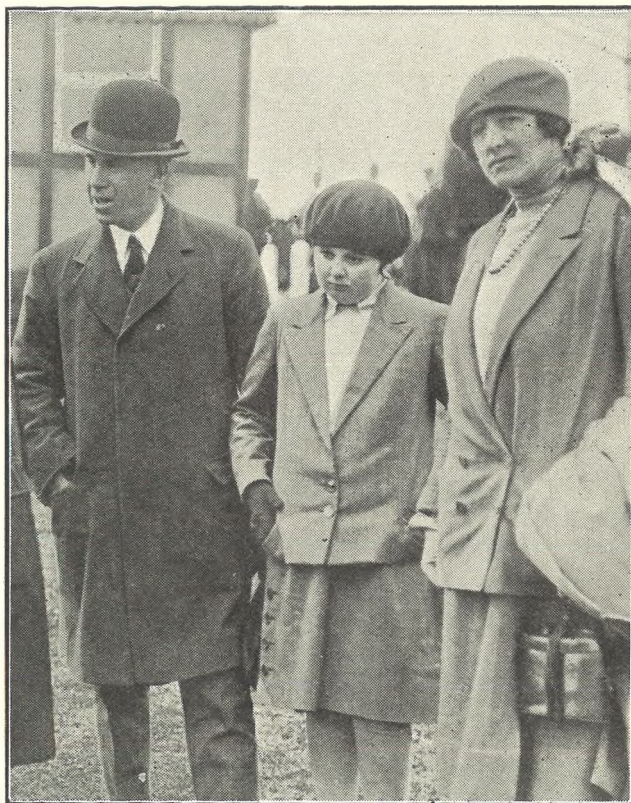

TRAGIC DEATH OF A GLOUCESTERSHIRE SPORTSMAN.

A very painful sensation was caused in Cirencester on Saturday evening last when the sad news was learned that Hon. Aubrey Hastings, the well-known gentleman rider and trainer of race-horses, of Wroughton, had died suddenly in Earl Bathurst's Park, after taking part in a practice game of polo. He was 51 years of age. He is here shown with his wife (the eldest daughter of Mrs. Forsyth Forrest, formerly of Cheltenham) and one of his daughters. He was a younger brother of Lord Huntingdon and was particularly well-known in Cheltenham in polo and racing circles. He trained three winners of the Grand National and rode one of them (Ascetic's Silver) to victory.

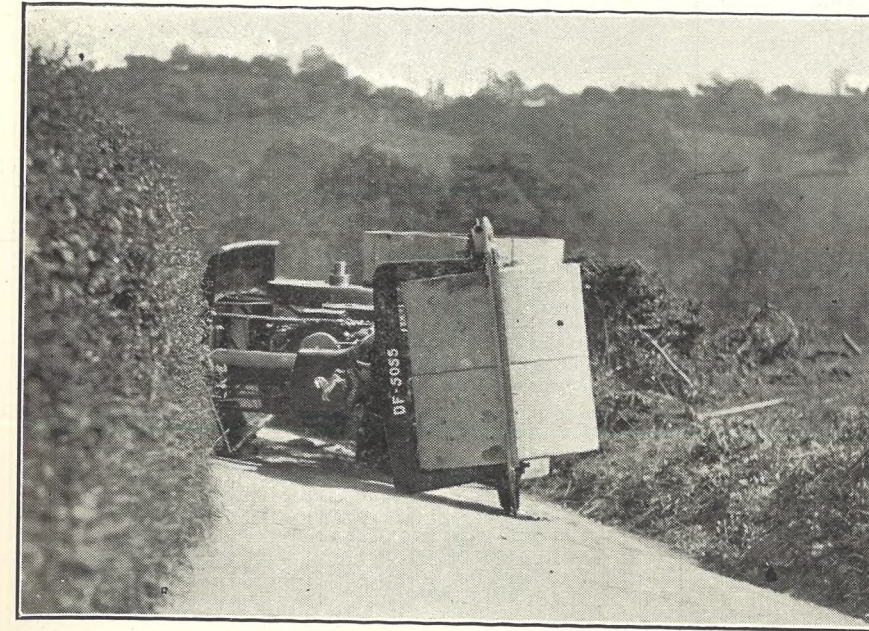


GLOUCESTER SCHOOLS' GYMNASTIC DISPLAY.

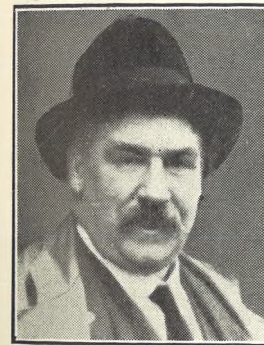
- 1.—A very fine spectacle was the Massed Drill by the whole School.

