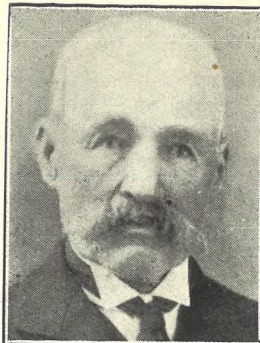

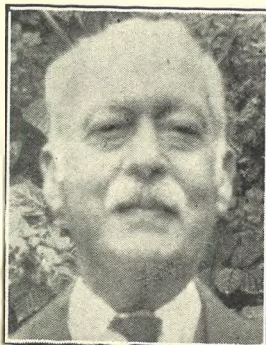
MRS AIMEE TARTE,

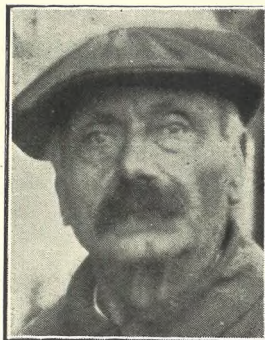


MR. WILLIAM A. PREEDY

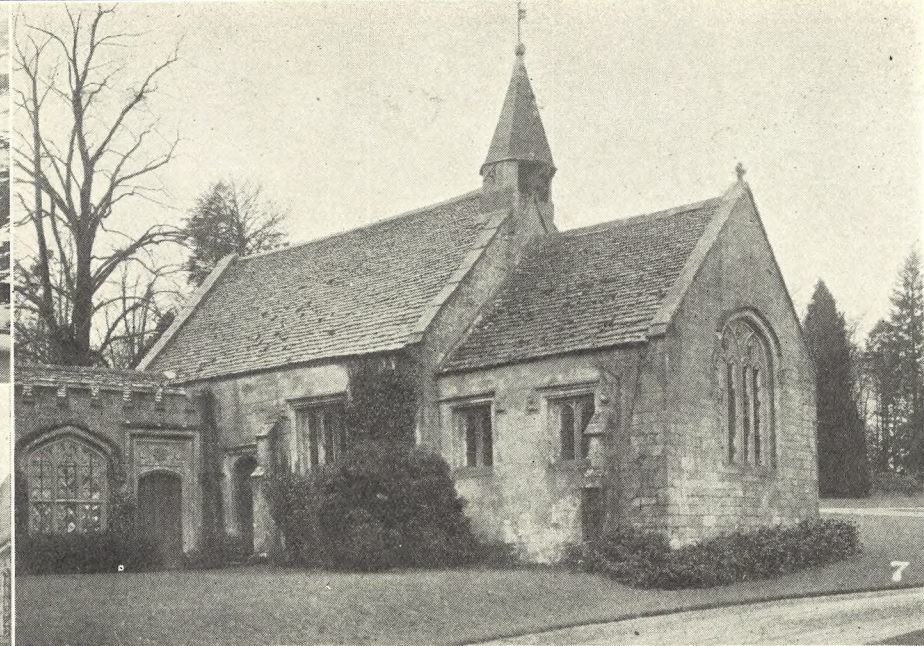

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—LYPIATT.

Upper Lypiatt, near Stroud, is one of the most interesting old houses in Gloucestershire. Sir Robert Atkyns, the County Historian, in 1712, calls it "Lupiatt," and says in 1624 it was called "a fair house of stone, with brewhouse, malthouse, stables, barns, etc." "The Chapell atte Over Lippiatt" is mentioned as the scene of a wedding between Edward Fust and Ann Stephens on June 5, 1688, in the Marriage Register of Stroud. It was owned by many generations of the Wyes, and it was a widow of one of the Wyes who married the famous John Throckmorton, who in 1596 became possessed of the estate; and who was connected with the Guy Fawkes plot. The place is magnificently situated.

5.—The South side of the House. The work on each end is Victorian, the old part is in the centre.

6.—The North or Main Front, with entrance Porch. The big Tudor window was more to the left formerly. The Chapel is on extreme right.

7.—The Chapel. These were moved from the front of the house after 1712.

