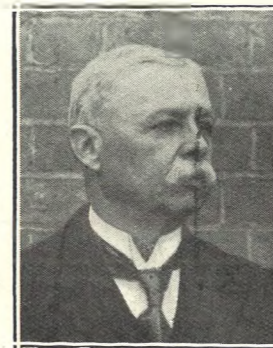

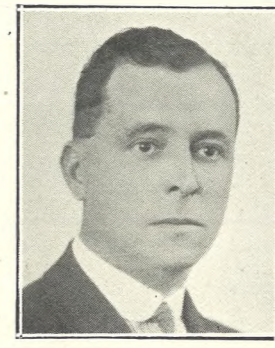

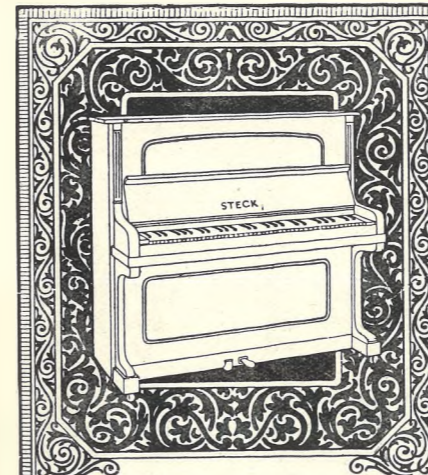
MR. WM. BROWN,

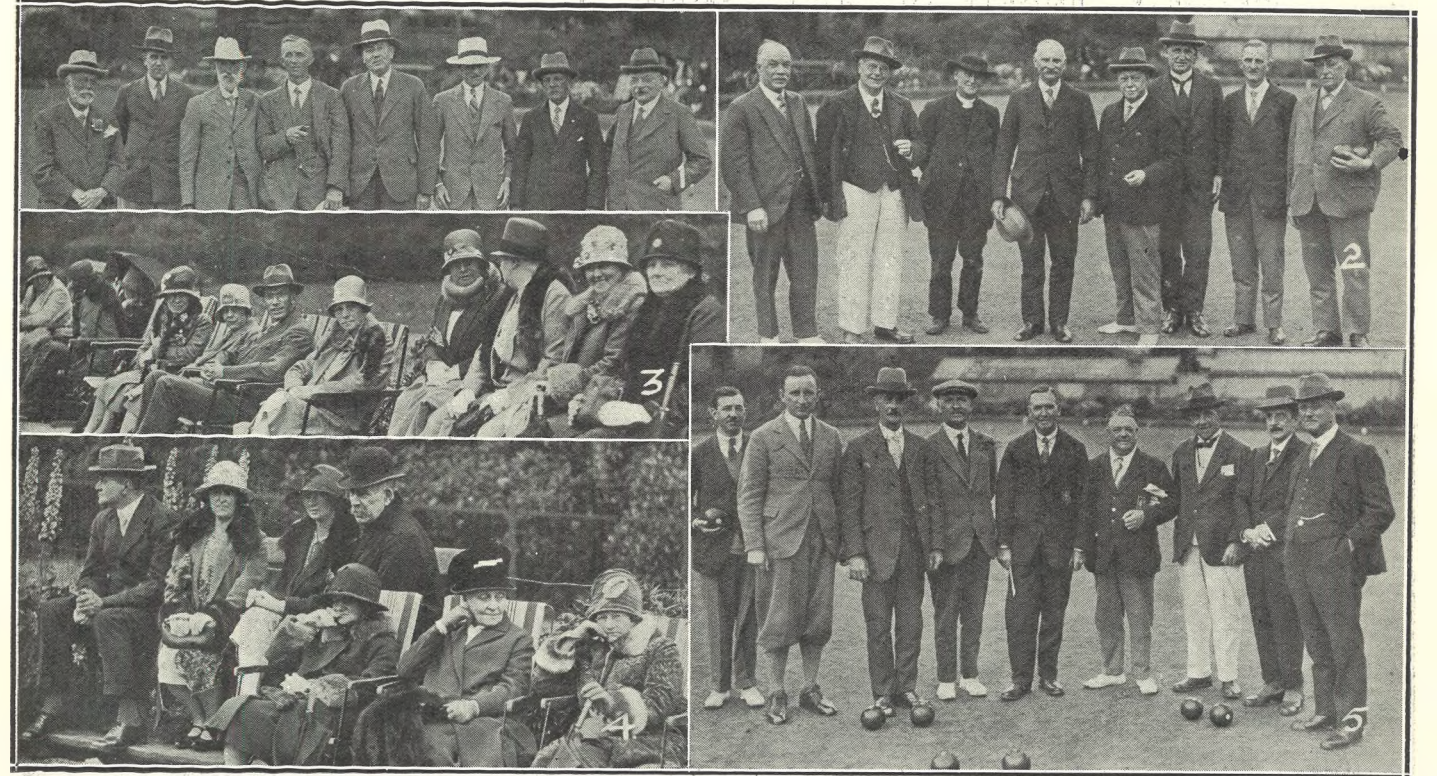

