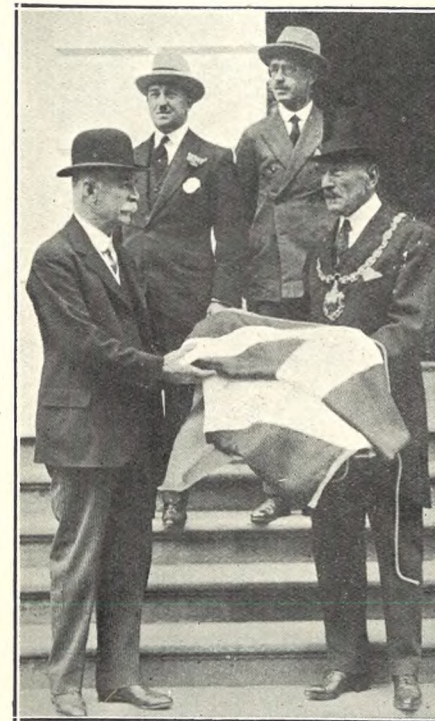

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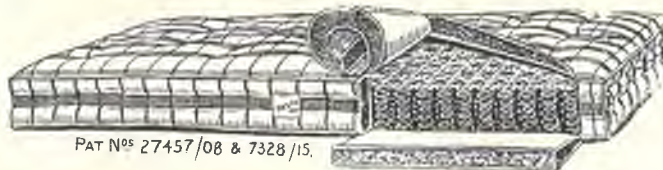


OFF TO THE ANTIPODES.

