



THE AMBULANCE SERVICE IN CHELTENHAM is conducted from Ambulance Headquarters by a Joint Executive Committee of the St. John Ambulance Association and the British Red Cross Society. The ambulances are staffed by the men and nurses of the two bodies who give their trained services whenever called upon.

Two drivers are the only paid employees—all other personal service being voluntary. More than 4,500 patients (including over 700 street accidents) have been conveyed in the Ambulance in the past 81 years, representing 1 in every 100 of the popula-




