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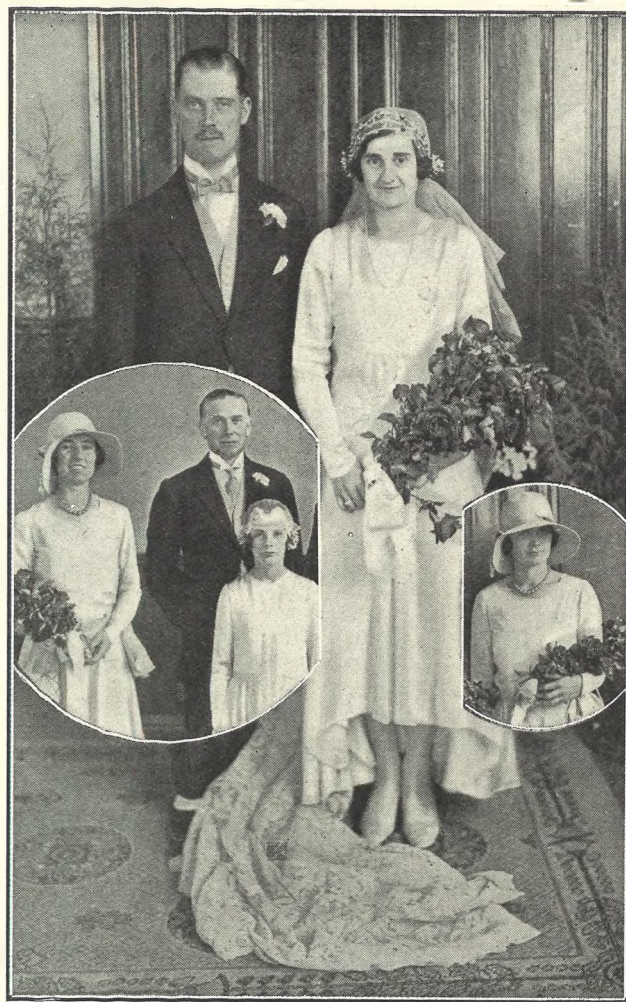

OFF TO THE HOP-FIELDS.

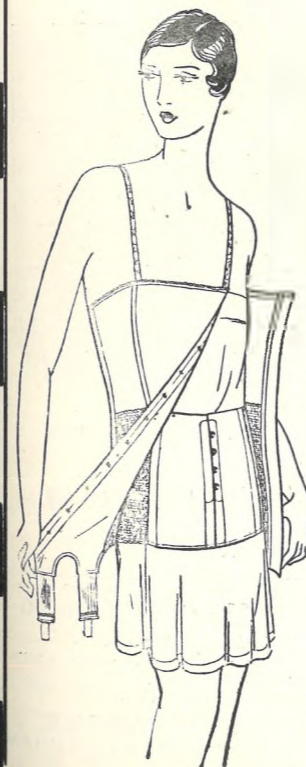

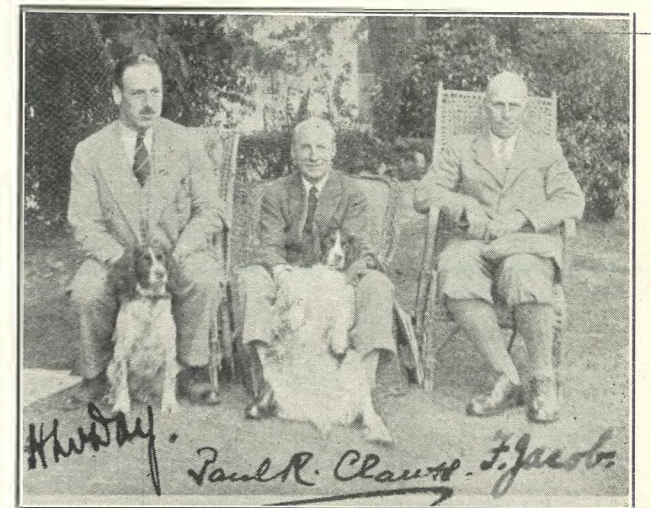

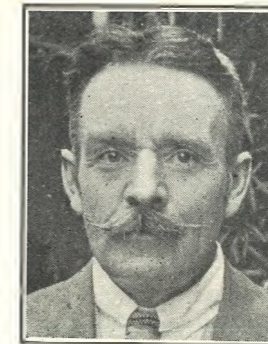


AN UNFORTUNATE FAMILY.