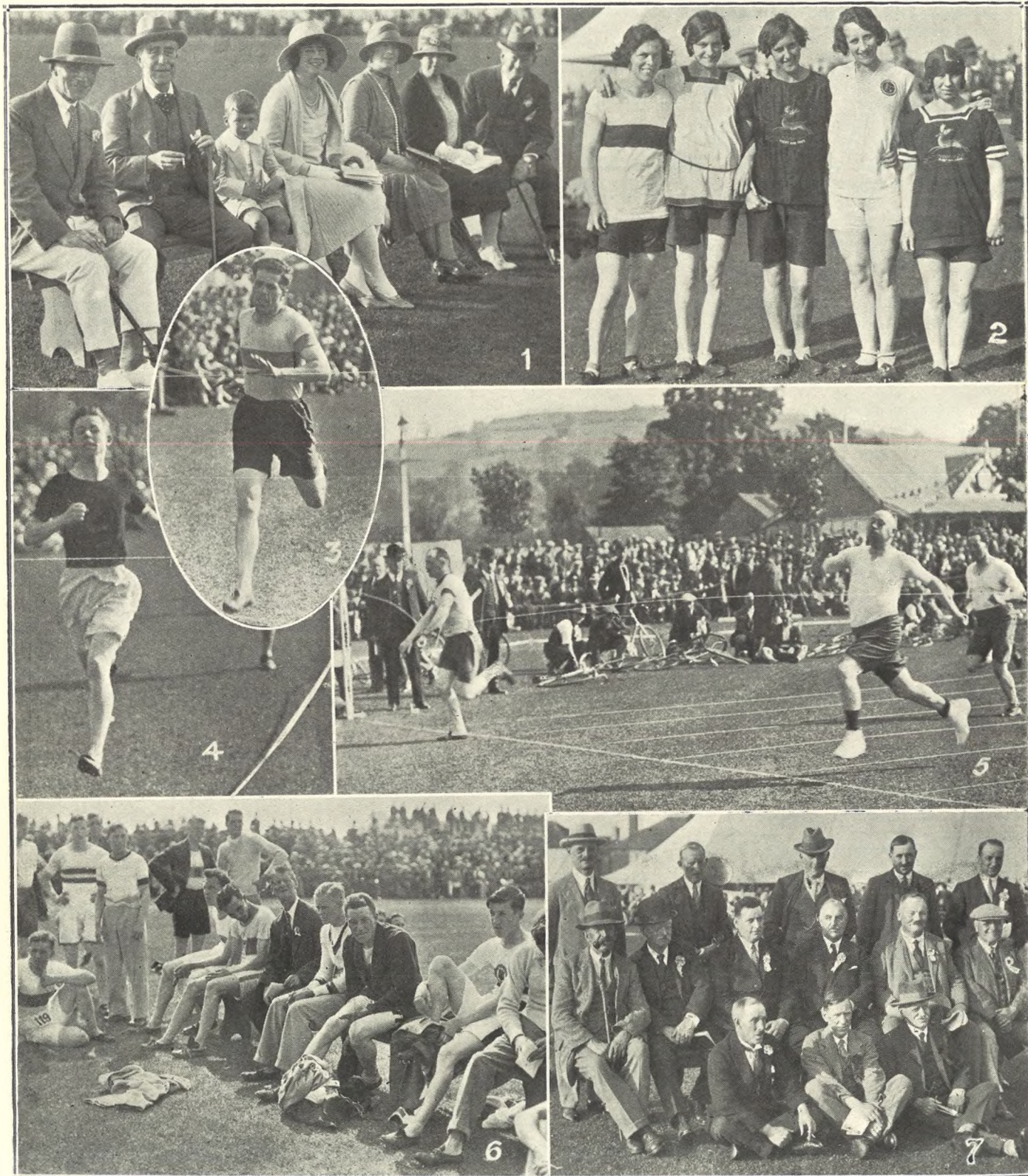

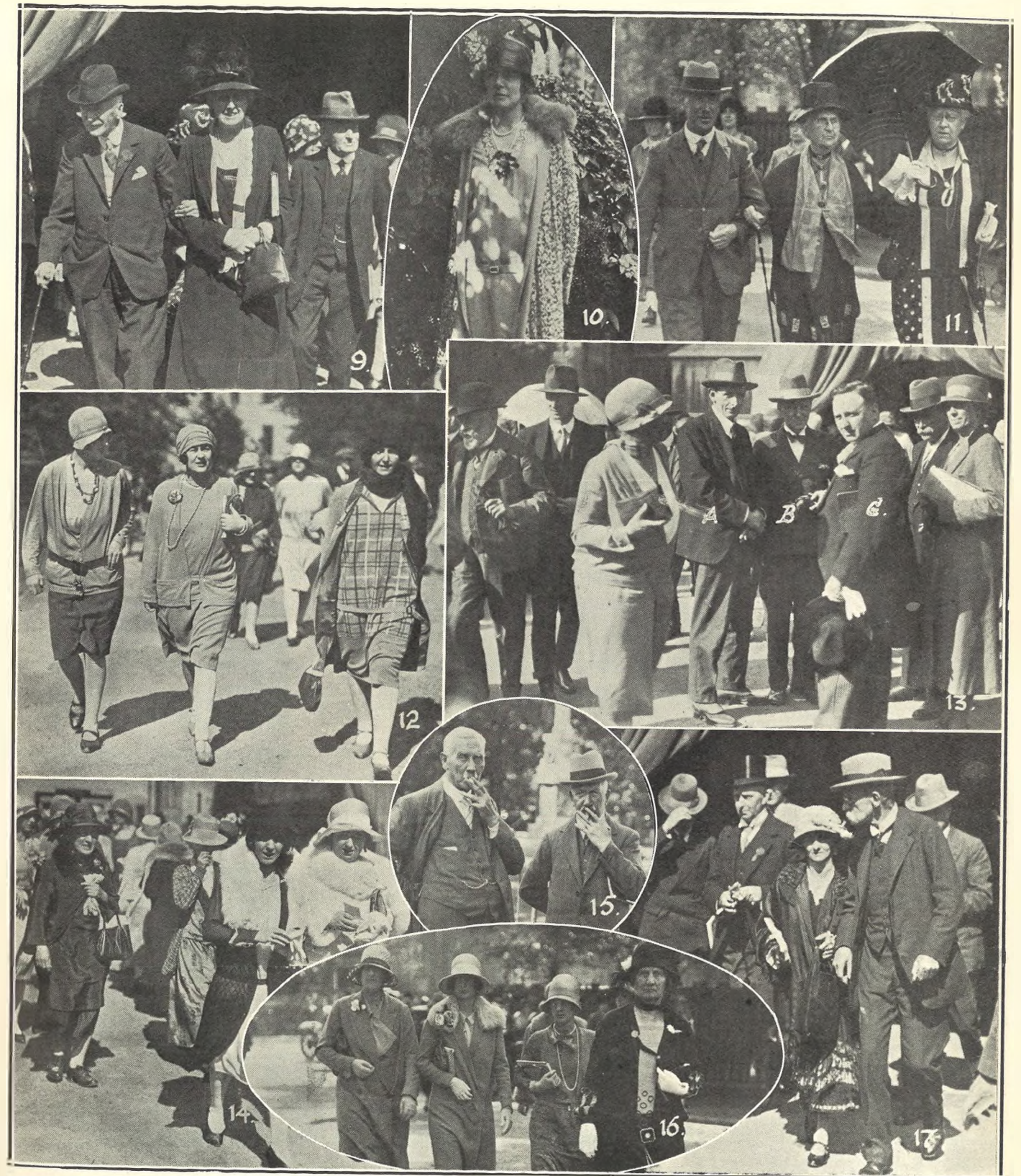

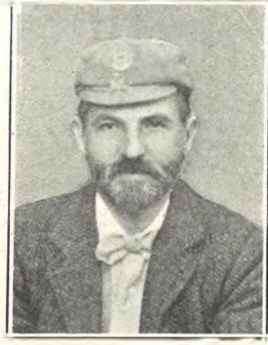

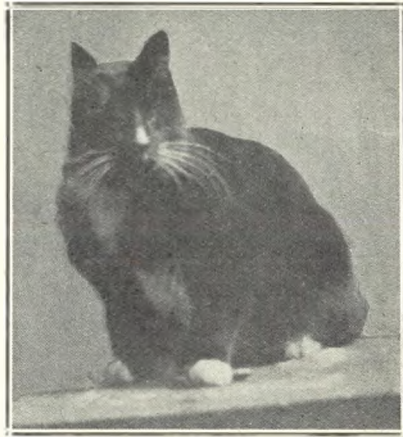