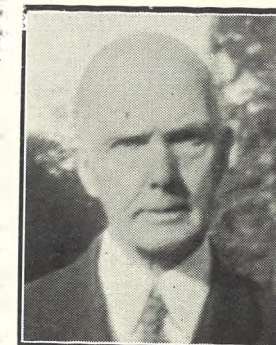


ACCIDENT TO A STEAM ROLLER.

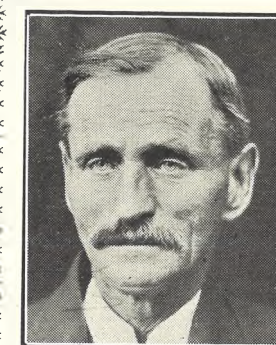

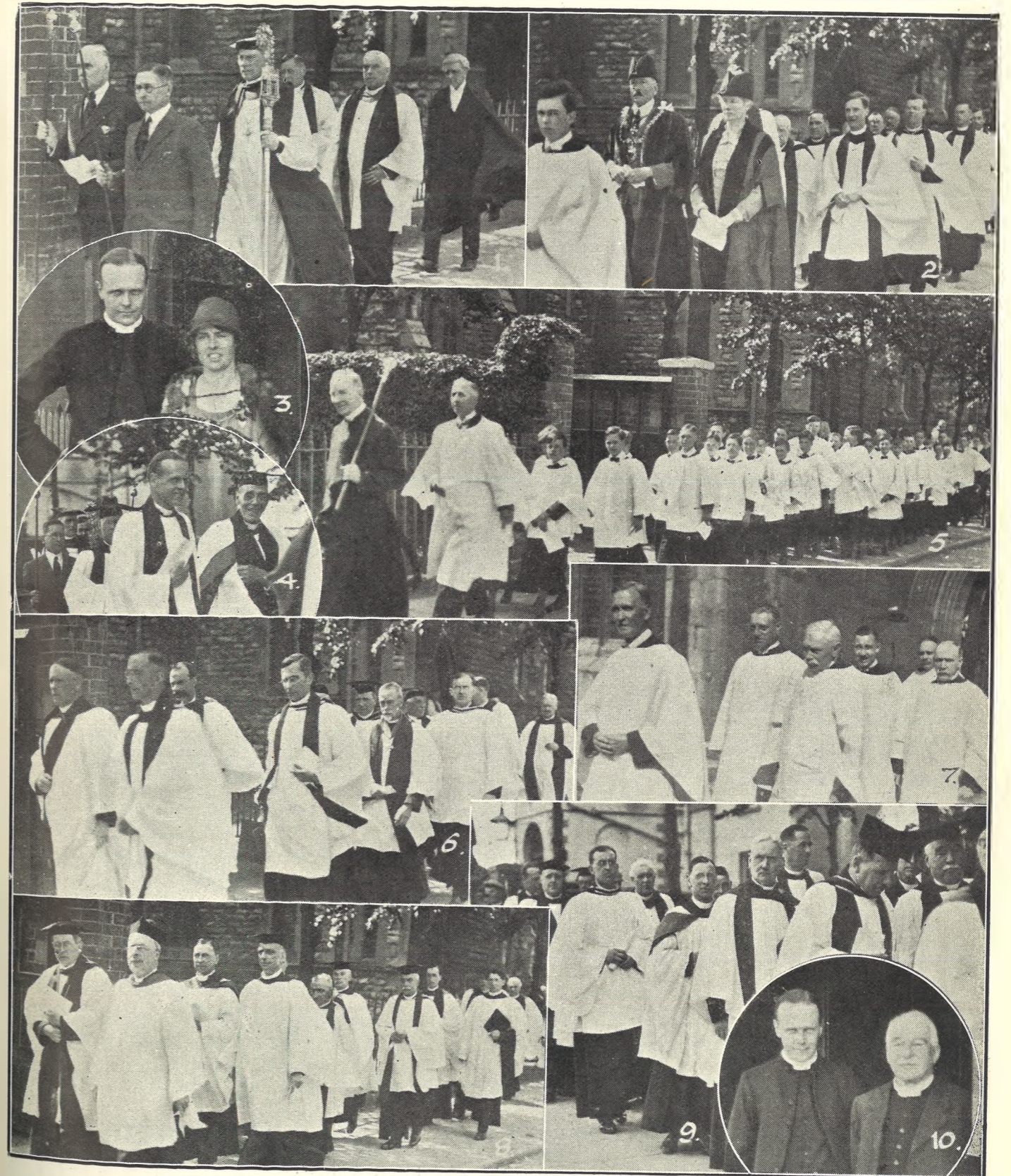


THE GENERAL ELECTION IN CHELTENHAM.

