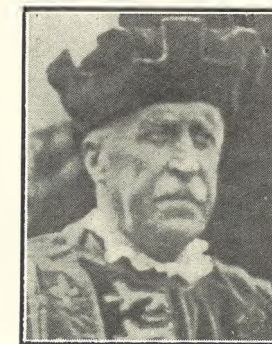
GENERAL HASTINGS READ, C.B.

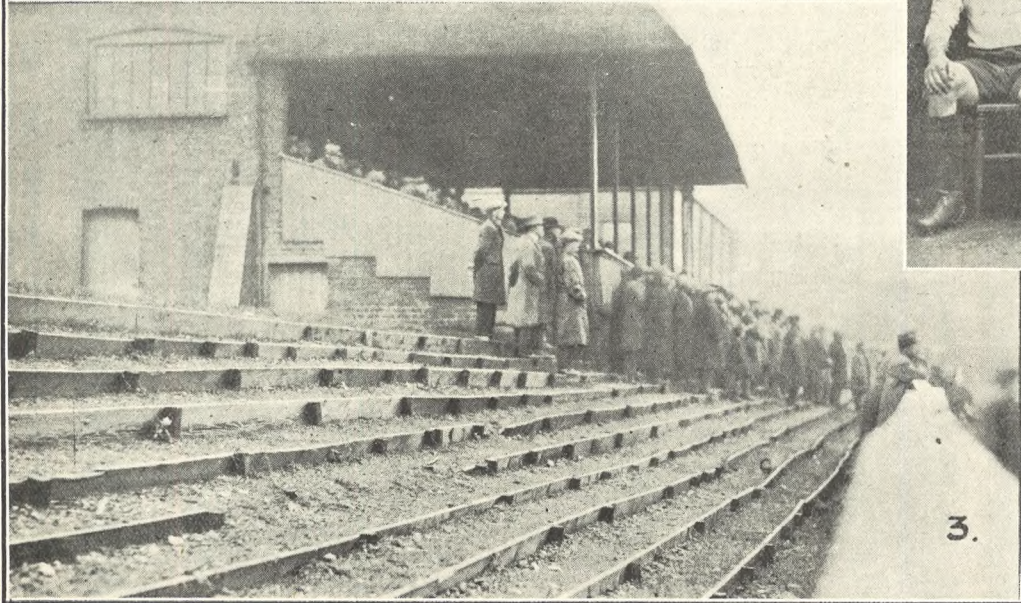
FASHIONABLE COUNTY WEDDING AT NORTHLEACH.

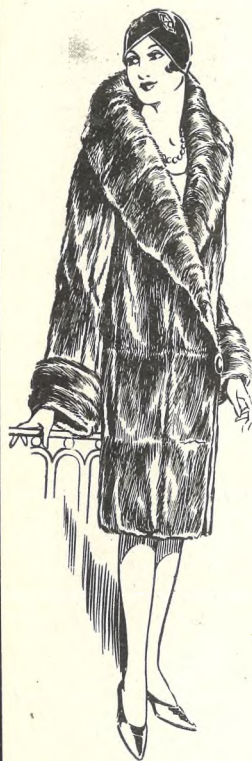
COWLEY MANOR, NEAR CHELTENHAM.

