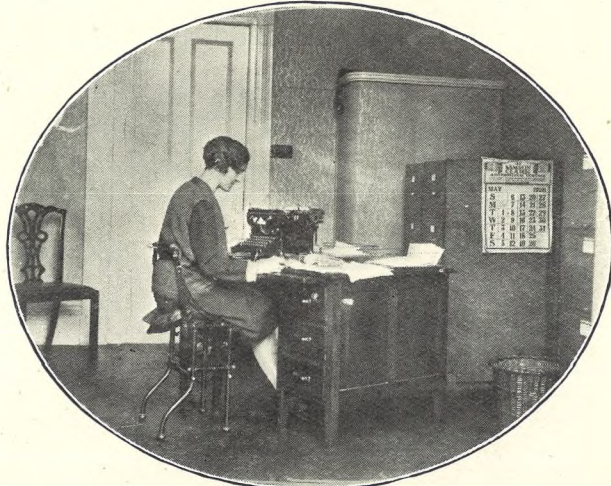

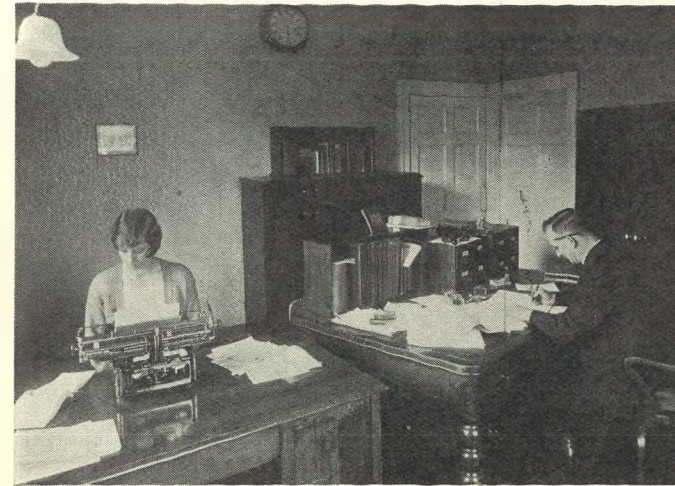

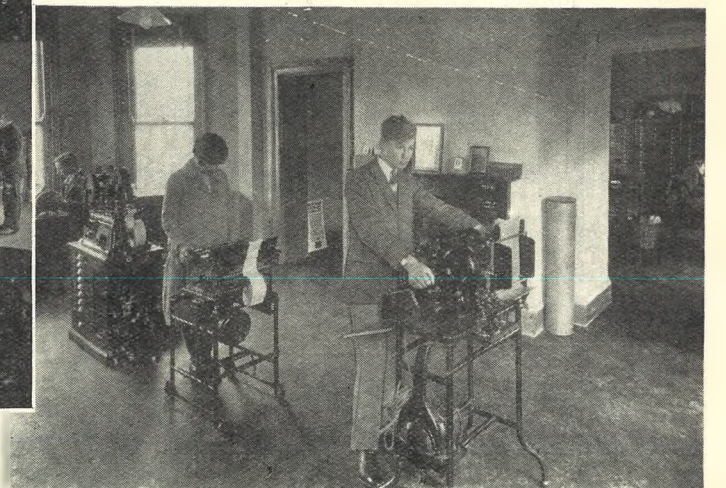

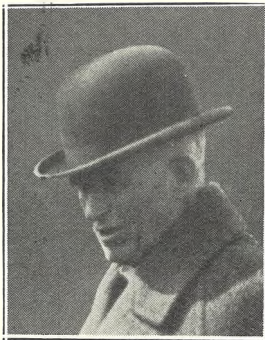