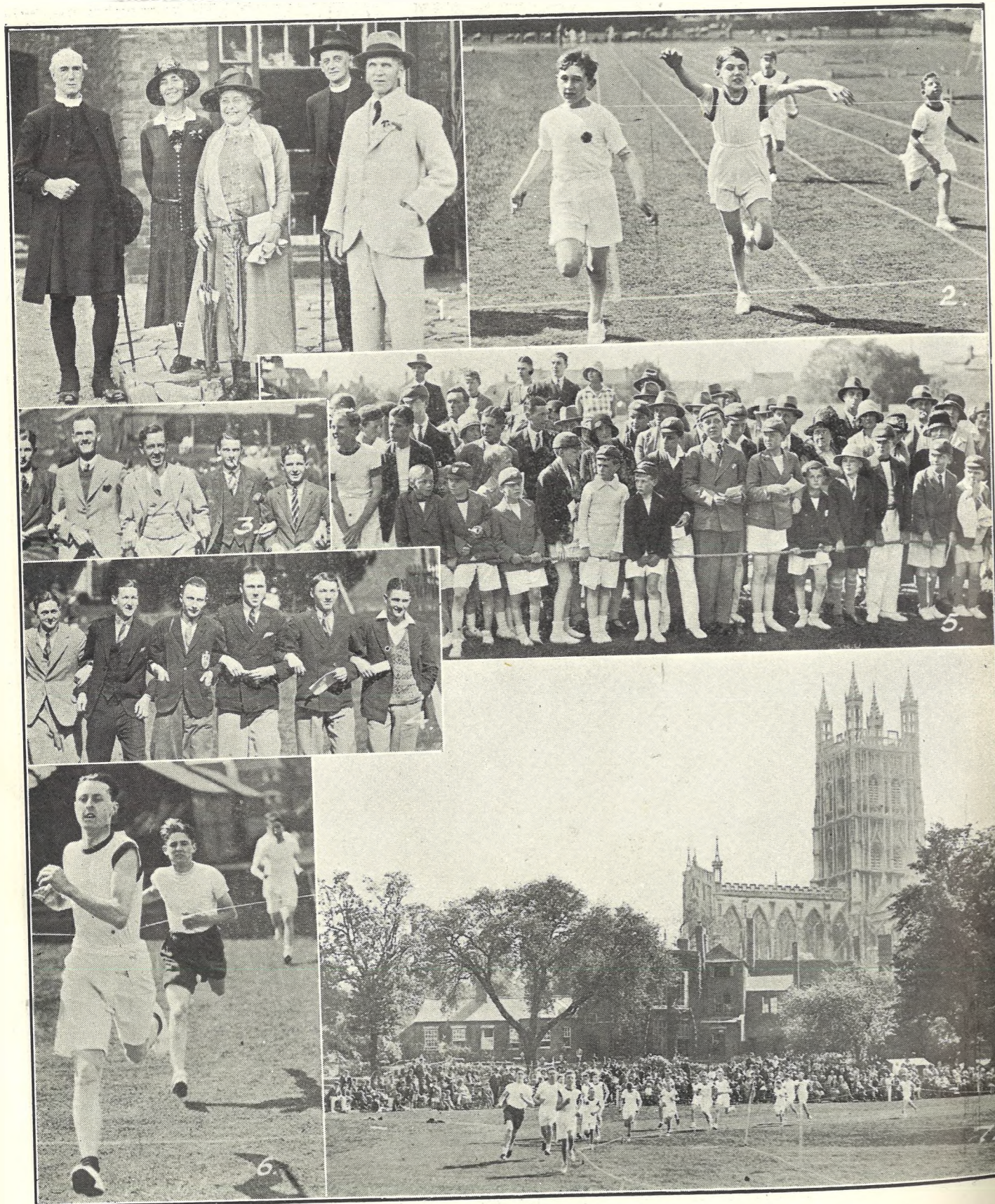


INDUCTION OF THE NEW RECTOR OF CHELTENHAM.

