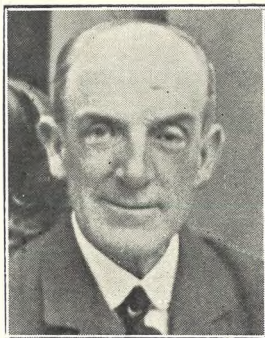

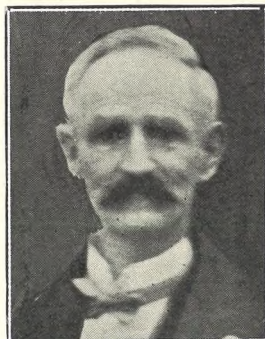

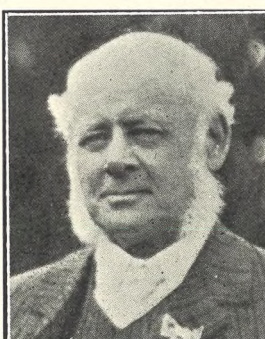
DR. JOHN HOWELL,

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A GREAT RUGBY GAME AT GLOUCESTER.

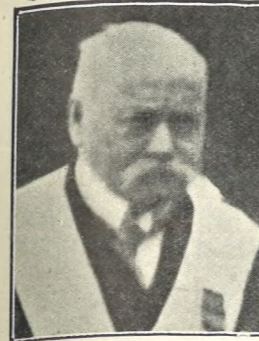

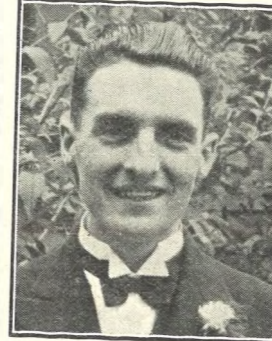

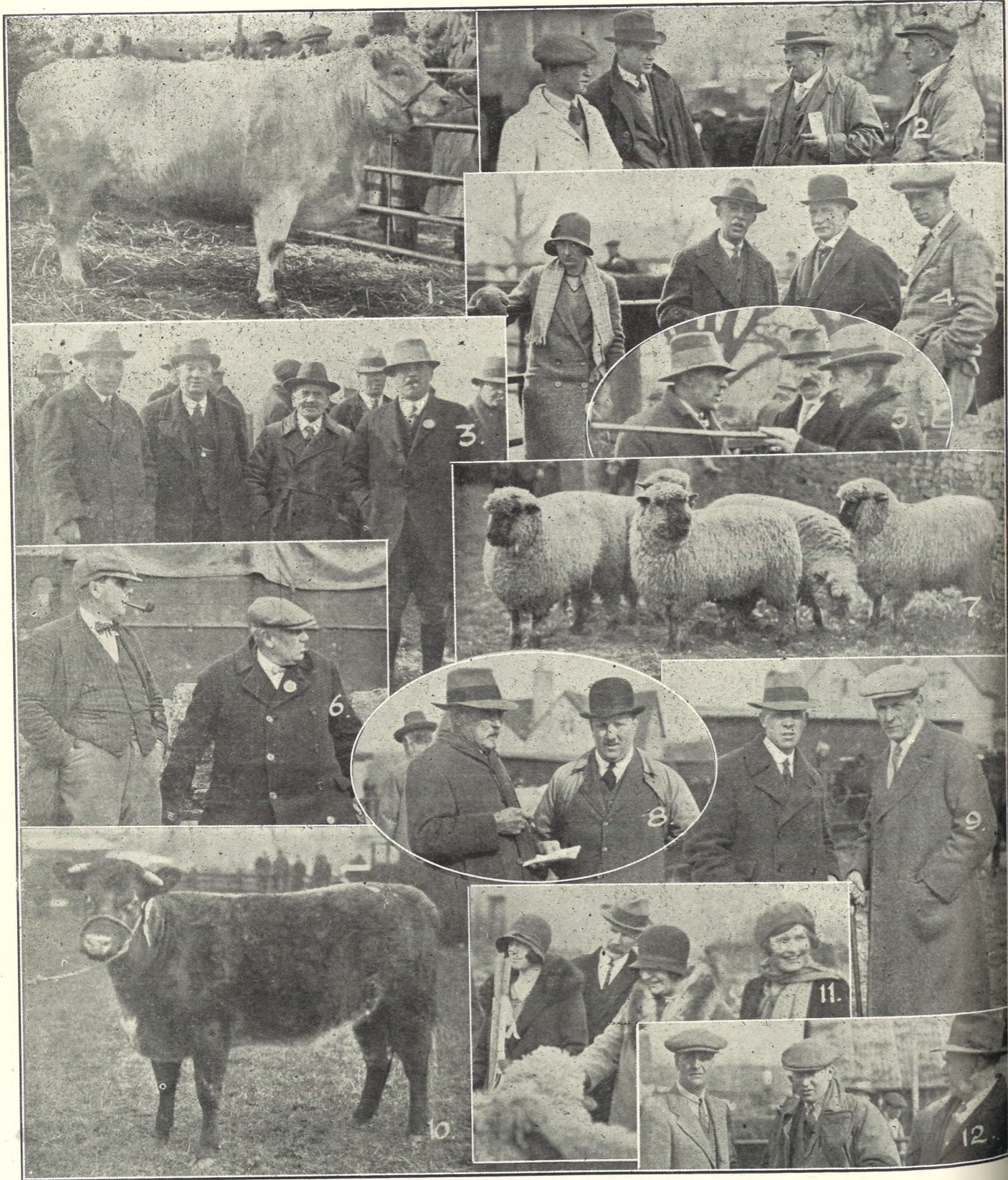
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ANDOVERSFORD STOCK SHOW AND SALE.