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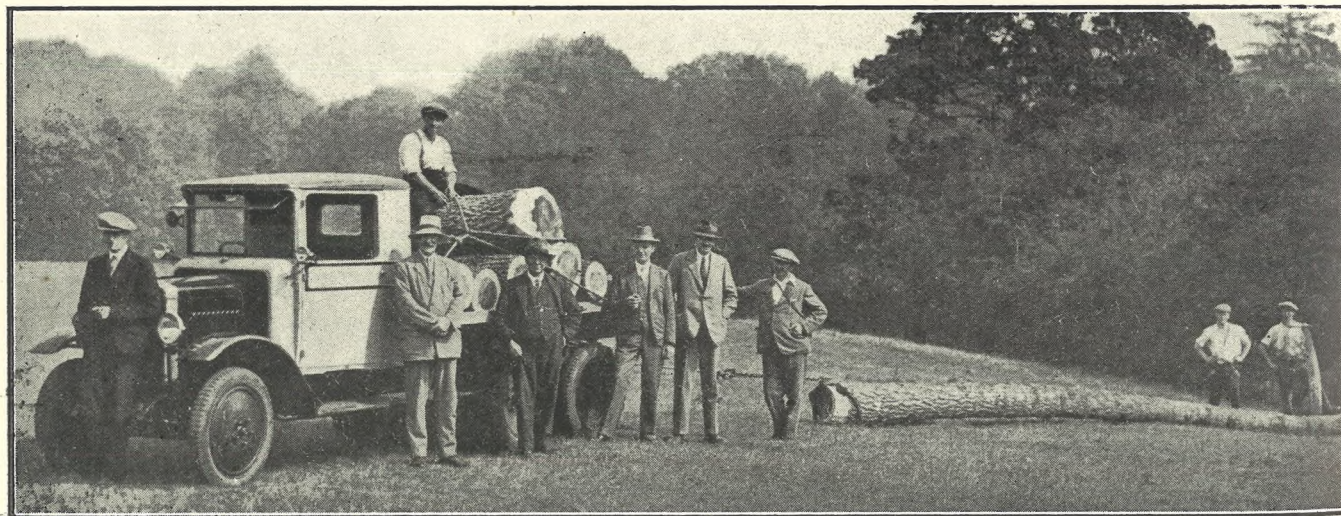

TIMBER HAULING EXTRAORDINARY ON A COTSWOLD ESTATE.

Tree felling has been going on at Col. Elwes's estate at Chatcombe, and there was considerable difficulty in moving the timber. The Wicliffe Motor Co., of 88 High-street and Bath road, Cheltenham, also Russell-street, Stroud, came to the rescue with a Morris Commercial six-wheel vehicle, for which they are the County Distributors, which is particularly adapted for hauling work such as this, the rear four wheels being fitted with a special removable chain of the caterpillar type, enabling a good grip to be obtained on the steepest and most slippery surface. The gradient in this case was 1 in 1.75, but no difficulty was experienced in dealing with the weight of 1½ tons as shown in upper picture. Lower picture shows that after the heavy load has been pulled up this terrific gradient another whole tree weighing a ton was also pulled along to be cut up, and then the whole 2½ tons transported to Gloucester.

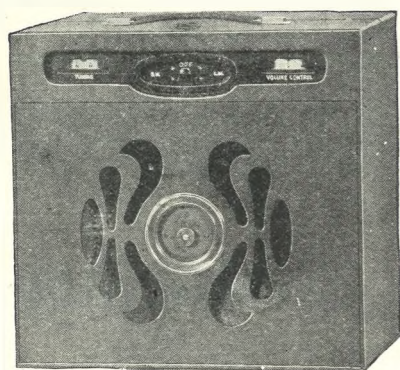

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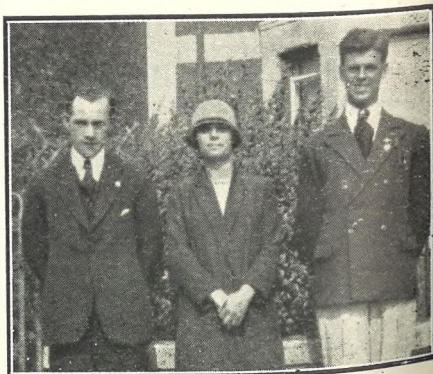