MR. JOHN HAYWARD,

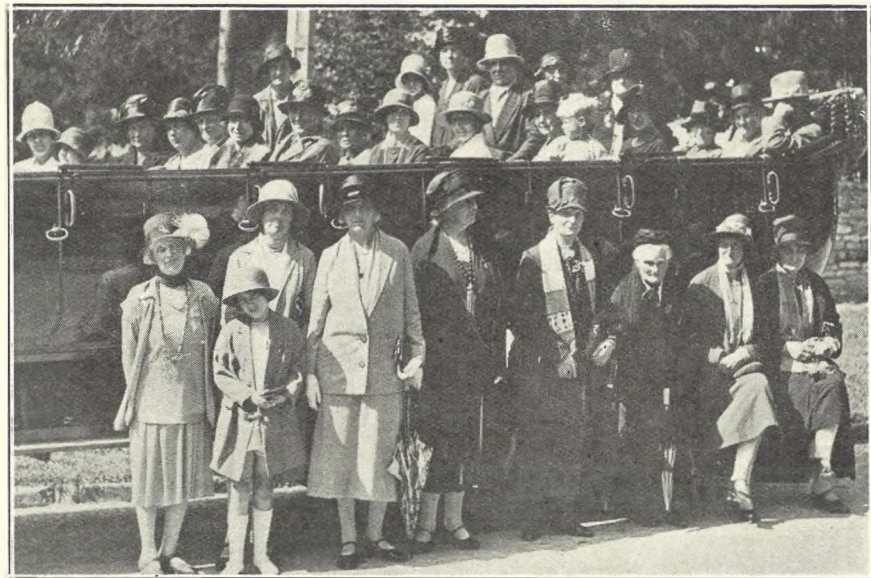
MR. DECIMUS W. VOYLE.

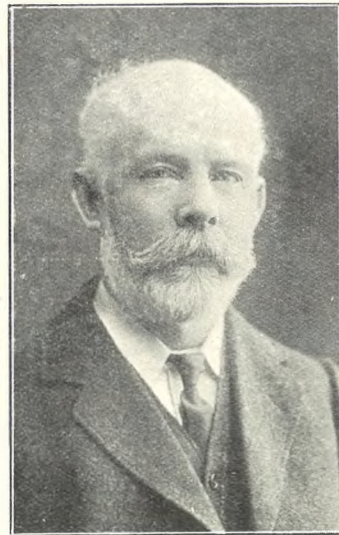


£1 REWARD FOR LOST CAT.