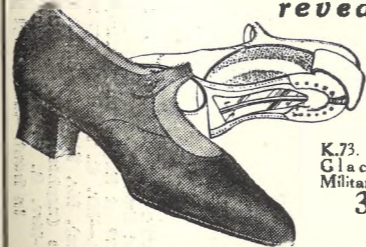

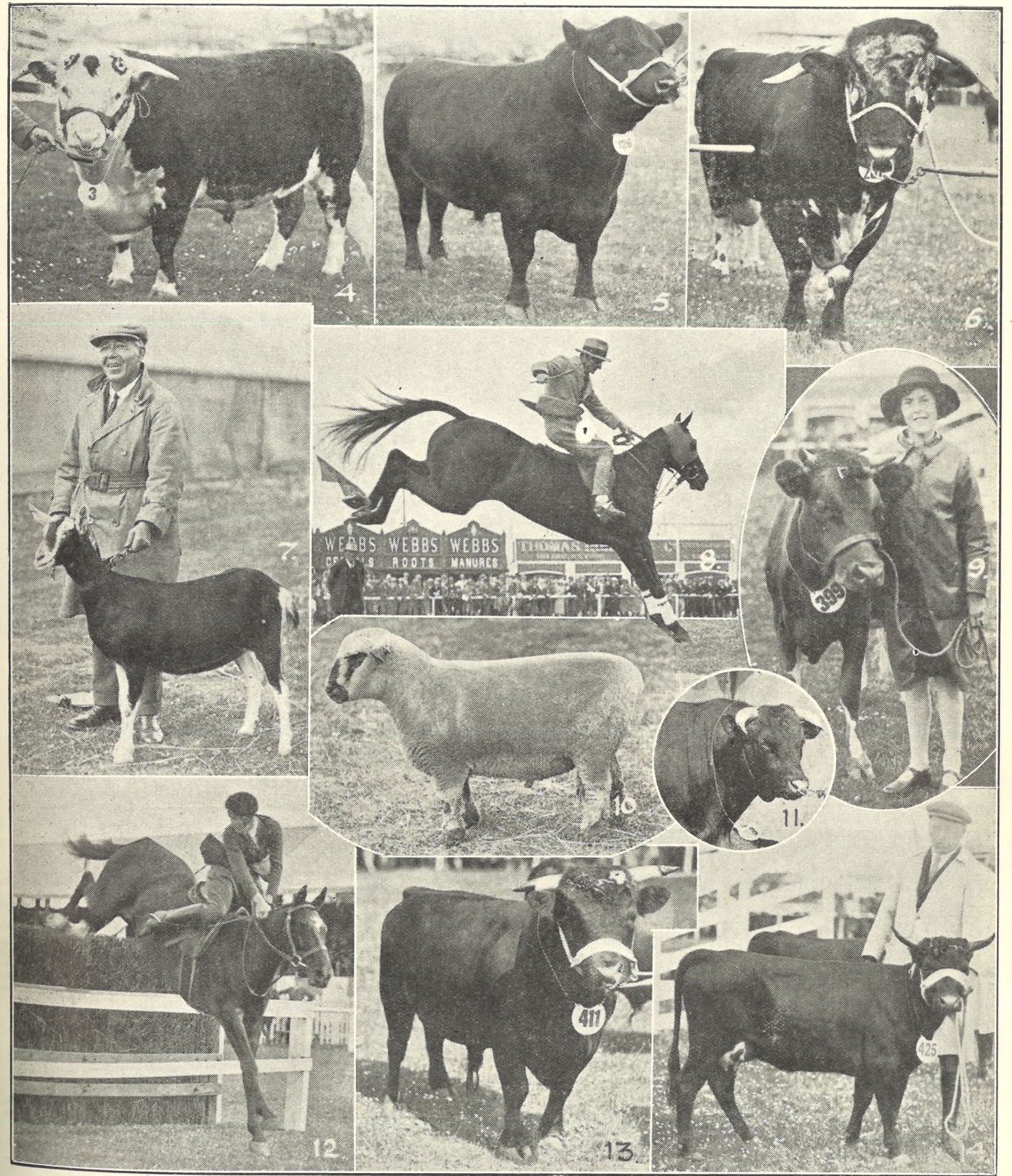