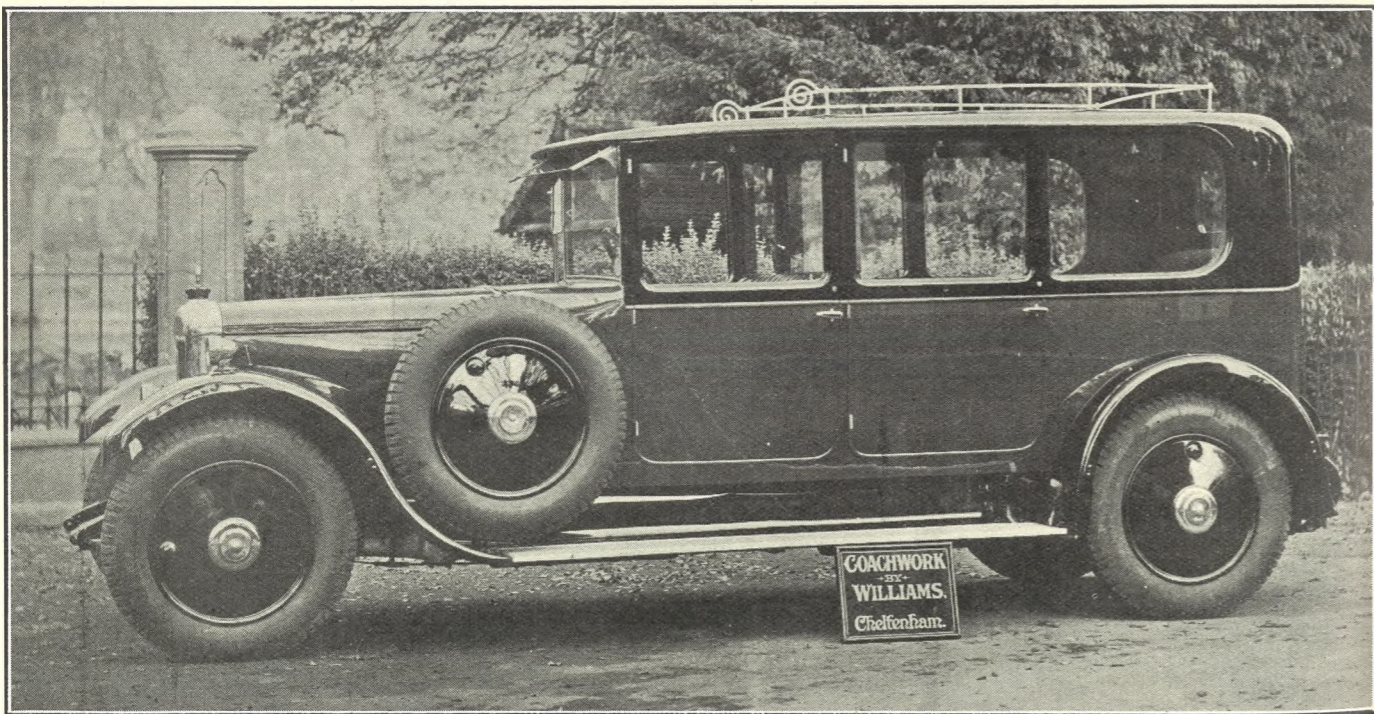

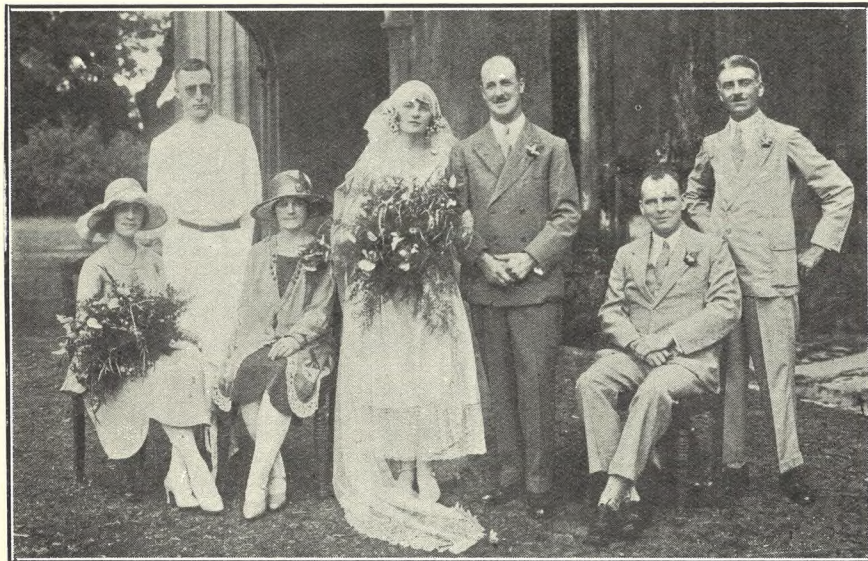

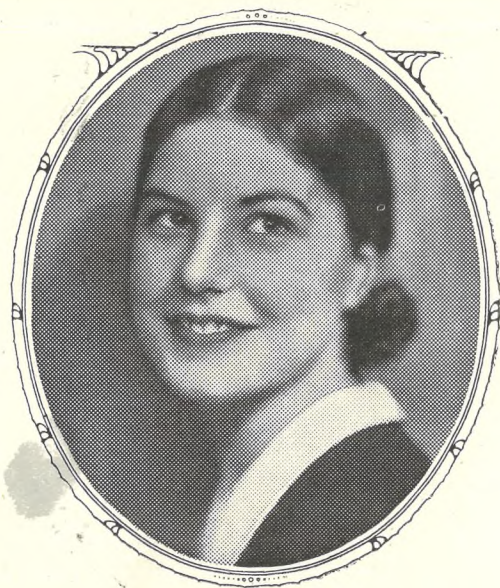


OLD DICK PURSER.

