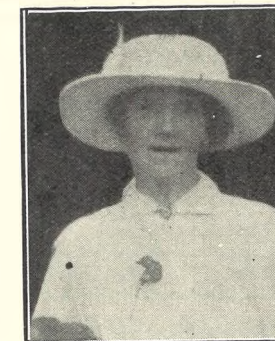
TRIPLE TRAGEDY AT GLOUCESTER: FUNERAL OF THE VICTIMS.

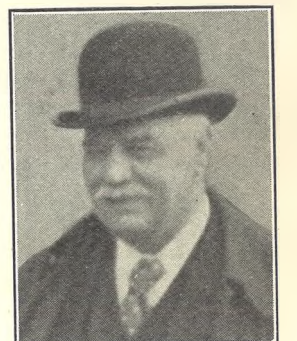


THE MOTORISTS' BALL.

PRESENTATION TO EX-POSTMAN.

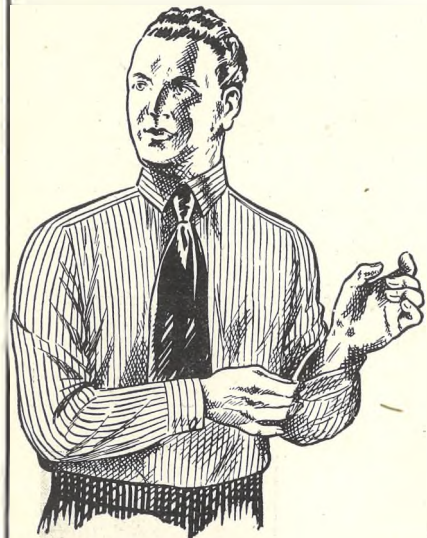

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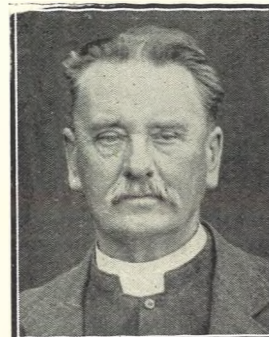
BIG CROSS COUNTRY RACE IN CHELTENHAM.

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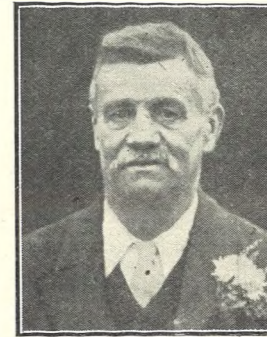