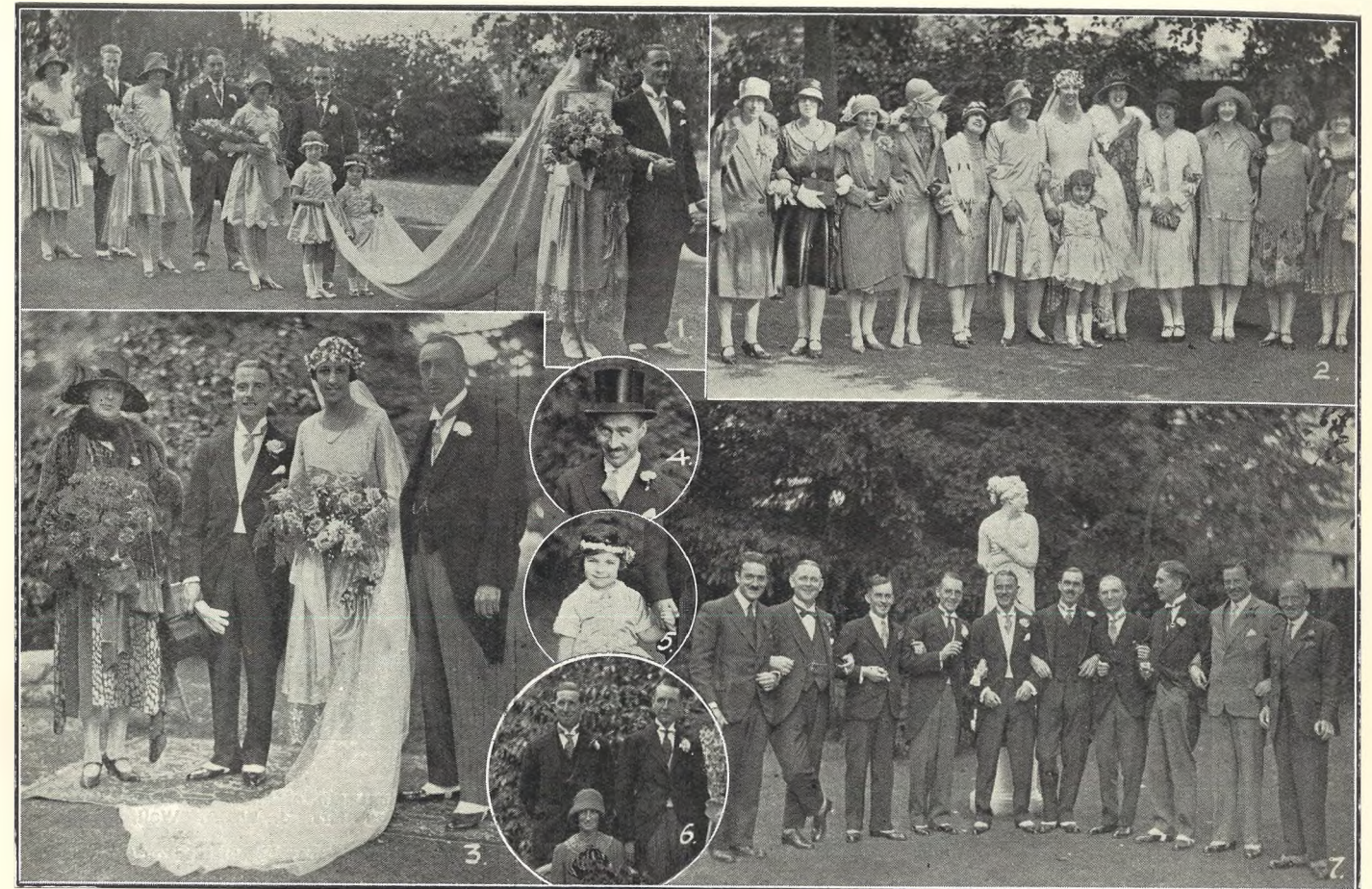

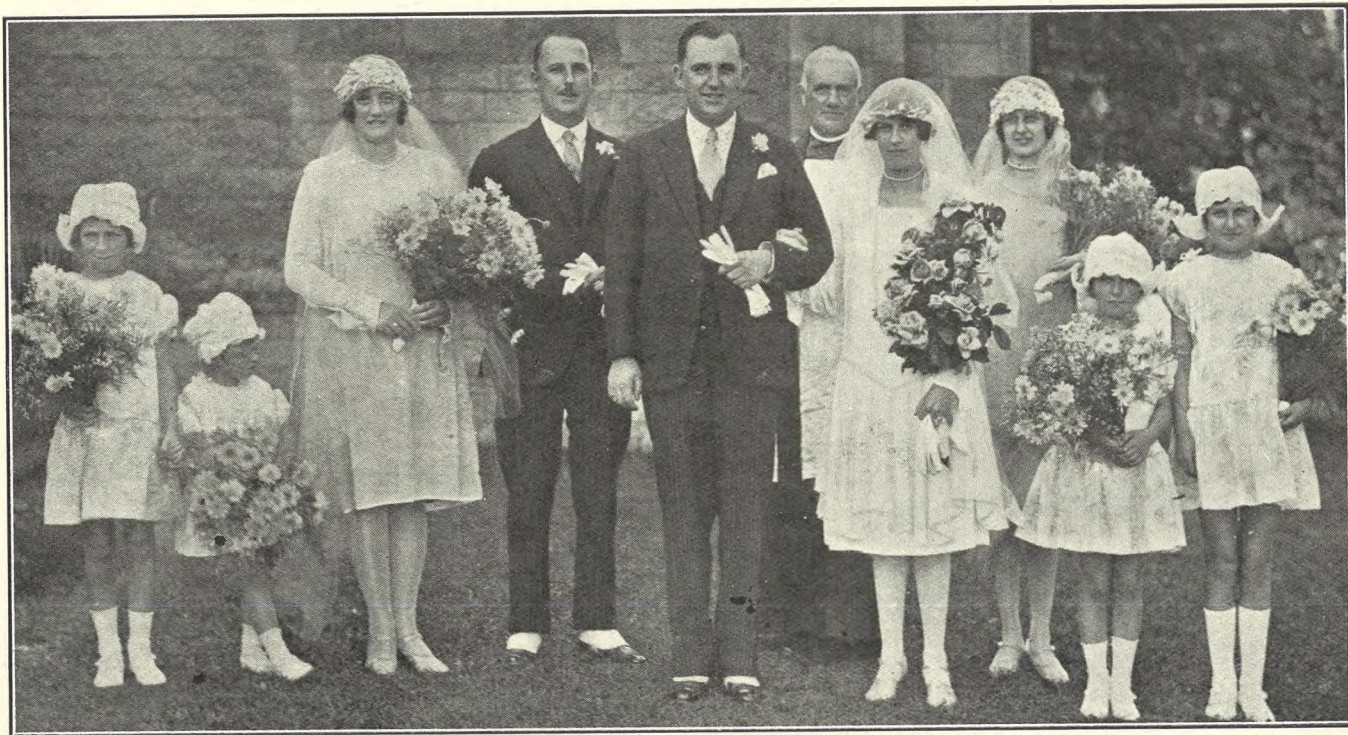

