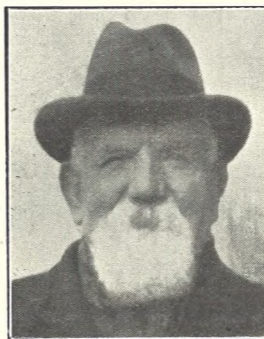

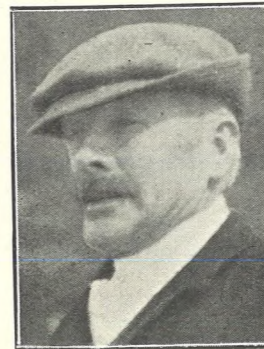
OPENING OF THE CHELTENHAM GENERAL HOSPITAL NEW EXTENSION.

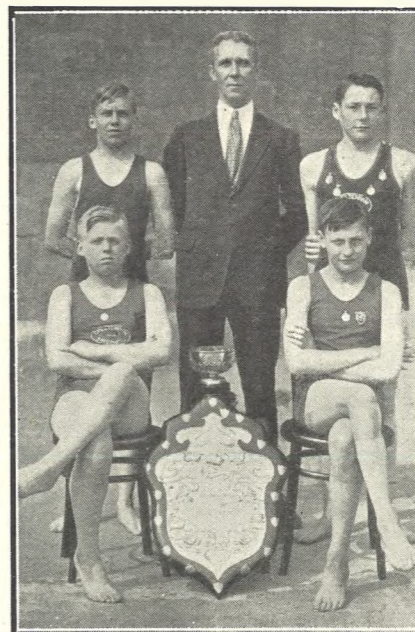
LECKHAMPTON "EARTHQUAKE."

