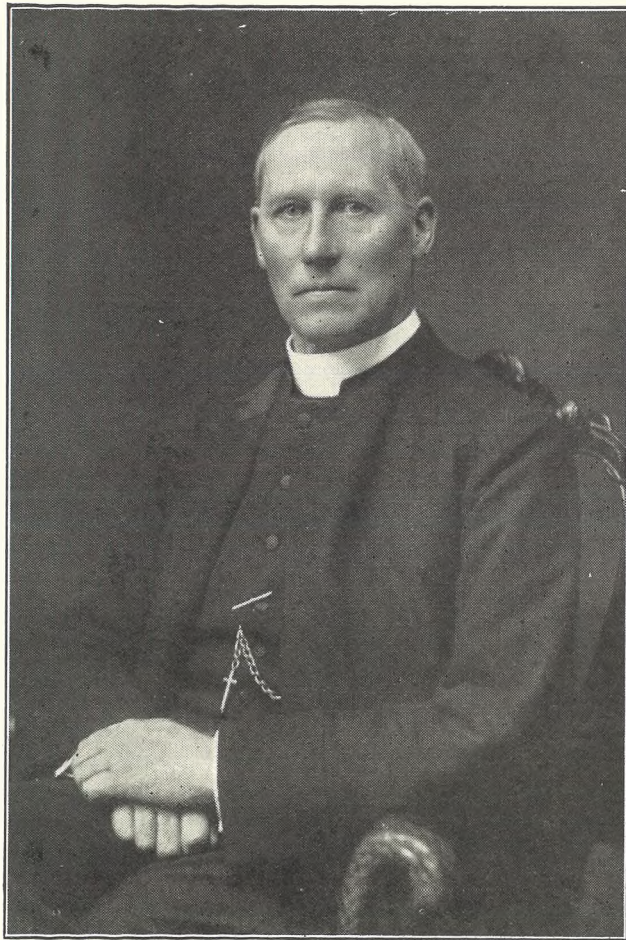

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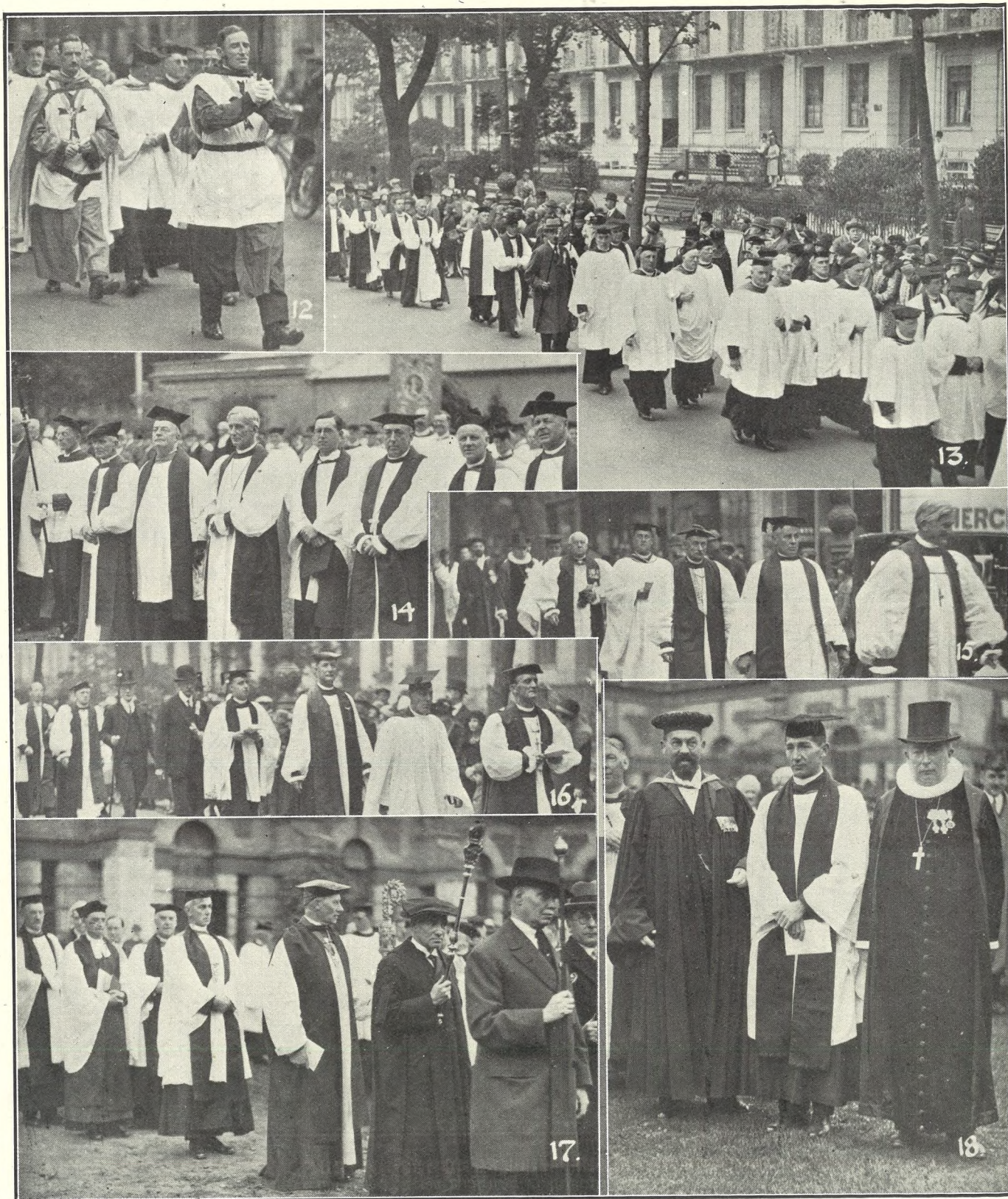
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CHURCH CONGRESS IN CHELTENHAM.

