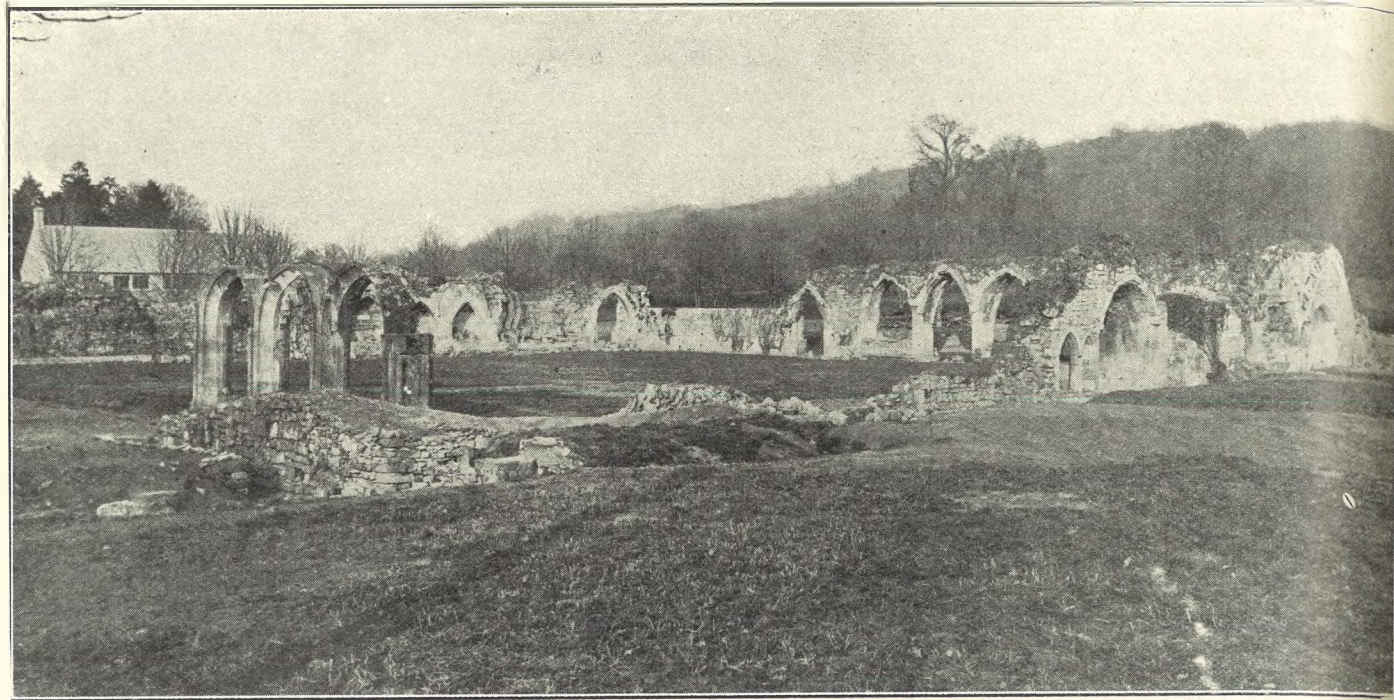


**CHELTENHAM COLLEGE ANNUAL SPORTS.**

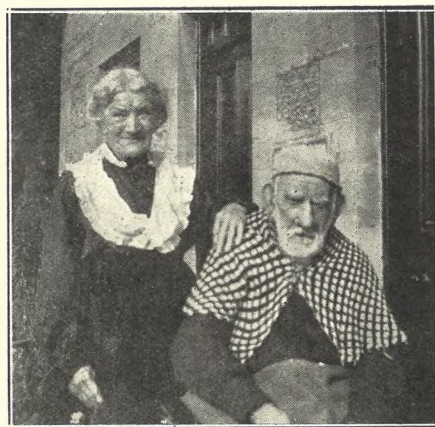