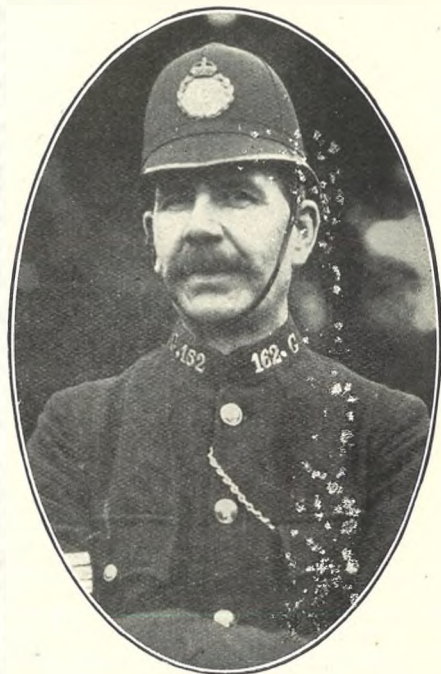

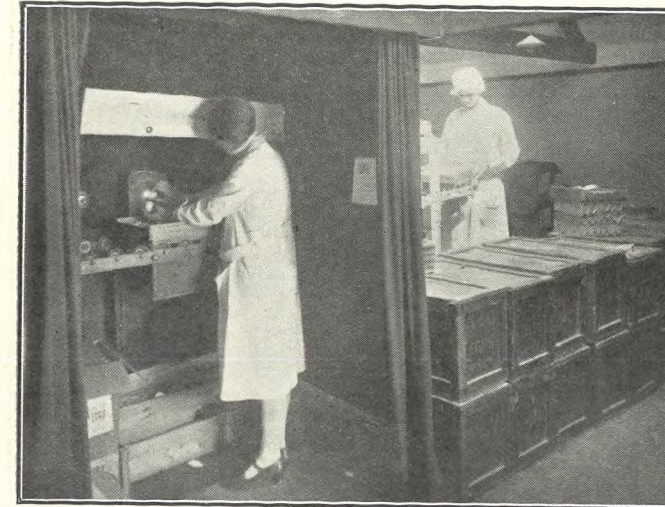
A DESCRIPTION OF THE PROCESS.