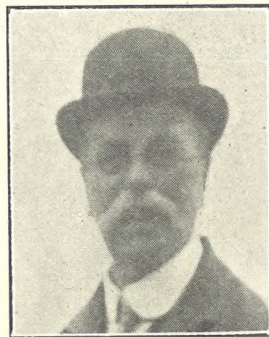

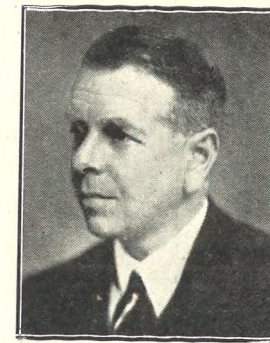
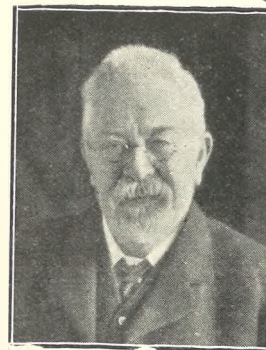

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FATHER AND SON.

Mr. David Lewis and his son, Harry J. Lewis, respectively Secretary and Deputy Secretary of the Cheltenham and Gloucester Building Society. Mr. David Lewis became Secretary in 1885, when the total assets were a little over £140,000. They are now £3,380,000, with total reserve funds that exceed 10 per cent. of total liabilities to shareholders and depositors. Mr. Lewis, sen., now finds it absolutely necessary to share his responsibilities, and the Directors have provided this relief by appointing his son as Deputy-Secretary. Mr. Harry Lewis joined the staff on leaving school 30 years ago, and has for some years past taken an increasing share in the management. He has been actively associated with much social work in Cheltenham; is a Governor of the General Hospital; Superintendent of St. John's Ambulance Brigade; Secretary of the local branch of St. John's Association; Hon. Treasurer to the local branch of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution; Vice-Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Finance Committee; and holds other positions of a similar character.

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WOMEN'S HOCKEY TOURNAMENT IN CHELTHENHAM.

