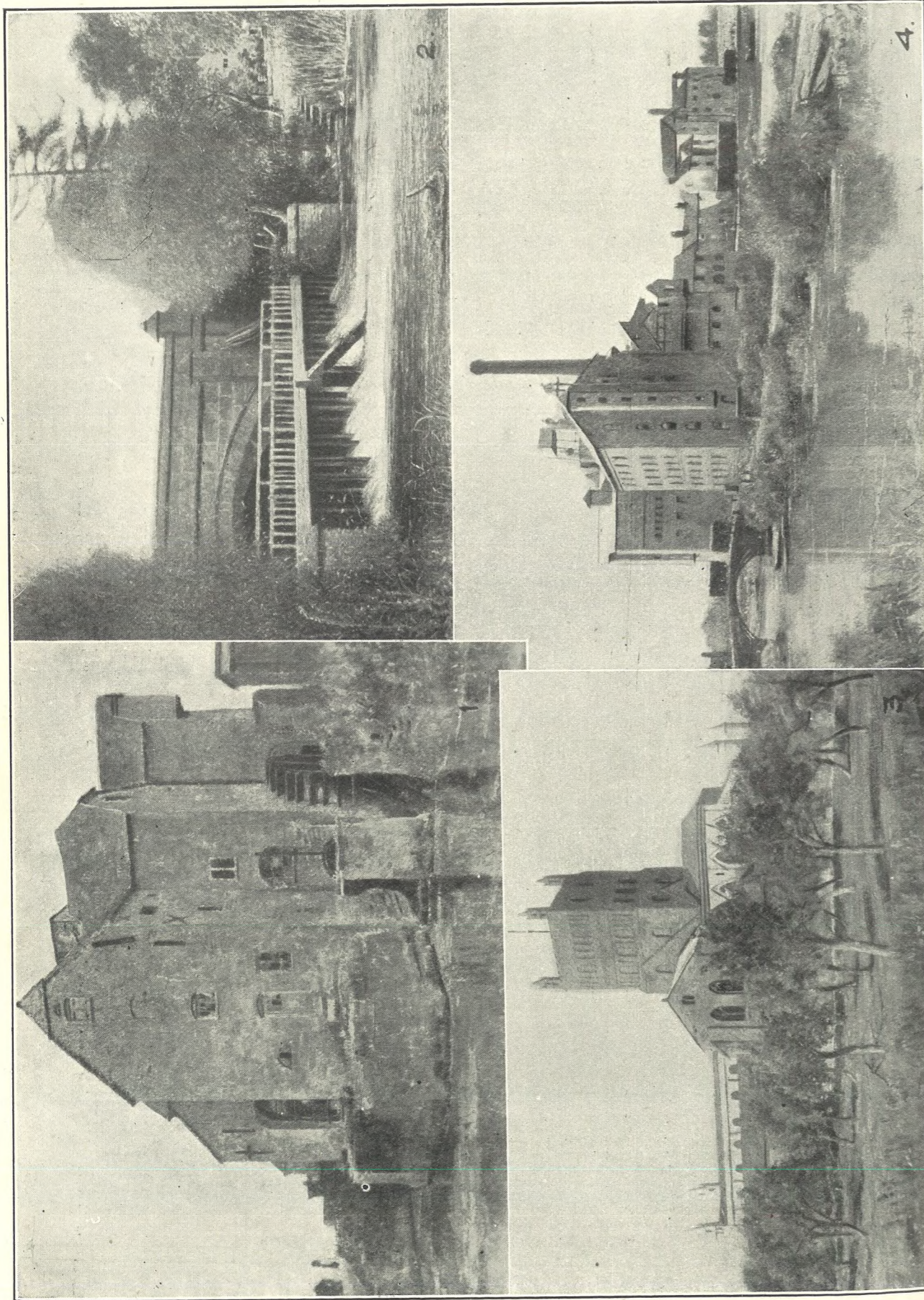

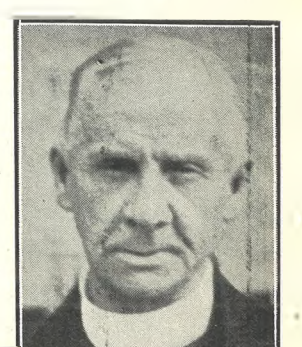
REV. W. C. MACKLIN,