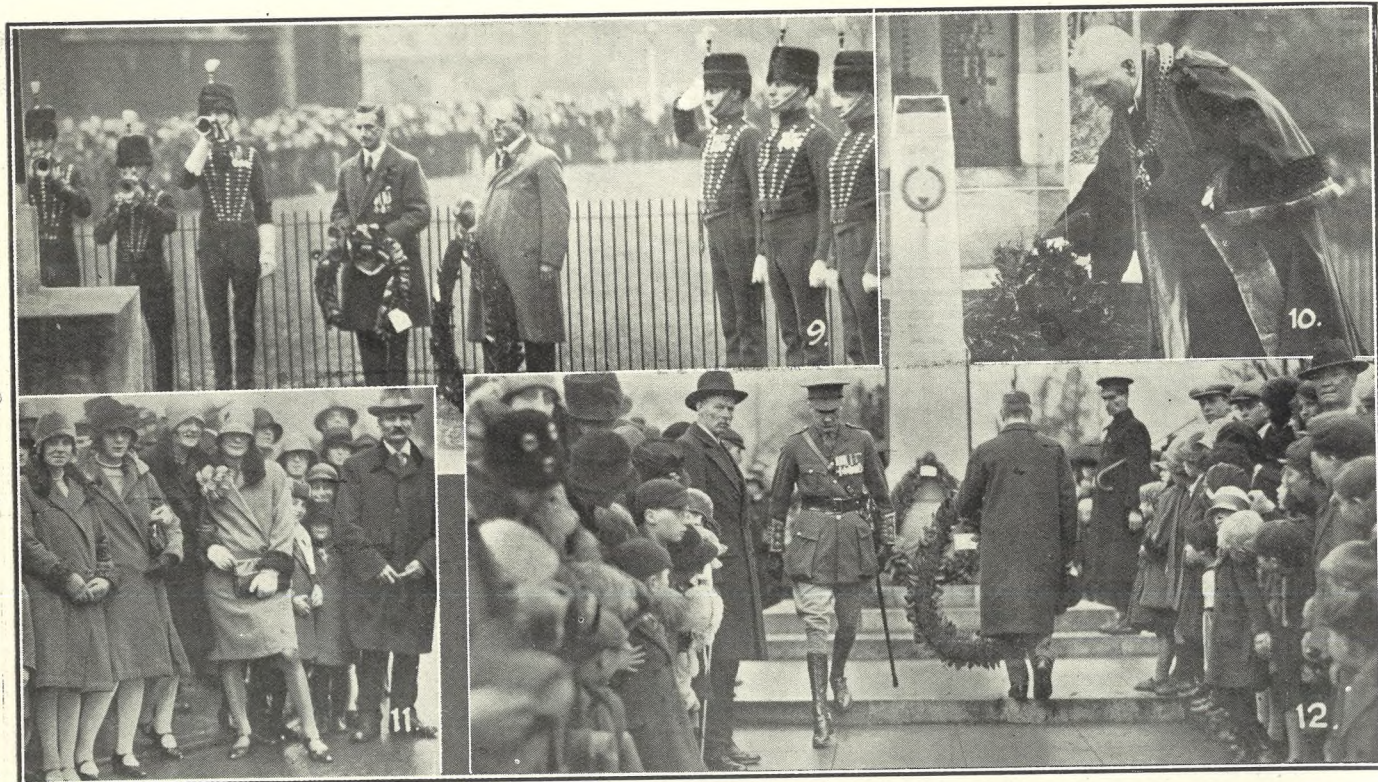

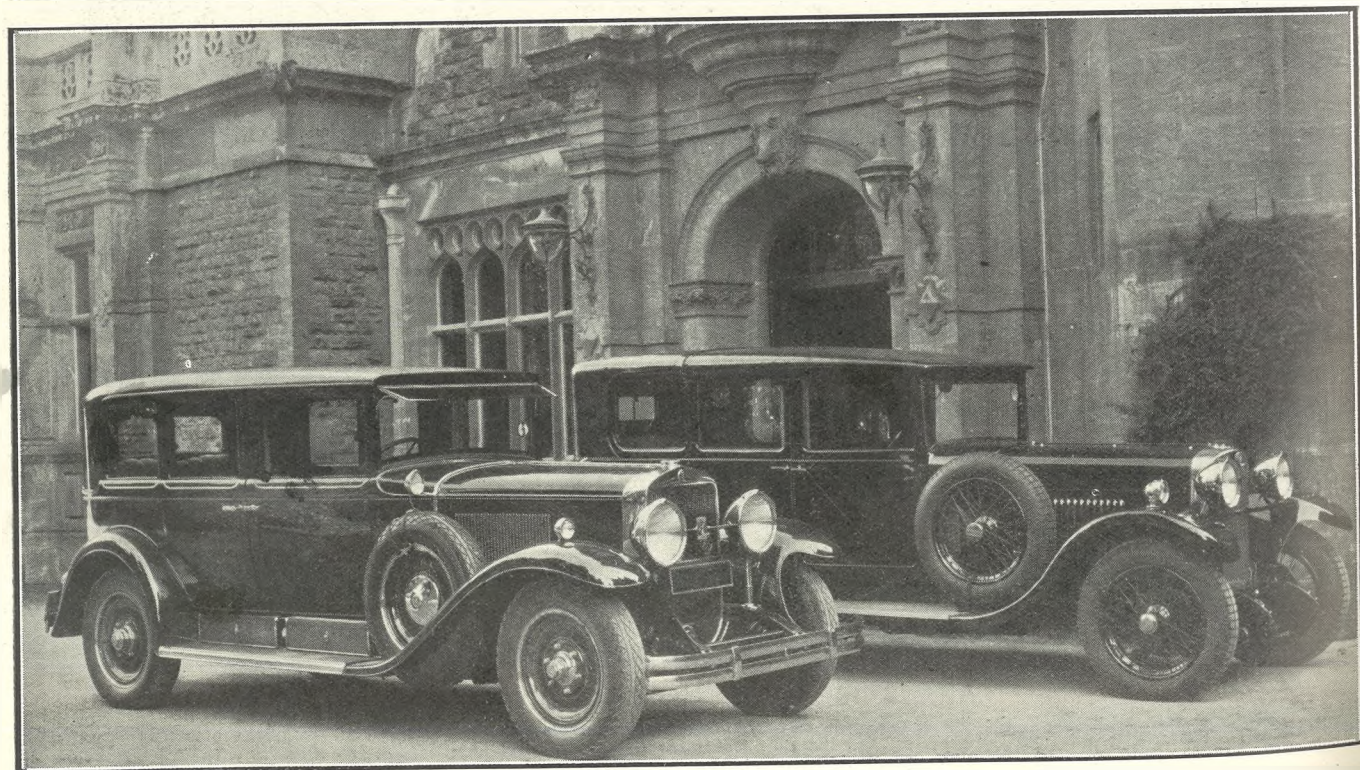

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—WOODCHESTER.

Woodchester is a most ancient place, with an absorbing history. It is a village situate on the side of a deep valley leading from Stroud to Nailsworth. As its name implies, it was a Roman post or station, and a wonderful Roman tessellated pavement of glorious design was discovered in the old churchyard in the 17th Century. This pavement is considered one of the finest specimens of its period in Europe. For preservation it is kept buried, being opened up once in every ten years.

