



TERRIBLE TRAIN TRACEDY AT ASHCHURCH STATION.

On Tuesday evening last, about 9 o'clock, the express train on the L.M.S. Railway, which had just left Cheltenham for Birmingham, Derby, and the North, crashed into a goods train which was being shunted across the main lines at Ashchurch Station.

The Mail train was travelling at close on 50 miles per hour, and a terrible smash occurred, the whole train being derailed, the engine thrown on its side, and the carriages piled upon and around it in inextricable confusion. Four persons were killed outright and twenty injured. Our pictures were taken as soon as it was light the next morning.