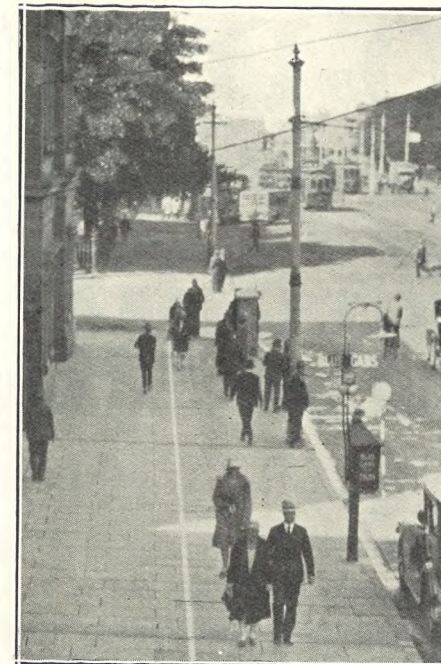

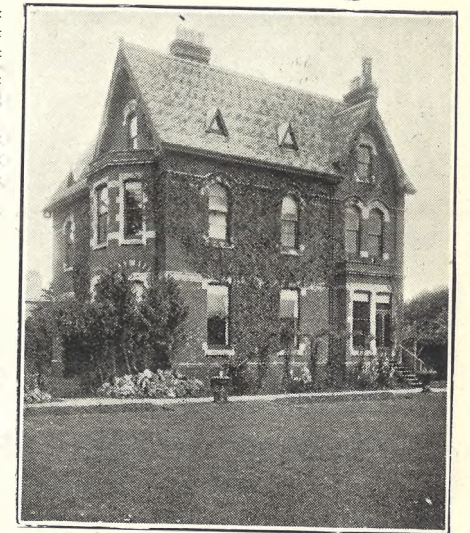
REV. A. R. WINNINGTON-INGRAM,

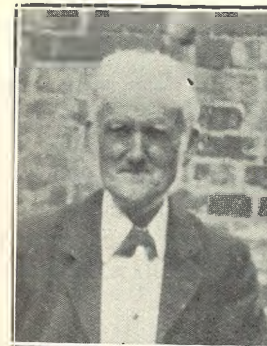

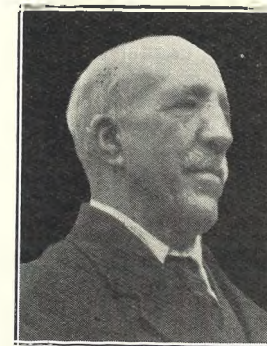
