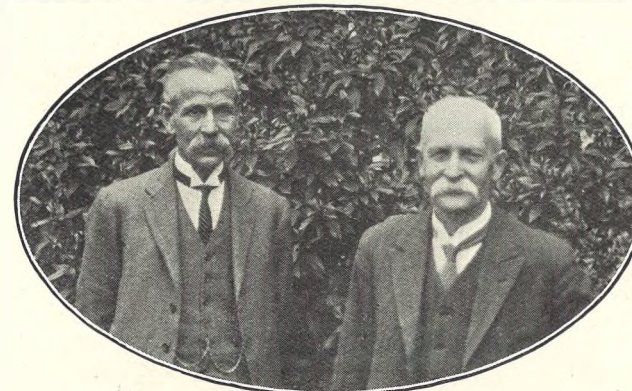

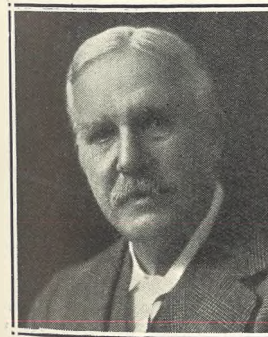


Stroud Cricket Team v. Cheltenham, May 26, 1928.

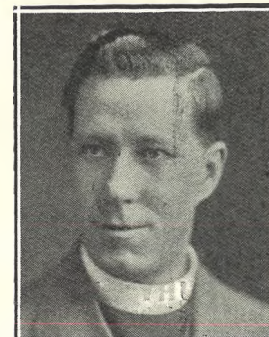

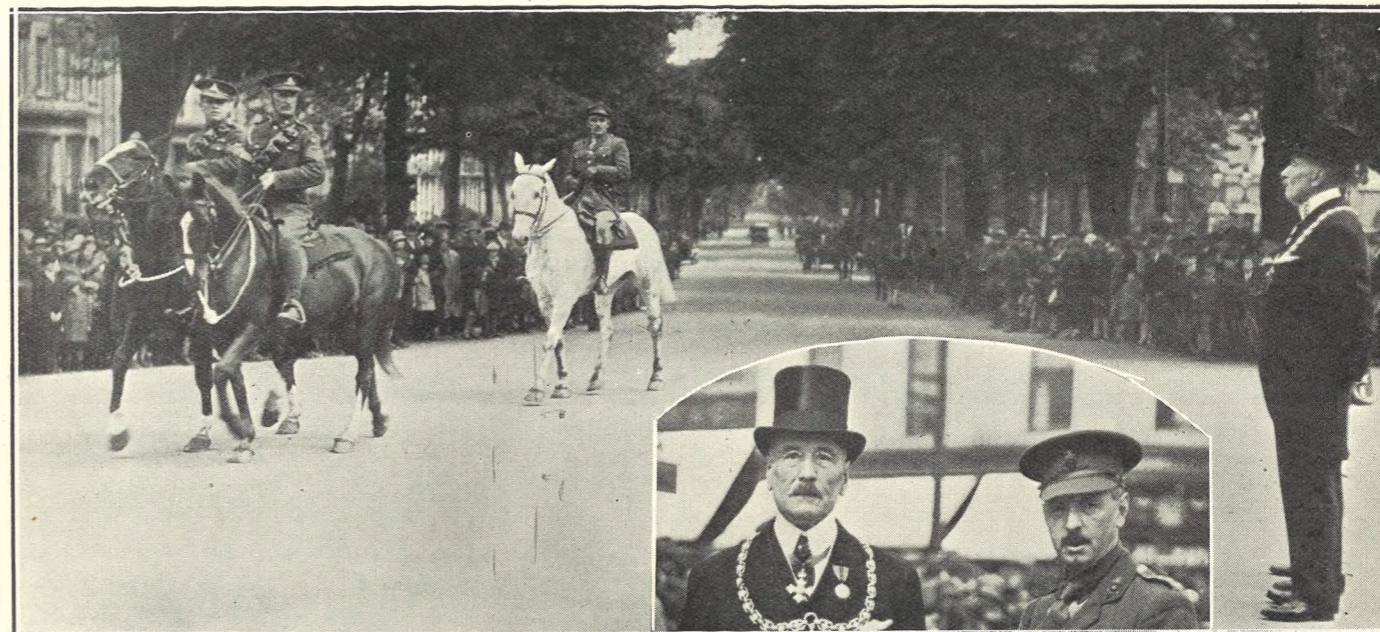