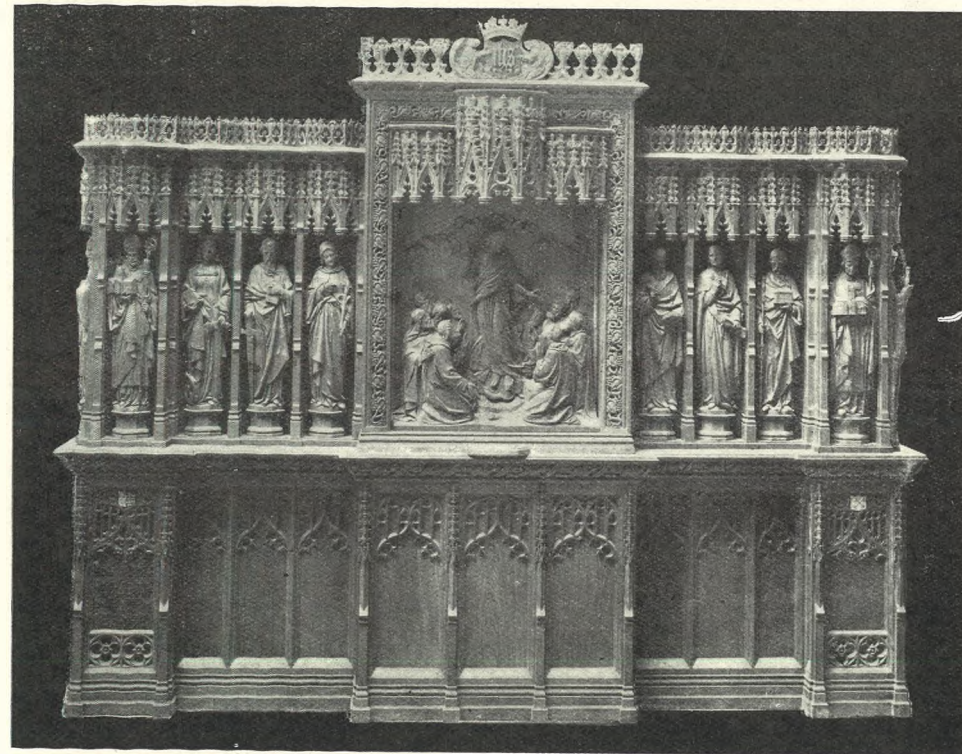

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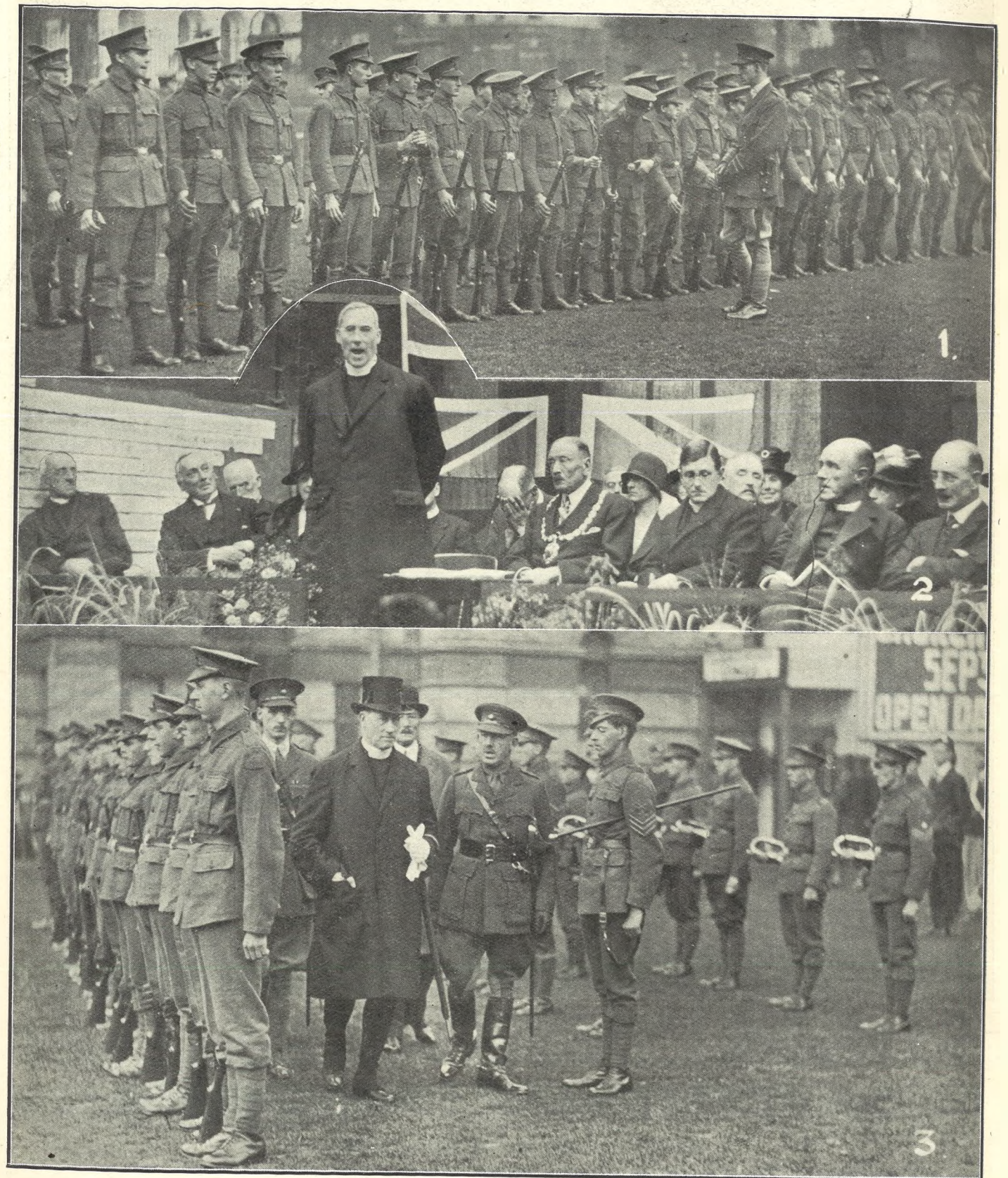