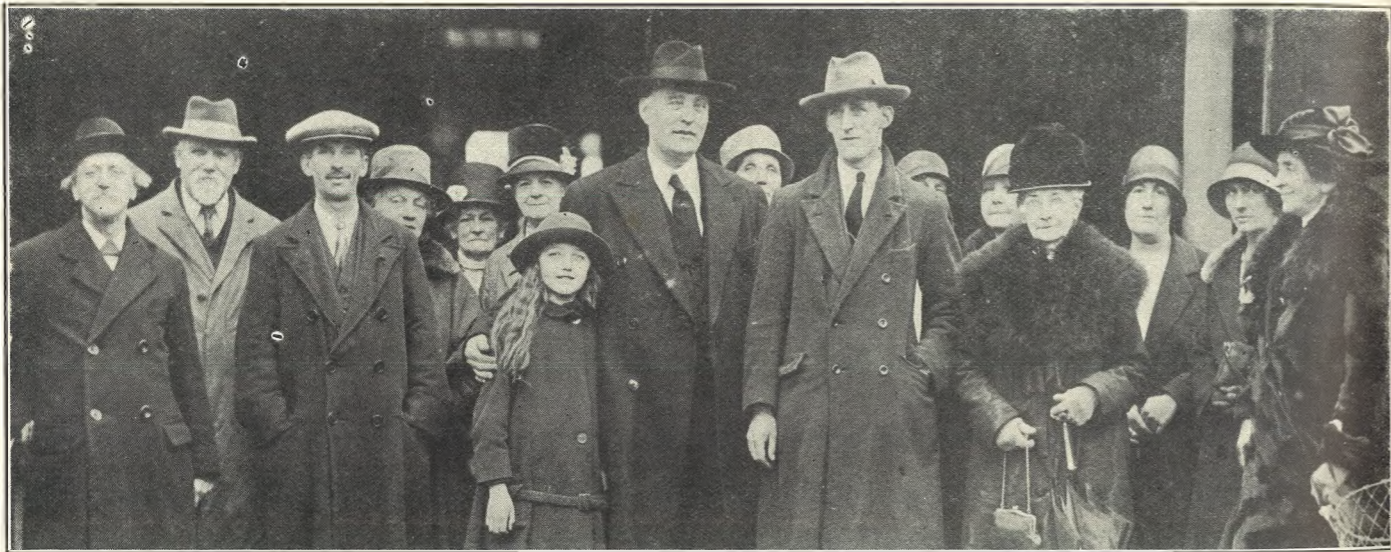

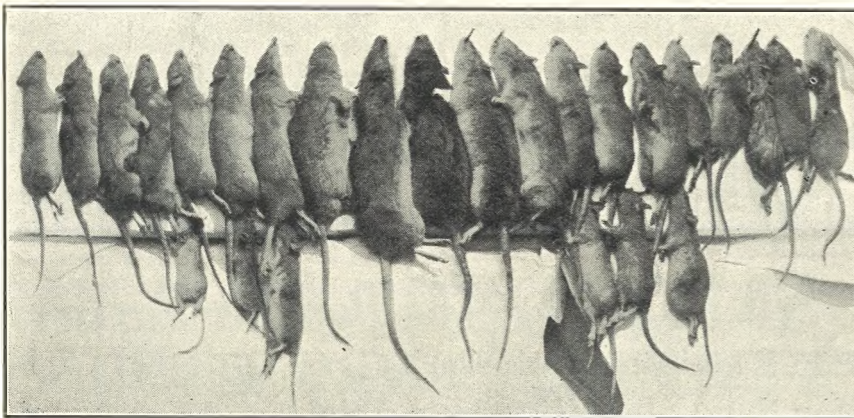