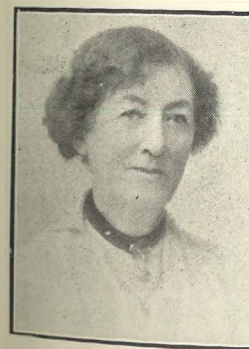

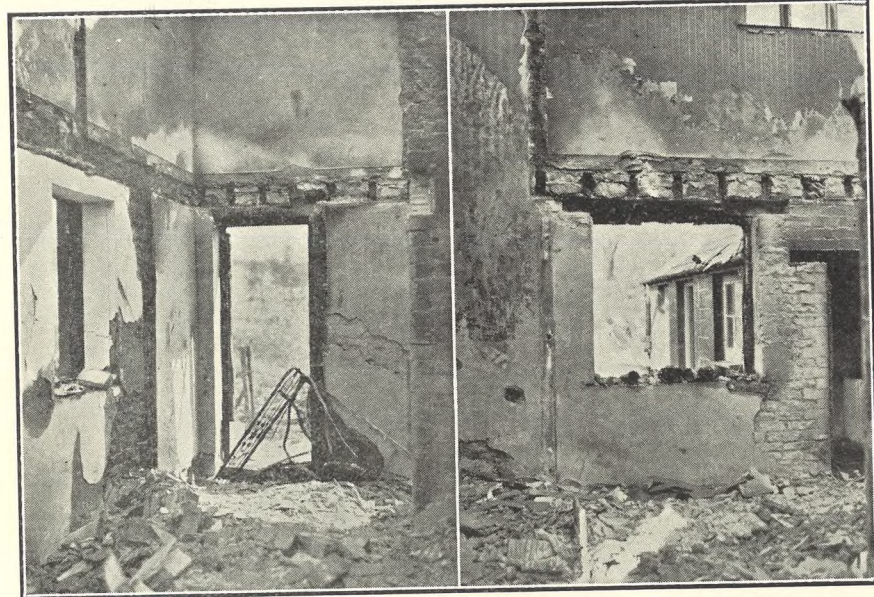
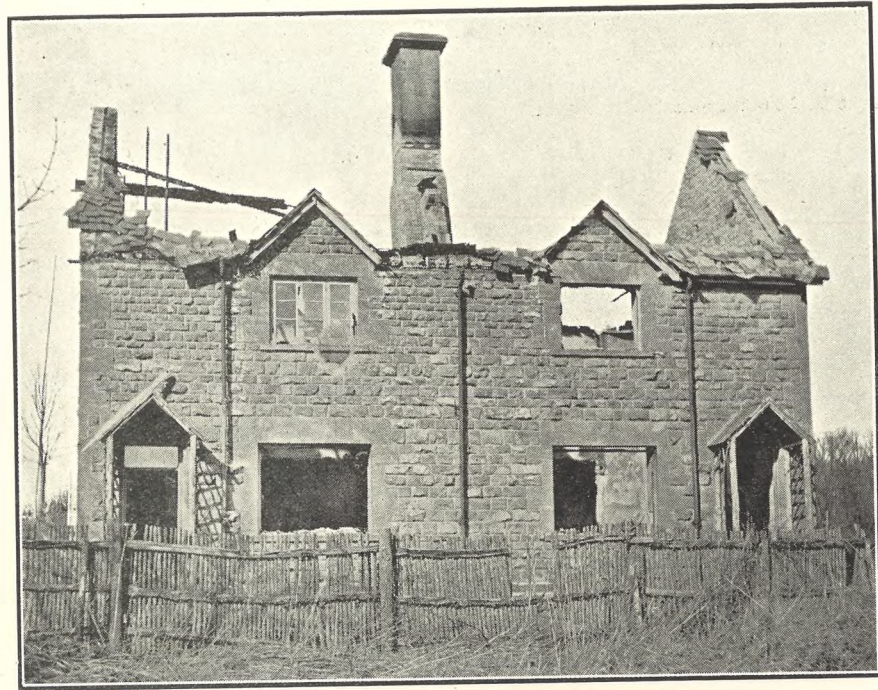

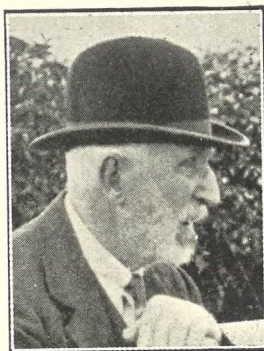
MR. SAMUEL WEAVER,

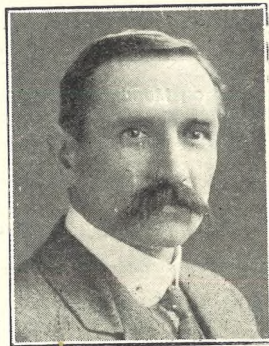

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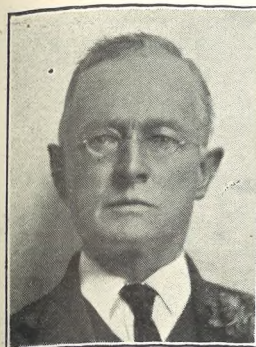

