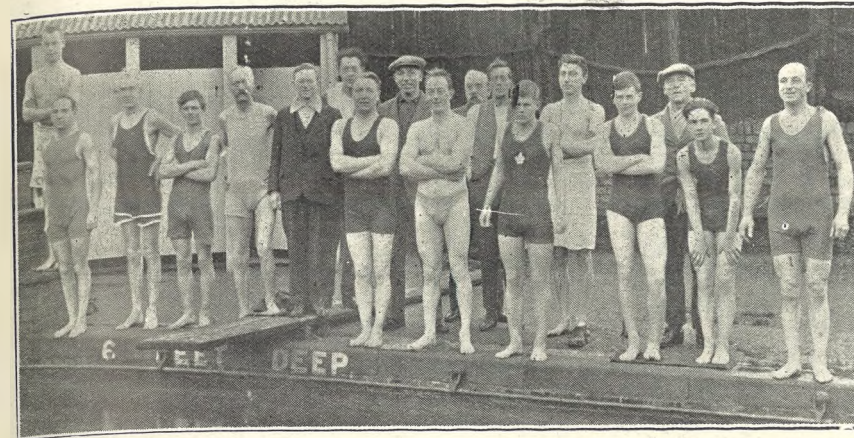

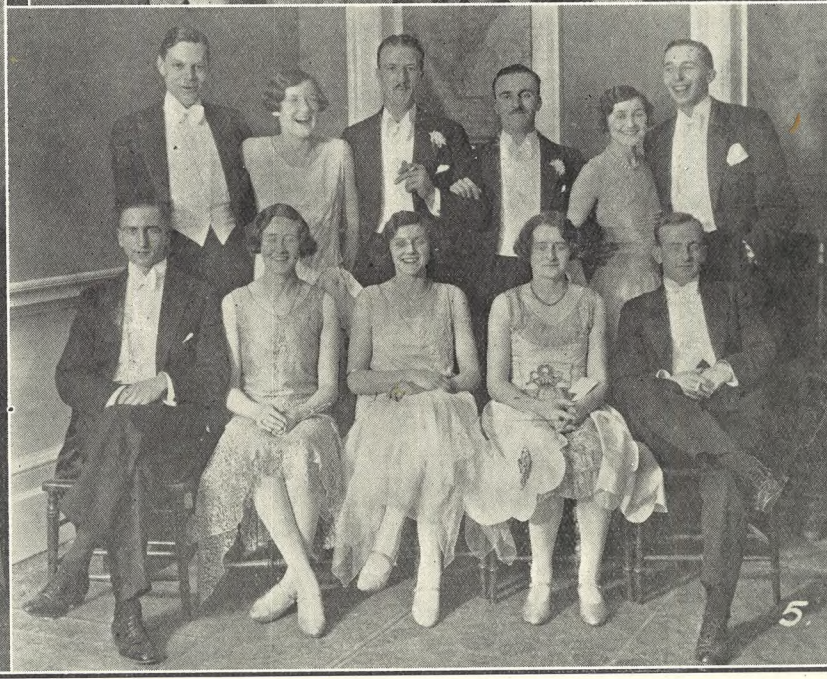


**GLOUCESTER v. CHELTENHAM AT RUGBY FOOTBALL.**

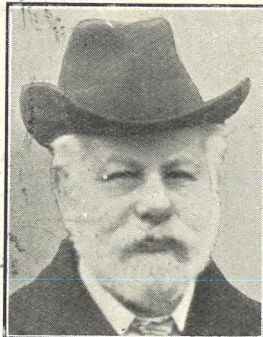

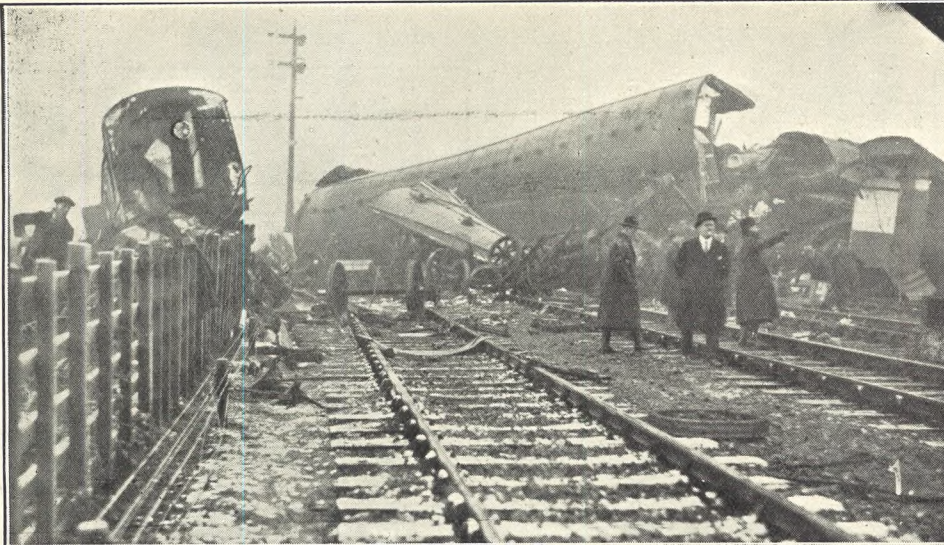

### TERRIBLE TRAIN TRAGEDY AT ASHCHURCH STATION.

On Tuesday evening last, about 9 o'clock, the express train on the L.M.S. Railway, which had just left Cheltenham for Birmingham, Derby, and the North, crashed into a goods train which was being shunted across the main lines at Ashchurch Station. The Mail train was travelling at close on 50 miles per hour, and a terrible smash occurred, the whole train being derailed, the engine thrown on its side, and the carriages piled upon and around it in inextricable confusion. Four persons were killed outright and twenty injured. Our pictures were taken as soon as it was light the next morning.

 2.—The tender of the express engine (shown by arrow) is protruding from the wreckage, the engine itself is buried.

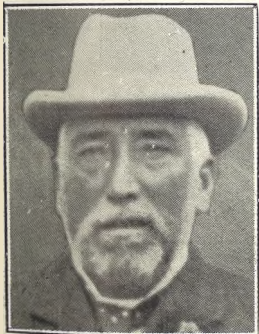
3.—All that was left of the chassis of one of the wrecked carriages: the buffers can be seen at each end.