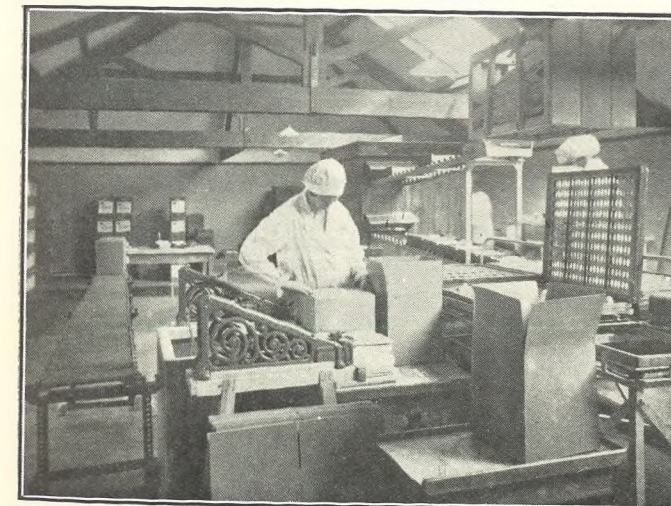
THE GLOUCESTERSHIRE FRUIT & VEGETABLE CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING SOCIETY, LTD., has graded eggs for quality and weight to National Standards since 1926. The development of business has necessitated larger premises, and the 60-year-old property known as the Malthouse, in Market-street, Cheltenham, has been converted into a Model Station, comprising Garage, with accommodation for eight lorries, complete with petrol and oil storage tanks; Stores, of 500 sq. yards floor space; Workroom, Rest-room, and Offices. An inclined Power Conveyor carries goods between floors. The conversion of the old building and all construction work has been carried out by Messrs. Trigg Bros., St. Paul's, Cheltenham, under the supervision of Messrs. Barnard and Partners, of Cheltenham, who designed the premises. Central Heating Apparatus and Electrical work has been installed by Messrs. R. E. and C. Marshall. The Workroom floor is constructed of "Decolite" Patent Asbestos Composition.



The Society's service covers collection from farms over a 30 miles radius; provision of egg-cases, specially fitted with leather-board "fillers"; testing for interior quality; automatic machine-grading for weight; packing in new 15-dozen cartons and delivery to buyers. Every producer's consignment is treated separately up to the packing stage—payment being made according to quality and weight-grading results. During 1927 over **THREE MILLION EGGS** were processed by the Society, and 1928 records indicate that the total turnover will exceed **FIVE MILLIONS**.

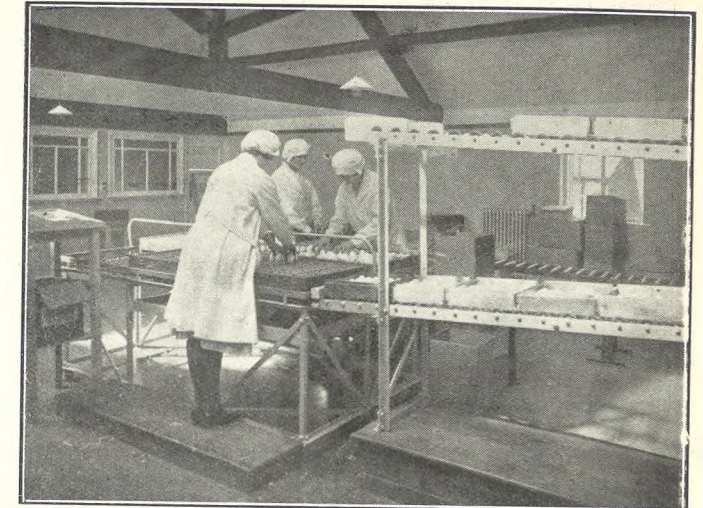


The First Quality eggs pass along the runway to the Grading Machine, which consists of an ingenious arrangement of metal trays capable of isolating eggs of regulated sizes. The grading trays or "sets" are mounted on ball bearings, which run in tracks between the operative filling the sets to the packers. Each grade section of the sets is hinged, and the packer on the extreme right of the machine extracts "Specials" and "Standards" then passes the set to her co worker, who extracts "Medrums" and "Smalls."

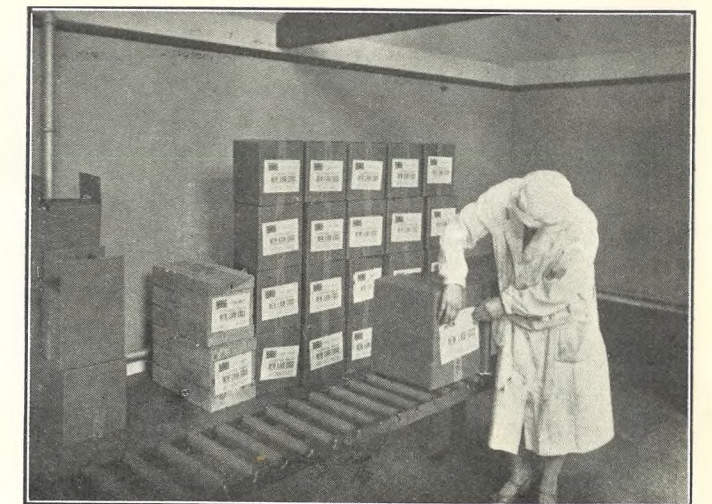


The high quality of the "C.F.M." Brand Eggs is well known in **LONDON** and **BIRMINGHAM**, to which centres tons of these eggs are delivered weekly. The eggs are sold in competition with other Home and Overseas Produce, and always realise higher prices—thus justifying the processing.