**RESTORATION OF HAYLES ABBEY, NEAR WINCHCOMBE.**

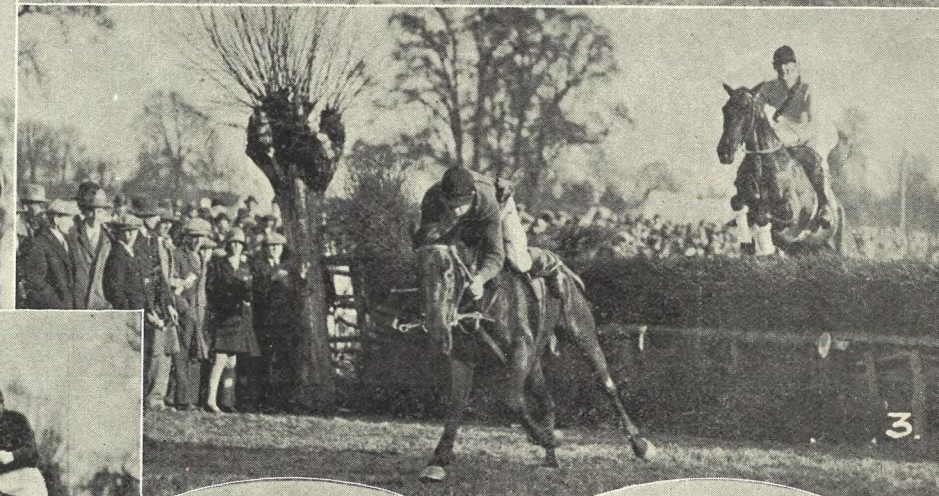
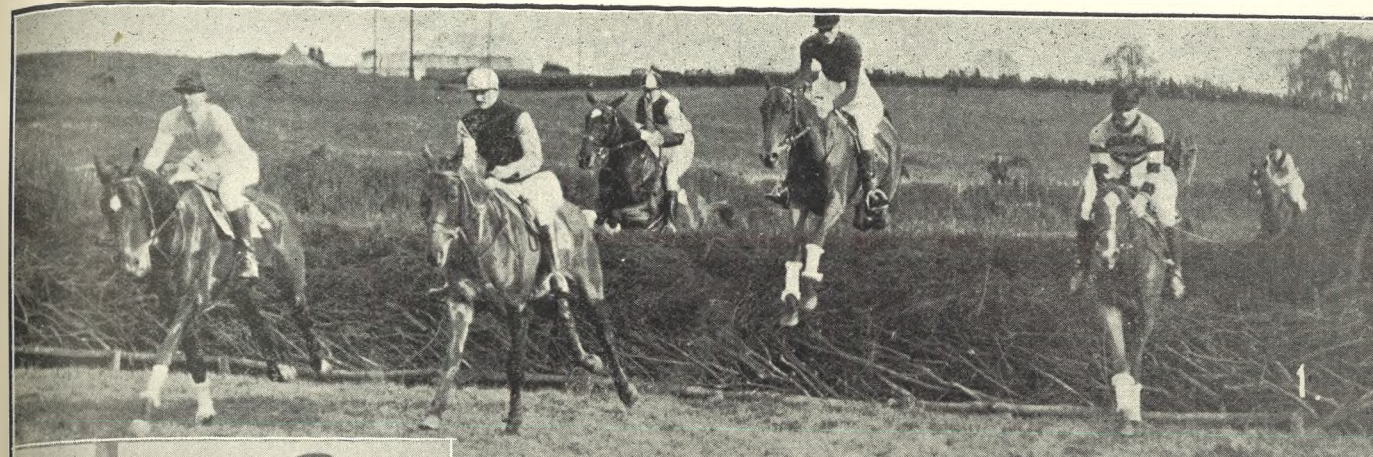