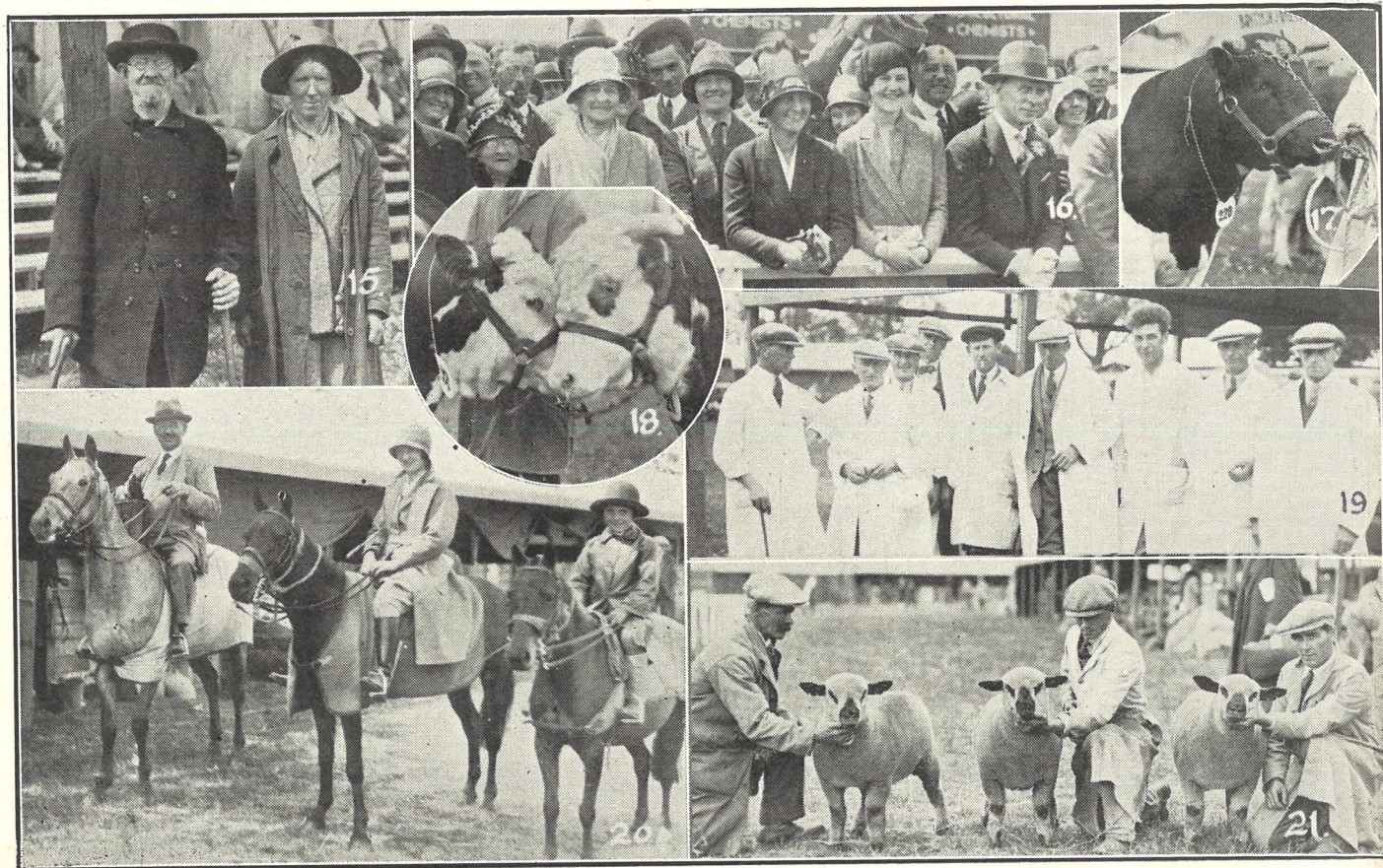

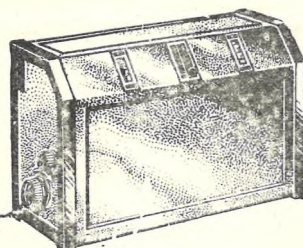