WHITE LINE FOR PEDESTRIAN TRAFFIC

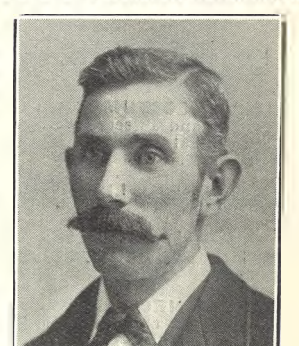
MR. JESSE BEDFORD,

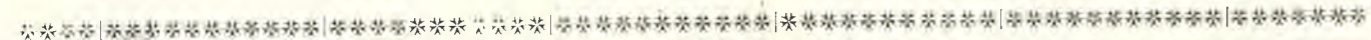

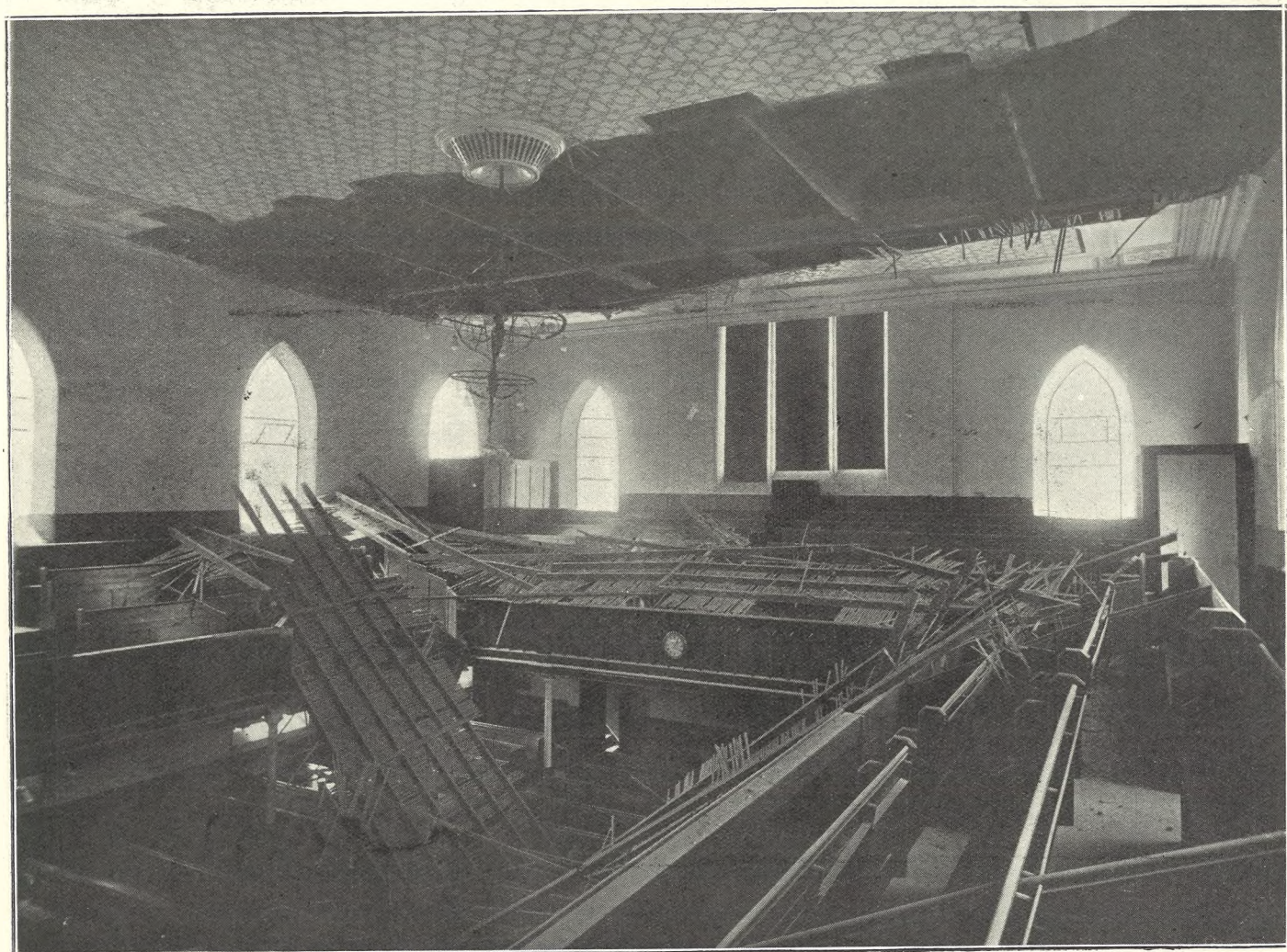

DIAMOND WEDDING IN CHELTENHAM.