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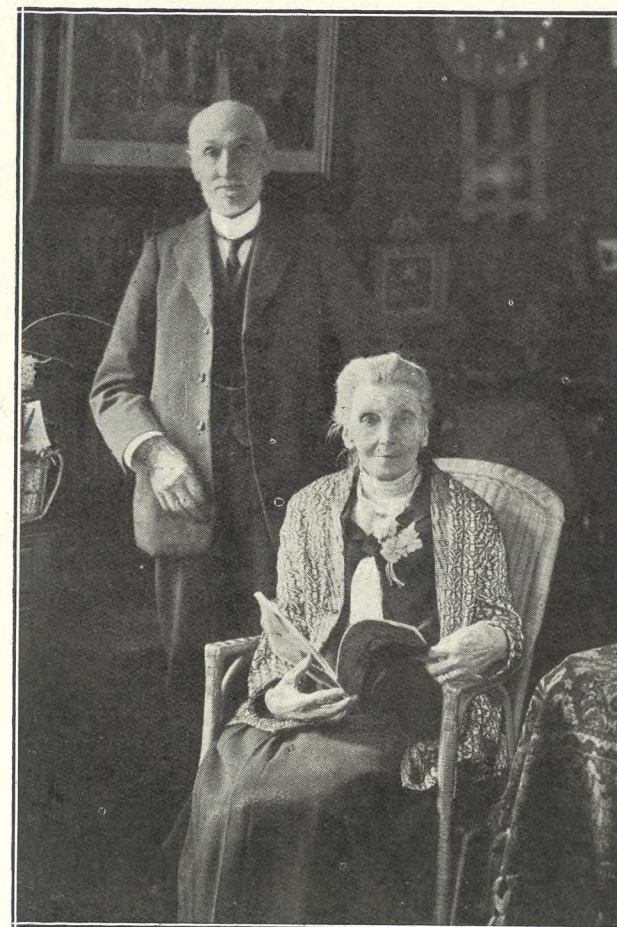
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IN DEATH NOT DIVIDED.