4.—In the midst of the most serious wreckage, where the three bodies of passengers were found. The buffer on right is that of the engine.

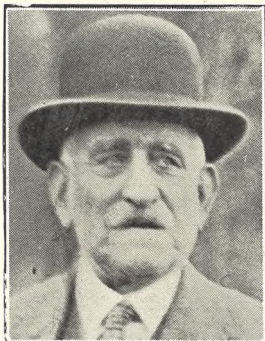


**THE ROAST BEEF OF OLD ENGLAND.**

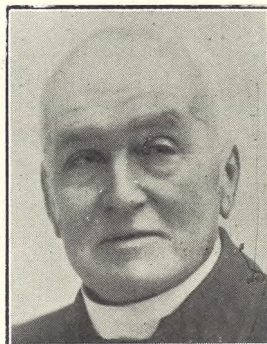

**PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—STROUD AND LYPIATT.**

Stroud and its neighbourhood abounds in archaeological and historic interest, and many fine old houses and relics of past glory can be found there. Stroud itself is famous as the centre of the manufacture of cloth. West of England cloth is still some of the best in the world. Upper Lypiatt, near Stroud, is a wonderful old house, now owned and occupied by His Honour Judge H. B. D. Woodcock, K.C., J.P. It was owned in 1596 by John Throckmorton, whom, Sir Robert Atkins says, "was concerned in the Popish powder plot," and a room in the house is shown as the place where the conspirators in the Guy Fawkes plot met.

1.—Part of Stroud Town Hall. It is 15th Century work, and is now used as the County Court.  
 2.—The Market Place, Stroud, with Spire of Parish Church behind.  
 3.—The old Almshouses, just behind the Church. They are not used as Almshouses now.

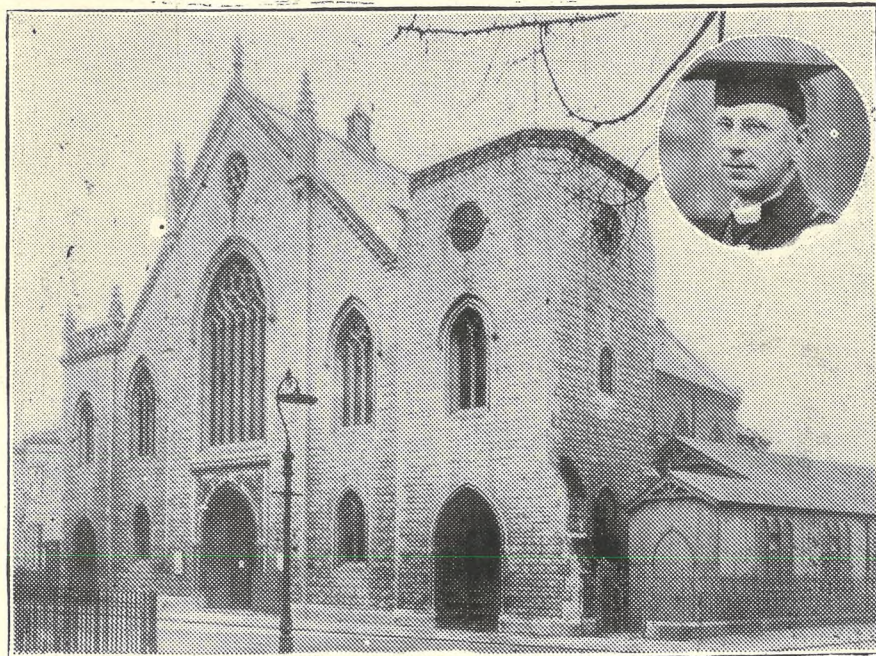