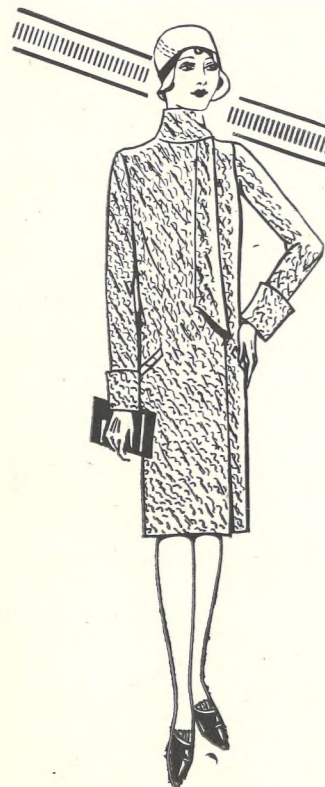

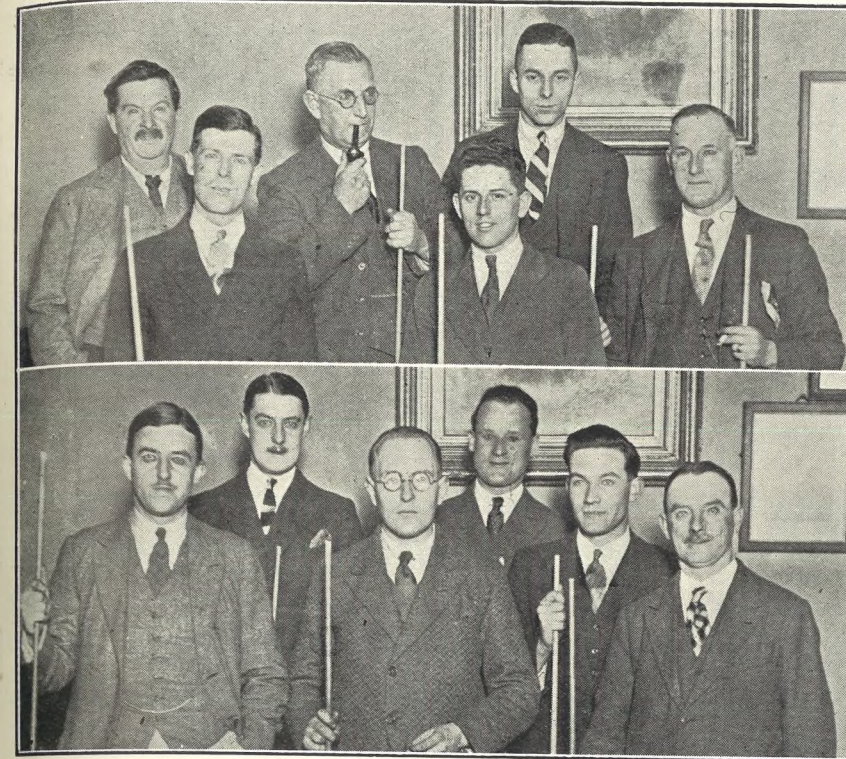

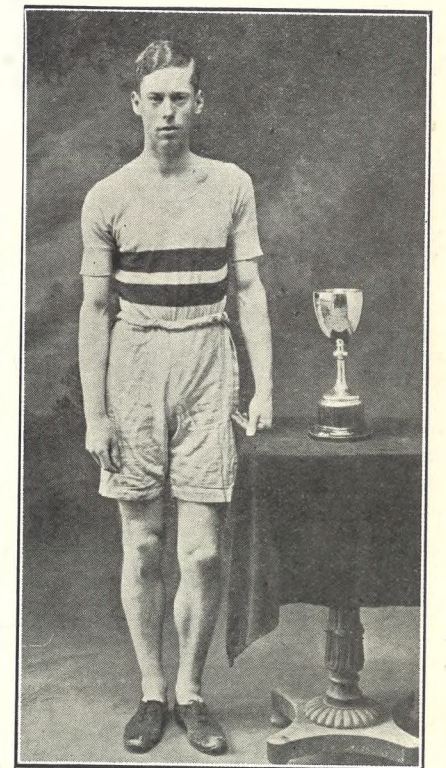