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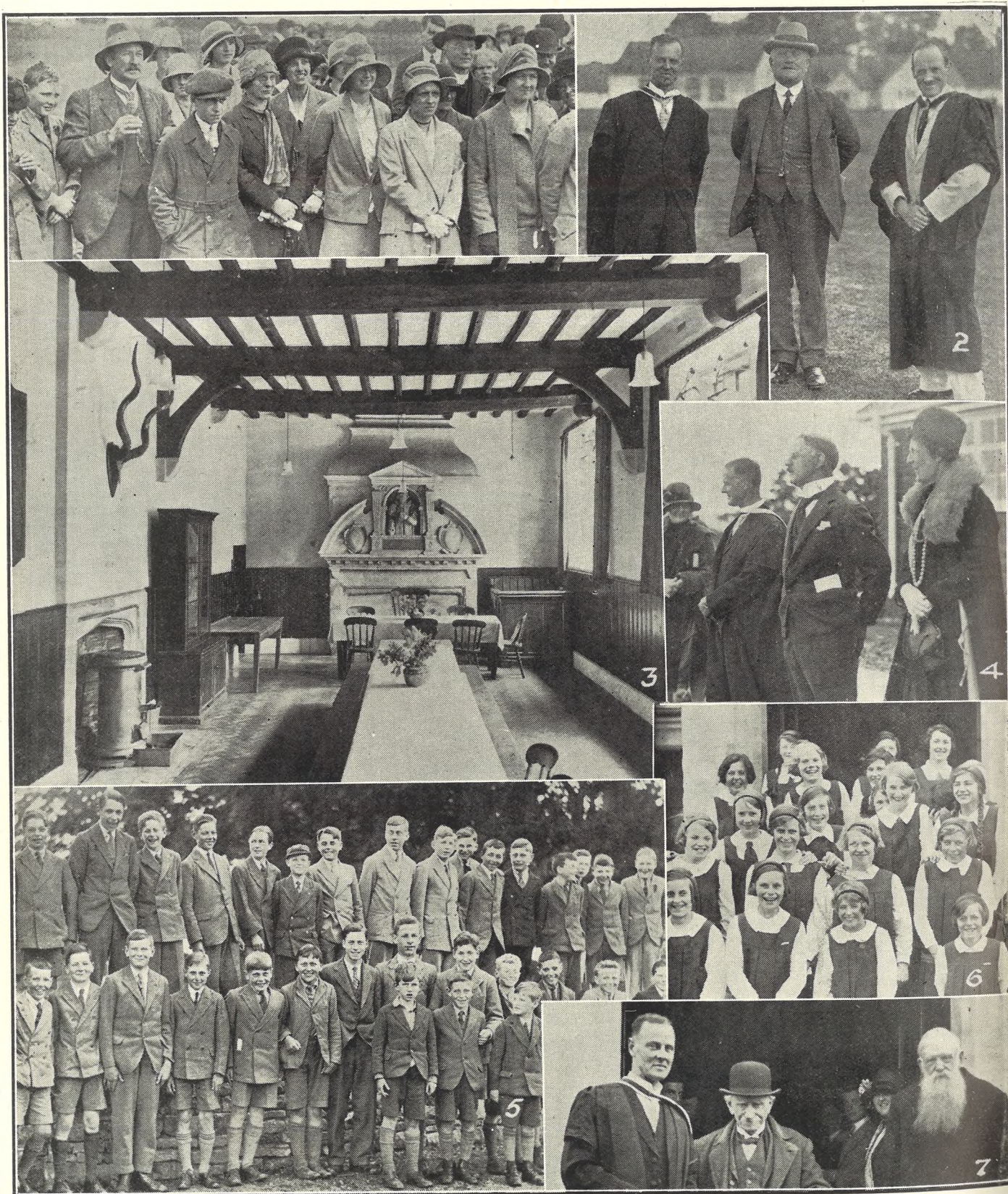