**NEW MUSEUM AT HAYLES ABBEY.**

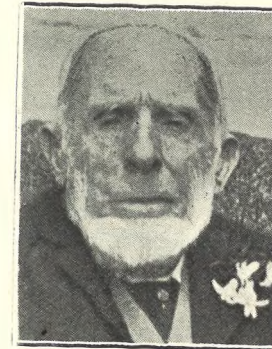

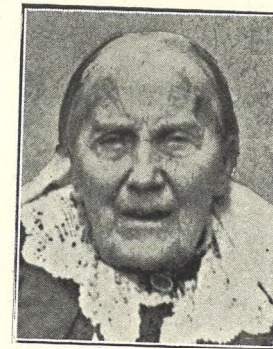

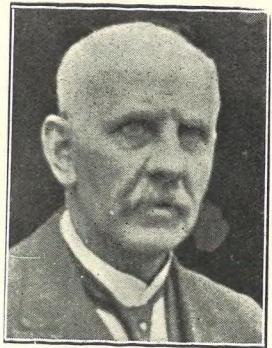
**GLOUCESTER DIAMOND WEDDING.**

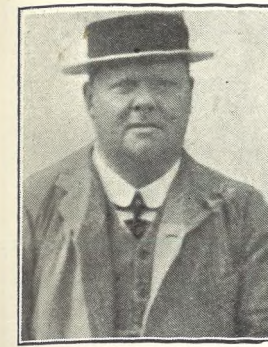


**ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL IN CHELTENHAM: TOWN v. WELTON ROVERS.**

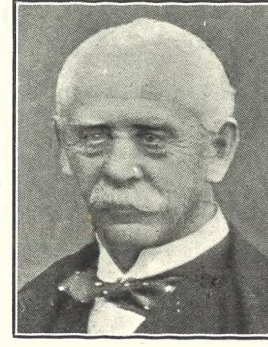
1.—Cheltenham's first goal. A centre from Hill deflected into the corner of the net by Farley, completely beating the goal-keeper.

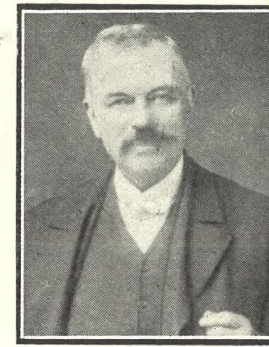

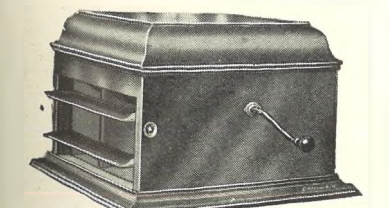


**MR. CHARLES COTTON,**

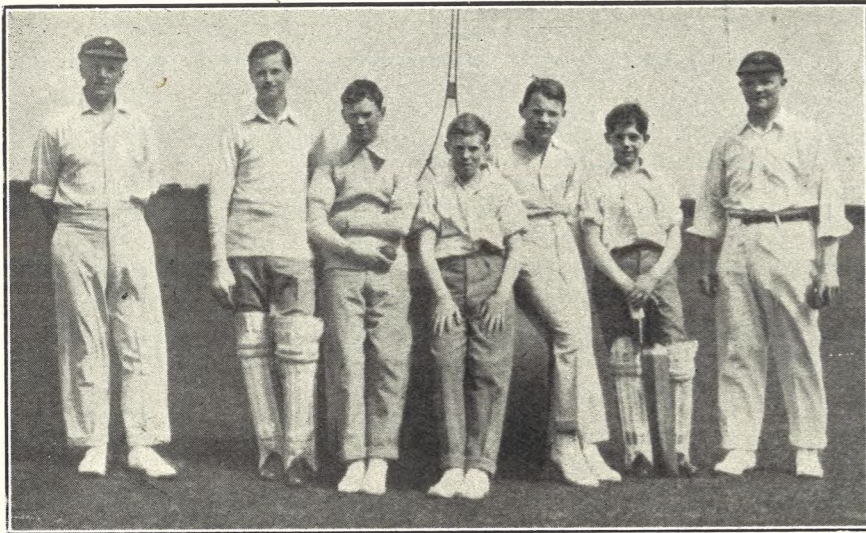

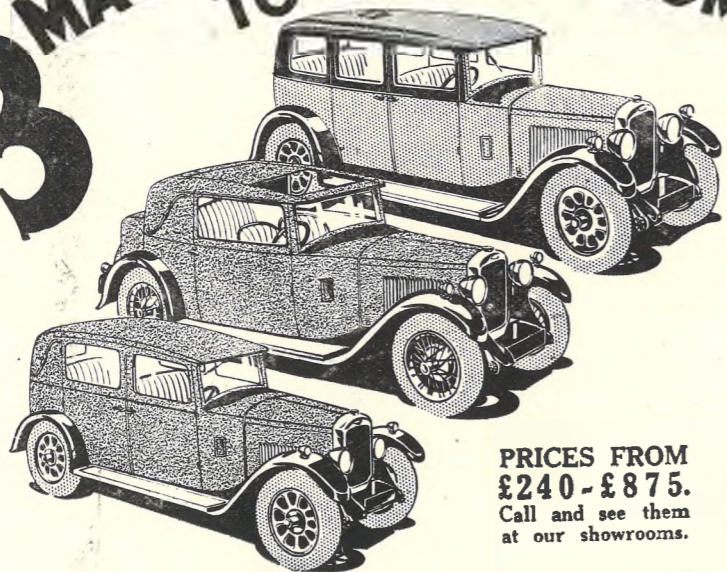