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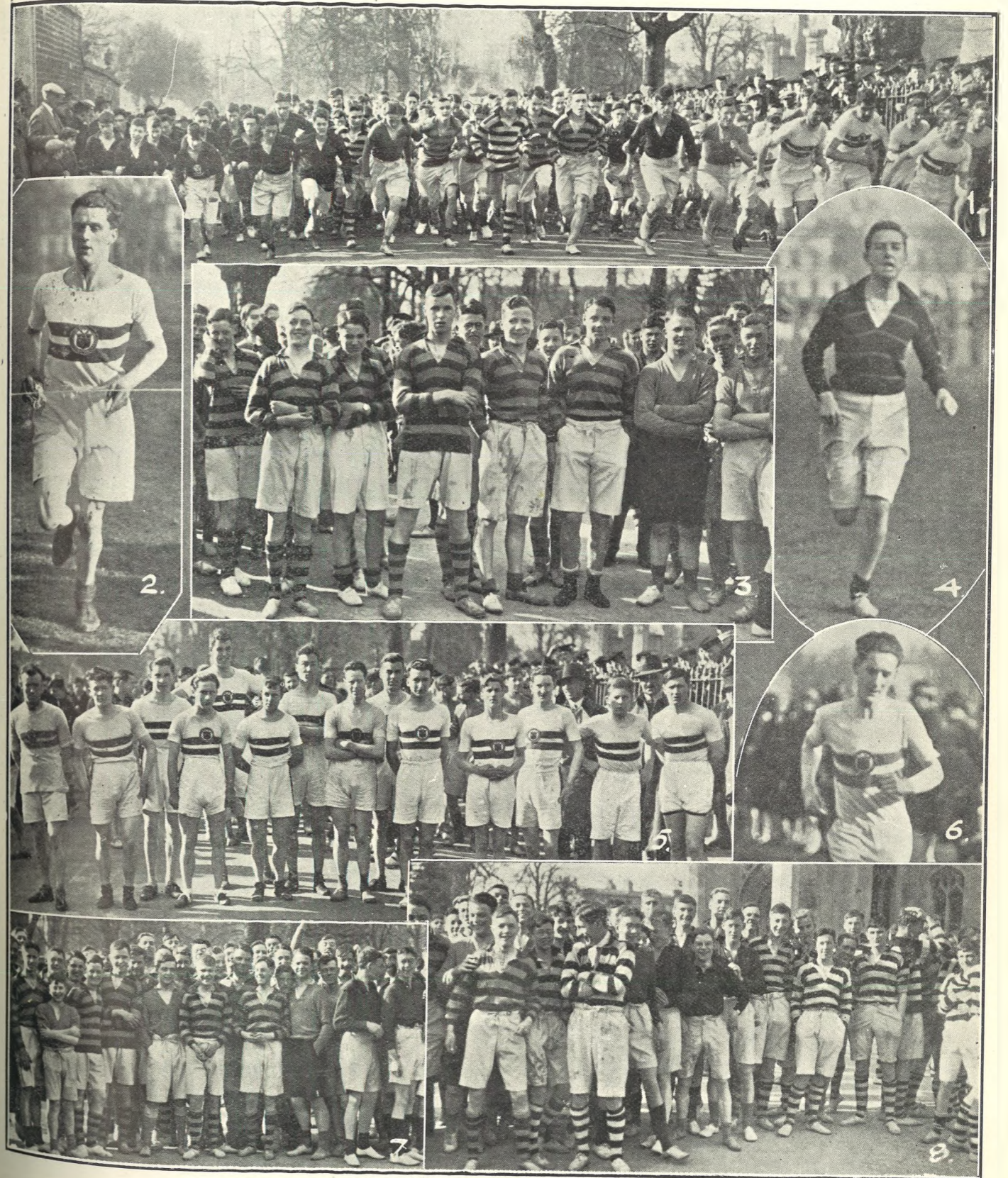