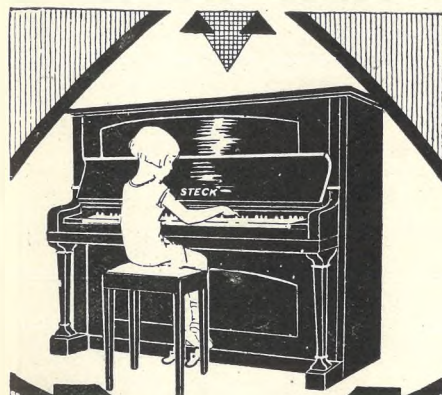

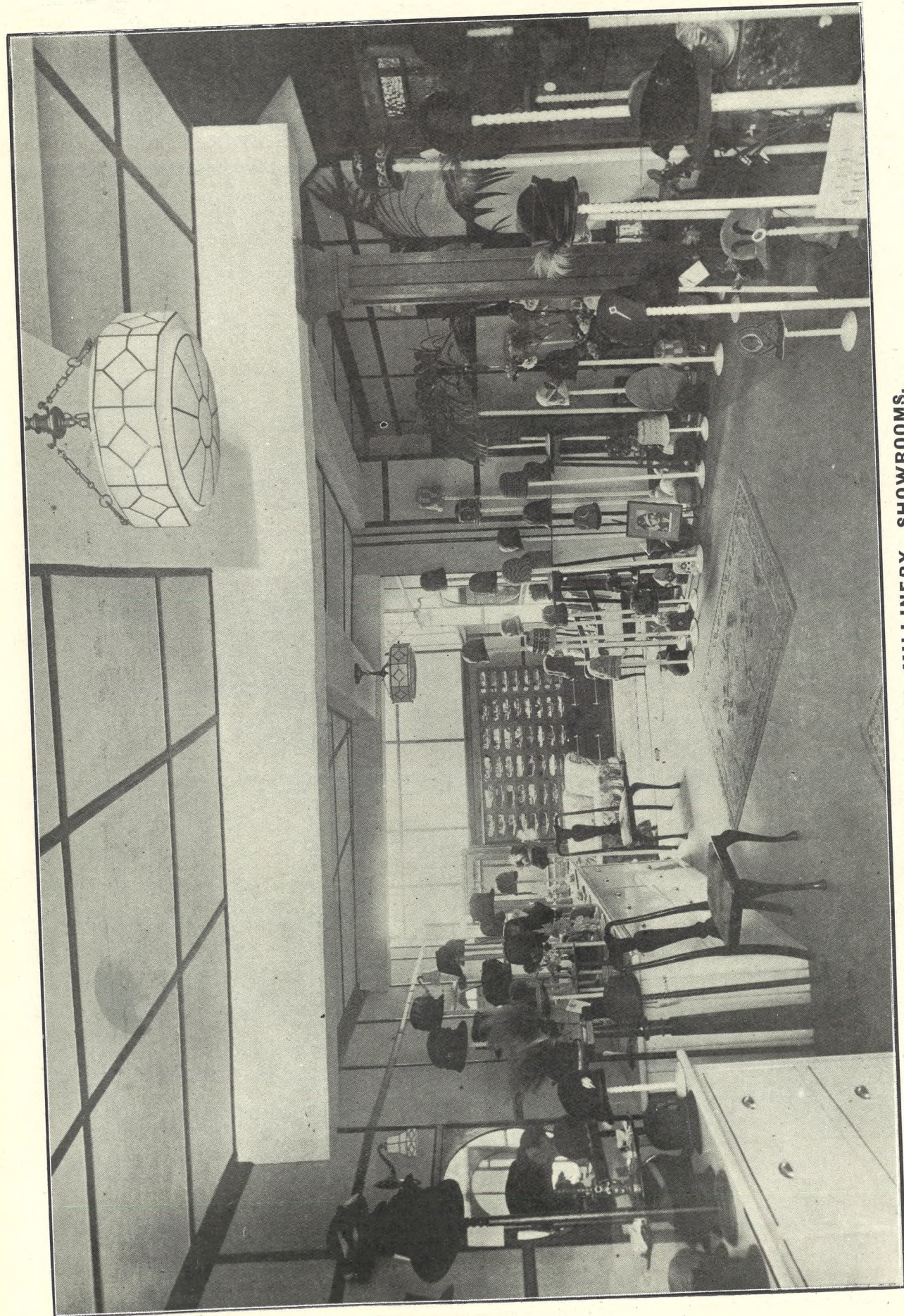

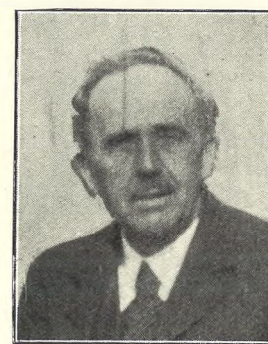
A CHELTENHAM GOLDEN WEDDING.

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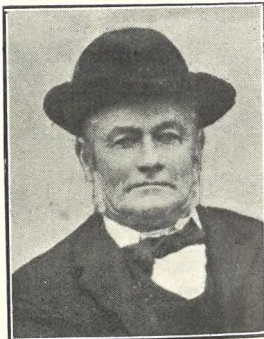

TERRIBLE TRAIN DISASTER AT CHARFIELD, GLOUCESTERSHIRE.

A dreadful accident, by which 14 persons were killed and many injured, took place at Charfield, a L.M. & S.R. station on main Gloucester to Bristol line, 20 miles south of Gloucester, on Saturday last. The mail train, which leaves Cheltenham at 4.27 a.m. and Gloucester at 4.48, was travelling fast through Charfield when it plunged into a goods train which was being shunted off the same line into a siding. Three carriages were telescoped and thrown against the road bridge, and the whole of the debris caught fire, burning to death the injured who could not be quickly extricated. Our pictures were taken on Sunday, when many thousands witnessed the scenes of clearing the line.

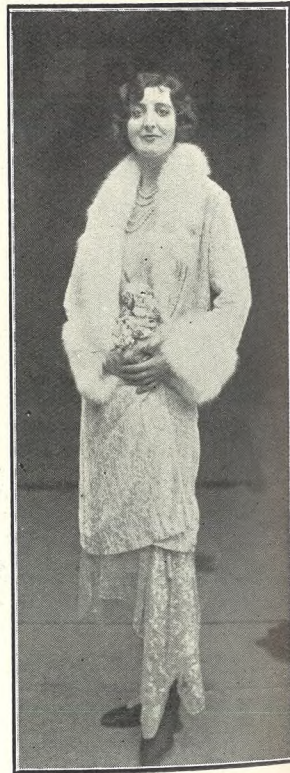