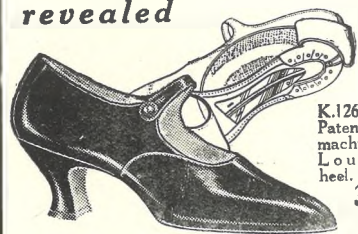

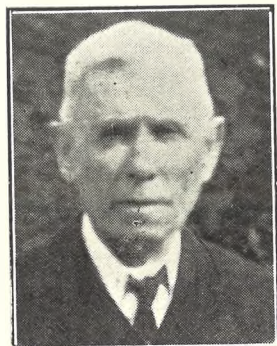

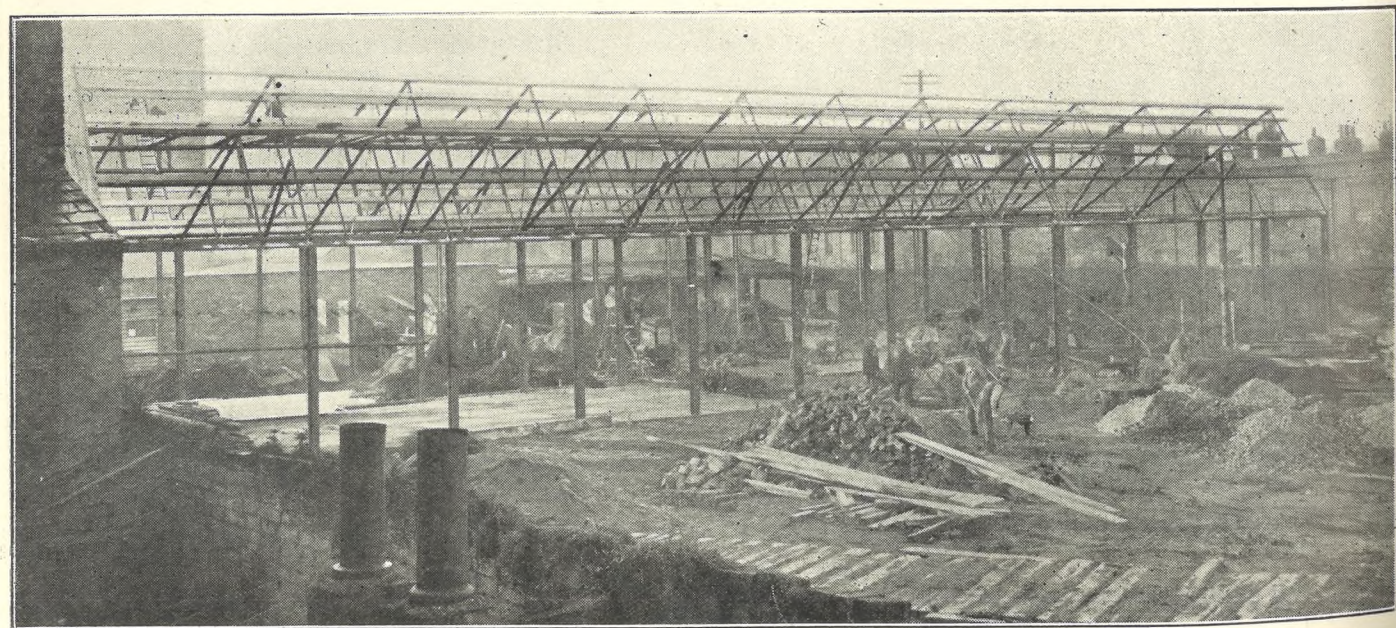

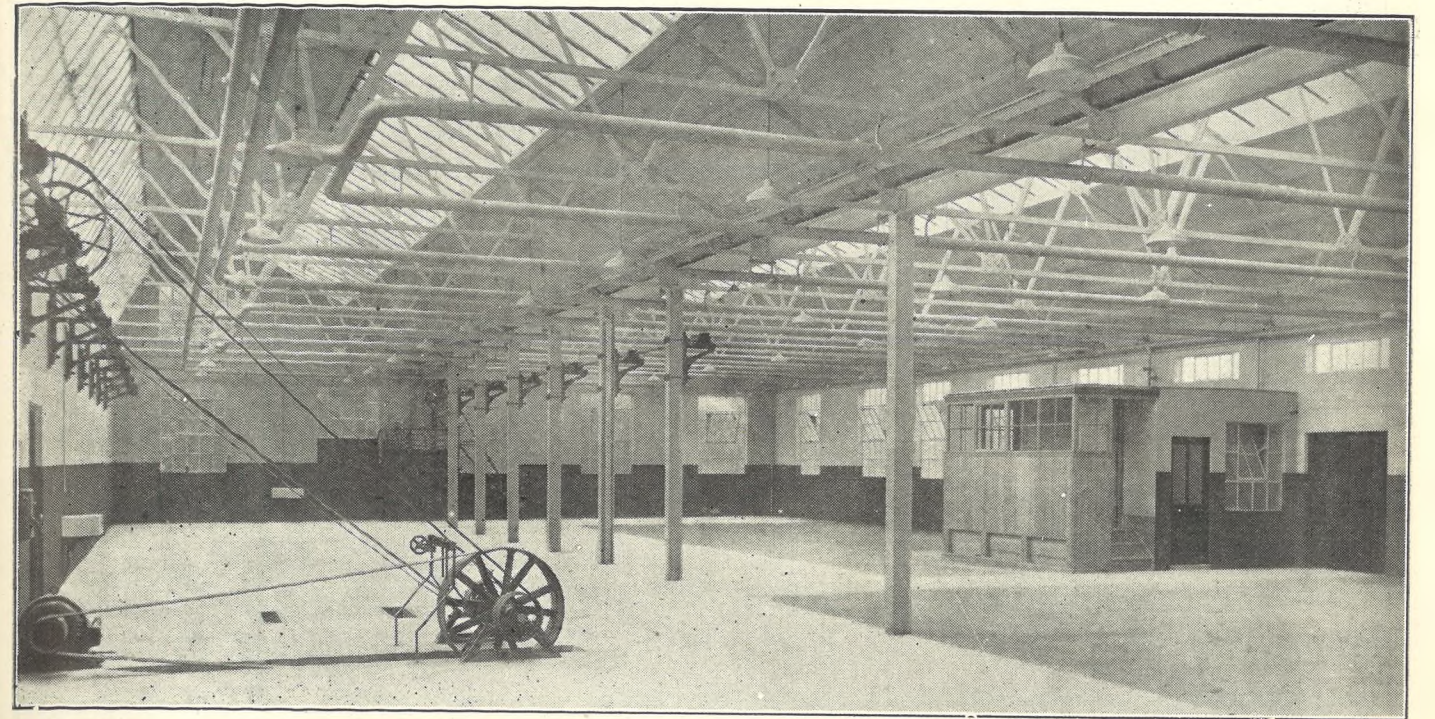


STEEL SKELETON IN COURSE OF ERECTION, AND PREPARATIONS FOR MACHINE BEDS.