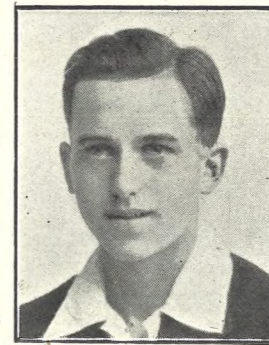

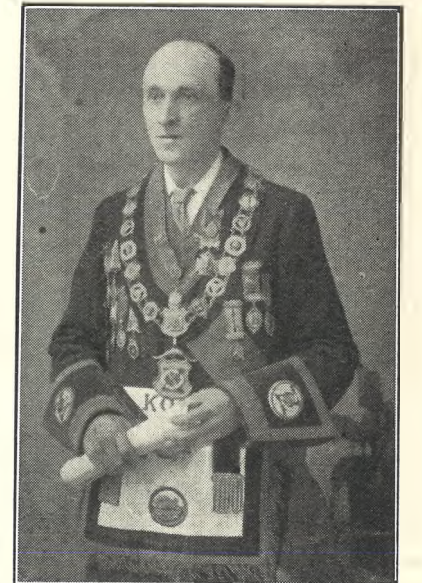

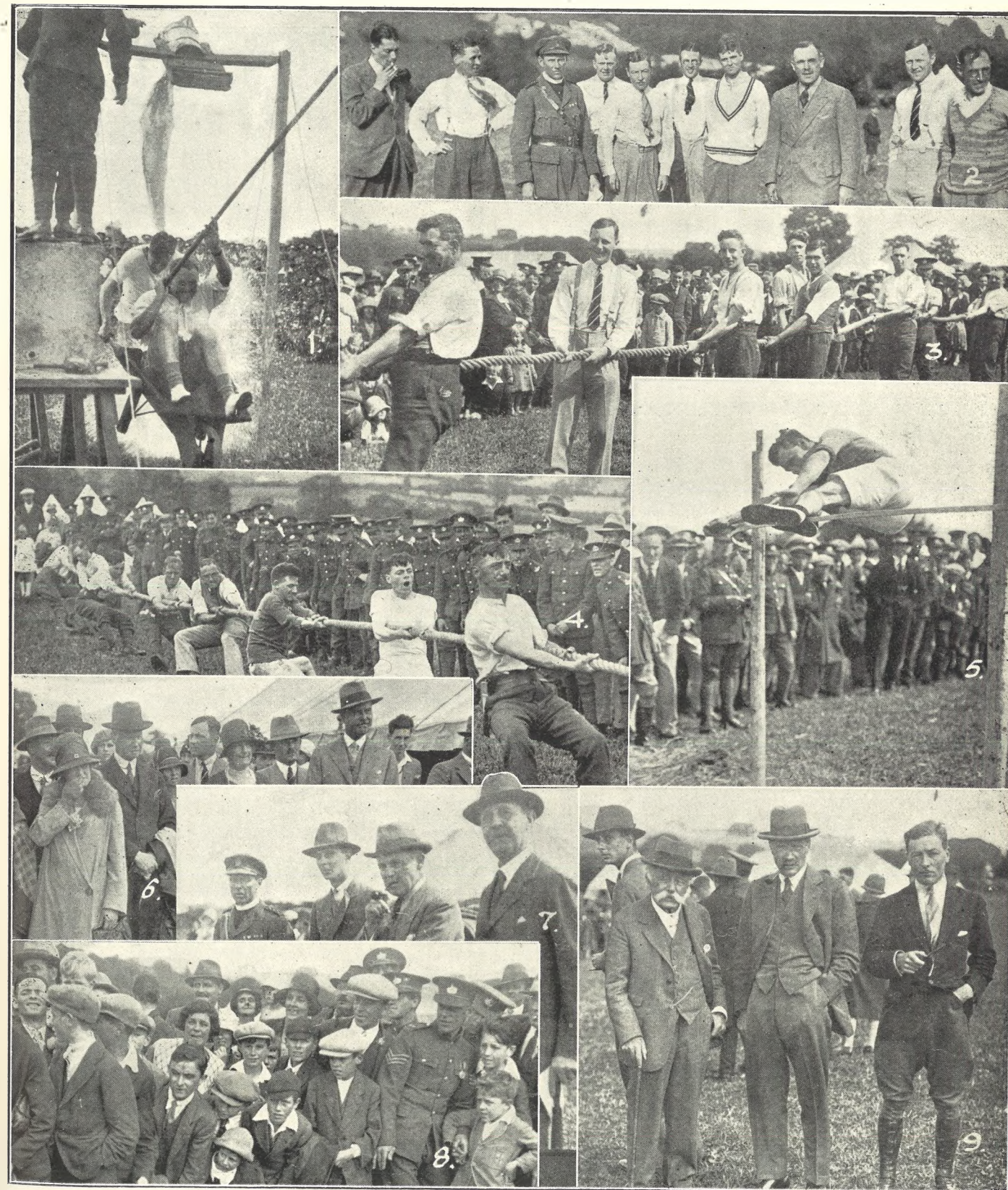