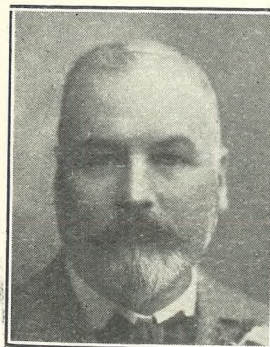

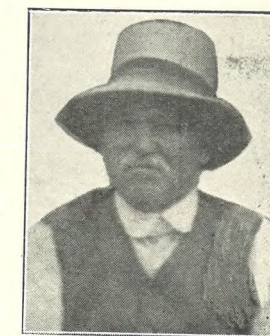

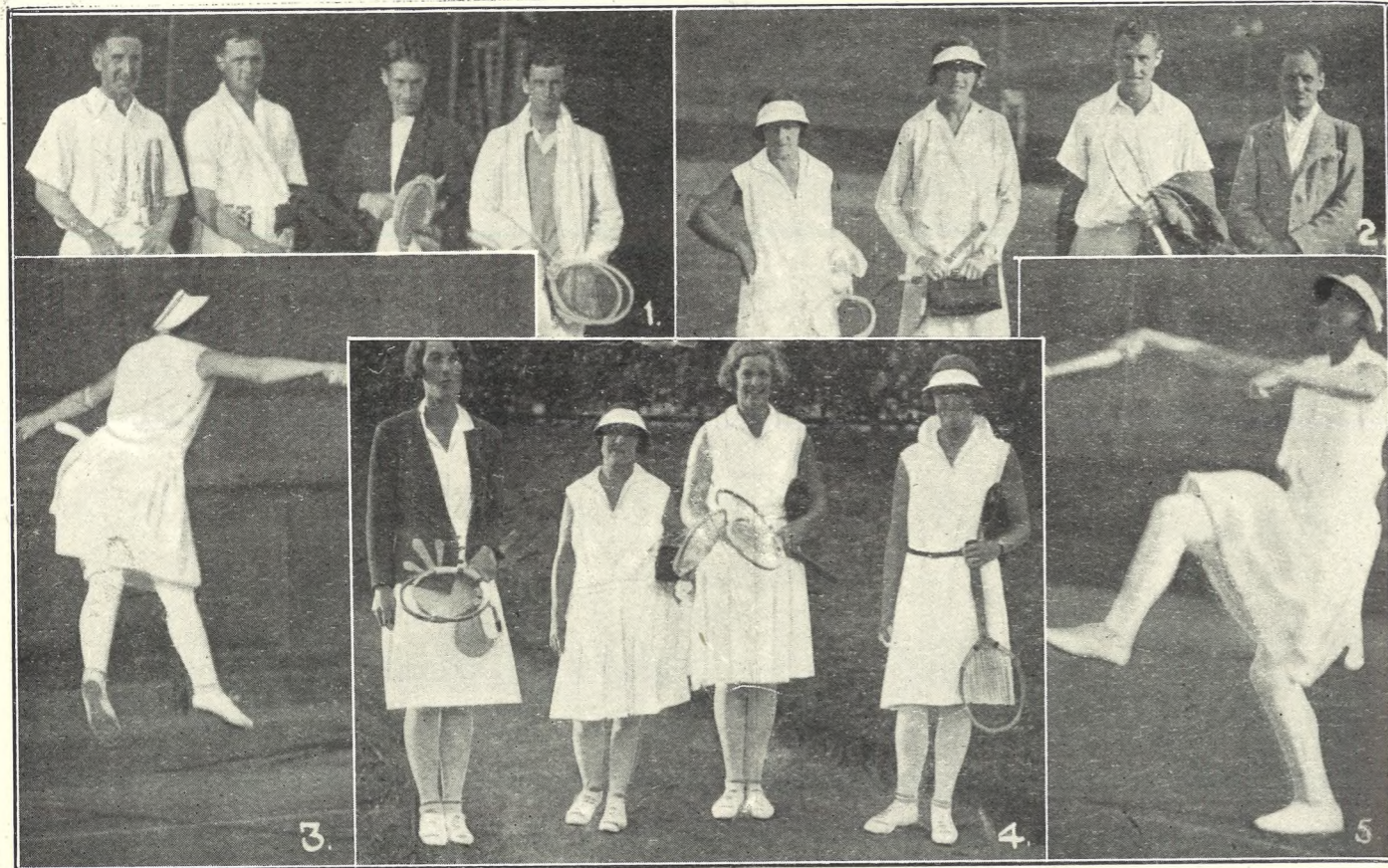

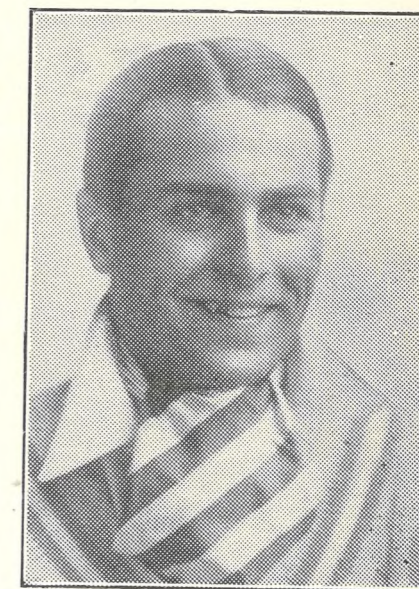