1.—The Priory, the residence of Major L. G. Saitau-Symons, D.S.O. Parts of it were built in 1513. It adjoins the old churchyard, in which is the Roman pavement, and remains of a Roman villa were found in the garden here.

2.—Southfield, the residence of Mrs. Allen. It is a fine old house, parts of it early XVith Century; and was formerly the home of the Paul family, Sir Onesiphorous Paul being one of its distinguished occupants.

3.—Rooksmoor House, now the residence of two families, formerly a cloth miller's home.

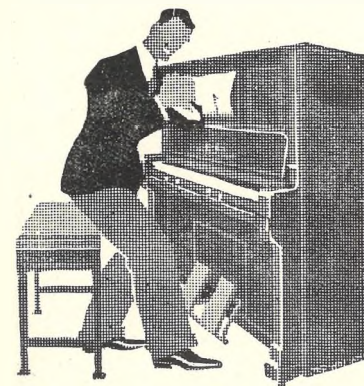

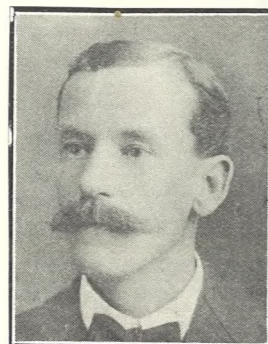
