



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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE: HAWLING AND BARTON. Barton is a very small hamlet attached to the village of Guiting Temple and about two miles from there. It has two large houses (one a farm) most picturesquely situated, overlooking a lovely little valley with a trout stream flowing through it. Big-land's Gloucestershire (1786) states "Barton was parcel of the Templars' estate in Guiting, where they had two mills. one of them a fulling mill, erected by the Hospitallers, probably in the reign of Edward III., and amongst the first in this county." Rudder (1779) states: "Barton contains 7 houses and 44 inhabitants."





PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—COMPTON ABDALE.
Compton Abdale is a delightfully secluded little village, most picturesquely situated on the sides of a little valley, about a mile to the south of the Cheltenham-Northleach road. It is three miles from Andoversford and two from Withington. A beautiful spring arises in the centre of the village, known as the Crocodile—the stream of pure water flowing out of a carved stone crocodile's jaws, and forming the source of a tributary of the Coln. The church and rectory before the dissolution belonged to the Priory of St. Oswald in Gloucester, but in the 34th year of Henry VIII, was granted to the Church of St. Oswald, a most interesting little place. The churchyard is in a neglected condition, and the church is kept locked. The pinnacles on the tower are four carvea dogs sitting up, and the gargoyles are quaint and well preserved.




PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—COMPTON ABDALE.

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