**FAREWELL TO REV. R. J. REITH.**

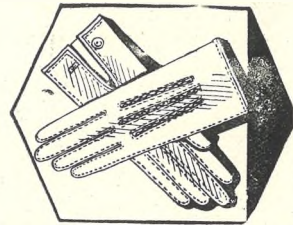

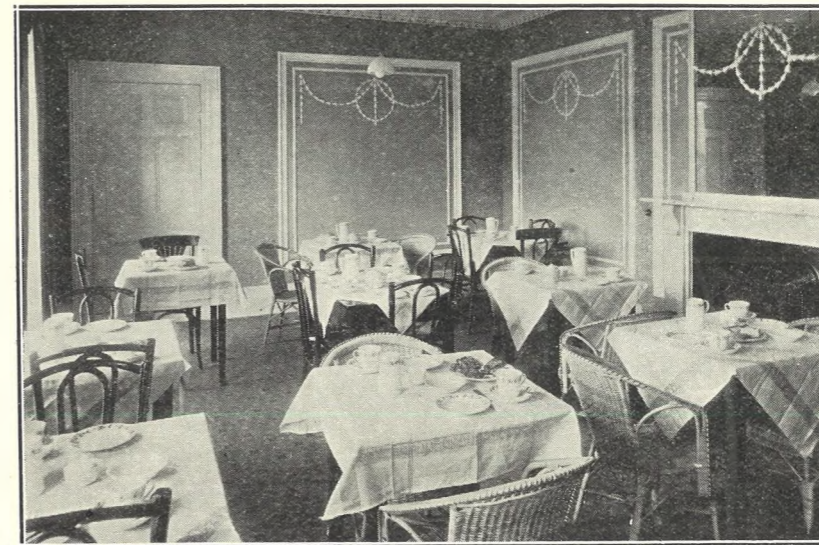