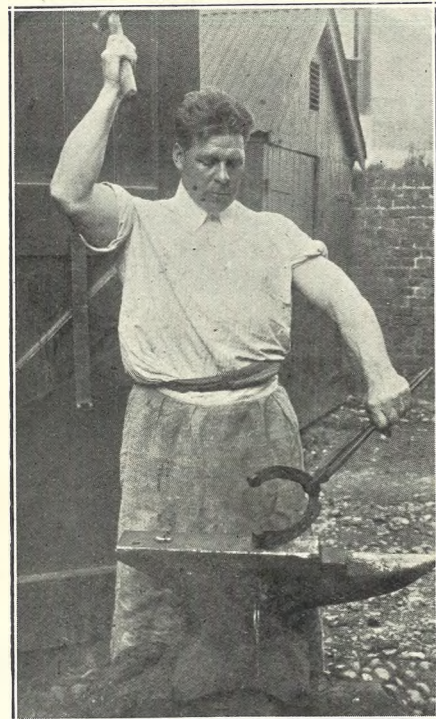

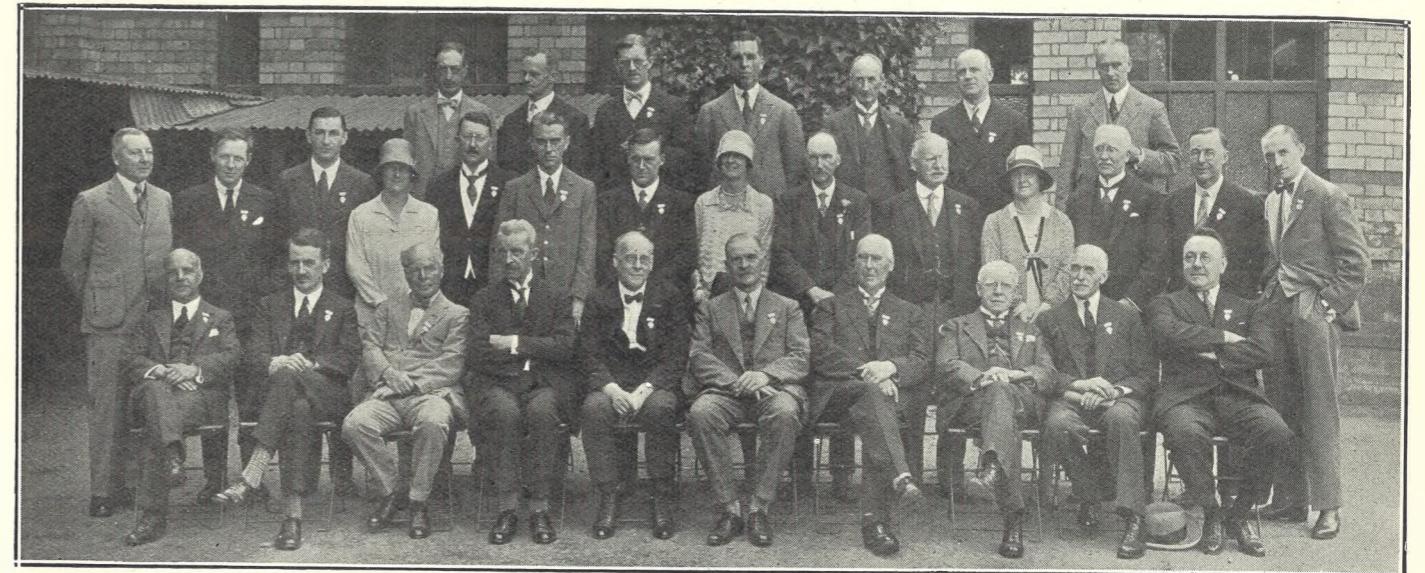