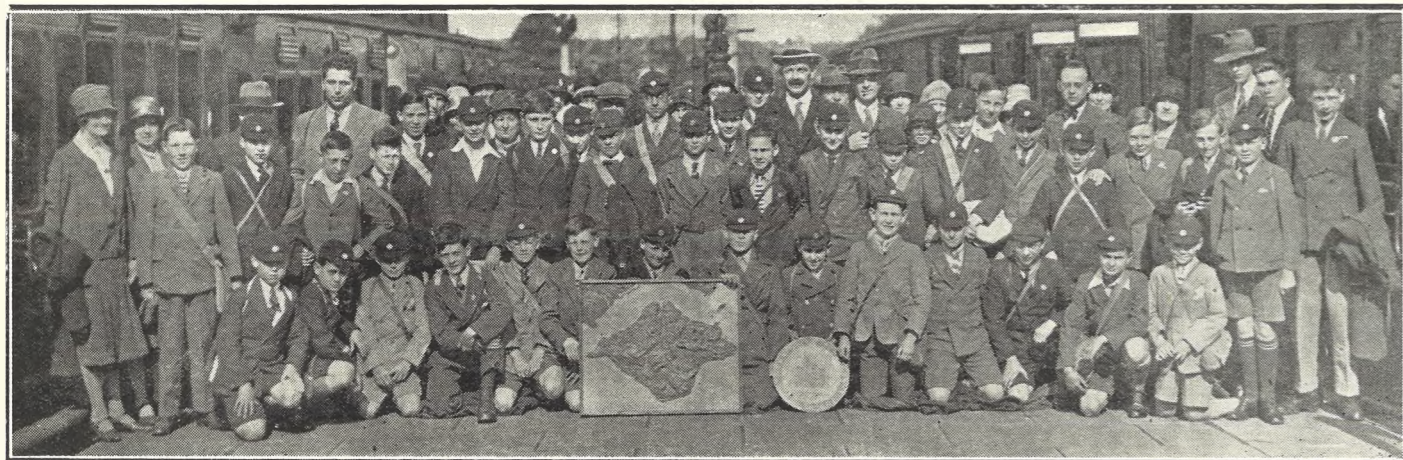

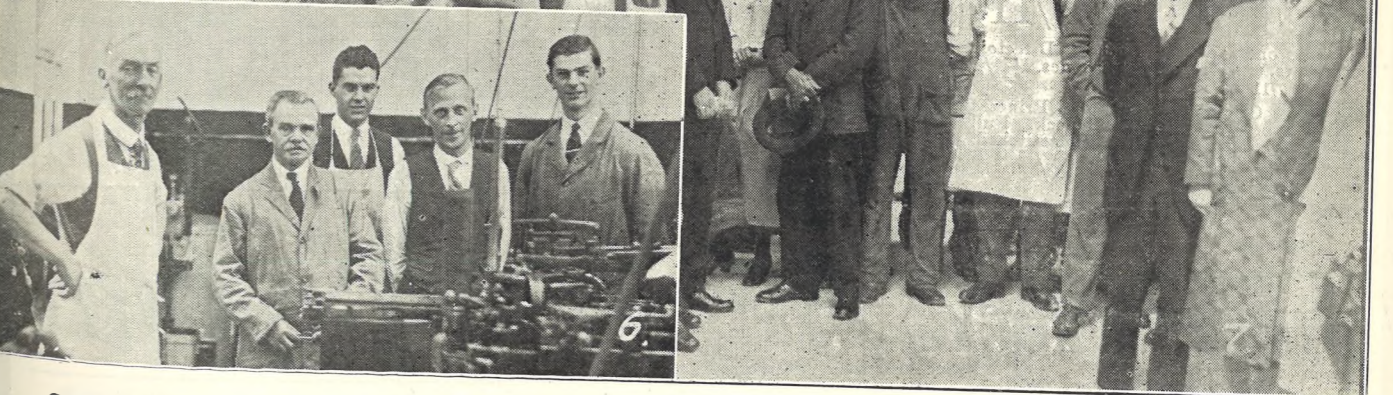

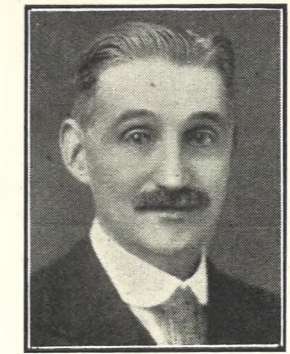
A CHARLTON DIAMOND WEDDING.

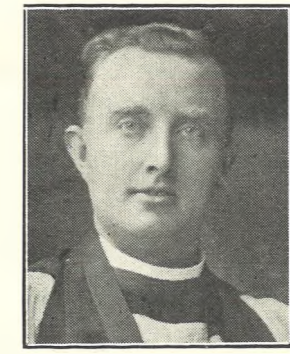

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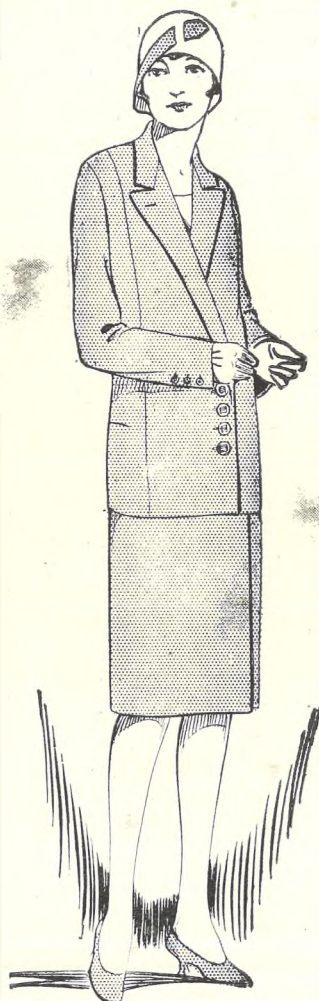
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