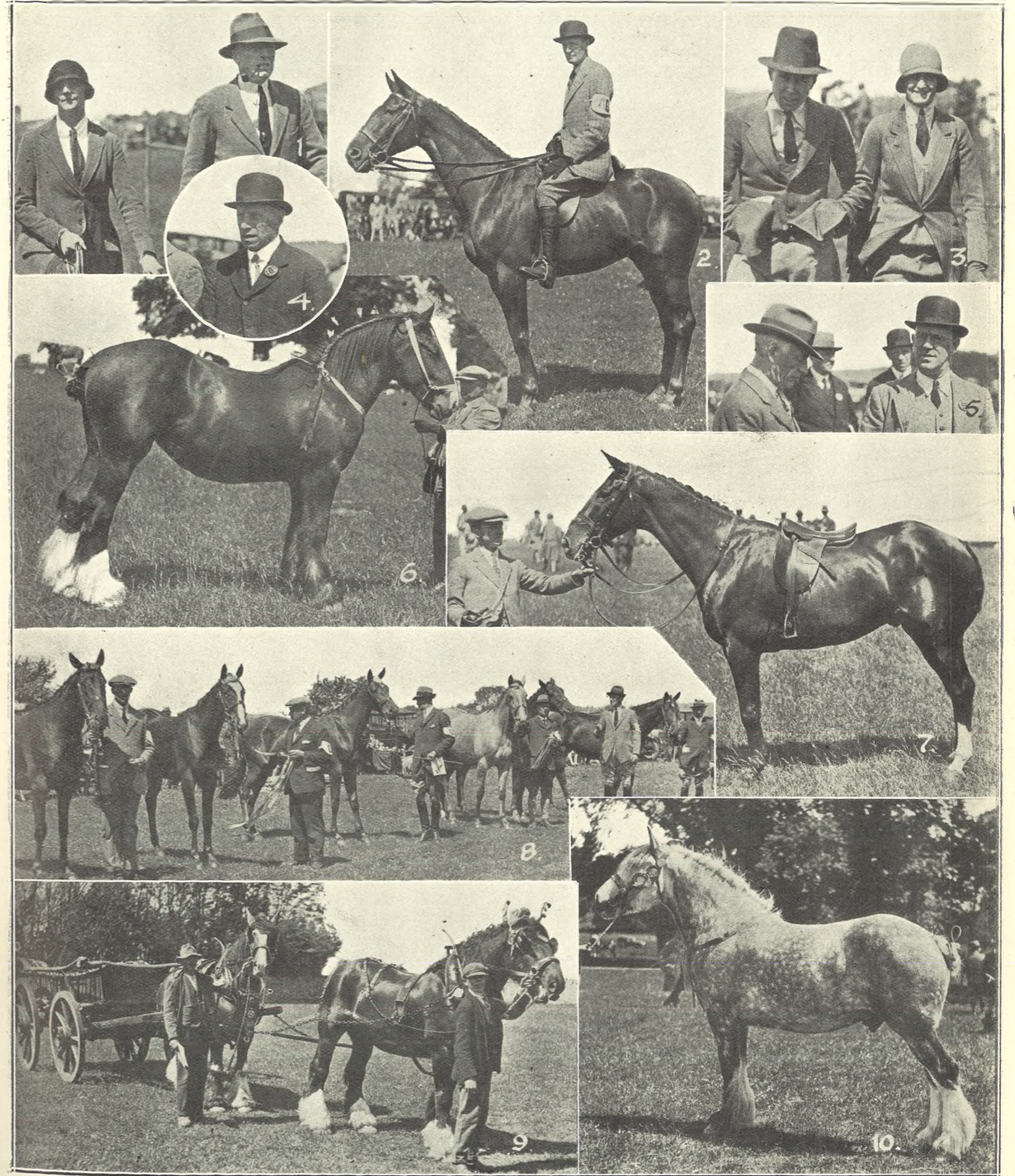

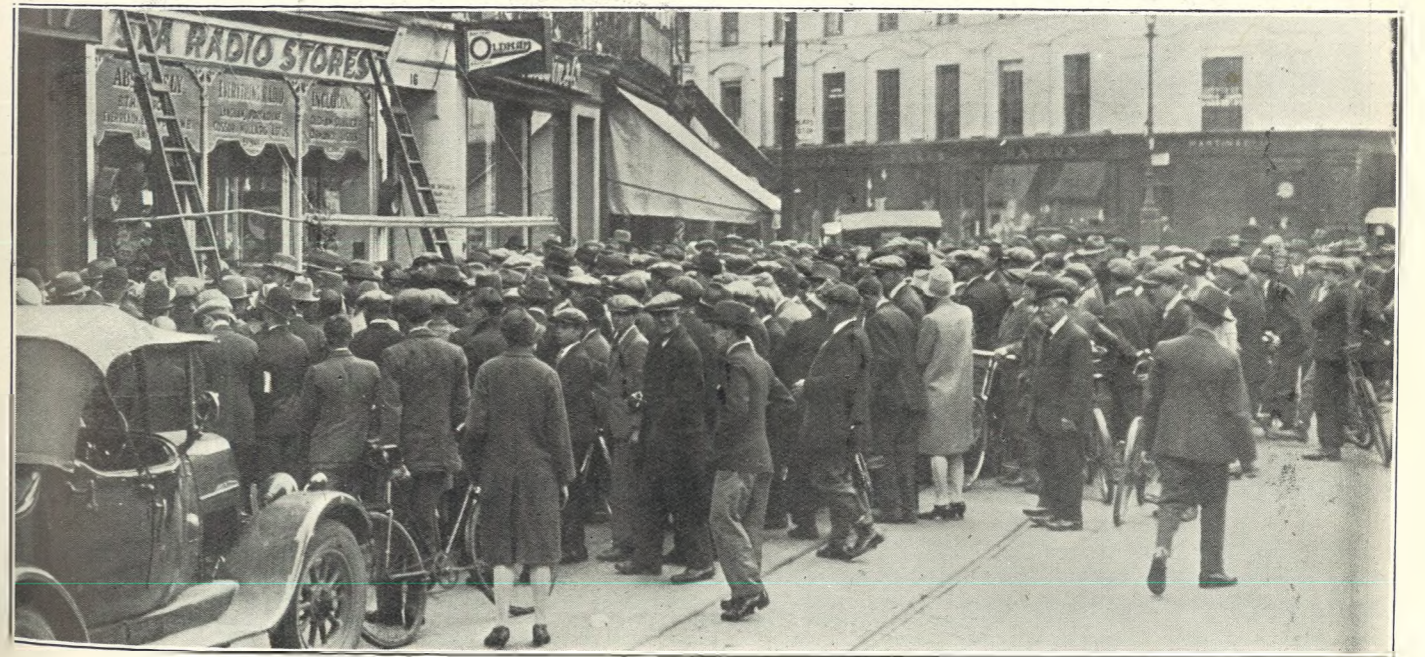


SALVATION ARMY FUNERAL IN CHELTENHAM.