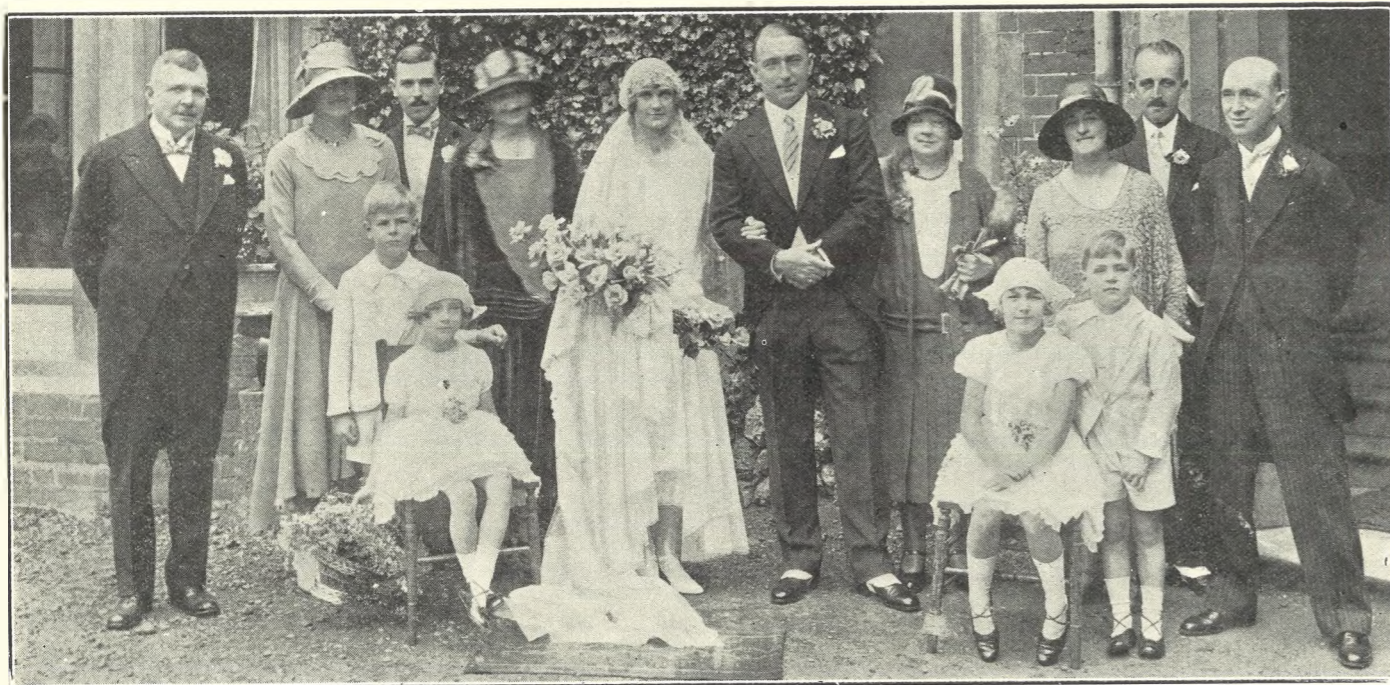

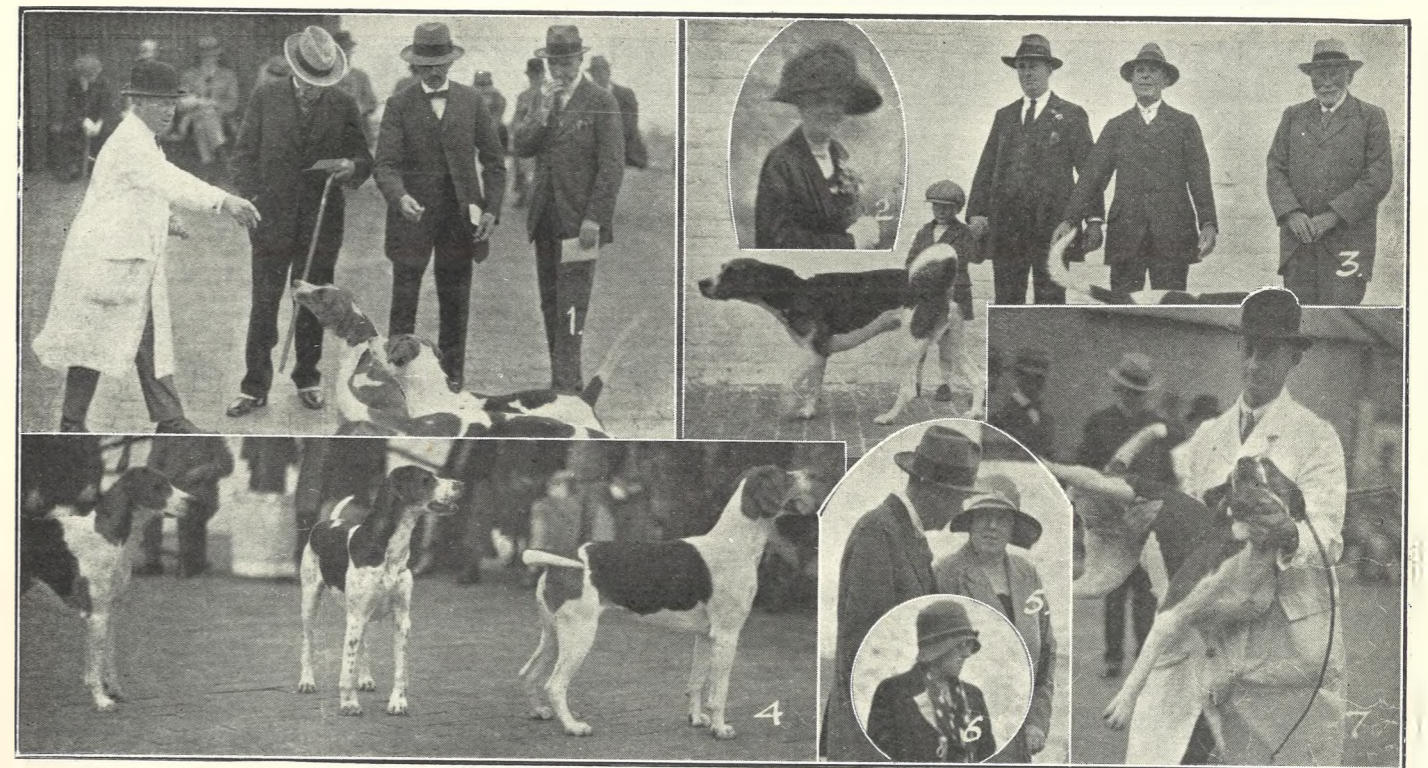

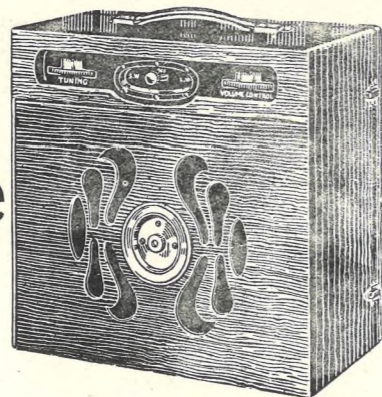

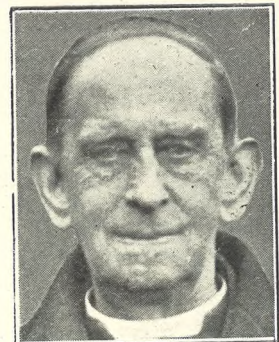