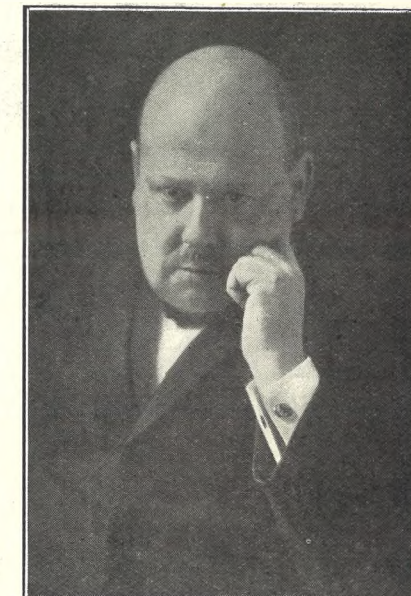

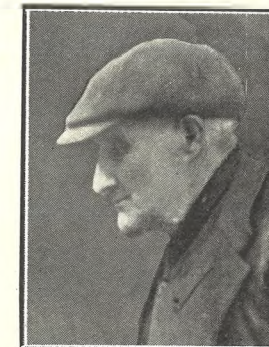

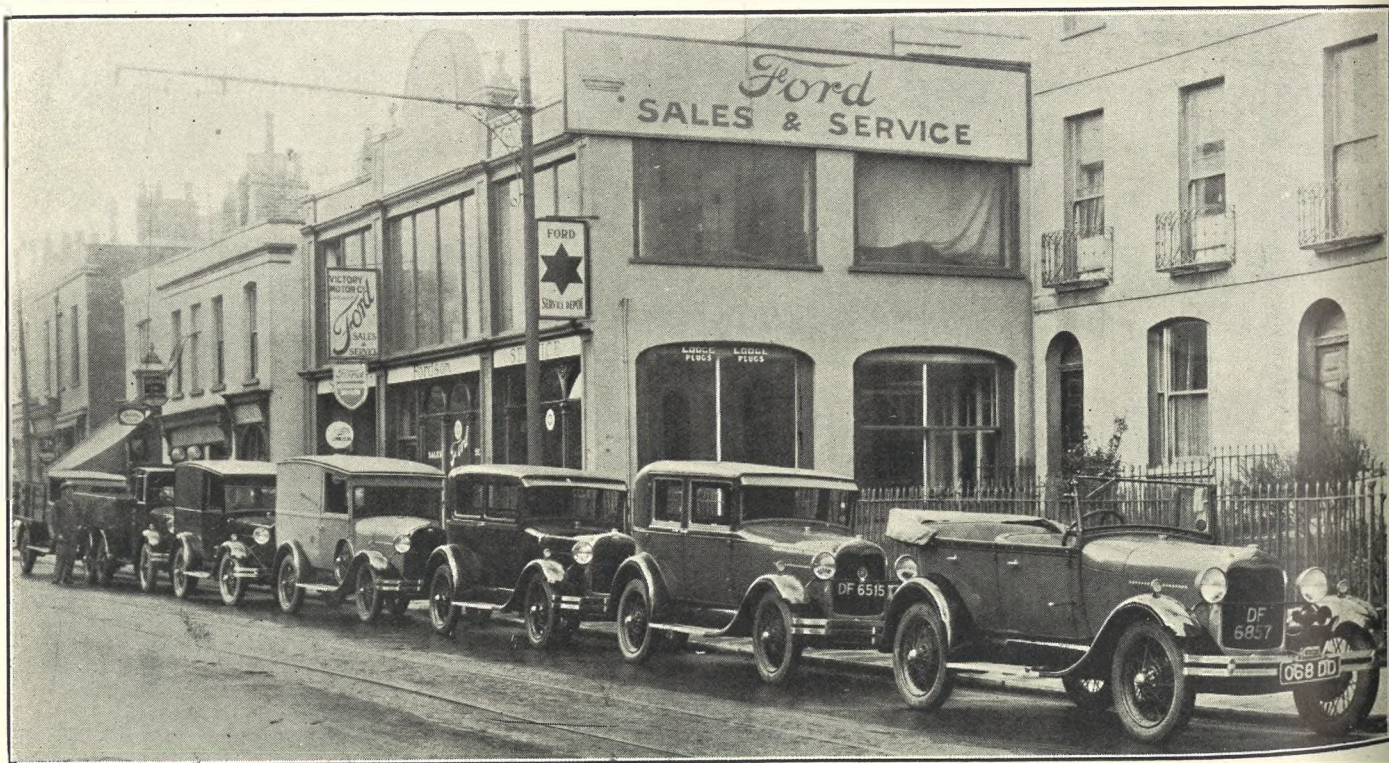