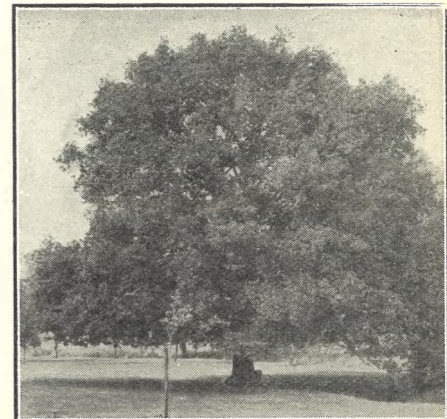

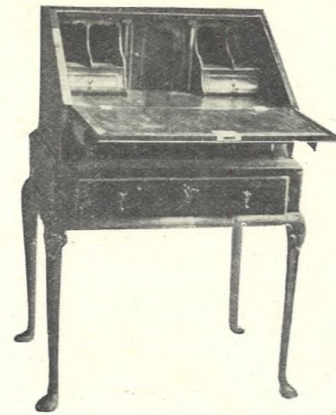

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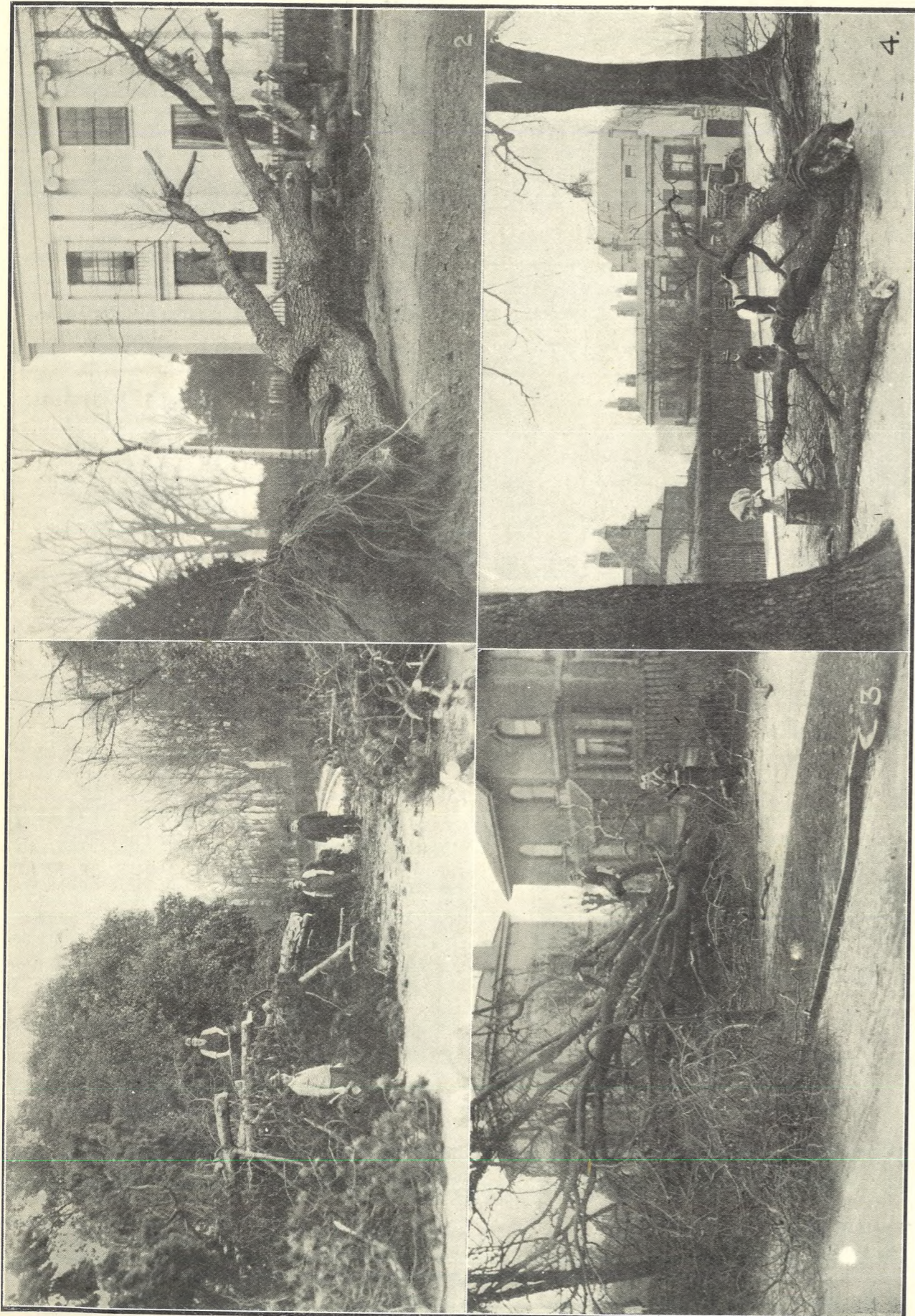

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE: GUITING TEMPLE AND FORD.

Guiting Temple, or Upper Guiting, is a secluded village on the Cotswolds, situated on the by-road from Winchcombe to the main Stow-Cheltenham road, which it joins near Naunton. The nearest stations are Toddington (4 miles) and Notgrove (6 miles). Ford is a picturesque hamlet about a mile away, lying in a hollow. Both places are in the midst of typical Cotswold scenery, beautiful in its sylvan serenity.

- 1.—Guiting Temple Church. The register dates from the year 1647. The manor was purchased by Dr. Richard Fox, Bishop of Winchester, who gave it to Corpus Christi College, which he founded, and the College Fellows are still Lords of the Manor.