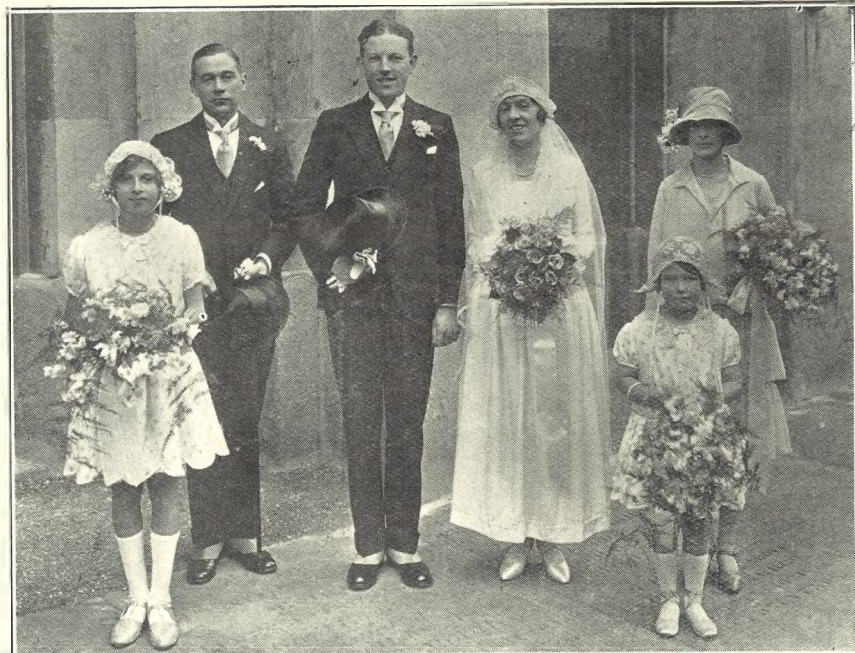

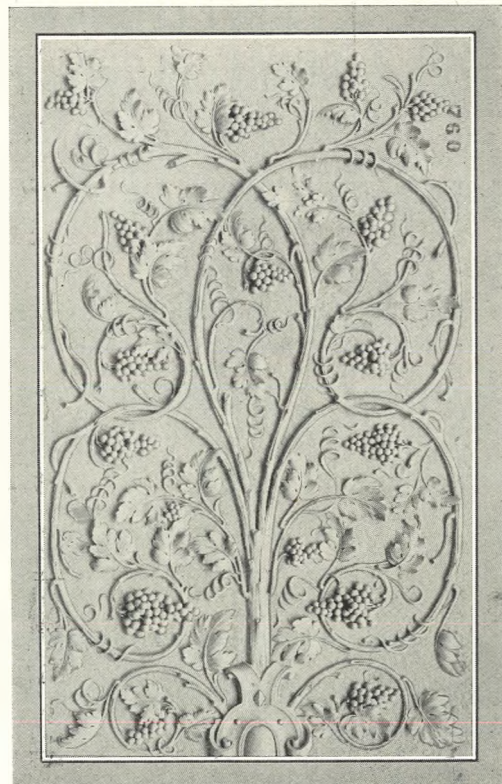

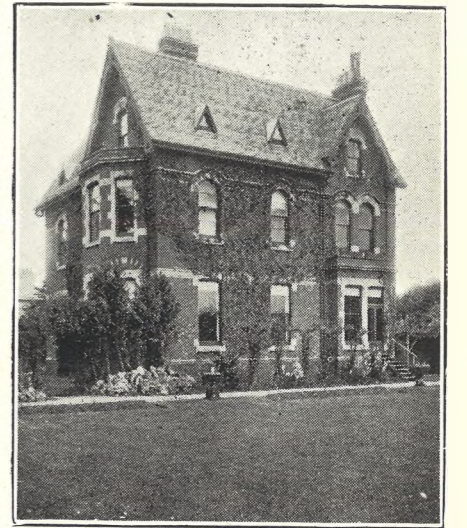