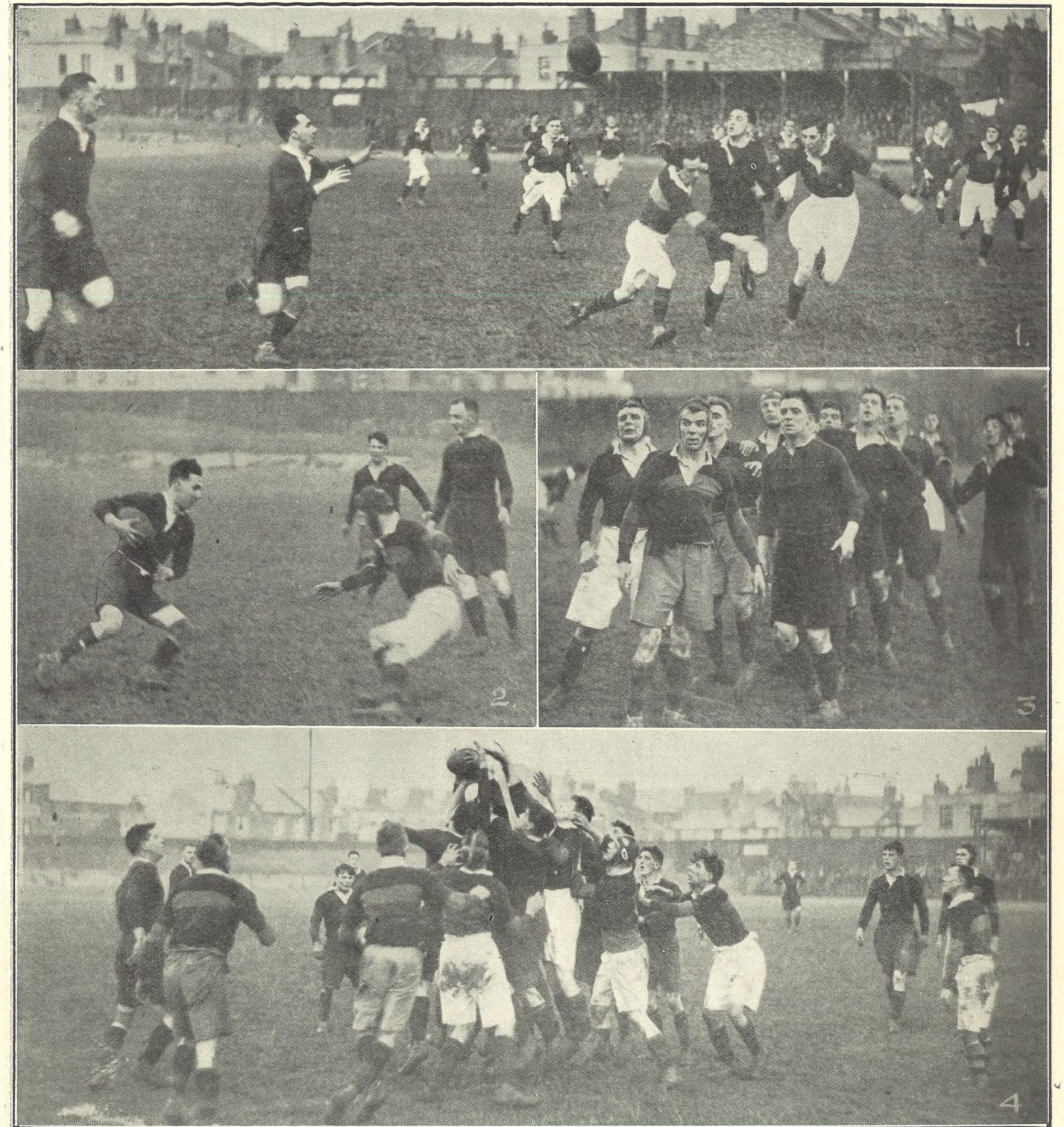

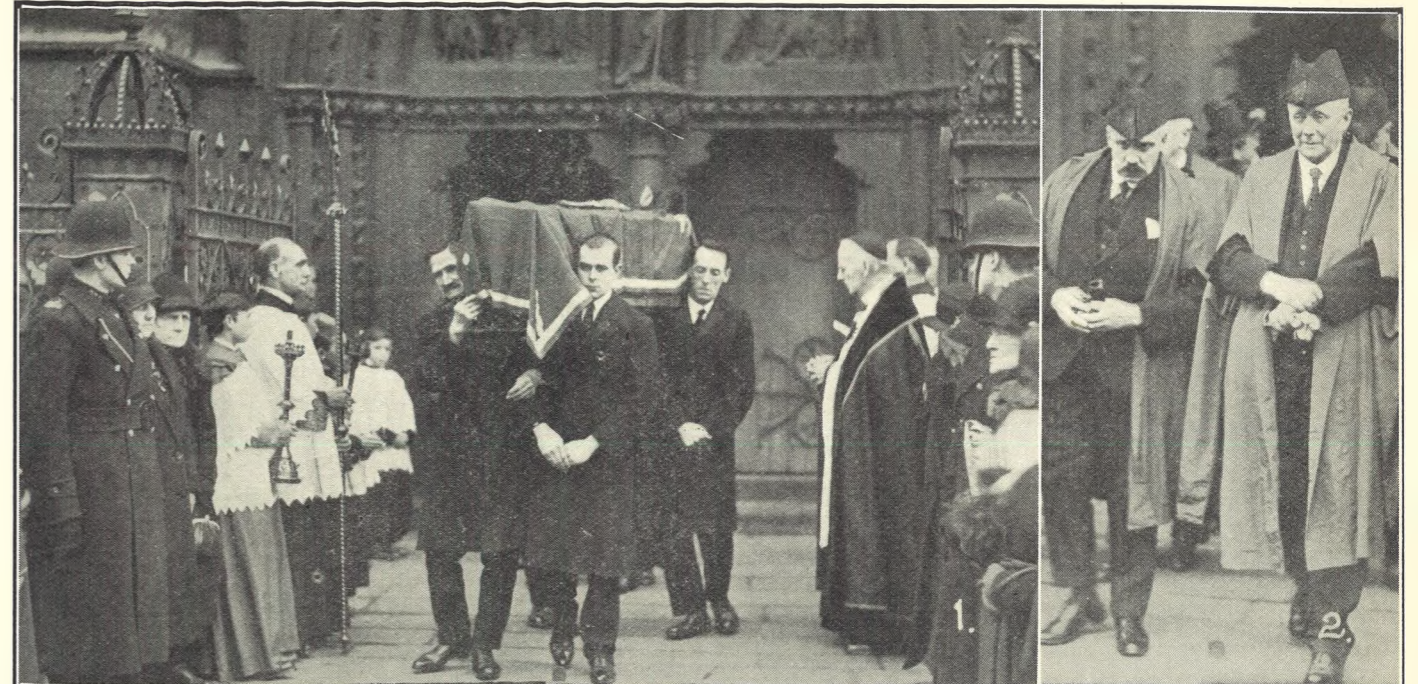