On arrival at the Grading Station the eggs are off-loaded from the collection lorries on to a Power Conveyor, which carries the cases into position alongside a gravity runway on the workroom floor. The "fillers" containing the eggs are emptied into trays by a simple reversing process. These trays pass along the runway to the testing chamber, where the eggs are subjected to a process known as "candling"—the eggs are held before a powerful light, which reveals the contents in detail. At this point eggs of a bad and doubtful character are classified and extracted.



Each grade of egg is separately packed in a 15-dozen carton, and when a carton is filled it is immediately sealed by means of gummed tape fed from a special machine, which damps the tape and cuts it off to the desired length. The sealing tape is printed with the designation of the grade. When sealed, the cartons pass along a gravity conveyor to be labelled and stacked.

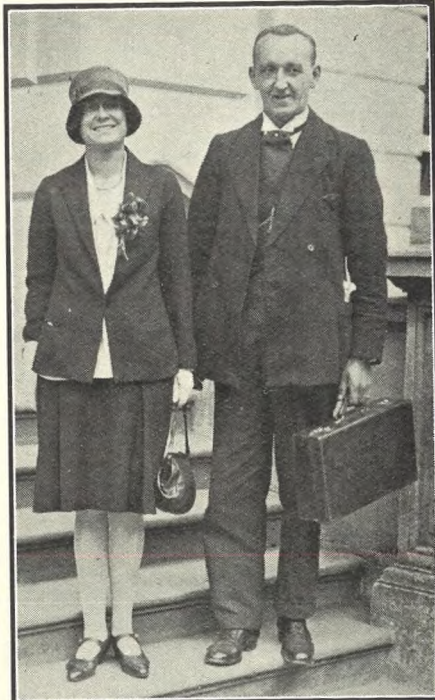

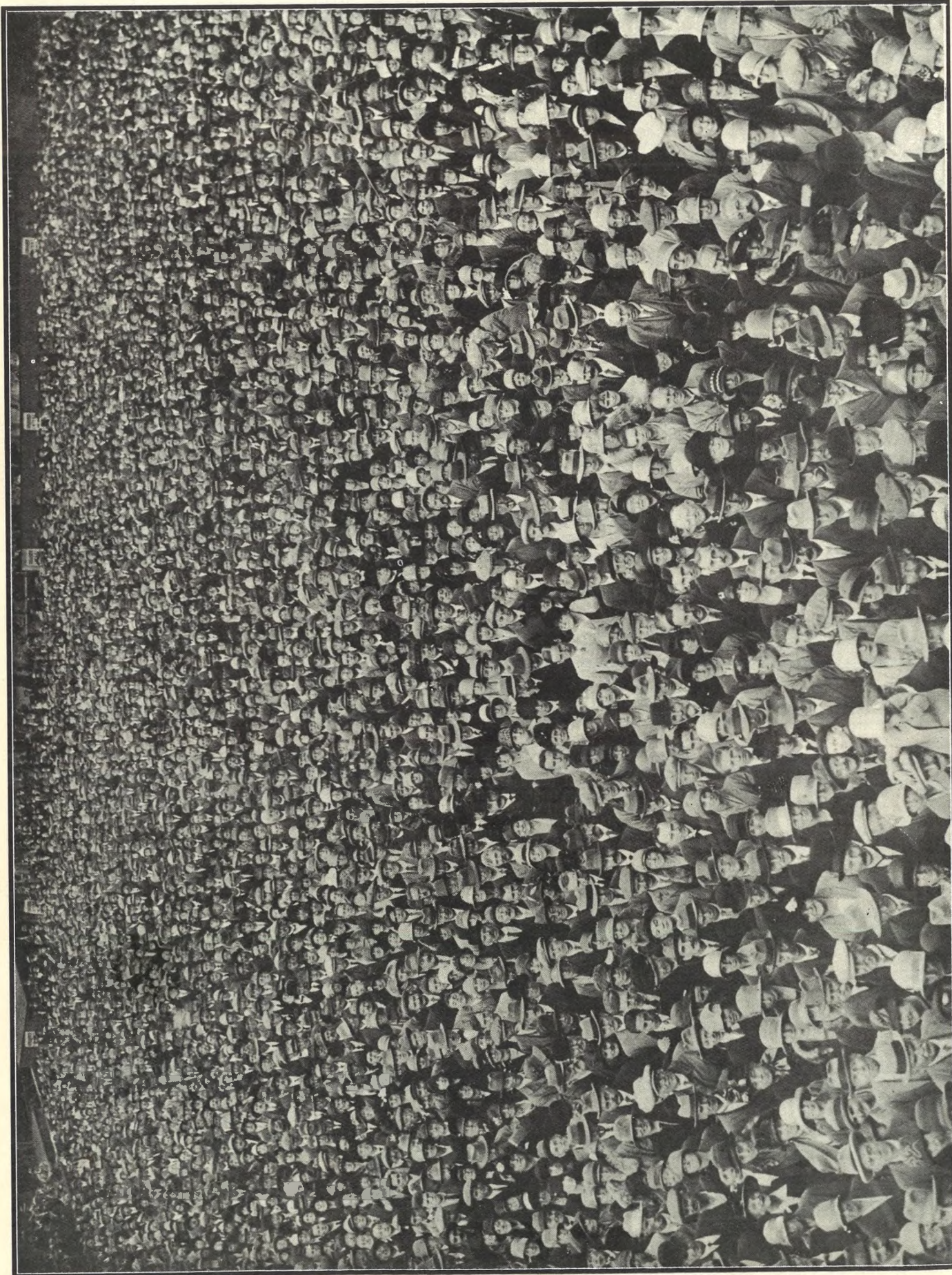

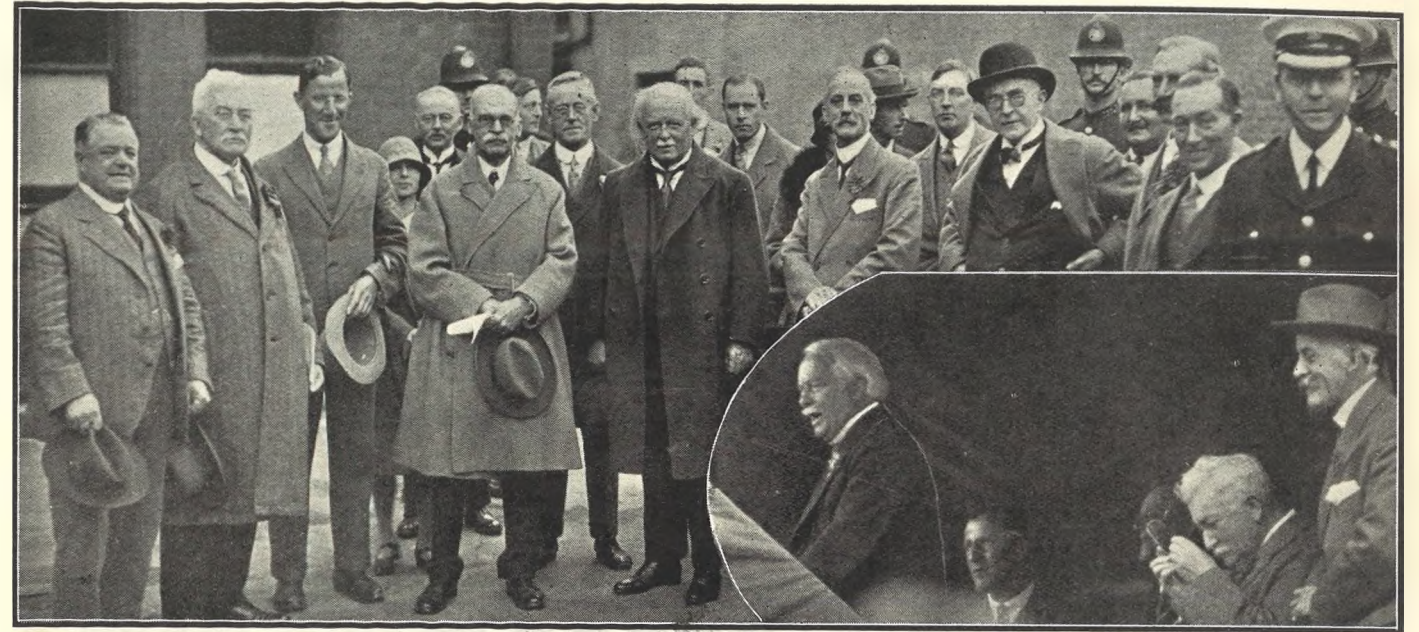