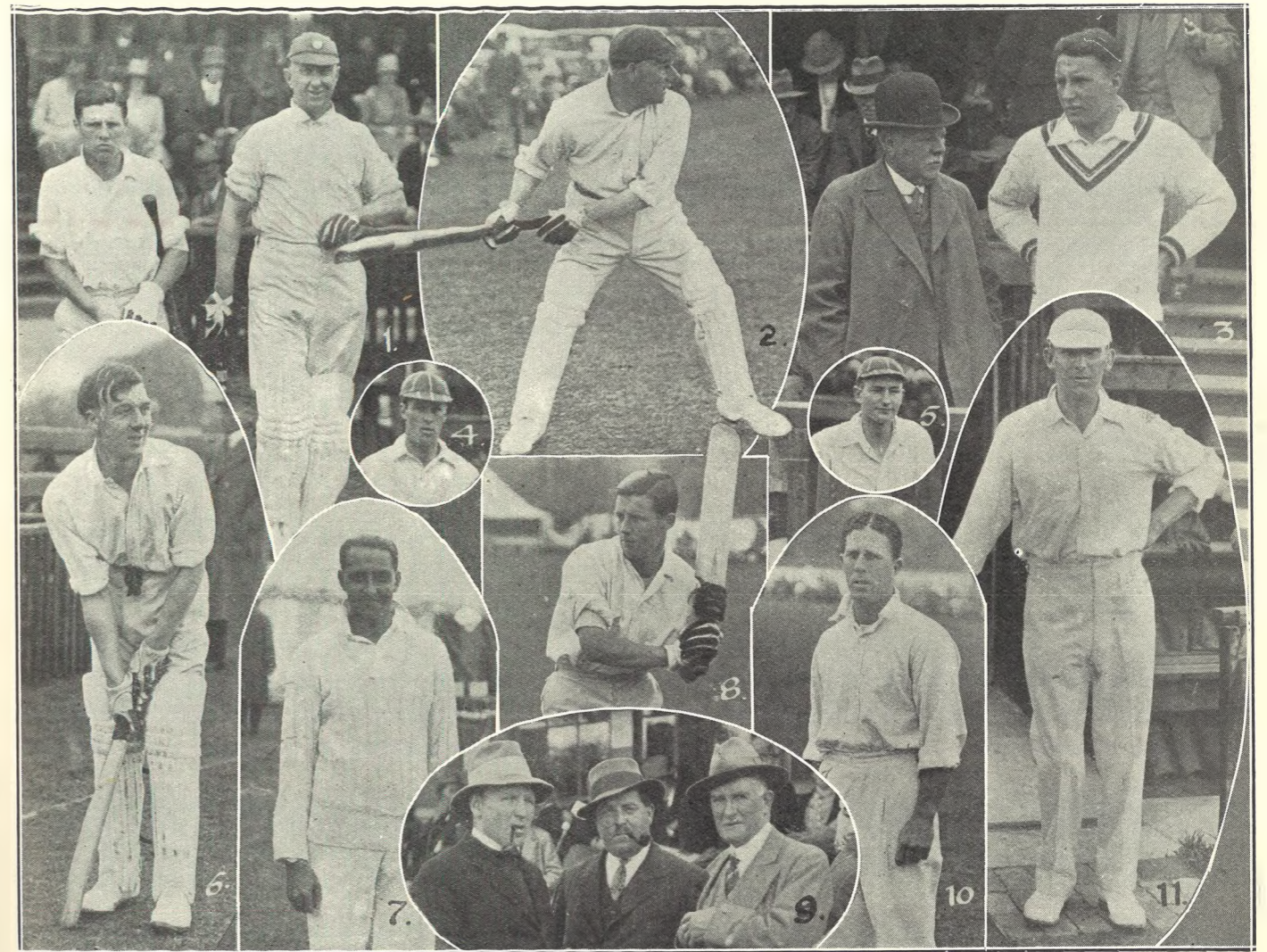

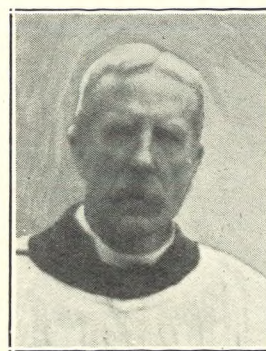

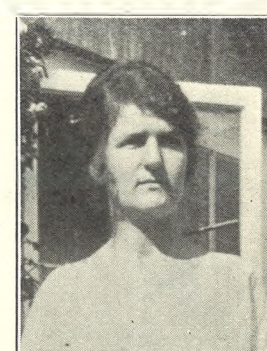
MR. V. A. LAWSON,