8.—The Stables. These were moved from the front of the house after 1712.

9.—The Dovecote and Granary, two wonderful old buildings close to the house. They are stated to be untouched 13th Century erections.

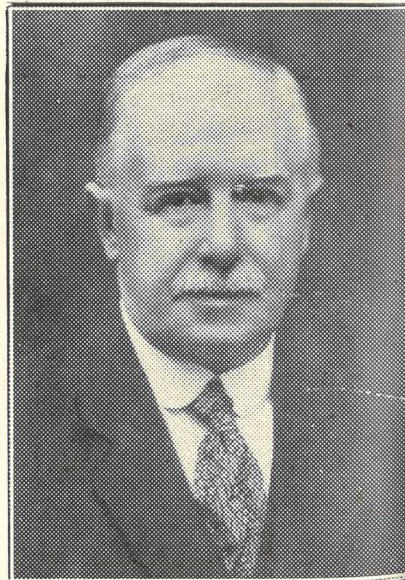

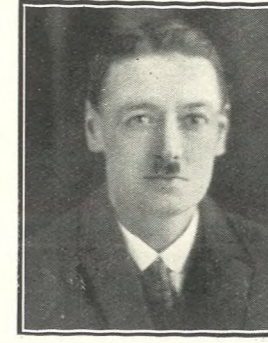

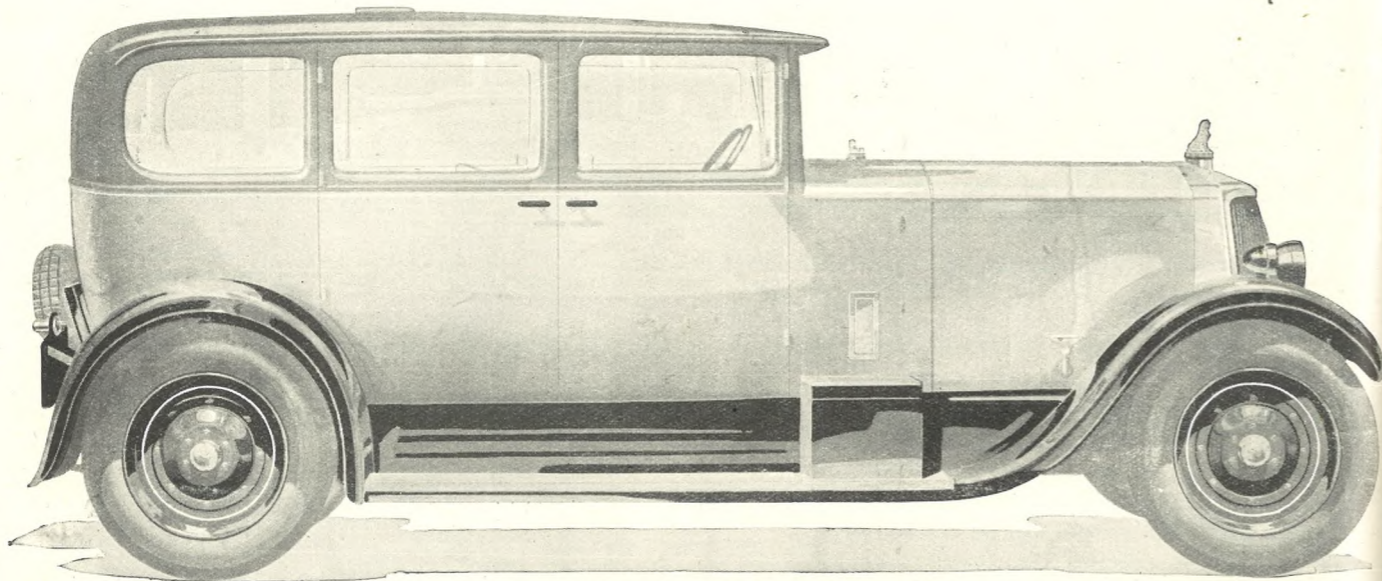

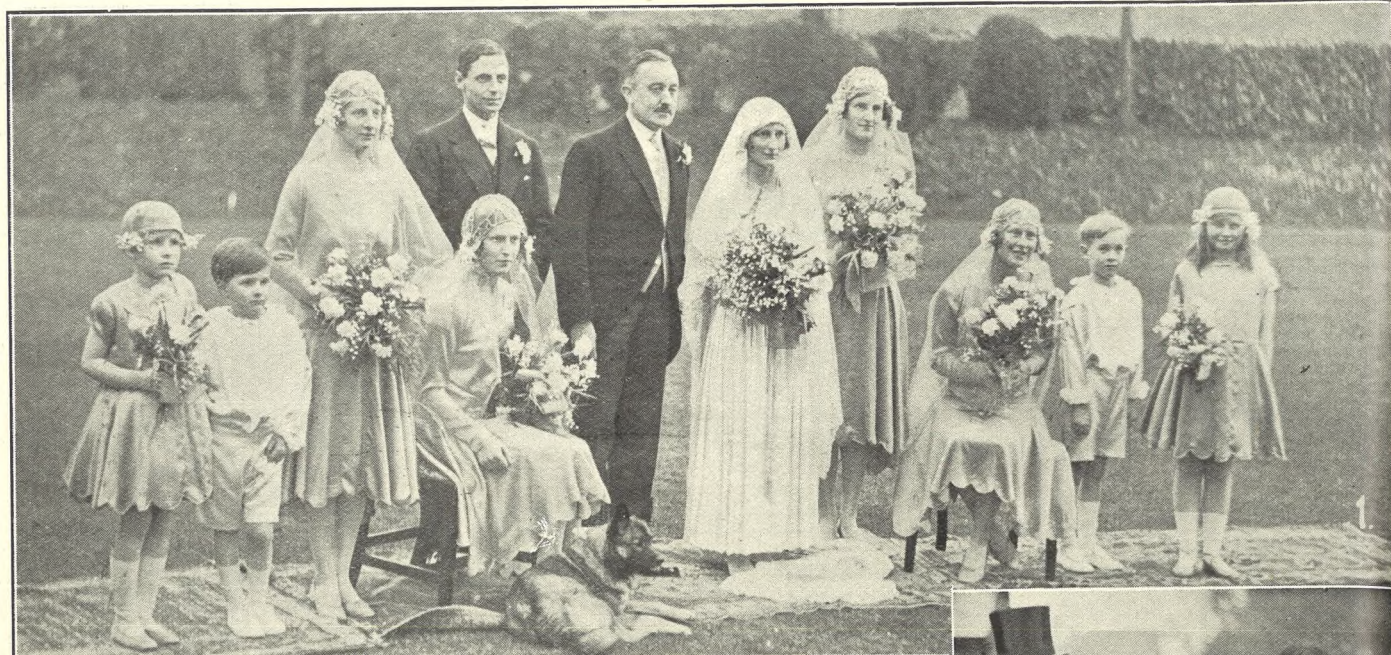

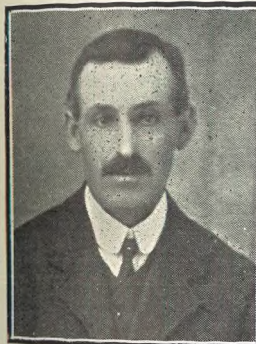
MR. SAMUEL AITKEN, J.P.

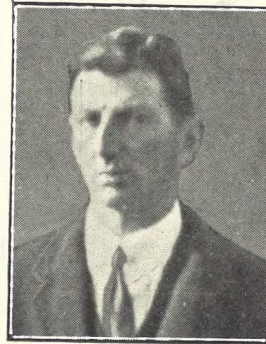

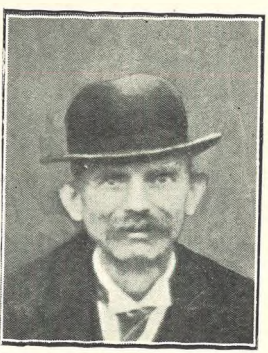
